Minutes of previous meetings. (5/24/21)

Motion by Herbst, second by Peckham to approve the minutes of the 5/24/21 meetings. Motion carried 4-0.

Discussion and possible action on a “Resolution to Support Environmental Justice” considered and recommended by the Liberation and Freedom Committee

Lisa Rasmussen noted following the consideration of the resolution by the Liberation and Freedom Committee the legal department asks for some revisions to the draft, which has been done and that is what is before them tonight.

Tom Kilian explained the origins of the resolution for environmental justice and its implications. This was followed by public comment and extensive committee discussion which can be accessed on YouTube for the full dialogue:

- 2) Bruce Grau, 1115 N 10th St, spoke in support of the resolution.
- 3) Rita Pachal, 1310 Maple Hill Rd, spoke in support of the resolution.
- 4) Terry Kilian, 133 E Thomas St, on behalf of Citizens for a Clean Wausau, indicated strong support of the resolution.
- 5) Randy Radtke, 244 Wyatt St, spoke in support of the resolution.
- 6) Lisa Ortondergard, 220180 Pleasant Dr, Edgar, retired Social Worker for Wausau School District, spoke in support of the resolution.
- 7) Don Lewandowski, 174514 Mission Lake Rd, Hatley, owner of rental properties in the City of Wausau, spoke in support of the resolution.
- 8) Joyce Luedke, 3605 Cross Pointe Blvd, Apt 371, Weston, spoke in support of the resolution.
- 9) Chris Norfleet, 227 Scott St, spoke about the lack of public participation in government and in support of the resolution.
- 10) Jack Hogendyke, Hilltop Rd, express concerns about the resolution not accomplishing much because the problems can be addressed with existing laws.
- 11) Will Harris, 316 ½ N 3rd St, Apt C, Marathon County Board Supervisor District 3, urged committee support for the resolution.
- 12) Ka Lo, 620 ½ Lincoln Ave, Marathon County Board Supervisor District #5, urged passage of the resolution.

Kevin Fabel, Environment Engineer for the City of Wausau, addressed the committee on his review of the resolution and went through each point in the statement provided to the committee in the packet. Link to packet below:

Eric Lindman, Director of Public Works and Utilities, commented he reviewed the resolution and tried to understand where the objectives and priorities are and to align them with what we are already doing. He felt direction to staff on how to move forward was missing. *Further discussion and questions. 5 minute recess was taken.*

Motion by Peckham, second by Wadinski to amend the wording in Section 2 as follows “also serves as the foundation for the future development of ~~additional ordinances~~ **practices** that ensure active consideration of environmental justice.....” Motion carried 3-1.

Motion by Peckham, second by Wadinski to approve the Environmental Justice Resolution with the intention of working with staff to develop equitable and wise procedures to handle these matters in the future, and as amended on the committee floor. Motion failed 2-2. (*Rasmussen and Herbst were the dissenting votes*)

Consider approval or denial of various license applications.

Rasmussen stated there is one denial recommendation for an Operator's License for Jessica Taylor. It was noted Ms. Taylor was not present to appeal.

Motion by Wadinski, second by Peckham to approve or deny licenses as recommended by staff. Motion carried 4-0.

Consider request for Premise Amendment to add an outdoor beer garden, 101 Pub, 101 N 3rd Ave (Brewer Entertainment LLC - Matt Brewer)

Matt Brewer indicated he has been the new owner of 101 Pub for approximately eight weeks and his business has grown and the priority now is space. He stated he has had some requests to have an outdoor event area similar to what Chatterbox has next door. He anticipated having some new activities in an outdoor beer garden, such as bags and music events, as well as additional seating and private events. The size would be approximately 25 x 50 square feet, fenced in. He indicated he would have to change the diving pattern within his parking lot. He noted he would be adding a handicapped entrance because there are some handicapped patrons. Staffing would be increased by two full-time employees for that additional space. He estimated the middle of July for the completion of construction.

Rasmussen pointed out outdoor music does require approval of the committee. She noted the committee typically asks that outdoor music end by 10:00 pm, so as not to disturb neighbors. Cpt. Todd Baeten commented noise complaints are pretty common with outdoor music entertainment, or indoor entertainment with doors left open.

Motion by Wadinski, second by Peckham to approve the premise amendment to add an outdoor beer garden at 101 Pub. Motion carried 4-0.

Consider request by Wausau Events to amend the Concerts on the Square event to add an additional concert on July 4, 2021.

Rasmussen stated the Wausau 4th of July Celebration has been canceled based on a lack of time to prepare and Covid restrictions, leaving a limited amount of things for people to do. Wausau Events would like to add an extra concert to their series to take place on The 400 Block on July 4, 2021.

Motion by Herbst, second by Peckham to approve the additional concert. Motion carried 4-0.

