Minutes of previous meetings. (2/15/21)

Motion by Peckham, second by Herbst to approve the minutes of the 2/15/21 meeting. Motion carried 5-0.

Consider approval or denial of various license applications.

Lisa Rasmussen indicated there were no denials recommended this month. She stated there is an application for a Class B Beer & Liquor license from Brewer Entertainment, LLC, Matt Brewer, to take over the bar 101 Pub, 101 N 3rd Ave, Cheryl Fehl, the current owner. The Plan of Operation was reviewed and the license recommended for approval by the Liquor License Review Subcommittee right before this meeting.

Rasmussen noted the ½ Year Class B Beer & Liquor License for Wisconsin College Baseball, dba the Woodchucks, at Athletic Park is renewing for the baseball season. Other miscellaneous licenses were noted.

Motion by Herbst, second by Peckham to approve the licenses as recommended by staff. Motion carried 5-0.

Discussion and possible action on creating temporary ordinance Chapter 5.90 Relaxing Certain Code Requirements during COVID-19 Pandemic and Recovery for a period expiring on December 31, 2021, 11:59 pm to provide for COVID-19 temporary outdoor seating areas for restaurants, bars and taverns, authorize City staff review and approval of temporary outdoor seating areas and temporary expansion of licensed premises; temporarily amending Section 9.04.025 Consumption or possession of intoxicants on streets; temporarily amending Special Events Policies and Procedures

Lisa Rasmussen explained this is a continuance of all of the provisions implemented last summer to help the restaurants and bars by allowing outdoor dining and/or expanded outdoor dining onto sidewalks with alcohol service, and to facilitate the Dining in the Street event. Staff was allowed to issue the temporary licenses without waiting for a Public Health & Safety Committee meetings. She stated an end date of 12/31/2021 has been inserted to cover the entire summer and fall season with the hope that 2022 will be back to normal.

Motion by Wadinski, second by Peckham to approve the temporary ordinance to 12/31/2021. Motion carried 5-0.

Discussion and possible action on COVID-19 related mask requirement city wide

Lisa Rasmussen stated the city's mask mandate has been extended a couple of times to sit behind the Governor's state wide mandate when there is one in effect. The time is approaching for the Governor's order, as well as the city mandate, to expire at the end of March. She asked the committee if they wanted to continue the city's mandate or let it go.

Rasmussen commented there is reason to be positive as it appears the pandemic is winding down, but it is still with us and health guidelines coming out indicate that even with the ramp up of vaccines we should continue to mask for a while yet. Dawn Herbst felt they should extend the mandate as long as they can; she did not want to concede and give in too early.

Becky McElhaney stated the resolution as written includes Public Transit and she pointed out public transit is under the TSA (Transportation Security Administration). Since it is federally mandated she did not feel Public Transit should be included in this resolution and asked for clarification of this by the City Attorney before it reached Council floor. She commented she had a problem with having a resolution because she found it to be moot. It is confusing to people with media calling it a mandate. She questioned what exactly a mandate is.

Tara Alfonso, Assistant City Attorney, stated the city's order would be subordinate to state and federal. To the second question she explained a resolution does not have the force and effect of an ordinance. If someone were to violate this resolution there is no citation or enforcement that the City of Wausau can take. It could be considered more like guidelines or urging from the city.

Mayor Rosenberg stated this is an official order from the City Council, which is a mandate, it just doesn't include punishment. Alfonso opined if it doesn't have a mechanism for enforcement then basically it is a strong request that is stating you "should" wear a mask, not you "shall" wear a mask.

Pat Peckham commented he saw no harm in continuing it and if the CDC or Marathon County Health Department guidelines change we back off, too.

Motion by Peckham, second by Herbst to approve the extension of the mask mandate to May 31, 2021. Motion carried 3-2. (*Wadinski and McElhaney were the dissenting votes.*)

Operations Report from Fire Department for October – February 2021

Deputy Chief Bob Barteck commented February was a tough month with a couple big fires. There was one on Kickbusch Street on a steep hill and when the crew arrived it was 18 below zero. He noted he learned the house was the first home of our first Mayor August Kickusch and unfortunately the structure sustained major losses. The other fire at 916 S 3rd Avenue resulted in an arrest and a charge of arson. The other fire of note was at Kocourek up against the building at which the crew made a quick stop of the fire to prevent a vehicle fire from spreading into their business. (*Report placed on file.*)

Tavern Activities / Compliance Checks / Law Enforcement Activities

Chief Bliven presented the Wausau PD Operations Report – March 2021. (*Report placed on file.*)

Chief Bliven reported on another fight at Roc's Place and the fact that there was not a lot of cooperation with the investigation. A video was requested, however, there was a two hour gap in the video, which seems clear they were intentionally not providing the footage needed. The PD obtained the missing footage that did show a fight and someone carrying a firearm, who was later identified as a convicted felon. Bliven reiterated the cooperation from the employees was very low and one individual was reluctant to give information out of fear of retribution. As a result of the incident Roc's Place will be back up to 100 demerit points.

Lisa Rasmussen noted the owner of Roc's has been before this committee regarding these issues at least twice, with the last one being in June. She stated since the committee has already expressed concern formally and things are not improving the next step would be to consider suspension of the license. She requested the City Attorney's Office and Police Chief gather reports from Roc's Place and to review Chapter 1.25 of the statutes in order to advise the committee at the next meeting of the process needed in order to consider suspension/revocation.

Dawn Herbst and Pat Peckham commended the Chief on the new Wausau PD Operations Report. Chief Bliven explained the reasons for this report is a comprehensive look at what is going on in law enforcement, whereas historically the report was just on tavern issues.

Communications

Lisa Rasmussen noted she has a scheduling conflict with the April 19th meeting, so it has been moved to Tuesday, April 20, 2021 at 5:15 pm.

Adjourn

Motion by Wadinski, second by Peckham to adjourn the meeting. Motion carried unanimously. Meeting adjourned at 5:45 pm.

No Mow May 2021- Invitation to Participate

2020 has been a year full of stress, anxiety and tension, for this reason we are happy to put forward some excellent news regarding the protection of our native bee pollinators. During the month of May 2020, the city of Appleton approved the first No Mow May.

The goal of No Mow May is to provide early season forage for emerging native pollinators by reducing own mowing intensity during a month where foraging resources are limited. Four hundred and thirty-five Appleton homes registered to participate, and the initiative was widely appreciated by our community.

