Minutes of previous meetings. (11/15/21)

Motion by Herbst, second by Wadinski to approve the minutes of the previous meeting on 11/15/21. Motion carried 5-0.

Consider approval or denial of various license applications.

Lisa Rasmussen stated there were two denial recommendations for Operator Licenses for Austyn Savaske and Chris Summerfield. It was noted Austyn Savaske was not present.

Chris Summerfield addressed the committee stating he did not fully understand the process for which his application was denied. He stated the letter indicated the reason was due to a battery conviction from three years ago and that it was an exempt offense. He stated he has come a long way since that incident and has moved to another state to avoid the person involved in the battery. He came back here specifically because his mother is ill, and he is working at a gas station. He noted he obtained Operator's Licenses in Rothschild and Weston prior to this, but his job transferred to the store in Wausau.

Peckham questioned what the definition of "exempt offense" is. Police Chief Ben Bliven stated individuals with an exempt offense on their record do not have the ability by statute to provide evidence of rehabilitation. Most offenses are non-exempt, which provides for the ability to show evidence of rehabilitation to be approved. Battery is an exempt offense. Assistant City Attorney Tara Alfonso added it means we are not discriminating against someone if we fail to approve them for licensing based on the existence of an "exempt" offense. She pointed out that doesn't mean the city cannot approve it but it is not required to; it is not employment discrimination under the state statutes to fail to make that exception.

Summerfield stated he works at a gas station and only needs the license to sell alcohol from the store. Rasmussen stated the license is city wide and could also be used at a tavern or other Class B establishment and there is no provision for a restricted license to sell at retail only establishments. Summerfield stated he has changed since the incident and is very patient with himself and everyone else and tries to think before acting or speaking in both personal and professional situations. Alfonso questioned if he had taken any anger management classes and Summerfield responded that he had not but was willing to.

Peckham questioned if there were other offenses on the record that the Chief considered in his denial recommendation or if he knew if the battery was alcohol related. Chief Bliven stated he did not know if it was alcohol related, it was domestic violence related battery conviction from 2018. There were additional charges from 2016 to which a no contest plea was entered for bail jumping and neglecting a child, both misdemeanors. He stated he reviews the policy the Council created when he makes recommendations on denial or approval and tries to be as consistent as possible. He felt the conviction was relatively recent and that is part of his consideration. He indicated his denial recommendation remains.

Motion by Peckham, second by McElhaney to approve or deny licenses as recommended by staff, except for Chris Summerfield to be voted on separately. Motion carried 5-0.

Motion by Peckham, second by Herbst to approve the Operator License for Chris Summerfield.

Becky McElhaney questioned if he was working at a Wausau RStore by Fleet Farm and if he had worked anywhere else. Summerfield confirmed he was currently working at the Wausau location and had previously worked at The Store in Weston and at the Schofield RStore location. He commented he did not intend to bartend or use the license for anything but retail

A vote was taken on approval of the license. Motion carried 4-1 (*Rasmussen was the dissenting vote.*).

Operations Report from Fire Department for November 2021

Deputy Chief Jeremy Kopp pointed out they changed the look of the monthly Fire Department Report to better tell our story as a department as well as an organization, and to make it easier to compile an annual report out of the monthly reports. He stated they would be happy to put in anything else the committee felt should be in the report. He noted it now tells the story from all the divisions as well as the charitable foundation and some of the things they are doing. *Report placed on file.*

Tavern Activities / Compliance Checks / Law Enforcement Activities

Chief Ben Bliven presented the tavern report for November 1, 2021 through November 30, 2021.

Chief Ben Bliven stated he had a conversation with Ashley, the manager of the Cop Shoppe, who indicated they are experiencing some difficulties with some of the clientele, and that she is working with staff on setting boundaries, knowing when to call police, etc. He stated they accepted a meeting with Lt. Felder for the first week in January where he will talk to their staff about de-escalation. Bliven stated the manager also commented to him that they believe some of the clientele from Roc's Place has moved there and that is why they are experiencing some of the issues. He indicated he received a message last week from the owner of the bar who expressed the same thing and that their intention is to close at midnight, effective immediately to head off some of the issues they are seeing from the really late-night bar crowd.

Bliven stated he talked to Ashley about the video system they have which is very old. Apparently, the only way to get video off of the system is to go into the system, hit play, and then record the video with an iPhone. He encouraged her to investigate new video systems to find one more easily accessible. He noted he is having extra patrols to the bar to help minimize the issues.

Adjourn

Motion by Herbst, second by Peckham to adjourn the meeting. Motion carried unanimously. Meeting adjourned at 5:35 pm.

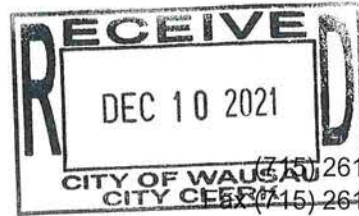

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Rent Abatement Program for Rental Units

The Common Council of the City of Wausau adopted the Rent Abatement Program effective April 1, 2012 (Section 16.04.037 of the Wausau Municipal Code). Rent abatement is a process by which tenants living in rental units with certain unrepaired conditions may qualify for rent reduction if property owners do not comply with inspection orders.

Residents may report conditions to the Division of Inspection and Zoning by calling 715.261.6780. Inspections will provide notice to tenants if abatable conditions persist after the owner has received notice of code violations and failed to correct issues prior to reinspection. Once notified of abatement eligibility, tenants have 30 days to request a hearing before the City's Public Health and Safety Committee by completing a request form available at the Customer Service Desk at City Hall or go to the link below. A fee of \$25 must be submitted with the form to the City Clerk. Once these are received, a hearing is scheduled. Testimony and evidence are presented by both sides for Committee consideration. If abatement is awarded, the tenant may deduct the approved percentage of the rent retroactive to the date of the original violation notice.

A list of abatable conditions is included below. Conditions include, but are not limited to issues with heating systems, electrical, plumbing, security, moisture, pests, safety and structural issues. A list of addresses with unresolved abatable violations will be posted on this website. Residents and prospective tenants may view the list to determine if a unit they are in or considering renting has serious issues.