Operations Report from Fire Department for May 2021

Chief Robert Barteck commented on a 5th alarm fire in the Town of Marathon that the department responded to as Mutual Aid partners. *Report placed on file.*

Tavern Activities / Compliance Checks / Law Enforcement Activities

Captain Todd Baeten presented the Wausau PD Operations Report – May 2021. He commented the hiring and swearing in of three new police officers was a landmark event for the department because it is the first time within recent years that we have been at full staff. *Report placed on file.*

This event is to film a scene for a dance and film workshop that takes place in Central Wisconsin every year. The event is not open to the public and does not function for profit. The size of the cast and crew will not total more than 20 people. In order to set the scene we will need to stage some cars parked in the road with their lights on and a few doors open. The shoot shouldn't take longer than four hours.

Dance for Screen works with local artists, filmmakers, musicians, and businesses to produce a short film once a year. The films are then submitted to dance film festivals around the country and abroad. We bring together the art of film-making with dance for a unique experience that dancers in the area would otherwise have to travel for. In the past, the films have premiered during the Festival of the Arts weekend and at venues like Whitewater Music Hall. We love to showcase local talent and Wausau itself.

The cast will be moving south along the sidewalk and street on N 3rd Street in the area between Sweets on Third and Yanke Book Store. A couple of cast members will be moving onto 3rd from McClellan near La Prima and Back When Cafe. This is a pretty isolated event and different parts of the scene will be shot at different times. This means that only when we shoot a wide shot would all of the cast need to be acting at once.

No parking needed as this is not a public event. We would need to stage a few cars around the shooting location including the main vintage car which would be parked in a spot outside Back When Cafe. The beginning of the scene starts with this car driving north on Third and into that parking space.

The only advertising we do goes towards the film premiere and is done through social media and sometimes news articles.

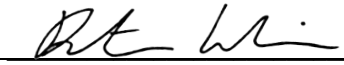

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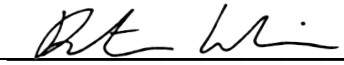

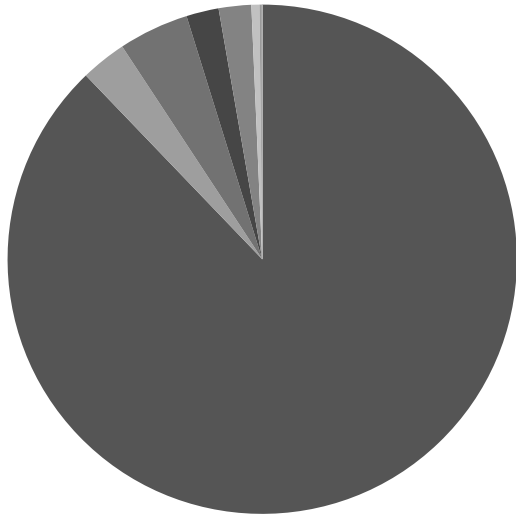

Chief's Message

June, 2021 was a busy month for the police department. As the weather warms, there is an increase in activity in our community. As you will see in this month's events report, the summer events in Wausau keep our department busy. We provide services with our sworn police officers, Community Service Officers, and our Emergency Police.

Our records bureau continues to be inundated with open records requests. It is extremely time consuming for our staff to sift through all of the body camera and squad videos to be sure we are in compliance with the law regarding redaction prior to release of these videos. This month we have one of our clerical staff members helping out the Mayor's office who is currently recruiting for a clerical position.

In June we saw a significant increase in calls for service at the Gazebo at Big Bull Falls Park. We went from 4 calls for service in May to 19 in June. One of the calls was a result of a stabbing and another call was a man with a hatchet damaging the gazebo. We are developing options and recommendations for PH&S to address the issues that continue to happen at Big Bull Falls Park.

In the CRO report, you will see a listing of arrests made that includes bail jumping charges. The backlog in the Marathon County court system is resulting in many people out of jail on bond that continue to commit crimes. This will continue to impact the safety and crime rate of our community until the issue is resolved.

Counting Rules

Counts on this page are based on the month of the incident or arrest, rather than the month the incident was submitted. If the incident date is unknown, the report date is used. Counts are subject to change as data are updated.

Offense counts are calculated based on the number of offenses for each victim (per incident) for Crimes Against Persons and the number of unique offense types (per incident) for Crimes Against Property and Crimes Against Society. For burglary and motor vehicle theft, offense counts are based on the number of premises entered and the number of vehicles stolen, respectively.

Victim counts are calculated based on the number of victims connected to each unique offense type in an incident. For Crimes Against Persons, the number of victims will be equal to the number of offenses. Victims will be counted more than once if they are connected to multiple offenses.

Arrest counts are calculated based on the number of arrestees listed on a Group A or Group B incident. Each arrestee is counted only once per incident. Arrests are categorized based on the specific Group A or Group B arrest code submitted by the agency, rather than the incident offense code. Since agencies only submit the most serious arrest charge for each arrestee on an incident, arrest counts are not indicative of the number of charges.

Incidents are cleared in one of two ways: by arrest or by exceptional means. Clearance counts are based on the number of offenses cleared in a given month regardless of when the offense occurred, and can therefore be greater than the number of offenses in a given month. In incident-based reporting, the first arrest on an incident, or an exceptional clearance, will clear all offenses associated with the incident.

