Watson stated support for the study to provide more information on the impact of having a city administrator as long as the bid for the Request for Proposal process to secure the study is open and transparent.

Lukens stated the amendment was not against the study itself but the process for which the study was brought to the budget. It was further stated this matter should be brought forward instead in a process to find a different funding source and have it be rated among other project needs.

Larson stated support for the amendment as the question of having a city administrator should be brought to residents first in the form of a referendum before having a study.

**Motion by Alderperson Lukens, seconded by Alderperson Larson, to amend 25-1109 to remove \$40,000 to fund a study for a city administrator out of the Community Development Department budget.

Kilian stated the city's budget should reflect the priorities of the Common Council and stated opposition to a number of development agreements included in the budget and development projects that benefit high-end residential developments. It was further stated opposition to Tax Incremental Districts subsidizing the wealthiest with cuts to services for regular people.

Neal stated opposition to the budget if it did not address projected deficits in the 2027 budget to fund firefighter positions. It was further stated that residents should not be asked to take the blunt of the increase in property taxes to fund the positions.

Larson questioned why a memo on a Parks and Recreation Department Repatriation Analysis was included in the packet. It was stated that the item was included not as part of the budget but as a consideration of a possible amendment.

**Motion by Larson to remove the Mayor's Parks and Recreation Department Repatriation Analysis document from the Common Council Packet.
*The Chair ruled the motion out of order as the memo was not an amendment to the budget.***

Rasmussen stated that development agreements included in the budget are not new spending but instead spending that was already committed. Rasmussen stated support of the budget as it stands.

McElhaney stated opposition to the budget as it includes a number of utility projects that are included in the budget as a whole but not voted upon individually by the Common Council.

Lukens stated support for the continuation of the lead service line replacement project included in the budget as the medical harm of lead is not reversible.

Kilian stated the inclusion of the memo was there as a suggestion of an amendment and stated opposition to the memo's inclusion.

Rasmussen stated the memo suggesting an amendment which was not vetted by the standing committees was not an appropriate discussion.

Watson stated opposition to removing the memo if its purpose was just for informational purposes.

Motion by Alderperson Larson, seconded by Alderperson Lukens, to remove the Mayor's Parks and Recreation Department Repatriation Analysis document from the Common Council Packet.

Kilian stated opposition to the budget due to a number of utility projects that are included in the budget which were not urgent, while other resident necessities needed further negotiation through strong discussion.

McElhaney stated opposition to the budget because it is disingenuous to say that every item included in the budget had been discussed by the Common Council or a standing committee.

Rasmussen stated support for a utility project included in the budget as the project seeks to relocate utilities that are not currently in the public right-of-way into the right-of-way for more accessible access to those utilities in the future. It was further stated that planning of the project on the front end, within the budget, was a more appropriate process.

Tierney stated support for the amendment because of opposition to the project being included in the budget and not because of opposition to the project itself. It was further stated that the project itself should come before the Common Council on its own and not included in the budget as a whole.

Martens stated opposition to the amendment as the project is funded through the TID that it is within and has no impact on the levy itself. It was further stated the utility needs to be moved as it is currently located above private property and not above a public right-of-way.

Rasmussen stated opposition to the amendment as removing the funding now would not earmark the funding needed to complete the project and potentially miss out on funding it through TID. It was further stated the earmark to fund the project could be supported within the budget and then ask that the final approval on the project itself come before the Common Council before commencing the project.

Motion by Alderperson Tierney, seconded by Alderperson Larson, to amend 25-1109 to remove the \$1.2 million utility relocation project near the Graebel building.

Neal stated opposition as pedestrian traffic in the area is reportedly very low and the lack of necessity for sidewalks on both sides of the road.

Kilian stated opposition for the same reasons as Neal.

Rasmussen stated that reports of low pedestrian traffic by residents who are required to maintain a sidewalk can be inaccurately reported because those residents don't want the responsibility of maintenance. Rasmussen stated support to ensure the community remains safe and walkable.