YOU CAN PROVIDE PROOF REGARDING ANY OF THE FOLLOWING QUESTIONS BY PRESENTING:

- A) your own testimony
- B) the testimony of any witness you call
- C) the questions you ask of the other party at the hearing
- D) documents obtained from Inspection & Zoning Division and brought to the hearing
- E) photos
- F) any other relevant documents

BE PREPARED TO PROVE THE FOLLOWING:

- Are the code violations in question actually on the "Rent Impairing Violations List?" (Review the list of "Rent Impairing Violations" available at Inspection's tab on the City of Wausau website and note which one(s) are the actual violations in this case. Example: H-302.0 and H-303.0 addresses floors, wall, ceilings, roof, however, there are three possible violations under that section, all of which have different abatement amounts.
- When did the tenancy begin, and when will it end?
- What is the monthly rent?
- Did building inspection violations occur?
- What date did an inspector note a violation(s)?
- When did the violation(s) actually first start affecting the tenant?
- What was the original "due date" given by the inspector for getting the repairs made?
- What was the date the inspector certified that the repairs were completed? OR, show that the repairs have not yet been certified as completed by the inspector.
- On what date were the repairs actually completed? OR, show that they have not yet been completed.
- How are or were the tenants affected by the violations? GIVE DETAILS about the individual nature, extent and seriousness of the violations in this case.

This notice is written to notify you that the property listed above is in noncompliance with the referenced sections of the City of Wausau Municipal Code.

1. Violation: WMC 16.04.010 adopting BOCA H-303.8 Interior walls, ceilings and floors: All interior walls, ceilings and floors shall be structurally sound, in good repair, free from defects, clean and painted and decorated.

Required Action: The kitchen floor in disrepair shall be repaired or replaced. (This may be a rent abatable item.)

Compliance by: November 16, 2021

2. Violation: WMC 16.04.010 adopting BOCA H-400.4 Heating facilities: Every dwelling and multi-family dwelling shall have heating facilities, and the owner of the heating facilities shall be required to see that they are properly installed, safely maintained and in good working condition, and that they are capable of safely and adequately heating all habitable rooms, bathrooms and toilet rooms located therein, to a temperature of at least an average of seventy (70) degrees Fahrenheit.

Required Action: The furnace shall be replaced by a professional HVAC technician. (This may be a rent abatable item.)

Compliance by: November 09, 2021

3. Violation: WMC 16.04.010 adopting BOCA H-401.2.1 Maintained clean and sanitary: All building facilities shall be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition by the occupant so as not to breed insects and rodents or produce dangerous or offensive gases or odors.

Required Action: The excreta on the shower curtain, floor, and bath tub shall be removed, and the whole bathroom sanitized.

Compliance by: November 02, 2021

4. Violation: WMC 16.04.010 adopting BOCA H-401.4 Plumbing systems: In buildings and structures, every plumbing stack, waste and sewer line shall be so installed and maintained as to function properly and shall be kept free from obstructions, leaks and defects to prevent structural deterioration or health hazards. All repairs and installations shall be made in accordance with the provisions of the building code or plumbing code of the municipality.

Required Action: The damaged section of waste stack in the basement not properly repaired, shall be removed, and properly replaced by a professional plumber. (This may be a rent abatable item.)

Compliance by: November 09, 2021

5. Violation: WMC 16.04.010 adopting BOCA H-401.6 Electrical outlets and fixtures: Every electrical outlet and fixture, as required in Section H-403.0 shall be installed, maintained and connected to the source of electric power in accordance with the provisions of the building code or electrical code of the municipality.

Required Action: The open electrical box, as well as the ceiling light hanging from the electrical box in the basement shall be properly repaired. (This may be a rent abatable item.)

Compliance by: November 09, 2021

6. Violation: WMC 16.04.010 adopting BOCA H-500.3 Disposal of rubbish: Every occupant of a building or part thereof shall dispose of all his rubbish in a clean and sanitary manner by placing it in the rubbish containers required by Section H-400.5 of this code.

Required Action: The trash and scrap building materials in the basement as well as the trash/debris scattered about the entire house shall be removed and disposed of properly.

Compliance by: November 02, 2021

7. Violation: WMC 17.08.010 adopting SPS 328.03 Smoke Detectors

Required Action: Smoke detectors shall be installed on every floor. (This may be a rent abatable item.)

Compliance by: October 31, 2021

8. Violation: WMC 17.08.010 adopting SPS 328.04 Carbon Monoxide Detectors

Required Action: Carbon monoxide detectors shall be installed on every floor. (This may be a rent abatable item.)

Compliance by: October 31, 2021

9. Violation: WMC 16.04.010 adopting BOCA H-303.8 Interior walls, ceilings and floors: All interior walls, ceilings and floors shall be structurally sound, in good repair, free from defects, clean and painted and decorated.

Required Action: The hole in the dining room ceiling shall be properly repaired, and painted. (This may be a rent abatable item.)

Compliance by: November 09, 2021

10. Violation: WMC 16.04.010 adopting BOCA H-303.8 Interior walls, ceilings and floors: All interior walls, ceilings and floors shall be structurally sound, in good repair, free from defects, clean and painted and decorated.

Required Action: The tile on the living room floor, shall be removed, and the floor made uniform and useable. (This may be a rent abatable item.)

Compliance by: November 23, 2021

11. Violation: WMC 16.04.010 adopting BOCA H-303.8 Interior walls, ceilings and floors: All interior walls, ceilings and floors shall be structurally sound, in good repair, free from defects, clean and painted and decorated.

Required Action: The floors in the dining room, and bedrooms shall be made uniform, and useable. (This may be a rent abatable item.)

Compliance by: November 23, 2021

12. Violation: WMC 16.04.010 adopting BOCA H-302.5 Roofs: The roof shall be structurally sound, tight, and have no defects which might admit rain, and roof drainage shall be adequate to prevent rain water from causing dampness in the walls or interior portion of the building.

Required Action: The roof shall be replaced. (A building permit is required to replace the roof.)

Compliance by: December 17, 2021

13. Violation: WMC 16.04.010 adopting BOCA H-302.5 Roofs: The roof shall be structurally sound, tight, and have no defects which might admit rain, and roof drainage shall be adequate to prevent rain water from causing dampness in the walls or interior portion of the building.

Required Action: The garage roof shall be replaced. (A building permit is required to replace the roof.)

Compliance by: December 17, 2021

December 2021 Fire Chief's Report

This December report will be slightly abbreviated as we prepare to report the data from all of 2021 in our Annual Report that we will present in February to the Police and Fire Commission and the Public Health and Safety. We are currently redesigning our monthly reports and will also begin producing annual reports for the first time since 2015.