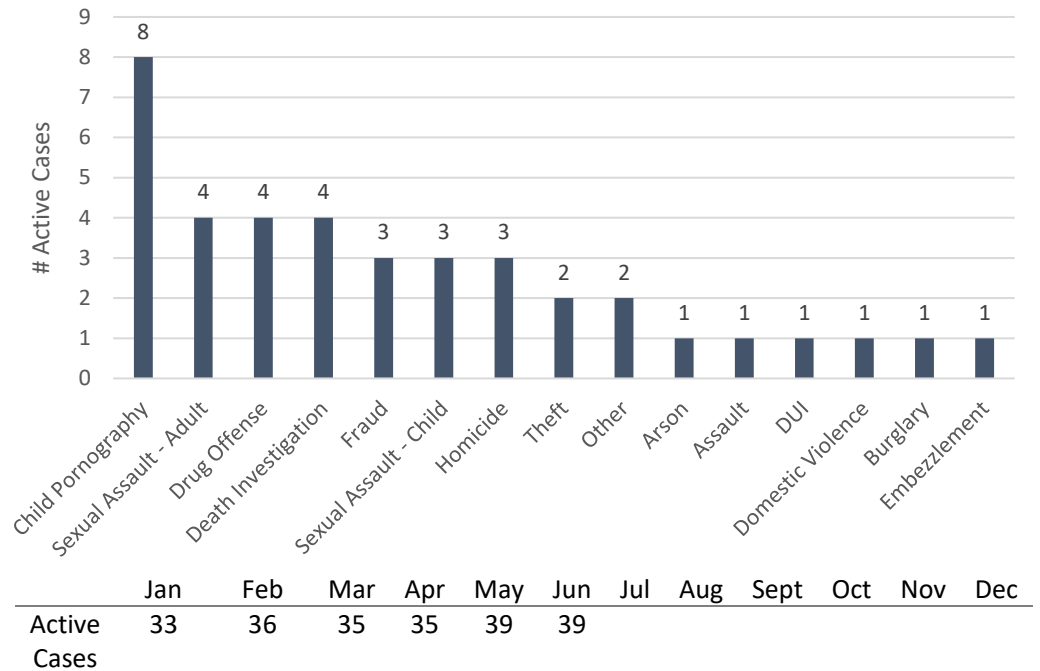

Detective Case Load by Crime Type



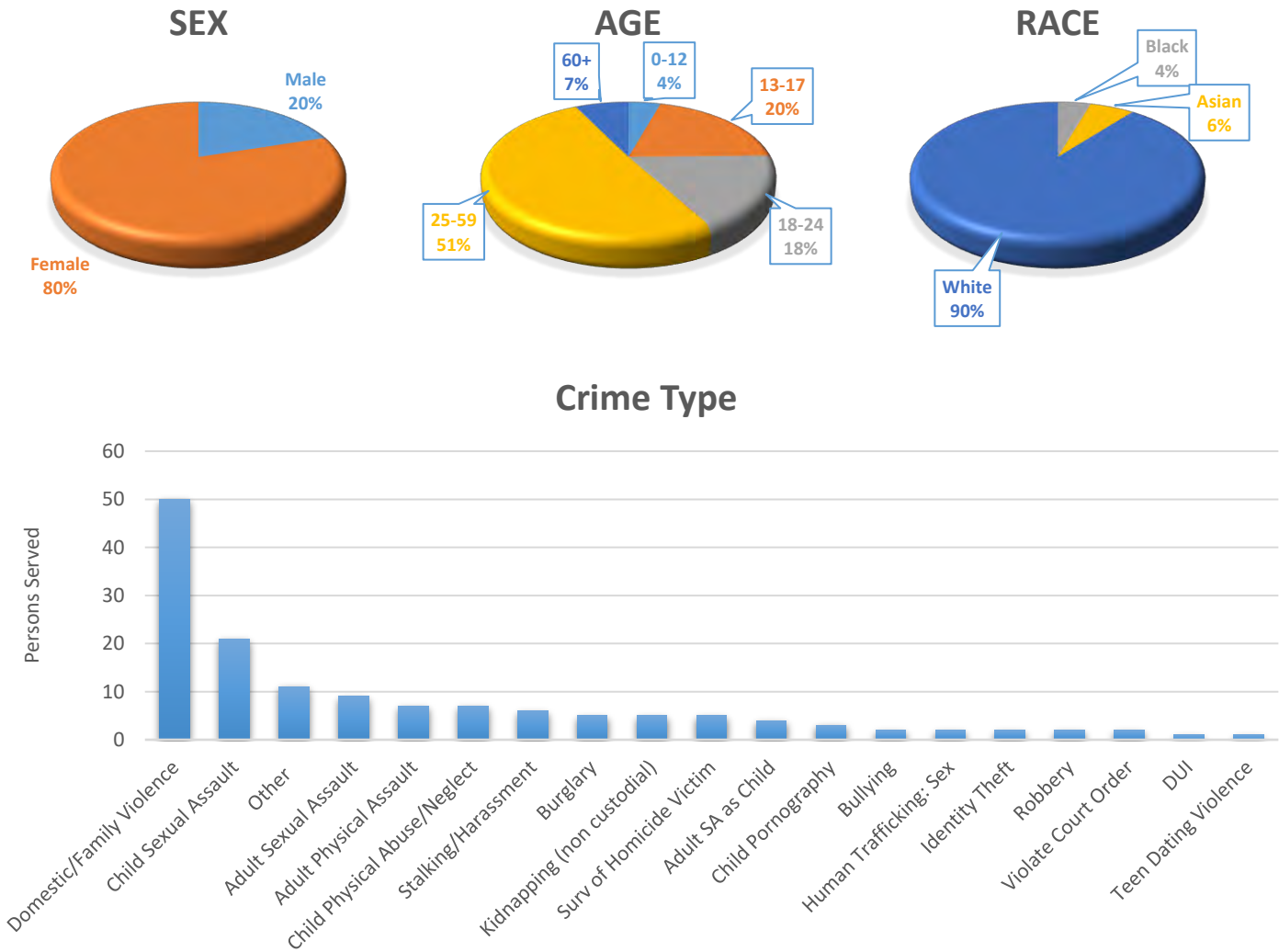

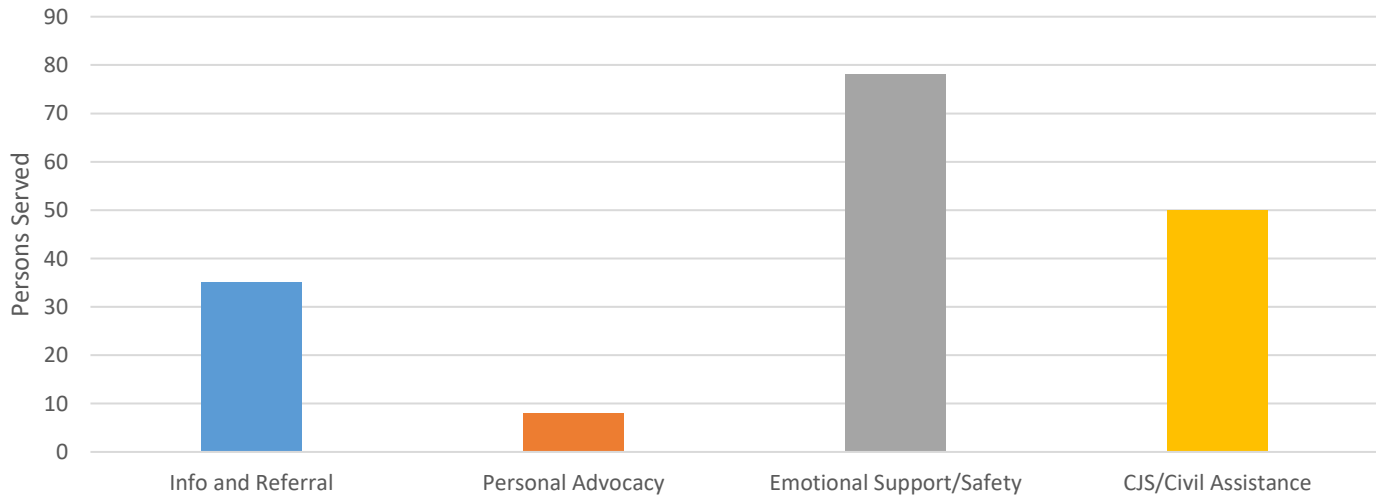

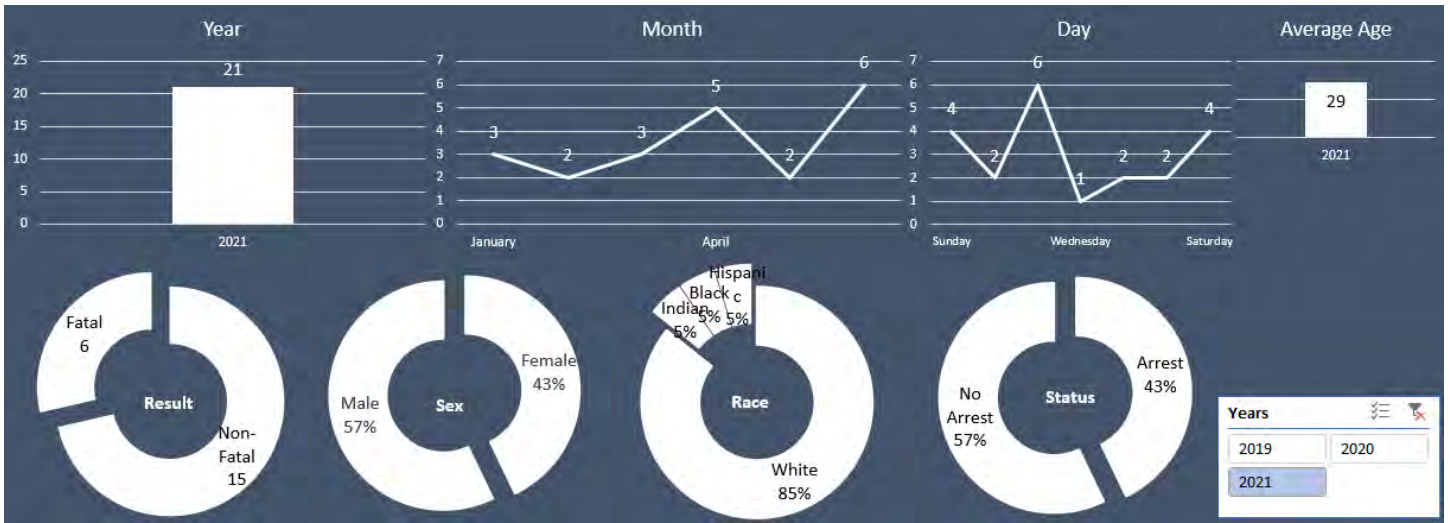


Type of Service Provided



Drug Overdoses – Monthly Report

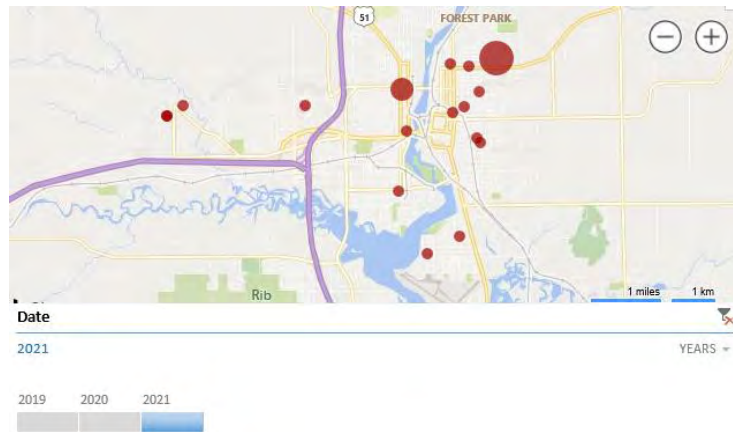
Year to Date (through June, 2021)

*CART is a shared resource with MNSO; above data represents WPD jurisdiction activities only. WPD has one (1) CART Officer, on M-F day shift schedule. This position is not back-filled during the CART Officer's off-days. MNSO's CART Deputy also responds to relevant CFS in the City when available.

"CFS": Calls For Service (Officer initiated activities and calls received from Dispatch).

"Mental Health" and "Welfare Check" are the two most common types of CFS (coded by Dispatch based on the initial information reported) that involve individuals in crisis.