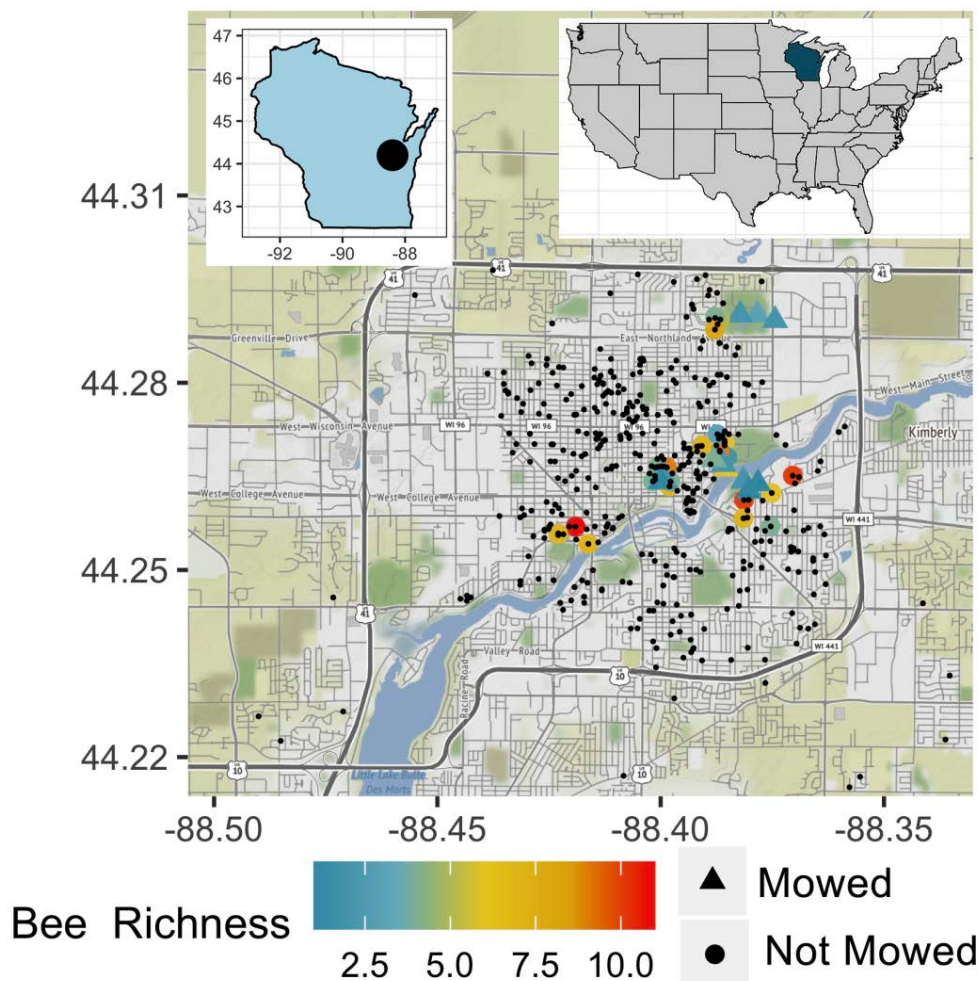


Fig. 1 shows the 435 homes that participated in No Mow May 2020. The colored points are sites where we sampled for native bee biodiversity.

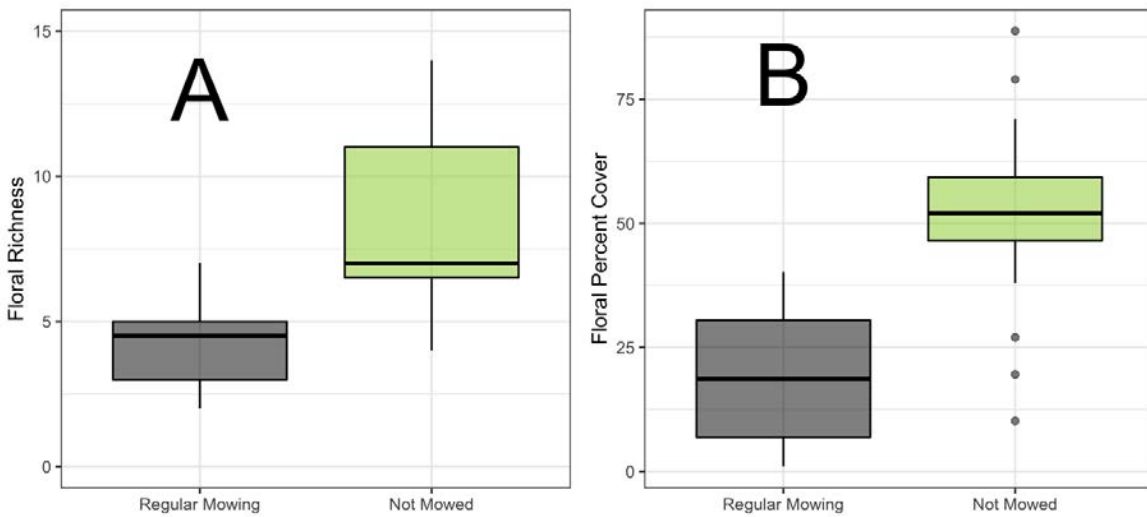


Figure 2 Boxplot of floral richness and percent cover comparisons. Boxplot showing higher median floral density (A) and richness (B) in No Mow May lawns ($n = 20$) relative to regularly mowed areas ($n = 15$).

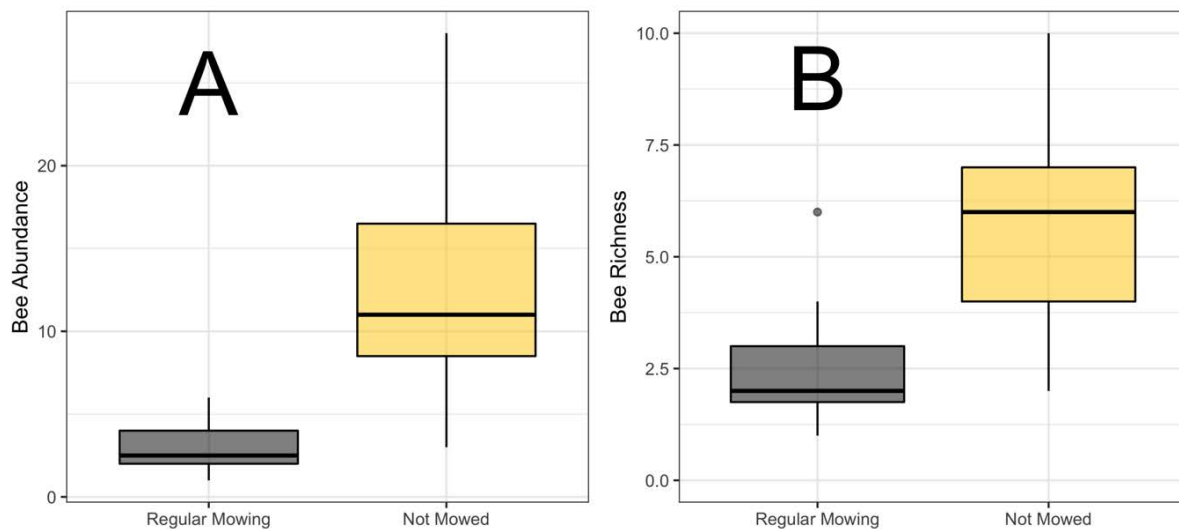


Figure 3 Boxplot of bee abundance and richness. Boxplot showing higher median bee abundance (A) and richness (B) in No Mow May lawns ($n = 20$) relative to regularly mowed areas ($n = 15$).

The results of our first attempt at No-Mow-May are promising and speak for themselves. The reduced mowing intensity resulted in ~35% more floral resources (abundance and diversity) available to native pollinators by the end of the month (Fig.2). This translated to a five-fold increase in wild bee abundances and three-fold increase in wild bee diversity (Fig. 3).

In preparing for the 2021 re-launch of No-Mow-May, we would like to grow our program to include ten additional cities/towns in the Fox Cities and throughout Wisconsin. We aim to increase citizen science engagement by providing detailed instructions and materials for collecting standardized data on pollinator diversity, abundance and floral resource availability. In 2021 we will do things a little different but with the same goal in mind, protecting our native pollinators by providing additional foraging resources for them.

Citizen Science:

Your community is full of scientists! All it takes is a little time, some basic tools (which we will provide) and your smartphone to share your data and results with. Citizen scientists will measure the length of their grass, record blooming flower species in their lawns, photograph pollinators and help us build a list of pollinator biodiversity in your community. Participants in No Mow May will be asked to register on our site (www.BYOBEEZ.org) and citizen scientist materials will be made freely available at a local point of collection starting in mid-April (e.g. in Appleton this will be a local brewery and City Hall).



We are looking for your help in growing this already successful citizen science initiative in your community. This means talking to your elected officials to approve a long-lawn exception ordinance during the month of May 2021 and facilitating No Mow May's endorsement through your city council. RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, insects, especially bees, serve a significant and critical role as pollinators of plants including agricultural plants; and

WHEREAS, the ideal pollinator-friendly habitat is one comprised of mostly native wildflowers, grasses, vines, shrubs, and trees blooming in succession throughout the growing season; and

WHEREAS, the formative period for establishment of pollinator and other insect species and the many songbirds and other urban wildlife species that depend upon them occurs in late spring and early summer as they emerge from dormancy and require flowering plants as crucial foraging habitat; and,

WHEREAS, “No Mow May” is a community science initiative that encourages property owners to limit lawn mowing practices during the month of May to provide early season foraging resources for pollinators that emerge in the spring, especially in urban landscapes when few floral resources are available; and

WHEREAS, the City of Wausau would like to encourage interested residents to increase pollinator-friendly habitat by encouraging pollinator-friendly lawn-care practices on their own properties for the month of May during this formative period; and

WHEREAS, the City of Wausau Municipal Code §6.48.010 Mowing required and §6.48.040 Penalty together require the mowing of all grasses, weed and brush subject to a possible forfeiture of \$98.80.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City of Wausau suspends enforcement of W.M.C. §6.48.010 Mowing required and §6.48.040 Penalty for the period of May 1, 2021 through May 31, 2021, for those citizens and residents who desire to participate in the “No Mow May” initiative.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that enforcement will resume again after a seven (7) day grace period from May 31, 2021.