The Wausau Fire Department kept up its high pace through December. The operations division was busy responding to a high call volume and in the gaps gearing up for cold weather operations and training on winter topics like ice and cold-water rescue.

The administration division had several impactful projects either completed or moved forward. Here is a brief list of some of the most notable items:

Assistance to Firefighter Grant (AFG) – The department writes this grant annually and has successfully received projects funds for the last three years. These projects have had a significant impact on the department, and this year will be no different. We wrote a two-pronged grant request in which we requested a turn-out gear washer/extractor and dryer cabinet for Fire Station Three and an MSA Lunar firefighter location system.

Extractor and Dryer: This will be identical to the extractor and dryer that was installed into the new Fire Station Two in 2020. Currently, Station Three does not have an extractor and dryer, so firefighters must bring their gear to Station One, wash it, and dry it between their work shifts. This addition will aid in the Cancer prevention efforts that the department has been under for an extended period of time.

MSA Lunar System: This is a brand new technology that utilizes technology already built into our SCBA packs to locate downed firefighters. We trialed the BETA designs for this system in early 2021 and were impressed with how the technology works. It uses small handheld units that can search for a firefighter either lost or down in a structure fire. This system also comes with some personnel accountability software that fireground commanders can utilize for accountability management. This will aid Rapid Intervention Teams in quickly finding and extricating downed firefighters from potentially dangerous situations.

Additional Firefighter Initiative: On December 13, we presented the case for additional firefighter/paramedics to the Human Resources Committee. The Committee examined deployment and recommended hiring 12 additional firefighter/paramedics. The three positions added to the requested nine are to allow another vacation/time off slot on each fire crew. Currently, WFD staff have more paid time off hours than available hours in the time off calendar. This step will keep overtime to a minimum because the department will have enough time off slots to allow employees off without hiring back overtime.

Chaplains: Under the leadership and guidance of Chaplain Sheldon Miles, he selected Pastor Eric Olson and Pastor Mike Fox to join the WFD chaplain team. We introduced two new volunteer Chaplains to the department members during three crew meet and greet sessions. Each Chaplain is assigned to a fire station, and they have already begun their service. Sheldon Miles will be the Chaplain serving at Station One, Chaplain Mike Fox and Station Two, and Chaplain Eric Olson at Station Three. On February 4, 2022,

we will be holding a Chaplain Oath of Service ceremony in conjunction with a Swear-In Ceremony for the new firefighter/paramedics.

Ideal Team Player workshop: We were privileged to have Carey O'Conner from The 4Sight Group present organizational culture and teamwork lessons to our staff. She started the presentations with one of the toughest challenges we have faced in training....the dreaded spaghetti & marshmallow challenge. Teams had 15 minutes to build a tower that would hold a marshmallow on top using only spaghetti noodles, string, and tape. It proved to be a fun exercise filled with insightful teamwork lessons. The crews had a lot of fun and learned some insightful lessons on being a great team player. We look forward to having Carey back again in 2022.

Station Two Warming Shelter: On December 16, we received a request from Emergency Management to open one of the fire stations as a warming shelter. That night 3100 Marathon County residents were without power on a bitterly cold winter night. We opened up the Fire Station Two Training room to the public for use. We advertised the warming shelter over our social media pages. That evening two people dropped off donated food for those seeking refuge, and two people came and used the room for a few hours in the night.

Diversity Project Introduced: In December, I was asked if Wausau Fire has any Hmong firefighters. We don't. This fact is something we have been seeking to change. As an organization, we are firmly committed to recruiting strong, diverse, talented firefighter/paramedics to serve our community. And we believe that our department should be a reflection of the community we serve. We will be a stronger team when all segments of our society are represented across our ranks.

We want you to see us as a reflection of all of you so we can serve you better. This improved service will be in the form of a greater understanding of cultures, languages, traditions, and expectations. We have a positive and accepting culture that is excited to welcome new people with unique backgrounds and experiences to improve our outstanding team further.

Our efforts around this initiative have included attending and recruiting at various community events such as La Fiesta and the Hmong American Festival, where we sought to connect with potential firefighters. This past fall, we invited the community to participate in our first-ever Wausau Fire Career Night. In addition, we have increased the size of our Fire Department Explorers group and have been speaking at area schools and youth groups about potential careers in the fire service. Despite all this, we feel we can do more and seek help from the community.

We are continuing to seek opportunities to build relationships with underrepresented groups and individuals to grow and develop conduit paths to employment with our department. If you are interested in assisting the Wausau Fire Department with inspiring and creating change, please contact me, Fire Chief Bob Barteck, at robert.barteck@ci.wausau.wi.us.

Afghan Refugee Team: We were asked by Deputy Police Chief Matt Barnes for volunteers to serve on a new team that would work to welcome the new Afghan refugees on behalf of the public safety agencies in the community. Three members of the Fire Department volunteered and will be serving on the combined team under the expert leadership of Deputy Chief Barnes. The team had a kick-off meeting and is pressing forward to find solutions to many of the hurdles that are anticipated thus far. The most

significant is the language barrier, and the team has several potential solutions they are currently exploring.

Counting Rules

Counts on this page are based on the month of the incident or arrest, rather than the month the incident was submitted. If the incident date is unknown, the report date is used. Counts are subject to change as data are updated.

Offense counts are calculated based on the number of offenses for each victim (per incident) for Crimes Against Persons and the number of unique offense types (per incident) for Crimes Against Property and Crimes Against Society. For burglary and motor vehicle theft, offense counts are based on the number of premises entered and the number of vehicles stolen, respectively.

Victim counts are calculated based on the number of victims connected to each unique offense type in an incident. For Crimes Against Persons, the number of victims will be equal to the number of offenses. Victims will be counted more than once if they are connected to multiple offenses.

Arrest counts are calculated based on the number of arrestees listed on a Group A or Group B incident. Each arrestee is counted only once per incident. Arrests are categorized based on the specific Group A or Group B arrest code submitted by the agency, rather than the incident offense code. Since agencies only submit the most serious arrest charge for each arrestee on an incident, arrest counts are not indicative of the number of charges.

Incidents are cleared in one of two ways: by arrest or by exceptional means. Clearance counts are based on the number of offenses cleared in a given month regardless of when the offense occurred, and can therefore be greater than the number of offenses in a given month. In incident-based reporting, the first arrest on an incident, or an exceptional clearance, will clear all offenses associated with the incident.