"Community" origin of 51.15 / 51.45: Law enforcement is called to a location in the community (*residence, business, public location*) in response to an individual in crisis (or incapacitated). De-escalation, safety planning, and/or diversion is not viable or is unsuccessful, resulting in 51.15 or 51.45 detention.

"Facility" origin of 51.15: While under care or custody of the Jail, NCHC, or medical facility; an inmate or patient is suicidal or otherwise assessed on-site by a Crisis Professional, and deemed in need of 51.15. Law Enforcement is then called upon to confirm and complete the 51.15 (as required by WI Stats.) **Lacks opportunity for diversion.**

"51.15": "Emergency Detention" under WI Statute 51.15. Law enforcement may take into custody an individual who is:

- (1) Mentally ill, drug dependent or developmentally disabled, and;
- (2) A substantial probability of physical harm to him/herself or others is evident by recent acts or omissions, attempts or threats.

"51.45": "Alcohol or Drug Detention" under WI Statute 51.45. "A person who appears to be 'incapacitated by alcohol or another drug' shall be placed under protective custody by a law enforcement officer."



Housing Task Force - WPD/NCHC Team update:

5 total residents at McClellan Refuge house:

- 1 male found other housing with a family member and moved out in June
 - *This person had joined the house following prison release; had stayed about 5 weeks*
 - *Replaced with a male who had been homeless, current NCHC client*
- 2 are maintaining employment, steady income and ready for own apartments
 - *searching/applying for apartments, but not yet successful in being selected*
- 2 are on / applying for SS - Disability, so employment is not an option at this point.
 - *1 recently accepted to 18-month treatment program out of county (working on replacement)*

June CFS to Big Bull Falls Park area (activities outside of proactive/extra patrol by Officers):

- Activity increased significantly from May to June. 18 WPD responses in June:
 - 8 Criminal/misdemeanor activity complaints
 - 6 Welfare checks / 911 hang-up
 - 4 Medical emergency (incapacitation)