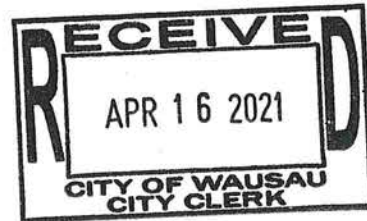

NOW COMES Todd Baeten, Patrol Captain of the City of Wausau Police Department, and alleges as follows that:

1. The Complainant, Todd Baeten, is an adult resident of the City of Wausau with a business address of 515 Grand Avenue, Wausau, Wisconsin, and at all times material to this action, he was and is Patrol Captain, employed by the City of Wausau Police Department.
2. The Complainant, Todd Baeten, as Patrol Captain with the City of Wausau Police Department, is familiar with the efforts of City police officers and local law enforcement agencies and their investigations into violations by taverns and other places where alcohol is sold within the City of Wausau, of alcohol beverage and other laws, and by employees and agents of such taverns and other places.
3. The Respondent herein, Timothy Nawrocki and Timothy Nawrocki d/b/a Roc's Place ("Respondent"), is an alcohol beverage licensee according to documents on file with the City Clerk of the City of Wausau. The licensed premises operated by the Respondent is known as Roc's Place and is located at 810 S. 3rd Avenue, Wausau, Wisconsin ("Licensed Premises").
4. On May 18, 2020, the Public Health & Safety Committee of the City of Wausau recommended the granting of a Class "B" Beer & Liquor License to Respondent for the period July 1, 2020, through June 30, 2021.
5. On June 9, 2020, the Common Council of the City of Wausau granted a Class "B" Beer & Liquor License ("License") to Respondent for the period of July 1, 2020, through June 30, 2021. A copy of the License is attached hereto as Exhibit A.

6. The Public Health & Safety Committee should recommend to the Common Council revocation or suspension of the Respondent's License on the grounds that the Respondent has violated chapter 125.12(2)(ag)2 of the Wisconsin Statutes, and such statute as adopted by Section 5.64.010 of the Wausau Municipal Code, and municipal regulations adopted pursuant to Section 125.10 of the Wisconsin Statutes, namely Section 5.64.078.

7. Respondent keeps or maintains a disorderly or riotous, indecent or improper house at the Licensed Premises under Wis. Stat. Section 125.12(2)(ag)2., such knowledge being based upon Complainant's best information and belief, review of City of Wausau Police Department records made at or near the time of the incidents reported therein in the course of regularly conducted law enforcement activity, based upon the personal knowledge of those law enforcement officers, and review of City of Wausau public records as follows:

(a) Since January 1, 2019, the Licensed Premises has been the subject of fifteen (15) complaints or incidents concerning fights inside the Licensed Premises or in the parking lot.

(b) Since January 1, 2019, the Licensed Premises have been the subject of five (5) complaints or incidents reported to have involved weapons or the threat of weapons.

(c) On September 19, 2020, the Licensed Premises was the subject of a noise complaint.

(d) On February 23, 2020, the Licensed Premises was involved in a medical emergency wherein an ambulance responded to the Licensed Premises after a woman in the bar was vomiting and described as being in and out of consciousness.

(e) October 17, 2019, an officer on foot patrol observed a male with liquor outside of the Licensed Premises.

(f) Respondent and employees failed to cooperate with the City of Wausau Police Department during the investigation of an incident that occurred on February 20, 2021, involving a fight and a handgun by failing to report the event to law enforcement on the night on which it occurred and then failed to provide the City of Wausau Police Department the complete footage of requested video of the incident for investigatory purposes, omitting an approximately 1 ½ hour section that depicted the occurrence.

(g) Respondent was called before the Public Health & Safety Committee on June 15, 2020 for a "formal expression of concern" pursuant to W.M.C. Section 5.64.078(d)(1)(A) in regard to fights and or weapons complaints occurring at the Licensed Premises.

The complaints and incidents referenced in this paragraph are set forth on Exhibit B to this Complaint titled "Synopsis of Events" which includes dates, times, case or event numbers, and brief description of event.

8. Respondent is in violation of Wausau Municipal ordinance Section 5.64.078, Point values for alcohol beverage violations and revocations and suspensions, currently having imposed against Respondent one hundred and fifty (150) demerit points. Such knowledge being based upon Complainant's best information and belief, review of City of Wausau Police Department records made at or near the time of the incidents reported therein in the course of regularly conducted law enforcement activity, based upon the personal knowledge of those law enforcement officers, and review of City of Wausau public records as follows:

(a) Fifty (50) demerit points as a result of a March 4, 2021 fight complaint for Failure to Maintain Orderly Premises, in which a fight erupted between two males and a bartender alleged a firearm may have been displayed during the altercation. This event is set forth on the Synopsis of Events.

(b) One hundred (100) demerit points as a result of a weapons and fight complaint from a February 20, 2021 incident (described also in paragraph 8(f) of this Complaint) at the Licensed Premises during which two individuals pulled weapons on each other during an altercation and during which the Respondent and/or his employees further failed to report the incident to the City of Wausau Police Department. Fifty (50) demerit points were assessed for Failing to Summon Police and Fifty (50) point enhancement for firearm involved. This event is set forth on the Synopsis of Events.

9. Wausau Municipal ordinance Section 5.64.078 provides in relevant part:

(d)(1) The Public Health and Safety Committee shall call before it for purposes of a revocation or suspension hearing all licensees who have accumulated 100 points in a 12-month period as a result of court imposed convictions or who have had referred to it reports from the City Attorney which, if believed, would result in 100 demerit points in 12 months.

10. That under applicable State law, the license holder is held strictly liable for the actions of its employees and for the activities occurring on the Licensed Premises.

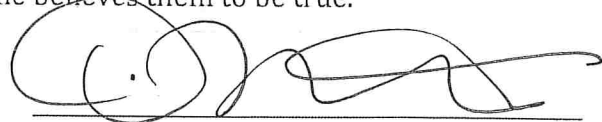

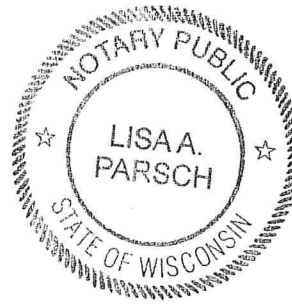

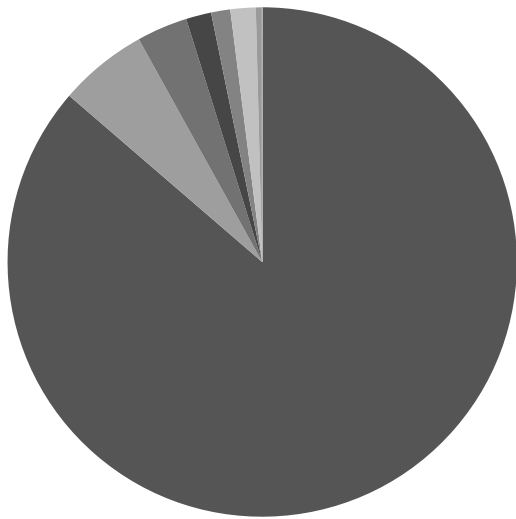

In this month's report, you will see a couple of additional items. First, on page 5, there is a new chart that reports total criminal offenses since January, 2020. The purpose of this chart is to provide you a clear view of overall crime and its trajectory in our community. Additionally, on page 10, you will see the Victim Resource Unit's quarterly report.

In March, 2021, we began three homicide investigations as the result of community members who died. Two of these community members died from heroin overdoses. On March 21, Mai Rue Vang, also known as Lily Vang, was killed in a domestic homicide. Our team is working diligently to investigate these crimes and hold perpetrators accountable. In addition, we are working closely with our community partners to determine what steps we can take to prevent future tragedies.