Overview:

- The Community Resource Unit followed up further on a November non-fatal heroin overdose that resulted in the arrest of 4 individuals being arrested and the seizure of methamphetamine, THC, heroin, drug paraphernalia and over \$13,000 in cash.
- Officers assisted DCI Agents with the execution of a search warrant at 616 ½ Fulton St in regards to a multiple jurisdiction large scale heroin case.
- 14 different individuals were arrested with a total of 45 felony charges and 15 misdemeanor charges.

Oct - Dec 2021 in the Community Resource Unit

- **There were 10 reported Heroin overdoses in the City during the months of October - December**
 - Three fatal, still under investigation
 - Five uncooperative victims, no further investigation.
 - Two cooperative victims, 3 people arrested in one investigation, 2 arrested in the second.
- **39 traffic stops resulting in 35 vehicle searches, by CRO officers.**
 - Several arrests, seized drugs leading to below investigations
- **Conducted drug trafficking investigations to include;**
 - **5 Search warrants (1 assisting DCI agents in a multiple jurisdiction Heroin case)**
 - 3 warrants were follow up to Heroin overdoses.
 - **3 controlled buys into drug traffickers. Starting investigations into drug dealing within the city.**
 - **Seized almost 8 ounces (210 grams) of Methamphetamine**
 - One use is usually around 0.1 gram (point)
 - *2,100 doses/uses seized this quarter*
 - **Seized over 650 different prescription pills**
 - **Seized 16 grams of Heroin**
 - One use is .05 - 0.1 gram (half point or point)
 - *160-320 uses/doses seized this quarter*
 - **Seized almost 4 pounds (1634 grams) of Marijuana**
 - a gram will produce 1 to 2 joints
 - *1600 - 3200 JOINTS worth seized this quarter*
 - **Seized 4 firearms and \$14,238 in cash seized during above investigations**

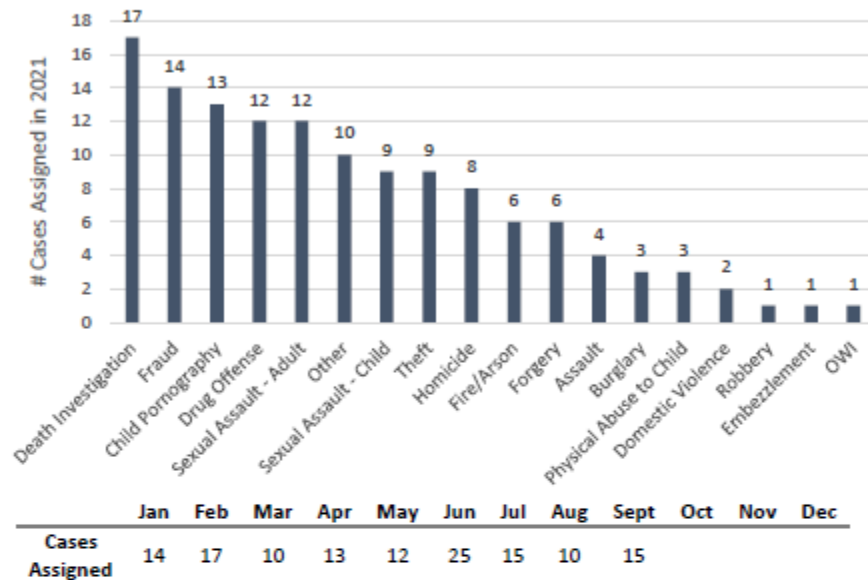

Detective Case Load by Crime Type



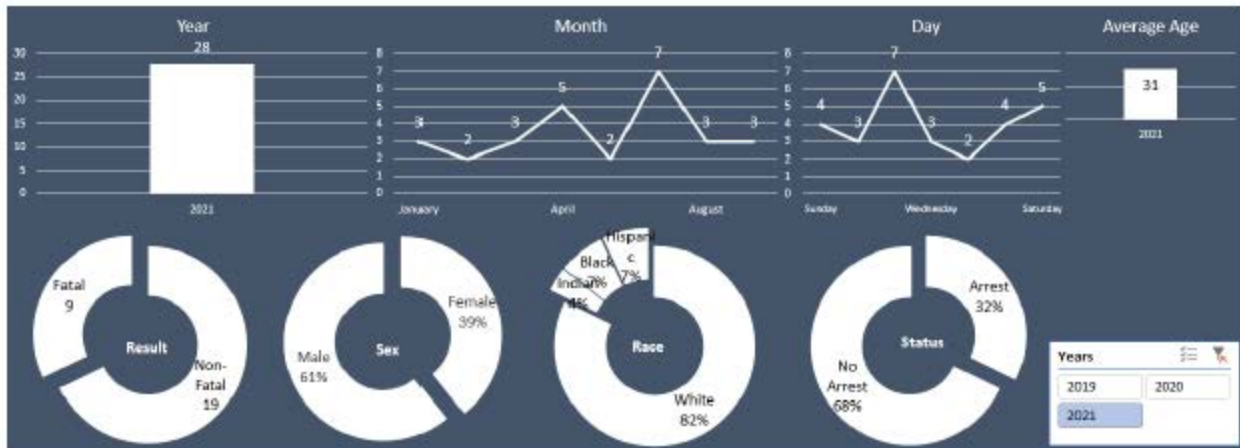

Drug Overdoses – Quarterly Report

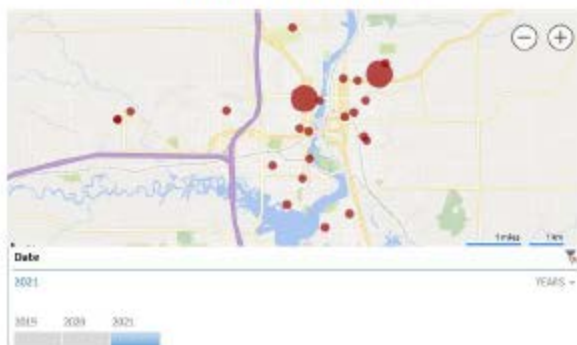
Year to Date (through September, 2021)

"CFS": Calls For Service (Officer initiated activities and calls received from Dispatch).

"Mental Health" and **"Welfare Check"** are the two most common types of CFS (coded by Dispatch based on the initial information reported) that involve individuals in crisis.