Lukens stated support because of the recommendation from the Public Works Department to build the sidewalk and because it would enhance the city's walkability.

Kilian stated concerns of the huge amount of lighting in the area with the different types of lighting being presented.

Without objection, a scrivener's error was noted within the title of 25-0910D and the error will be corrected as part of the approval of the resolution. The error was in the title which stated North 13th Street when it should say North 6th Street.

Rasmussen stated that decorative lighting outside the Central Business District adds substantial cost to build and maintain. It was also stated that decorative lighting is often viewed by residents as wasteful and stated there was no need for it in this particular area.

Martens stated support for the amendment as the decorative lighting is not appropriate for this area and also expressed concerns about preventing light pollution by minimizing brighter lighting for road reconstruction projects.

Neal stated support for the amendment to oppose decorative lighting in this area because it is not necessary.

Lukens stated support for the amendment to prevent excessive lighting which contributes to light pollution.

Without objection, a scrivener's error was noted within the body of 25-0910D and the error will be corrected as part of the approval of the resolution. The error was in the body of the resolution which authorized the budget amendment but did not authorize appropriate staff to enter into the contract.

Neal stated opposition because the optics will be presented to the public that residents are being sold an argument instead of being provided with objective statements.

Rasmussen stated support because of the need for an outside entity to create materials providing information on the referendum to residents. It was further stated support because the price was conducive to the needs of the communication materials needed.

Lukens stated support because of resident support for this communication.

Kilian stated opposition citing optics concerns similar to Neal and resident feedback that the communication was not necessary and insulted the intelligence of voters.

Neal stated the communication could be conducted by city staff using channels already available to the city. It was further stated that communication can be easily presented to the public without the need for overly decorative materials.

Watson stated support due to the need to create educational materials to put information into the public.

Lukens stated support as the city staff do not have the capacity to create effective educational materials and citing a public distrust of city staff which would create a mistrust in education materials created by staff.

Rasmussen stated residents have asked for more information on the topic of a referendum and that communication was needed to provide the information to the public.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, State Highway 52 (East Wausau Avenue) from 6th Street to 18th Street is a two-lane urban roadway and is scheduled for reconstruction in 2029; and

WHEREAS, the existing pavement has deteriorated and is reaching the end of its service life and the existing crosswalk curb ramps do not meet current Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Standards; and

WHEREAS, the proposed project includes replacement of the existing pavement, upgrades of crosswalk curb ramps, complete curb and gutter replacement in spot locations, and storm sewer repairs ; and

WHEREAS, the intersection at North 6th Street has outdated traffic signal equipment and poor accommodations for pedestrians as the curb ramps do not meet ADA standards, there are no pedestrian push buttons on the traffic signals, and the crosswalks are not marked; and

WHEREAS, the lack of turn lanes was found to be a contributing factor for ongoing crashes between North 6th Street and North 13th Street; and

WHEREAS, State Highway 52 is a designated Wausau Metropolitan Planning Organization

bicycle route from North 7th Street to County X; and

WHEREAS, on August 10, 2023, the Common Council approved a State/Municipal Agreement for East Wausau Avenue from North 6th Street to North 18th Street, which provides for the City to finance 25 percent of the cost of the design, which is estimated at \$58,500 and the total cost of the project is estimated to be \$3,498,000 and the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WDOT) is responsible for leading the design and for the reconstruction costs associated with the roadway; and

WHEREAS, a Public Information Meeting was held on May 14, 2025, and a comment period was held until May 28, 2025, but WisDOT will continue to accept and address comments throughout the life of the project; and

WHEREAS, your Infrastructure and Facilities Committee met on June 12, 2025 to discuss the design alternatives for State Highway 52 (East Wausau Avenue) from North 6th Street to North 18th Street and recommends approval of Alternative A2 which includes two 11-foot travel lanes with 12-foot median turn lane, which would help reduce impacts and calm traffic with narrower lanes, a 4-foot bike lane with standard 30-inch curb and gutter, new sidewalks ranging from 5 feet to 6 feet in width, and maintaining a 5-foot boulevard where feasible for green space and tree planting, with lighting and sidewalk impacts independent of which alternative is selected; and