We continue to have more incidents of concern at Roc's Place Bar. On March 4, there was a large fight in the parking lot which resulted in 50 demerit points being assessed for Failure to Maintain an Orderly Premise. We are working with the City Attorney's office to formalize the concerns and issues at Roc's Place to bring forward to the Public Health and Safety Committee.

Special events applications are starting to come in at a steady rate. Our team is working closely with event organizers to assure proper planning is in place for the safety of these events. The Emergency Police are ramping up planning efforts as well.

Our records bureau is seeing a steady increase in the number of records they have to process on a monthly basis and an increase in the number of open records requests. There were 164 open records requests in March 2020, and 208 requests during March 2021.

Lastly, we held our first in-service day of 2021 in March which resulted in a spike in overtime. To retain law enforcement certification, officers need 24 hours of annual in-service training. By contract, the first 12 hours of training is paid as overtime. Through 25% of the year, we have expended 19.5% of our overtime budget.

Counting Rules

Counts on this page are based on the month of the incident or arrest, rather than the month the incident was submitted. If the incident date is unknown, the report date is used. Counts are subject to change as data are updated.

Offense counts are calculated based on the number of offenses for each victim (per incident) for Crimes Against Persons and the number of unique offense types (per incident) for Crimes Against Property and Crimes Against Society. For burglary and motor vehicle theft, offense counts are based on the number of premises entered and the number of vehicles stolen, respectively.

Victim counts are calculated based on the number of victims connected to each unique offense type in an incident. For Crimes Against Persons, the number of victims will be equal to the number of offenses. Victims will be counted more than once if they are connected to multiple offenses.

Arrest counts are calculated based on the number of arrestees listed on a Group A or Group B incident. Each arrestee is counted only once per incident. Arrests are categorized based on the specific Group A or Group B arrest code submitted by the agency, rather than the incident offense code. Since agencies only submit the most serious arrest charge for each arrestee on an incident, arrest counts are not indicative of the number of charges.

Incidents are cleared in one of two ways: by arrest or by exceptional means. Clearance counts are based on the number of offenses cleared in a given month regardless of when the offense occurred, and can therefore be greater than the number of offenses in a given month. In incident-based reporting, the first arrest on an incident, or an exceptional clearance, will clear all offenses associated with the incident.

*Kidnapping – Abduction Offense – Our False Imprisonment statute, commonly charged in Domestic Violence incidents, is reported in this IBR category.

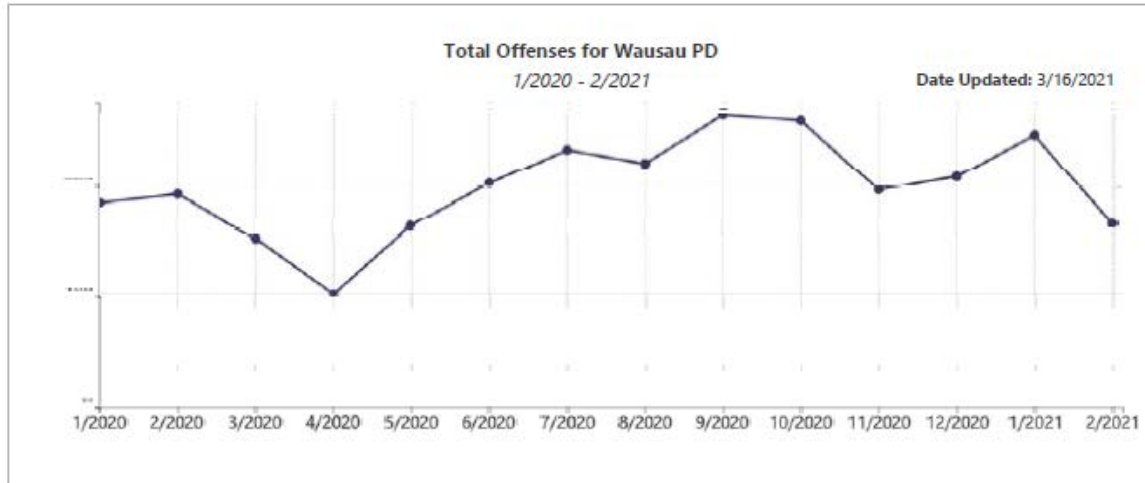

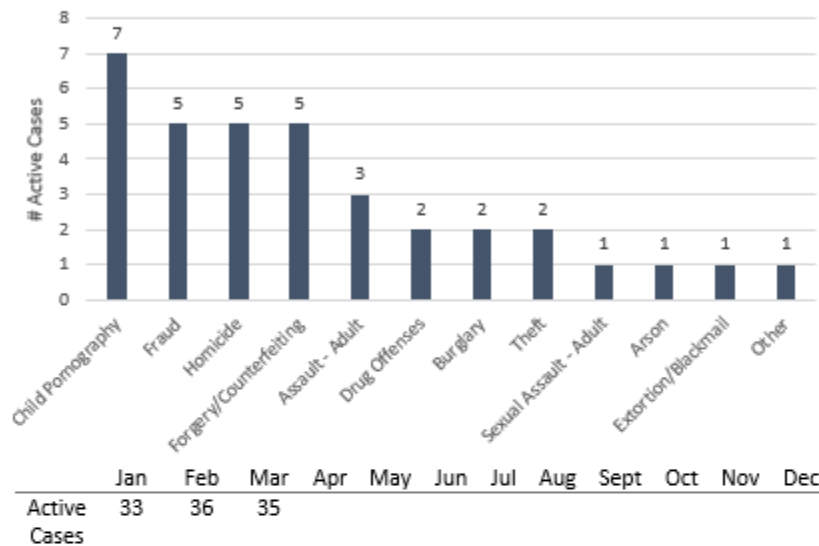

Detective Case Load by Crime Type



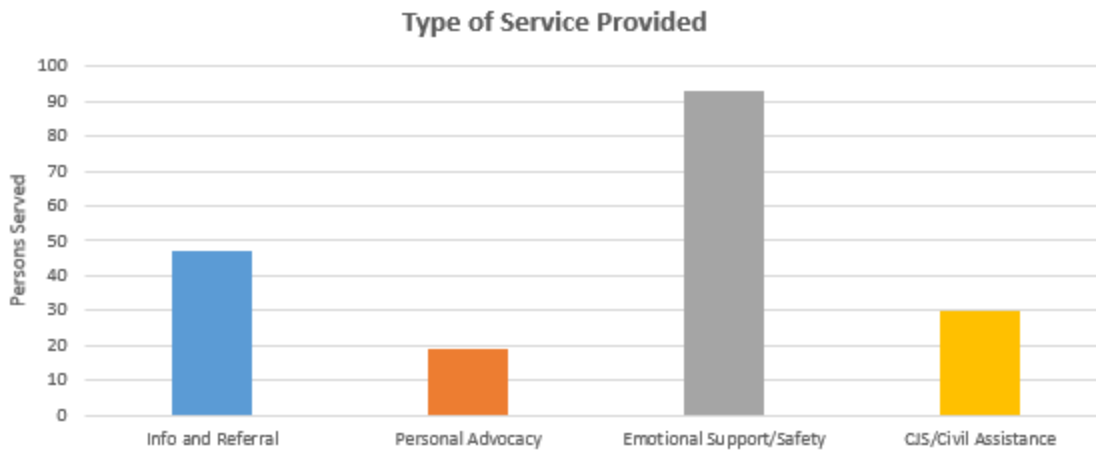
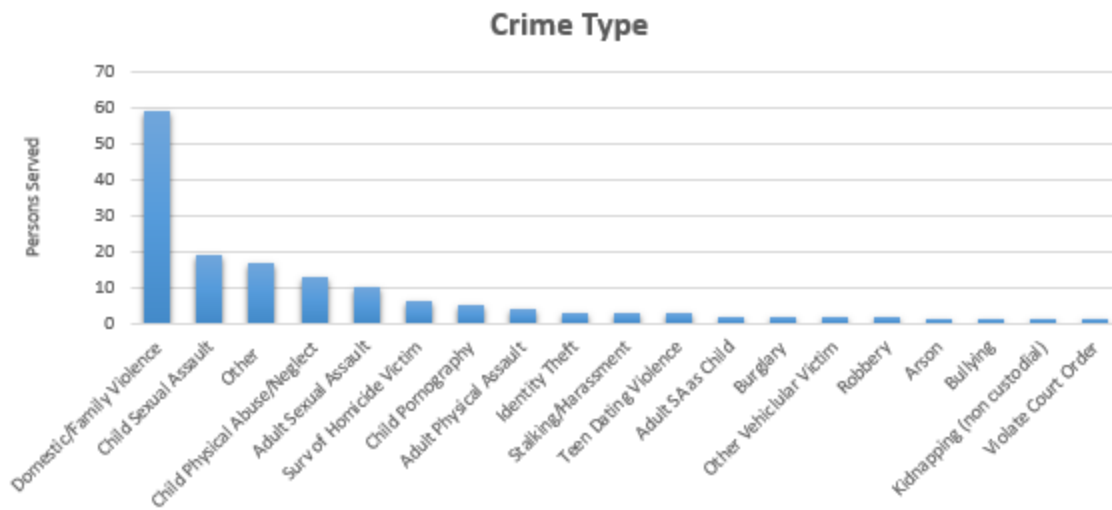
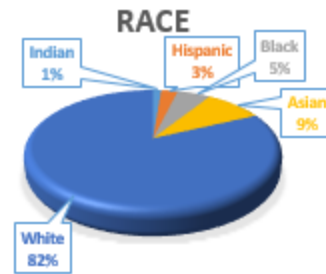
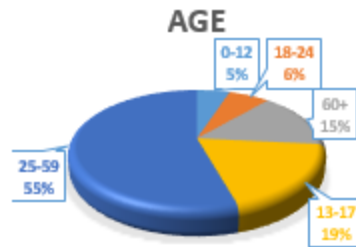