"Community" origin of 51.15 / 51.45: Law enforcement is called to a location in the community (*residence, business, public location*) in response to an individual in crisis (or incapacitated). De-escalation, safety planning, and/or diversion is not viable or is unsuccessful, resulting in 51.15 or 51.45 detention.

"Facility" origin of 51.15: While under care or custody of the Jail, NCHC, or medical facility; an inmate or patient is suicidal or otherwise assessed on-site by a Crisis Professional, and deemed in need of 51.15. Law Enforcement is then called upon to confirm and complete the 51.15 (as required by WI Stats.) **Lacks opportunity for diversion.**

"51.15": "Emergency Detention" under WI Statute 51.15. Law enforcement may take into custody an individual who is:

- (1) Mentally ill, drug dependent or developmentally disabled, and;
- (2) A substantial probability of physical harm to him/herself or others is evident by recent acts or omissions, attempts or threats.

2021 Summary

Officer Eric Lemirand

- Assignment began September 21, 2020.

Primary partners:

Goals:

- Build relationships with homeless persons by learning their individual stories, with regular in-person contacts. Identify individual needs, barriers to success and any pre-existing support systems.
- Connect with community partners; to assist individuals with immediate basic needs and with overcoming barriers to housing and employment.
- Provide ongoing support and mentorship to individuals in making steps toward substance abuse treatment, sobriety, acquiring housing and acquiring employment.

Funding support (*for McClellan House rent/utilities/supplies, and client support costs*):

- Greenheck Foundation:
 - \$10,000 grant (issued to WPD)
 - \$10,000 grant (issued to NCHC)
- TC Energy: \$2,500 grant (issued to WPD)
- In-kind donations: \$2,550 (issued to WPD)
- *Current funding balance:*
 - WPD: \$8,7212
 - NCHC: \$0

McClellan House outcomes (*January – December 2021*):

- Occupancy started January 2021, leased by NCHC.
- 12 male residents, with varying lengths of stay.
 - Shortest stay: 2 weeks | Longest stay: 10-11 months
 - 3: Transitioned to self-supported housing and employment.
 - 4: Housed to other transitional / assisted / recovery living.
 - 4: Reverted back to homelessness, substance abuse.
 - 1: Arrested for property crimes, released to homelessness.



- McClellan House challenges:
 - o Opportunities for residents to sabotage self and/or roommates' progress when unsupervised.
 - o For those securing income/employment, motivation to move out in a timely manner (and use money saved to pay own rent/expenses) was low.
 - o Some wanted to accept the benefits of this housing, but tested limits, were not ready to reduce substance use, and/or rejected efforts to be guided toward treatment or employment.

Officer street outreach outcomes (apart from McClellan House):

- Summer 2020: 22 chronically homeless / at-risk individuals identified by WPD, via responses to Gazebo/Big Bull Falls Park area. As of September 2021, 12 of those 22 had progressed into being housed.
- For those continuing to be homeless, HTF has helped many make positive steps, and overall relationship with Police Officers is improved.
- 42 total persons having had contact with WPD / HTF, identified as being homeless or at-risk at some point before or during this initiative. 29 of those currently have housing. "At-risk" included persons/families reported to HTF with homelessness on the horizon (common sources: prison/jail releases, pending evictions, deteriorating mental health).
- Of those identified as still homeless, CART / HTF have engaged with most or all at some level; some are just not ready yet to accept services, treatment offered, or still struggle with mental health barriers to progress.
- Several new persons have relocated to Wausau in homelessness during this initiative.

Assessment of impact on jail bookings:

- Reviewed MNSO jail records for identified homeless persons
 - o Nov. 2018 -2020 (Pre-HTF) vs. 2021 (HTF active) [*Superior records began Nov. 2018*].
- Persons who progressed into housing (locally or elsewhere): Nearly all had 0 MNSO bookings in 2021.
- Persons still homeless: consistent reduction in bookings in 2021, compared to Pre-HTF period.

Overall assessment / opinion of service gaps and needs:

- 24-hour supervision and advocacy at recovery housing.
- Availability of local MMT recovery (or similar) program. (*When Officers/advocates obtain agreement from people to participate in treatment, to have immediate availability to get started*).
- Availability of Mobile Crisis Professionals on night shift.
- Transportation availability for people whom have services set up, and need transportation in order to follow through on appointments.
- Additional case manager/social worker roles, to serve as outreach advocates in the field, to engage and advocate for clients on high-frequency basis in-person, where there are.



- Availability of affordable housing.
- A means to remove satisfied evictions from the individuals' records.