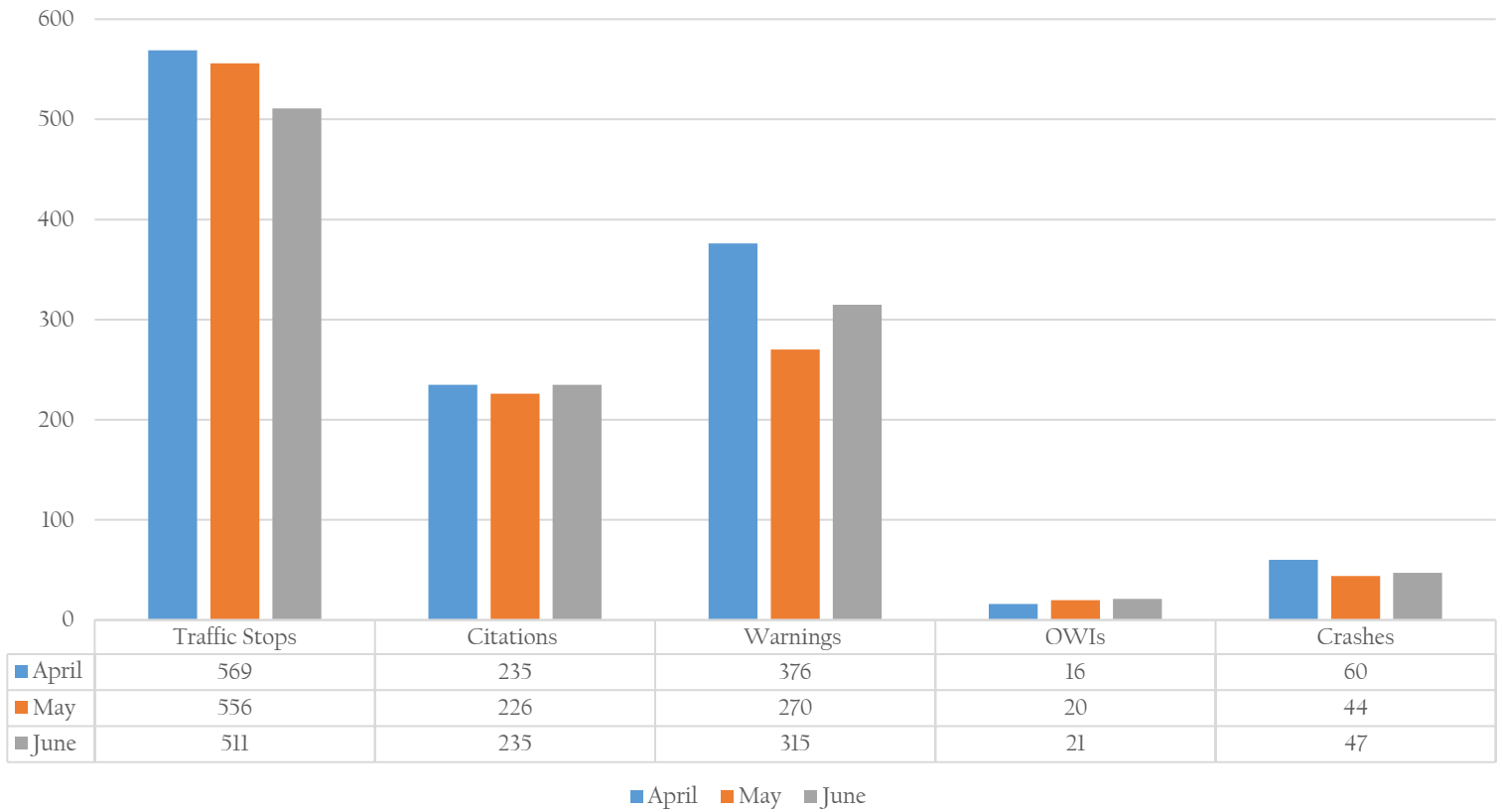
Monthly engagement examples:

-Homeless male w/ mental health diagnoses had been damaging city street lighting components; was jailed initially. Worked with NCHC on stabilization stay and commitment, and now residing with parents following NCHC release.

-60 year old male, many years of homelessness here, substance abuse/addiction history, extensive public disorder violations history. Deteriorating hygiene issue landed him in the hospital for several days. Worked with social workers on getting him a rehab stay at a local nursing home. HTF identified family members out of the area, relayed his story and current situation, resulting in renewed interest and efforts by family in coming to his aid. He is still in the nursing home facility, with family now working on next steps for him.