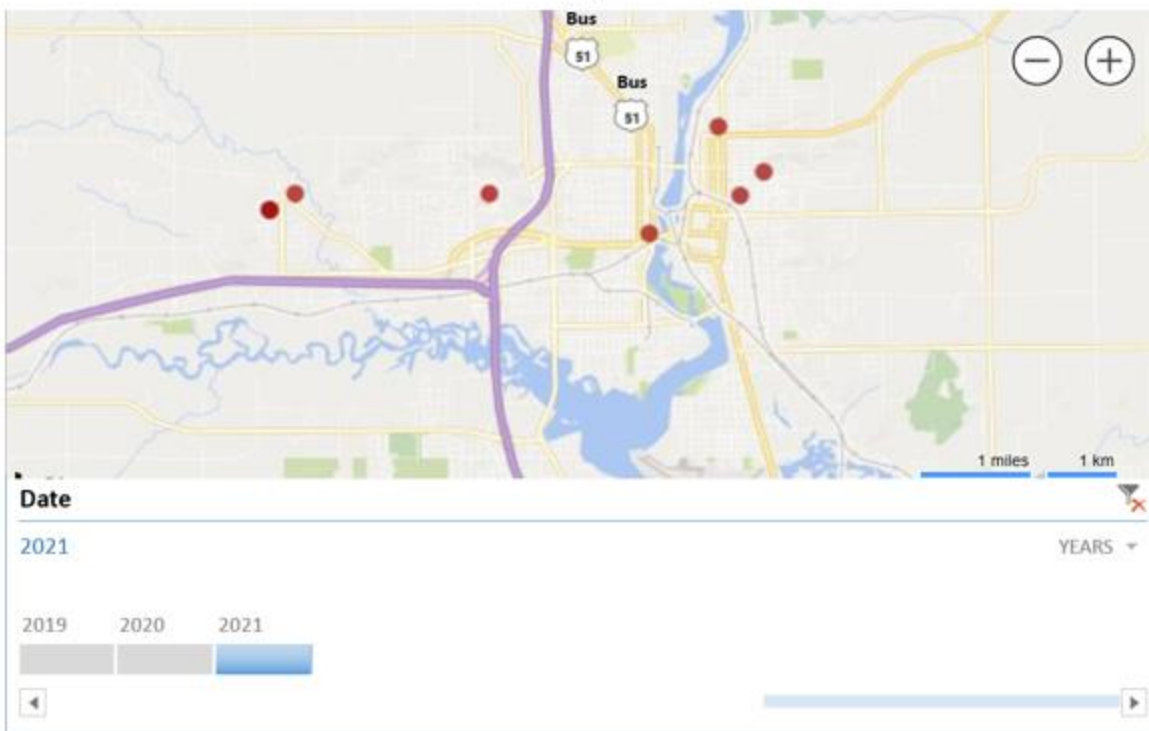

*CART is a shared resource with MNSO; above data represents WPD jurisdiction activities only. WPD has one (1) CART Officer, on M-F day shift schedule. This position is not back-filled during the CART Officer's off-days. MNSO's CART Deputy also responds to relevant CFS in the City when available.

"CFS": Calls For Service (Officer initiated activities and calls received from Dispatch).

"Mental Health" and "Welfare Check" are the two most common types of CFS (coded by Dispatch based on the initial information reported) that involve individuals in crisis.

"Community" origin of 51.15 / 51.45: Law enforcement is called to a location in the community (*residence, business, public location*) in response to an individual in crisis (or incapacitated). De-escalation, safety planning, and/or diversion is not viable or is unsuccessful, resulting in 51.15 or 51.45 detention.

"Facility" origin of 51.15: While under care or custody of the Jail, NCHC, or medical facility; an inmate or patient is suicidal or otherwise assessed on-site by a Crisis Professional, and deemed in need of 51.15. Law Enforcement is then called upon to confirm and complete the 51.15 (as required by WI Stats.) **Lacks opportunity for diversion.**

"51.15": "Emergency Detention" under WI Statute 51.15. Law enforcement may take into custody an individual who is:

- (1) Mentally ill, drug dependent or developmentally disabled, and;
- (2) A substantial probability of physical harm to him/herself or others is evident by recent acts or omissions, attempts or threats.

"51.45": "Alcohol or Drug Detention" under WI Statute 51.45. "A person who appears to be 'incapacitated by alcohol or another drug' shall be placed under protective custody by a law enforcement officer."



Housing Task Force - WPD/NCHC Team update:

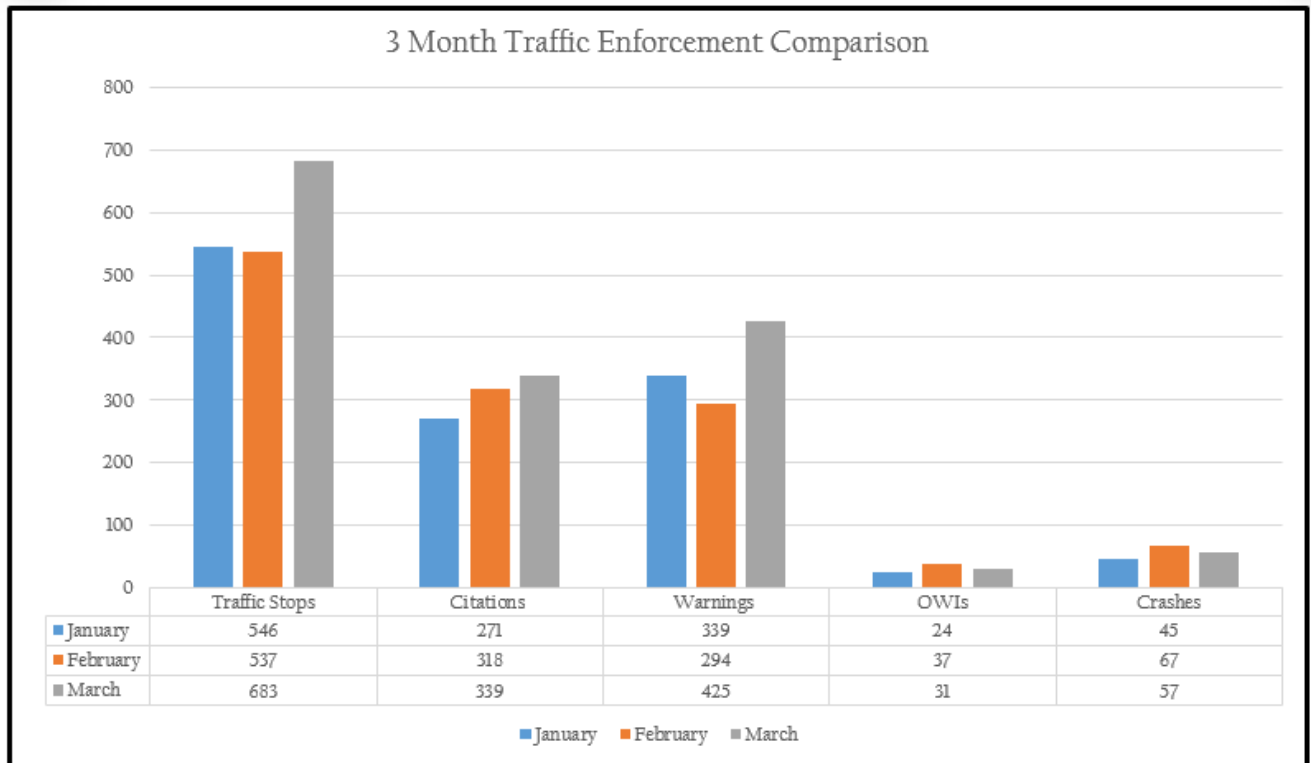
One of the McClellan Refuge residents made decision to leave the house in March; the team continues to stay in contact with this person for support and encouragement. *This individual is an example of approx. 7-10 chronically homeless persons remaining in our community who (regardless of now having positive relationship with us), are in need of steady inpatient substance abuse treatment resources to have a chance at long-term recovery and self-sufficiency.*