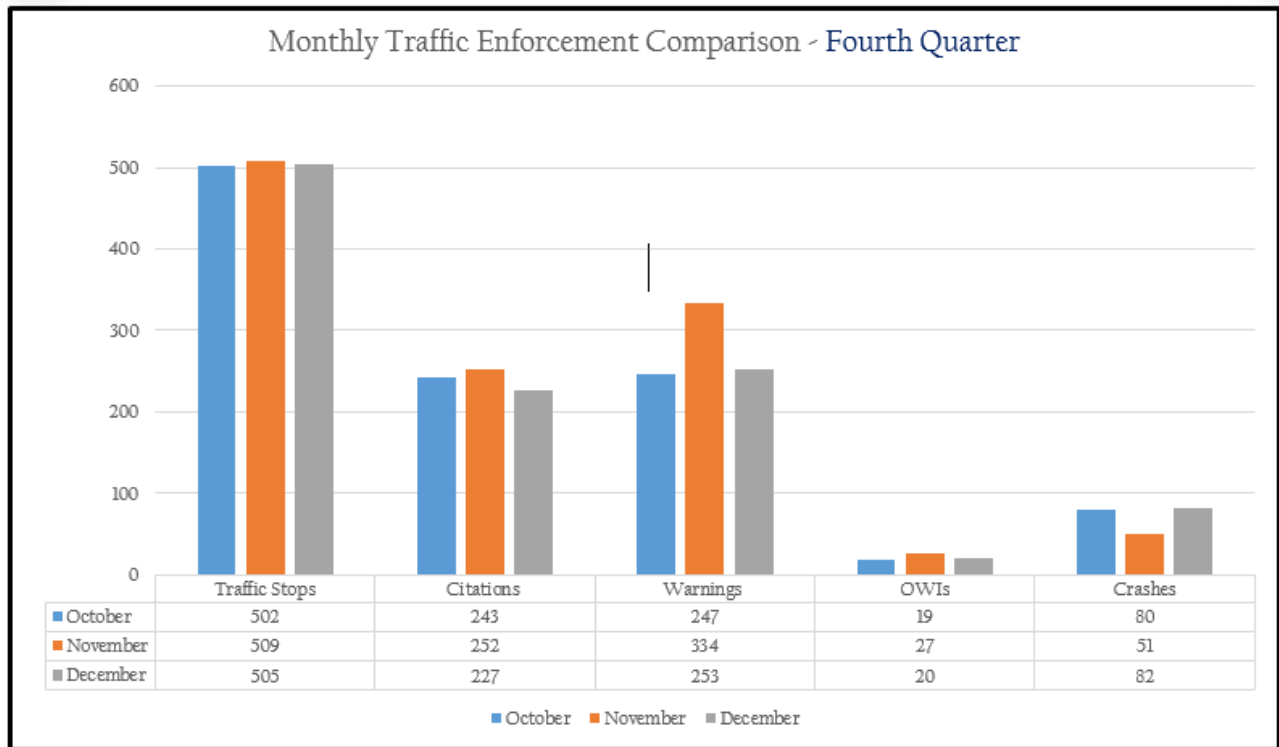

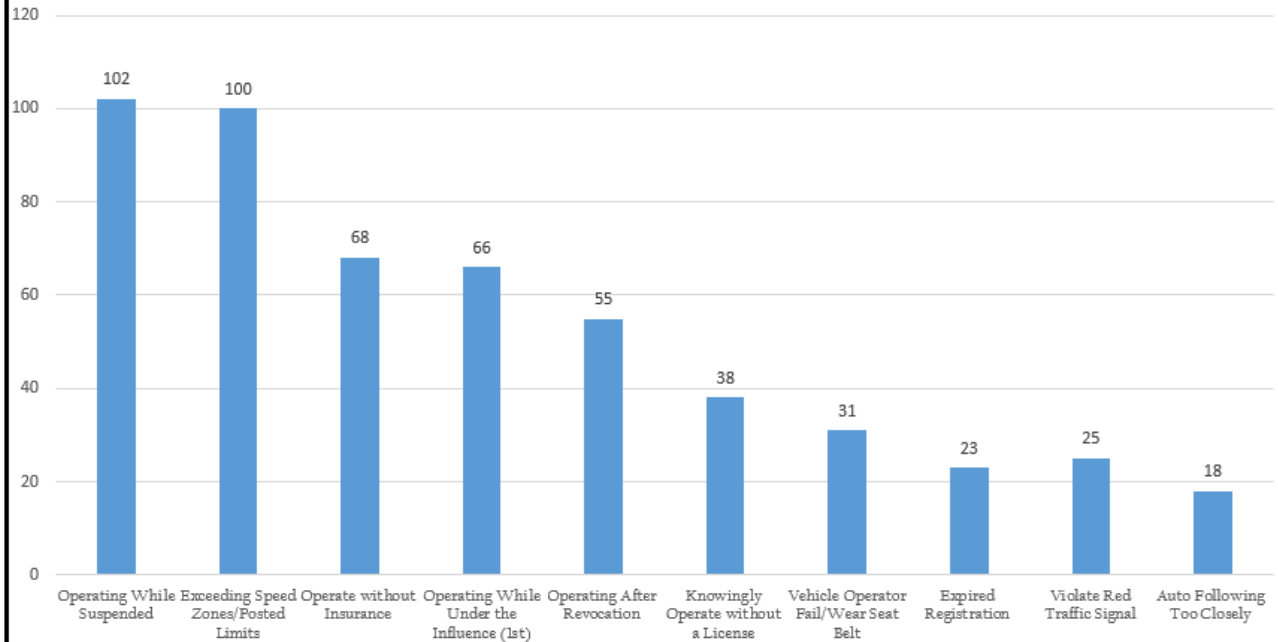


YEAR-TO-DATE TRAFFIC TOTALS (JANUARY- DECEMBER 2021)