3 Month Traffic Enforcement Comparison

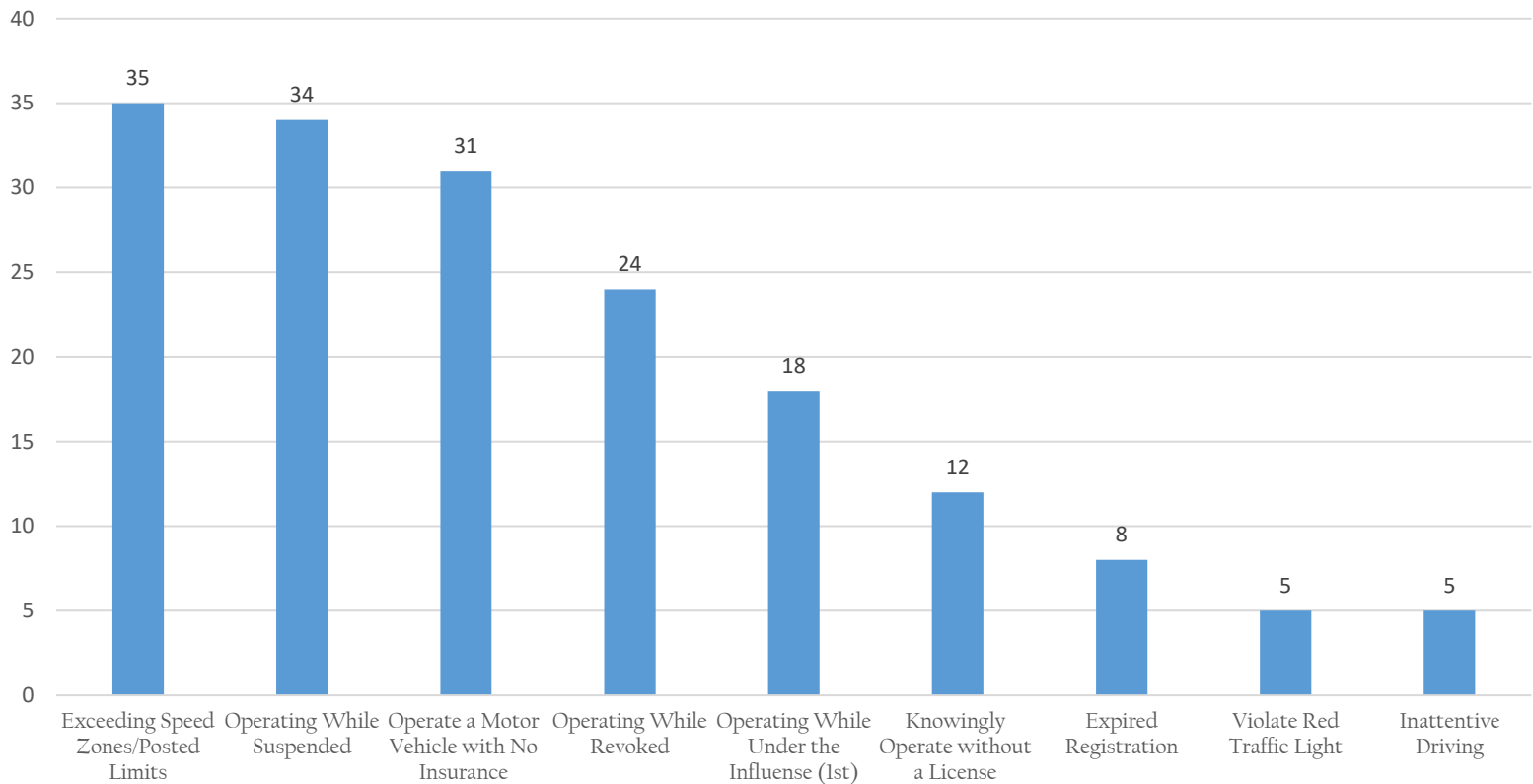


YEAR-TO-DATE TRAFFIC TOTALS (JANUARY- JUNE 2021)

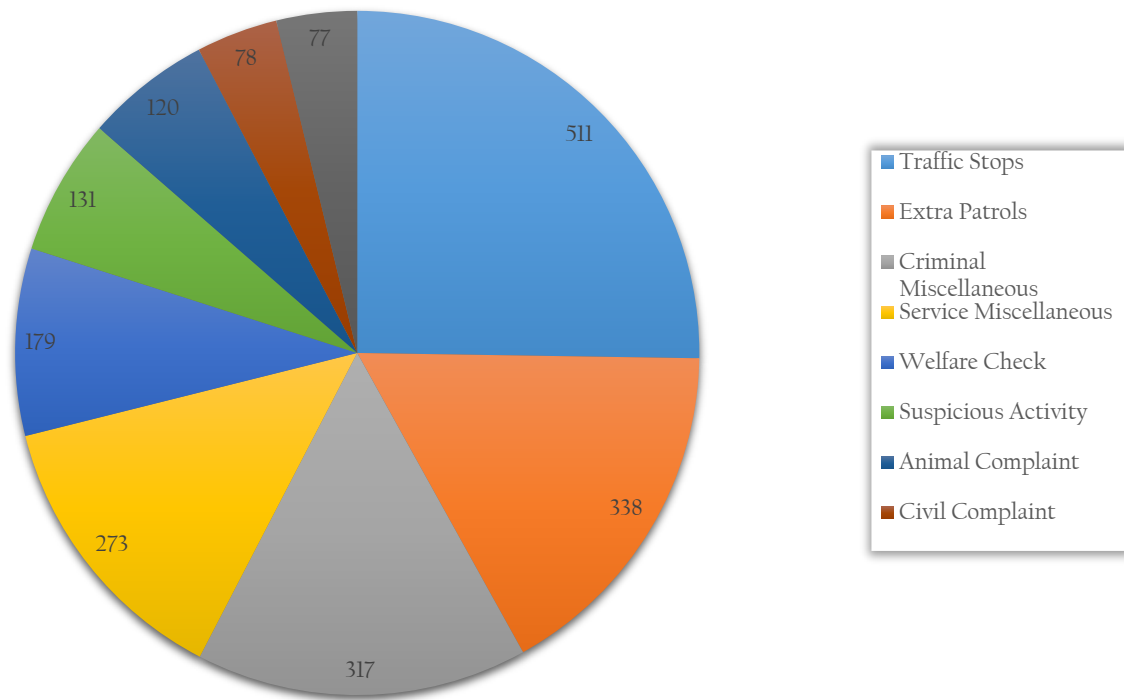

NOTABLE INCIDENTS AT TAVERNS TO WHICH POLICE WERE DISPATCHED.