With warming weather, some previous frequent utilizers of the “Gazebo” area have started to gather during the day, ranging 2-7 people at times (including some known to have housing). HTF team continues to visit there and the island to connect with people. Relationship building, regular team contacts and progress with housing some people since fall 2020 may have impacted frequency of problems at the Gazebo (Police/EMS calls). In 2021 so far, only 1 WPD call for service involving negative activity (One altercation between 2 men in March). Zero EMS responses so far.

The team received a number of in-kind donations in the last month from citizens and community groups (i.e., backpacks w/ supplies, blankets, clothing).

North Central Community Action Program received a grant to fund a full time “Street Outreach Specialist” position. This person/position will spend little time in the NCCAP office; the primary focus will be connecting with the homeless, persons being released from mental health institutions, substance abuse treatment centers, and persons being discharged from correctional facilities. The Outreach Specialist will **be connecting with the shelters and service providers in the area** to provide outreach and case management services for individuals in the community who are homeless and living with a severe and persistent mental health issue or co-occurring mental health and substance use disorder. They will be working closely with the WPD/NCHC team to further these efforts in the community. (NCCAP has started recruiting for this position).

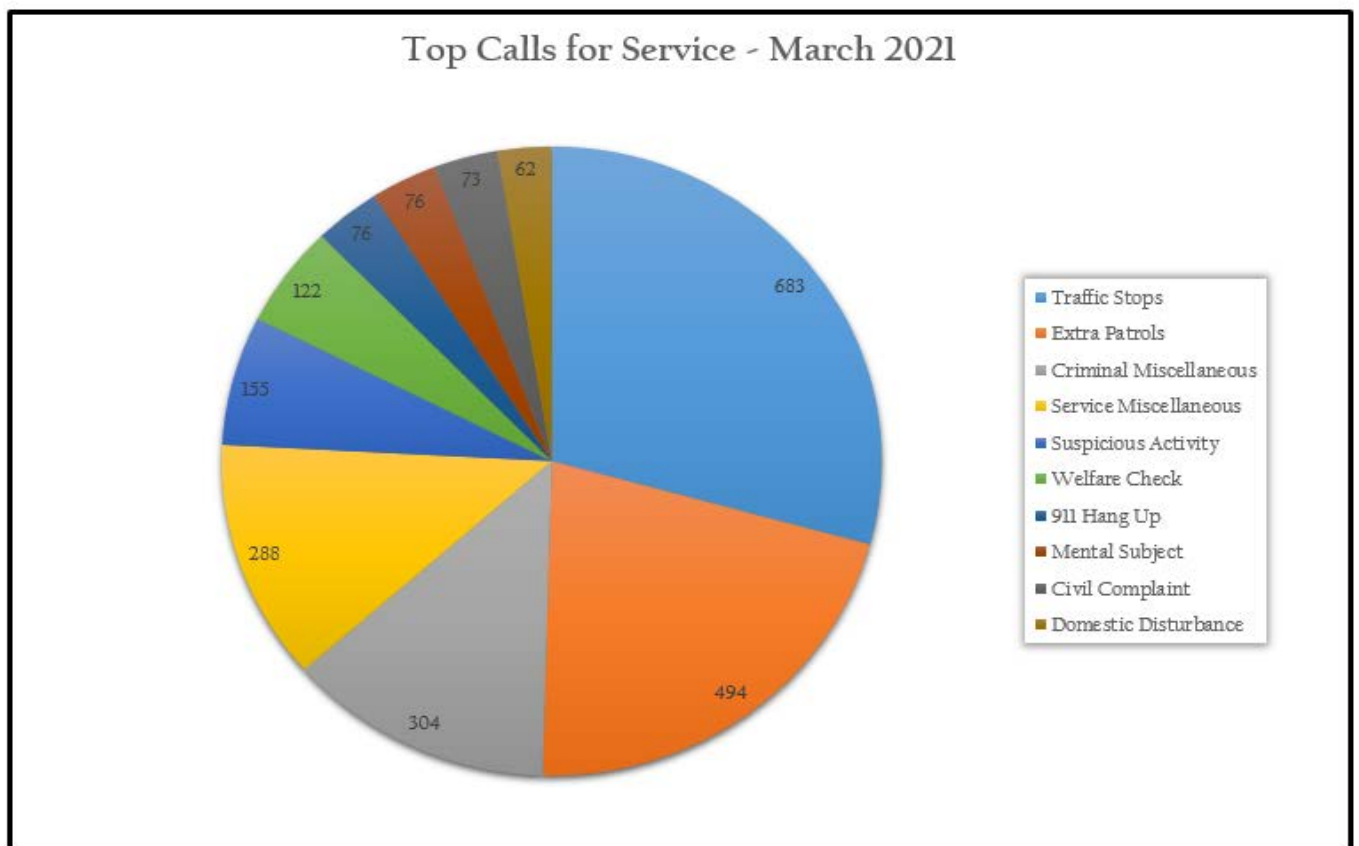
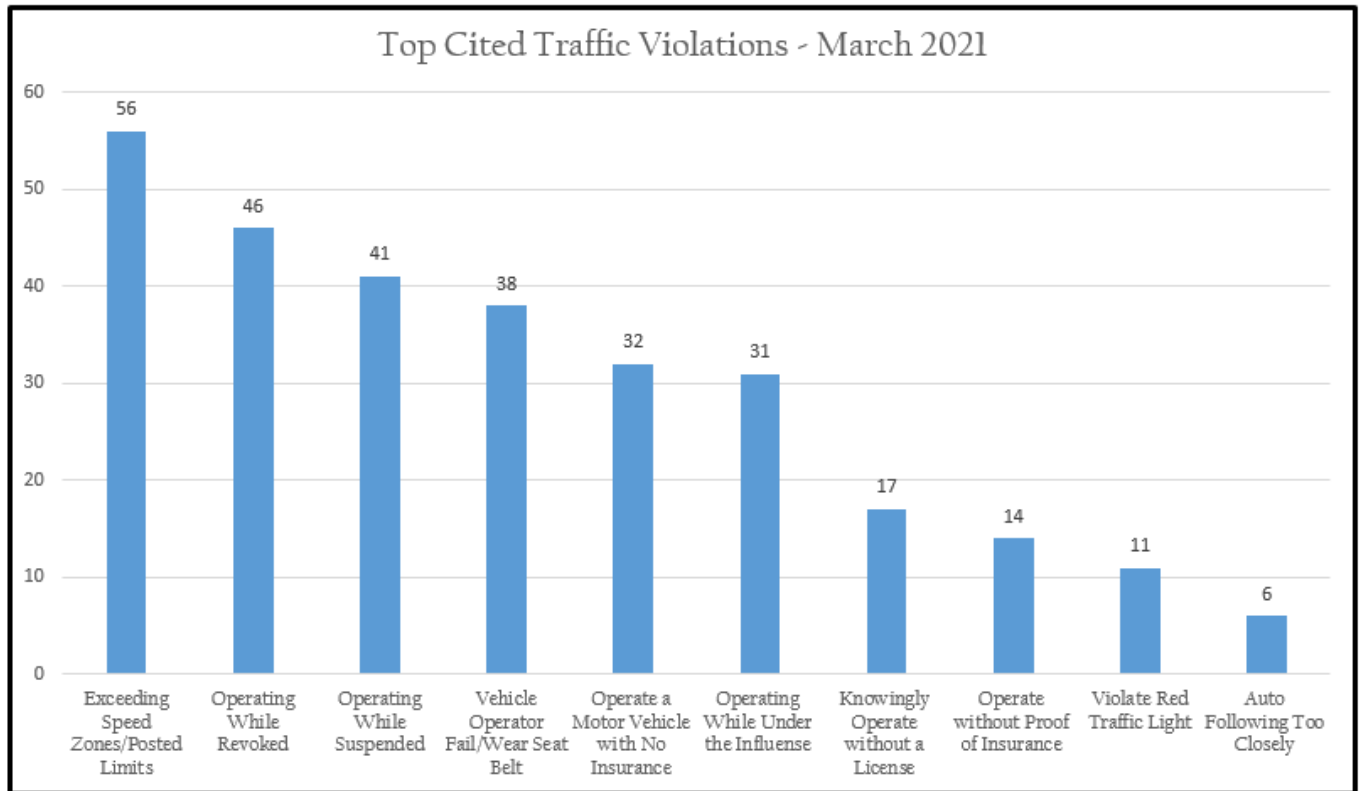