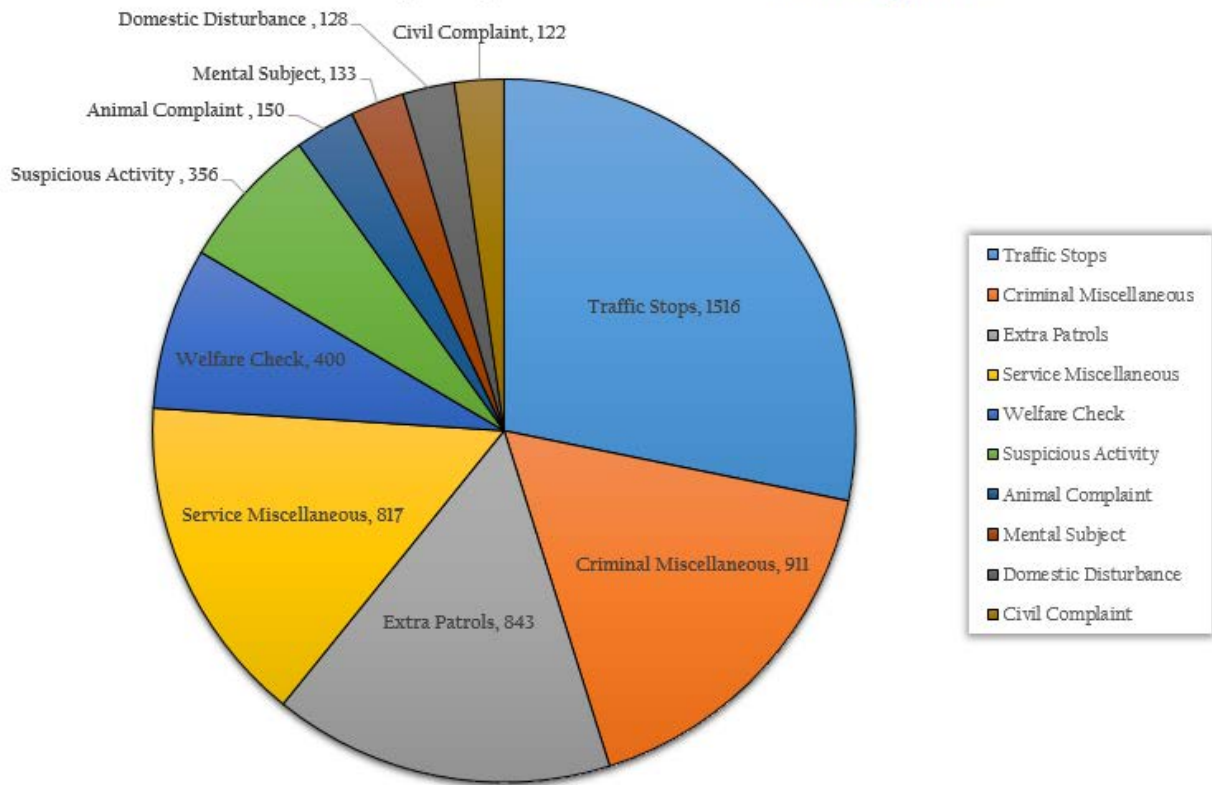

Records Bureau

Law enforcement would not be able to do its job successfully without access to data. The 76 sworn officers at the Wausau Police Department create a lot of data and paperwork, but it's only useful if it can be found when it's needed, and only if it gets to the correct people. We have 1 Office Manager, 4 Administrative Assistants and 1 Law Enforcement Computer Technician that keep all of our processes moving. They receive information from the officers, be sure it is entered and properly cataloged, forward it to other agencies and departments, and then review and potentially release when requested. This includes paper reports, squad video and body worn camera, photos, and lost and found items.

This department is also the first point of contact for customer service for the public. They are a cheerful, resourceful group who go out of their way to be sure needs get met in as timely a manner as possible.

NOTABLE INCIDENTS AT TAVERNS TO WHICH POLICE WERE DISPATCHED.

Cop Shoppe Pub, 701 Washington Street

- (1) *Case #21011158, 12/14/2021 at 12:12 AM: ALARM/FIGHT:* An **employee** triggered the “panic alarm” from inside the bar. On arrival, an officer observed two females fighting in the parking lot. One of the women involved in the fight (turned out to be the main instigator) left in a vehicle, down the dead-end alley. The officer checked inside the bar (regarding the panic alarm) and then went up the alley looking for the car. The car was located at a nearby residence, and one of the women involved in the fight was arrested for battery to a patron that had remained on scene. The other woman involved was later identified from a citizen’s video of the incident. The woman was known by Law Enforcement to be twenty (20) years old. Since the video did not show that she had been served any drinks, and no one provided information that she had, the employees were not issued any citations regarding the underage person. However, I will be assessing **twenty-five (25) Demerit Points** for Underage Person on Premise. The underage woman was not located after being identified, so she will be referred for Disorderly Conduct. Another male that had engaged in the fight outside the bar was referred for battery. It should be noted that other than the underage person on the premise, employee response was appropriate.
- (2) ****Ongoing Extra Patrols:** Officer conducted several extra patrols through the remainder of the month. Staff/Management had incorporated a closing time of midnight, which was supported by officers’ observations on most days, and likely helped keep the problem calls from developing, as evidenced by the fewer calls for service.

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Domino Bar, 740 Washington Street

- (1) *Event #21168370, 12/05/2021 at 2:27 A.M.:* WELFARE CHECK: A caller that refused to be identified called to report that there was a male in a wheelchair in the parking lot of the bar. The male was allegedly very intoxicated and having a hard time getting out of the parking lot. The caller reported that the male had fallen at one point, and had no control at all. Officers responded and located the male moving westbound on Washington Street. The male was mostly oriented – he knew who he was and his address. A cab was called to transport the male home, where the officers assisted in removing the wheelchair from the cab. The male made it into his residence on his own, once he was in his wheelchair. One officer made contact with the bartender, who stated the male had arrived at 2:15 AM, asking to be served, but “Last Call” had already been declared. The bartender observed the male leave, and fall off his chair.

El Jalapenos, 300 N. 3rd Street

- (1) *Case #21011100, 12/12/2021 at 2:07 AM:* FIGHT: An unidentified caller reported that there was an active fight at the bar. On arrival, officers observed no fight, and about forty people inside and in front of the bar. Most of the patrons started leaving once officers arrived. No one leaving would provide any information as to what had happened. Officers located one injured female that had been a bystander in the incident, but had been hit in the face by a thrown bottle. The owner was present and attempted to provide surveillance video, but was not able to work the system. The case is inactive, pending review of video or further information is provided by witnesses.
- (2) *Event #21175691, 12/18/2021 at 11:32 PM:* CRIMINAL MISCELLANEOUS: An **employee** called for assistance in removing a patron that had been kicked out but refused to leave. The patron had wanted to fight the employee, and threatened a couple of the bouncers. When officers arrived, the male initially refused to identify himself. After some time, and starting his own recording with claims of being illegally detained, he did provide minimal information that allowed officers to confirm his identity. The bar simply wanted him warned that he was no longer allowed on the property, at which time he was released.

Limerick’s Public House, 121 Scott Street

- (1) *Case #21011334, 12/20/2021 at 9:28 AM:* CRIMINAL DAMAGE TO PROPERTY: The **owners** reported that their business had two floor-to-ceiling windows shot out with a BB/pellet gun. This was one of several business that suffered similar damage. A male was identified and arrested for the damage.

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Wausau On the Water, 1300 N. River Drive

- (1) *Event #21166633, 12/01/2021 at 6:12 PM:* SERVICE MISCELLANEOUS: An **employee** called to report that there was an intoxicated male that came into the bar. He was served one drink, and they did not feel comfortable serving him more. When asked to leave, the male refused to do so. The arriving officer located the male outside the bar, and removed him cooperatively from the property.
- (2) *Event #21177453, 12/22/2021 at 8:28 PM:* CRIMINAL MISCELLANEOUS: An **employee** called to report having been slapped in the face by a patron. The bartender/Assistant General Manager stated he had just come back inside from have a break outside. The patron approached him and asked if he knew him. The bartender said he didn't know him, after which the patron said, "Then you are not going to like this..." and then slapped the employee in the face. The slap did not cause any injury, so the employee did not want to pursue charges. The male had been served by the bar, but had started making "rude" comments. Bar staff had been on the verge of cutting the patron off from further service. The male had left the property before officers arrived, however left his credit card behind, allowing for identification of the patron. The employee requested that the patron was no longer allowed on the property. The patron was called by the officer and advised he could retrieve his credit card from the Police Department and that he was no longer allowed at WOW.