WHEREAS, your Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee met on June 23, 2025, and recommended to the Infrastructure and Facilities Committee, to adopt an alternative design that includes a 25 mph speed limit from 6th Street to 18th Street, creates an 8 to 10 foot wide multi-use trail on one or both sides of the roadway, with 3-5 foot terraces/street trees, with left turn lanes only at high priority intersections mainly 13th Street and 18th Street, add pedestrian refuge islands at 6th Street, 7th Street, 8th Street, and 13th Street for traffic calming and to aid pedestrian circulation, while not expanding right of way width or with limited property acquisition; and

WHEREAS, your Infrastructure and Facilities Committee met on July 10, 2025, and tabled the item to allow for consideration of a multiuse trail; and

WHEREAS, your Infrastructure and Facilities Committee met on August 14, 2025, and recommends approval of Alternative A2 from 6th Street to 13th Street which includes two 11-foot travel lanes with 12-foot median turn lane, 4-foot bike lane with standard 30-inch curb and gutter, new sidewalks ranging from 5 feet to 6 feet in width on both sides of the roadway, and maintaining a 5-foot boulevard where feasible for green space and tree planting, and Alternative C1 from 13th Street to 18th Street which includes two 12-foot travel lanes, 4-foot bike lane with standard 30-inch curb and gutter, a new 5-foot sidewalk on the north side, a 10-foot multiuse path on the south side, maintaining a 4-foot to 6-foot boulevard where feasible, standard overhead lighting to include 30-foot poles and cobra heads from 10th Street to 18th Street, and decorative lighting to match existing City decorative lighting from 6th Street to 10th Street; and

WHEREAS, the Common Council met on September 9th, 2025 and considered a resolution approving Alternative A2 from 6th Street to 13th Street which includes two 11-foot travel lanes with 12-foot median turn lane, 4-foot bike lane with standard 30-inch curb and gutter, new sidewalks ranging from 5 feet to 6 feet in width on both sides of the roadway, and maintaining a 5-foot boulevard where feasible for green space and tree planting, and Alternative C1 from 13th Street to 18th Street which includes two 12-foot travel lanes, 4-foot bike lane with standard 30-inch curb and gutter, a new 5-foot sidewalk on the north side, a 10-foot multiuse path on the south side, maintaining a 4-foot to 6-foot boulevard where feasible, standard overhead lighting to include 30-foot poles and cobra heads from 10th

Street to 18th Street, and decorative lighting to match existing City decorative lighting from 6th Street to 10th Street and the resolution failed; and

WHEREAS, a second Public Information Meeting was held on September 29, 2025, and a comment period was held until October 27, 2025, but WisDOT will continue to accept and address comments throughout the life of the project; and

WHEREAS, based upon public comments received at the Public Informational Meeting, comments from Staff, and comments from WisDOT, the following cross section is proposed: Alternative C2, which includes two 11-foot travel lanes with 12-foot median turn lane, 78-inch curb and gutter to accommodate a 5-foot bike lane, new sidewalks ranging from 5 feet to 6 feet in width on both sides of the roadway, and maintaining a 5-foot boulevard where feasible for green space and tree planting from 6th Street to 13th street and from 13th Street to 18th Street two 11-foot travel lanes, and 78-inch curb and gutter to accommodate a 5-foot bike lane.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED the Common Council of the City of Wausau hereby approves recommending to WisDOT the adoption of Alternative C2, which includes two 11-foot travel lanes with 12-foot median turn lane, 78-inch curb and gutter to accommodate a 5-foot bike lane, new sidewalks ranging from 5 feet to 6 feet in width on both sides of the roadway, and maintaining a 5-foot boulevard where feasible for green space and tree planting from 6th Street to 13th Street and from 13th Street to 18th Street two 11-foot travel lanes, and 78-inch curb and gutter to accommodate a 5-foot bike lane.