NOTABLE INCIDENTS AT TAVERNS TO WHICH POLICE WERE DISPATCHED.

Bob & Randy's Bar, 1515 N. 6th Street

- (1) *Case #21001838, 03/02/2021 at 10:45 AM:* Criminal Theft; A self-report form was completed for a theft of a bicycle from the bar-a red Trek Series 4000, with scuff marks, a broken shifter and frozen cables.
- (2) *Case #2100227, 03/13/2021 at 9:37 PM:* Stolen Vehicle; A citizen called to report her vehicle stolen from the bar by a male she had been at the bar with. On arrival, the female reporting person had left the bar, according to the bartender. As officers were walking back to their cars, the vehicle in question pulled out from the back parking lot. The male operator saw the officers, they left the lot driving in an extremely reckless manner, speeding and running stop signs. The officers did not pursue the vehicle but checked the area and located it parked near Chicago Ave. The female reporting party was still with the vehicle and claimed the male had fled on foot. The female claimed that she and the male had been at the bar together, when he asked to retrieve something from the car. She gave him the keys and he did not return. When she finished her food, she checked the lot to see that the car was gone. The male returned with the car just prior to officers' arrival. She was shocked and afraid when the male pulled away and drove in a reckless manner. She reached over and slammed the gear shift lever into park and remove the keys, which resulted in them stopping in that location. The officers were familiar with the male, however he is homeless and difficult to locate. Several citations would be issued to the male if/when located.

Cop Shoppe Bar, 701 Washington Street

- (1) *Event #21029315, 03/04/2021 at 11:57 PM:* Suspected Drug Use; A refused complainant called to report that there was marijuana smoking occurring inside the bar, to include the bartender. Officers responded looked into the bar before entering, did not see anyone smoking anything inside the bar. Officers make contact with the bartender to advise her of the complaint, and reported being able to detect a "light" order of marijuana inside the bar. The bartender denied anybody smoking anything in the bar, but was warned that smoking inside was not allowed, much less marijuana smoking.
- (2) *Case #21002267, 03/13/2021 at 8:02 PM:* Fight; A **bartender** called to report that a male patron that had been banned from the bar had been in the bar. The male had started a physical altercation with four to five patrons, knocking people down and breaking things. The male left, but threatened that he would be back. He had been gone ten minutes when they decided to call. When officers arrived, the male had not returned. The story at the scene from several people indicated that the male came into the bar and several of the patrons knew that the male had been banned. The bartender asked the male to leave, however he refused. Subsequently, several of the patrons took it upon themselves to physically attempt to remove the male, which caused the scuffle. One patron claimed of having been punched and kicked. Officers were able to contact the male suspect by phone, who claimed that he had been invited to the bar by another patron, and that he was forced to defend himself. He claimed he held back from throwing any punches, although he felt he easily could have. At the time, the bartender was unclear as to why she did not call police to have the mail removed, or when the fight escalated. Officers later watched surveillance video provided by the bar. It is determined that a male suspect had been accosted by patrons first, and was acting in self-defense. As such, no charges were filed, and an informational report was completed.



Loppnow's Sports Bar, 1502 N. 3rd Street

- (1) *Case #21002276, 03/14/2021 at 12:10 AM:* Criminal Damage to Property, Underage Drinking; A patron called to report that a male that had been kicked out of the bar had smashed a window on his vehicle. The suspect had left the area. Officers responded and took the complaint from the victim. He stated he left the bar at about the same time as another male that had been kicked out. He observed that male although one of the windows on his vehicle, smashing it. The criminal damage suspect had been in the bar and was asked to leave because he was intoxicated and bothering other customers. The suspect had left his name on a form for a Safe Ride Home. He was not located that evening. The victim to the damage to property admitted he had been in the bar drinking, but was only twenty years old. Investigation into that situation led to the discovery of the male to be in possession of a fake Illinois driver's license. The bar claimed they checked his identification, and described it as an Illinois driver's license. The false identification was confiscated and the male was issued a citation. Since the bar attempted to verify the males age and were presented with identification that was not obviously false, I declined to penalize the bar for having underage person on the premise. The criminal damage suspect is still at large.

Oz, 320 Washington Street

- (1) *Event #21030303, 03/06/2021 at 7:36 PM:* Mental Subject; A female patron called for a welfare check of her fiancé after they had an argument while they were inside of Oz. Her fiancé had left after their argument, and she was concerned for his welfare. Officers located him walking along Grand Ave. He denied having any suicidal or self-harm ideations. The female was given a ride home, and at his own request the male was allowed to continue walking after his contact with the officers. No law enforcement action was taken.

Bull Falls Brewery, 901 E. Thomas Street

- (1) *Case #21002180, 03/11/2021 at 11:34 AM:* A woman called to report her vehicle stolen from the parking lot of the bar after having been at the bar the previous night and leaving the vehicle parked there. The woman stated she had left the keys in the cup holder, or the passenger seat. It was a rental vehicle from Enterprise. Approximately twelve days later, the vehicle was located in Waukegan, Illinois. No suspects were identified.

Roc's Place Bar, 810 S. 3rd Avenue

- (1) *Case #21001954, 03/04/2021 at 11:04 PM:* Fight; Officers responded to a report of a fight involving about a dozen people in the parking lot. Two separate callers reported the incident, and I believe one of them was an **employee**. Officers observed two males yelling and pushing each other on arrival. As the crowd realized officers were present, people started dispersing, and one of the males involved in the altercation fled on foot. The other remained on scene and was spoken to by an officer, while others pursued the fleeing individual. The male that remained on scene denied being involved in the altercation, and described himself as trying to break up the fight. He was released at the time. Later information was learned that he was more involved in the direct altercation then he admitted on scene. He was referred for Disorderly Conduct. The male that fled on foot was located and arrested. He was issued a summons for Resisting, Disorderly Conduct, in two counts of Bail Jumping. Video of the incident was not immediately available, however it was provided in a reasonable amount of time and in its entirety following the incident. The video showed that the argument started inside the bar, in full view of employees and other patrons. It moved outside the bar into the parking lot, while one employee (presumably off-duty) was physically trying to keep the other half of the fight inside the bar. This went on for several minutes prior to the notification of law enforcement. There were some initial reports that one of the males may have been armed with a handgun in his waistband. There was an actual physical altercation that took place in the lot, not just pushing and yelling. Although certain movements would lend credence to the presence of a firearm



(quick movement to retrieve something from a vehicle parked nearby, certain body posturing and hand position and movement that might favor having something concealed in a waistband), it is not readily clear that anyone was in possession of a handgun. Officers checked the area after the fight and foot pursuit, and were not able to locate one. I recommend that the bar is assessed **fifty (50) Demerit Points** for Failure to Maintain Orderly Premise. I believe an employee did notify the Police, although I also believe that they could have called sooner, and had they called sooner, the altercation would not have progressed to the level it did.