Den Mar Bar, 601 W. Thomas Street

- (1) *Event #21181344, 12/31/2021 at 11:50 PM:* NOISE COMPLAINT: A named citizen complainant called to report loud music coming from the bar that could be heard with "the windows closed and the fan on." Officers responded and observed that there was a DJ playing, and that it was loud. An officer spoke with the DJ and asked him to turn it down. The officer monitored the noise until it could no longer be heard across the street.

Treu's Tic Toc Club, 1201 W. Thomas Street

- (1) *Event #21169548, 12/07/2021 at 4:30 PM:* FIGHT: An unidentified caller reported that there was a fight involving four people outside of the bar. Officers did not see an active fight on arrival. Investigating the call, officers made contact with one male that admitted having been involved in a verbal argument outside the bar. He was telling a couple not to walk down the middle of the road. The officer also identified what turned out to be the "couple" the first male had described. They also admitted that it was only a verbal argument. No further action was taken.

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- (2) *Event #21179098, 12/26/2021 at 8:05 PM: MEDICAL EMERGENCY:* An employee called after a patron had fallen out of his stool onto the floor. The caller described that the male refused to stand back up, and may have defecated himself. Officers arrived and recognized the patron from previous contacts at a different location. The male was described by officers as being extremely intoxicated. No injuries were observed, but he claimed to have hit his head. Officers and paramedics tried to convince the male to get up for treatment, however he refused. The bartender admitted to having served the male two beers, which was confirmed by another patron. The male eventually stood up on his own, declined medical attention and signed a waiver form regarding it. He walked on his own but was escorted to his residence, across the street. He was advised that he was no longer welcome to patronize the bar and released.

M & R Station, 818 S. 3rd Avenue

- (1) *Case #21011457, 12/25/2021 at 1:26 AM: CRIMINAL MISCELLANEOUS:* A caller that refused to be identified reported that there was a male at the bar that was "on the run for assault." The caller added that the suspect had left the bar and was in a parking lot of a neighboring business. Officers located the male inside a vehicle in the parking lot across the tracks from the bar. The male was taken into custody cooperatively, however some patrons from the bar became insistent on being close to the officers while the male in custody was searched. The activity that followed was an escalation of aggression on both sides, until the officers decided to leave in order to de-escalate the situation.
- (2) *Case/Event #: N/A, 12/20/2021 at 9:27 AM: CIVIL INFORMATION:* On the listed date and time, I was advised by email from the Inspections Department that their office has had some enforcement issues with the bar. A shed was installed on the property that required a building permit. They were advised of the need for the permit on 03/30/2021. They failed to obtain the permit and BRH LLC was issued a citation for that violation on 04/21/2021. It went to a small claims action, for which there was no appearance by BRH LLC. There was a judgement for \$24,587.00 against BRH LLC for the failure to obtain the building permit.

Hutch's Bar, 4411 Stewart Avenue

- (1) *Event #21173898, 12/15/2021 at 11:04 PM: NOISE COMPLAINT:* A caller that refused to be identified complained that the music from the bar was too loud. An officer responded, but was not able to hear any music from the roadway. No further action was taken.

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Whiskey River Bar & Grill, 5512 Stewart Avenue

- (1) Case #21011113, 12/12/2021 at 5:14 PM: VEHICLE ATL: A caller that refused to be identified reported that a particular woman was at the bar, heavily intoxicated and was about to leave in her car. The caller stated the woman does it all the time and leaves her children home alone, presumably while she goes out drinking. An officer responded, and was going to walk into the bar to attempt contact with the woman to prevent her from driving, when he observed the vehicle described by the caller leaving the bar. He observed it weaving exaggeratedly into the oncoming lane of traffic. The vehicle was stopped, and the operator was asked to submit to field sobriety tests. The woman submitted to the first test, and refused any further field testing. She was arrested with slight resistance, but agreed to a legal blood draw. The results of the blood test were pending at the time of this writing. The woman was released to a responsible person.

101 Pub, 101 N. 3rd Avenue

- (1) Case #21010832, 12/03/2021 at 12:55 AM: CRIMINAL MISCELLANEOUS: An **employee** called to report that there was a female patron that had been kicked out of the bar for being obnoxious and bothering other patrons. The expelled patron returned with her boyfriend and attempted starting a fight with people in the bar and bar staff. On arrival, officers escorted the woman and her boyfriend out of the bar and issued the woman a municipal citation for disorderly conduct.
- (2) Case #21010907, 12/04/2021 at 11:29 PM: CRIMINAL MISCELLANEOUS: A named citizen called to report that one patron was hit in the mouth by another patron, which knocked the first patron's tooth out. The suspect had left the bar by the time the call was made. According to the victim, the suspect had been accusing people in the bar of stealing \$10.00 from him. The victim gave the suspect \$10.00 to attempt to calm the suspect down. Even after this gesture, the male continued to be upset, and wound up throwing a shot glass at the victim. The shot glass hit the victim in the mouth and knocked out his tooth. The bar provided video images of the suspect, who remains unidentified and at large.
- (3) Event #21180014, 12/29/2021 at 12:42 AM: CRIMINAL MISCELLANEOUS: An employee called to report that there was a male that had threatened to "shoot up" the bar. The male left, walking towards 3rd Avenue, and then westbound. The bartender did not know this male, but he made comments about being a "Reyes," and that his father lived down the street. The male was further described as carrying a duffle bag, seemingly intoxicated, visibly shaking and pacing. After speaking with the bartender, she just did not want the male to return. Officer checked the area but were unable to locate him. The owner suspected that it could have been the same male noted in the above incident.

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Callon Street Pub, 209 Callon Street

- (1) *Event #21178759, 12/25/2021 at 10:52 PM:* MEDICAL EMERGENCY: An ambulance was requested for a male that had been drinking, and fell down the steps at the entrance/exit. The male hit his head when he fell. The male was cooperative, a nurse was on scene, and no officers responded.

- (2) *Case #21010908, 12/05/2021 at 12:12 AM:* FIGHT: An unknown person called to report a "bad fight" occurring, with a male down on the ground. Additional information from the caller noted that the male that was down was unconscious, which also initiated a medical call for an ambulance. Officers arrived to find the fight still somewhat active, with people yelling and holding others back from further confrontation. The fight actually did not occur in the bar proper, but in the upper space that was rented out for a wedding that included approximately 200 people. He was denied access, but wouldn't leave the property. Officers responded, but the male left prior to their arrival (two minutes after being dispatched).