- (2) *Event #21034007, 03/13/2021 at 8:35 PM:* Unwanted Patron; The **bar manager** called to report that her bartender contacted her and reported that there was a male in the bar that had been banned. He wouldn't leave when asked. This same male had also been kicked out of the Cop Shoppe bar after an altercation a short time before this call. On this occasion, an officer made contact with the male and explained to him that he was not allowed in the bar. He remained cooperative and left.
- (3) *Event #21034066, 03/13/2021 at 11:19 PM:* Suspicious Activity; Officers had conducted a bar check at approximately 10:52 PM. The **bartender** called back stating that a person had left the bar just before the officers came in for the check. After the officers left, the bartender found a heroin works kits (tie-off, etc.). No drugs were located and the kit was submitted for disposal.

Treu's Tic Toc Club, 1201 W. Thomas Street

- (1) *Case #21002644, 03/22/2021 at 4:30 PM:* Hit and Run; An officer was conducting follow-up at a residence across the street from the bar when the resident reported a hit and run to his vehicle by a patron leaving the bar. The officer made contact with the bar and obtained video of the incident. The video was of sufficient quality that the suspect vehicle and operator were identified. The male suspect was issued a citation for Hit and Run to an Unattended Vehicle.

M & R Station, 818 S. 3rd Avenue

- (1) *Case #21001953, 03/04/2021 at 10:11 PM:* Mental Subject; A complainant that refused to be identified reported that there was a male at the bar that has been mentally unstable in the past. Officers made contact with the male, who was not unstable at the time. However, he did have a felony bond that had a prohibition of being in a bar or drinking. He admitted to both. He was issued a summons for Felony Bail Jumping, and released at the scene.

Days Bowl-A-Dome, 1715 Stewart Avenue

- (1) *Event #21035805, 03/17/2021 at 7:15 PM:* Suspicious Activity; A complainant that refused to be identified called to report a young male (approximately twenty-three years old) was possibly on drugs. He came in and ordered some water and then went back outside with the lady said she needs to "take care of some shit" with the male. The caller did not believe the two were at the bar together. An officer responded and observed the male in the bar, playing a coin-operated machine, minding his own business. The officer asked the bartender if she had any problems with the male. She denied calling and said he was not causing any issues. The officer did not observe any female with the male at the time. Since the bar did not want anything done, and the male was acting relatively normally, no further action was taken.



Aftershock Bar, 1418 Lenard Street

- (1) *** Numerous extra patrols have continued through February (a total of twenty-eight). Most entries documented how many vehicles were there, and that there were no disturbances noted. The majority of the entries also noted not seeing anyone outside of the bar. ***
- (2) *Case #21002047, 03/06/2021 at 8:57 PM:* Noise Complaint; Officers responded to the bar in reference to an anonymous complaint of loud music. Officers were able to hear the sound of the bass from outside the bar, but described it as not being obnoxiously loud. The bartender advised they had a DJ for the night, and was receptive to turning down the volume. While inside for that matter, one of the officers observed a male he knew to have arrested recently. After checking bond conditions for the male, it was learned he should not have been drinking rather bar. Bell was arrested and issued a summons for felony bail jumping with the restriction that he is not supposed to be drinking or be at a bar male was released after having been issued a summons.
- (3) *Event #21037245, 03/20/2021 at 5:53 PM:* Vehicle ATL; A citizen that did not leave their name called about an intoxicated male that may be getting into a vehicle and driving. Three. The male was described as an older male, 75 to 80 years old. The caller was going to call back if the male left. Eventually, the male left in a cab. No officers responded prior to the male leaving in the cab.
- (4) *Case #21002787, 03/28/2021 at 2:51 AM:* Alarm; Officers responded to the bar for a commercial burglar alarm. The building was checked and was found to be secure. The officer noted the owners had mentioned installing a new alarm system. A false alarm report was completed.
- (5) *Event #21041062, 03/28/2021 at 8:13 PM:* Service Miscellaneous; A refused (but later named) complainant reported seeing people outside drinking and smoking. The bartender was out with the patrons at the time. The caller requested that an officer drive by the bar. On arrival, the officer did not see anyone outside. He spoke with the bartender (who was reported to be uncharacteristically cooperative). The bartender admitted that he had taken an empty bottle from a patron outside. He said he was working alone, and cooking, which made it difficult to watch everything. He further stated that he normally works during the day, when the crowd is calmer and abides by the rules more readily. The officer spoke with the patron that had the beer outside. He claimed it was an honest mistake. The witness also spoke with an officer at the scene. The witness observed a group of people come out of the bar. Within the group, a make was drinking out of a beer bottle. The bartender came out and talked to them, but didn't do anything about the beer. The officer had no evidence that open bottle of beer was anywhere on the sidewalk or street. I find it hard to believe that an adult that goes to a bar does not know you can't just take an open beer to the parking lot and drink it. It is the bartender's duty to make sure that does not happen, or the bar's responsibility to hire enough staff to prevent it. As such, I recommend assessing **twenty-five (25) Demerit Points** for Leaving with Open Container.

Callon Street Pub, 209 Callon Street

- (1) *Case #21002282, 03/13/2021 at 8:42 PM:* Welfare Check; The **bartender** called after a male came into the bar and began acting strangely, possibly under the influence of drugs. The male removed his shoes and went into the bathroom after claiming someone had beaten him up and urinated in his shoes. When he hadn't come out in a while, they checked on him. He had locked the door and refused to come out. He made a threat that he had a gun. The bar was evacuated and officers intended on beginning a dialogue with the male, however he came out on his own volition. He was transported to Aspirus, and was assessed by HCC. He was eventually accepted at HCC for a 51.45 (Emergency Detention due to drug incapacitation).



Showtime Gentlemen's Club, 1709 Merrill Ave

- (1) *Event #21040320, 03/27/2021 at 3:12 AM:* Hit and Run Crash; A woman called to report a hit and run crash to her vehicle in the parking lot. Initially, the operator of the striking vehicle refused to give their name, and offered the victim cash for the damage to their vehicle. The suspect left by the time the officer arrived, but a license plate was provided. While the officer was following up on the case, the victim advised that the suspect had worked things out with the victim, and no crash report was needed. No further action was taken with the incident.

Newch's Eatery, 1810 Merrill Avenue

- (1) *Case #21002587, 03/21/2021 at 10:27 PM:* Criminal Miscellaneous; A woman called to report what may have been a sexual assault. The woman admitted to voluntarily taking a ½ pill of ecstasy, and subsequently blacking out for a period of time. During that lost time, the woman suspected she may have been sexually assaulted by the owner of the bar in the apartment above the bar. The victim submitted to a SANE kit. Contact was made with the bar owner, who denied the allegation. He further stated that he retained the surveillance that showed he did not leave the bar with the victim during that night. The victim was not sure it had happened in the first place, and after seeing the surveillance from the owner, the victim declined to pursue the matter further, feeling that it likely did not happen, and was something that her ex-boyfriend had tried to promote as having occurred because of the problems they have had. No law enforcement action was taken beyond the questioning of the owner.

Records Bureau

Law enforcement would not be able to do its job successfully without access to data. The 76 sworn officers at the Wausau Police Department create a lot of data and paperwork, but it's only useful if it can be found when it's needed, and only if it gets to the correct people. We have 1 Office Manager, 4 Administrative Assistants and 1 Law Enforcement Computer Technician that keep all of our processes moving. They receive information from the officers, be sure it is entered and properly cataloged, forward it to other agencies and departments, and then review and potentially release when requested. This includes paper reports, squad video and body worn camera, photos, and lost and found items.

This department is also the first point of contact for customer service for the public. They are a cheerful, resourceful group who go out of their way to be sure needs get met in as timely a manner as possible.