6th Street Pub, 2002 N. 6th Street

- (1) Extra patrols have been done to determine if the bar has been open. The bar was checked sixteen days, and never found to be open for business during the month of June, 2021. I noticed that the Liquor License has been renewed to 2022.

Bob & Randy's Bar, 1515 N. 6th Street

- (1) *Event #21086436, 06/28/2021 at 12:15 AM: VEHICLE ATL:* An **employee** called to report that a woman had driven into the lot, came into the bar and fell down twice, then hit the dumpster as she was leaving. An Officer responded, was not able to immediately locate the vehicle, and was dispatched to another call. There was no notation of damage to the dumpster. An Attempt To Locate (ATL) was broadcasted to local agencies.

Cop Shoppe Pub, 701 Washington Street

- (1) *Case #21005138, 06/06/2021 at 12:01 AM: CRIMINAL MISCELLANEOUS:* An officer was flagged down by a citizen to report an assault. The victim claimed that he and his girlfriend had walked past the Cop Shoppe Pub, when they were chased north on 7th Street. One of the males chasing them threw a bottle at the male victim, causing him to fall and suffer visible injuries. After numerous follow-up interviews to corroborate or disprove the complaint, the officer referred a male for a battery charge. There were some conflicting accounts that the victim and his girlfriend had either not going to the bar, or had opened the door and began yelling inside. The suspect had been in the bar and went after the victim and his girlfriend after they left the bar area. The victim and his girlfriend denied having been in the bar. The bartender stated they had not been in the bar. At least one witness claimed they had been at the doorway of the bar in an instigating manner.
- (2) *Event #21075084, 06/06/2021 at 1:26 AM: SERVICE MISCELLANEOUS:* An **employee** called regarding a female patron refusing to leave. The employee stated that the female had been warned but still would not leave. Prior to officers' arrival, the female swore at the bartender and left. The employee advised he did not need a police response and would call back if she returned. No officer responded.



- (3) *Event #21075563, 06/07/2021 at 1:44 AM:* CRIMINAL MISCELLANEOUS: An **employee** called complaining that there were two patrons in the bar trying to pick fights. On arrival, the officers noted that many people were leaving and that the bar was nearly empty. The employee advised there were no incidents in the bar, although he did express concern about patrons who used to patronize Roc's Place have now started coming to the Cop Shoppe Pub. The officers and the employee spoke for some time regarding some strategies they can use when trying to manage unruly patrons.
- (4) *Event #21087488, 06/30/2021 at 12:08 AM:* SERVICE MISCELLANEOUS: Information was received from Rothschild PD that there was a male at the Cop Shoppe Pub, in violation of a bond. Officers responded to the bar but were unable to locate the male in question.

Intermission, 325 N. 4th Street

- (1) *Event #21082075, 06/19/2021 at 12:59 AM:* WELFARE CHECK: While patrolling downtown, an Officer observed three males standing around another male, who appeared to be passed out on the sidewalk in front of the bar. The other three males were able to load the intoxicated male into the front passenger seat of a Ford Mustang that was parked there. The officer stopped to check on the welfare of the intoxicated male, as well as to determine whether or not he was going to be able to be monitored for the remainder of the night. While speaking with the other people with the intoxicated male, he fell out of the vehicle, striking his head on the curb. As a result, he was transported to the hospital. His friends responded there to take custody of him after treatment. The officer spoke with the bartender, who stated the intoxicated male was in that shape on arrival, and was not served while in Intermission. The male threw up in a urinal in the bathroom, after which she closed the bar and asked the gentleman to leave. She did not see what happened outside. The friends recounted the male's consumption as consisting of two "Jack and Cokes," one beer and one shot of a peppermint liquor. They did not indicate where that consumption took place. No further action was taken.
- (2) *Event #21088066, 06/30/2021 at 10:42 PM:* SERVICE MISCELLANEOUS: An anonymous caller complained about people in the street blocking traffic, half of which could barely walk, and people carrying bottles of beer outside. Officers arrived and did observe people out on the sidewalk with open drinks. They were advised to take the drinks inside. Contact was made with the bartender and she was advised of the violations. She came outside, upset with her patrons, and yelled at them to not take the drinks outside. The bar was very busy with the band, and it did not appear that there was sufficient staff to manage the door. Based on direct observation by the officers of drinks from the bar being taken outside, I recommend an assessment of **twenty-five (25) Demerit Points** for Leaving with Open Container.

Loppnow's Sports Bar, 1502 N. 3rd Street

- (1) *Event #21080139, 06/15/2021 at 1:41 PM:* SERVICE MISCELLANEOUS: A bartender called to complain about an ongoing problem with a mentally unstable person that lives across the street from the bar. The latest complaint is that the person is sending harassing messages to their Facebook page. They requested extra patrol at closing time as they have also seen the person hanging out in the back lot when they take the garbage out.
- (2) *Event #21082608, 06/20/2021 at 1:00 AM:* FIGHT: Officers were dispatched to the bar for a citizen that wanted to report having been punched by a male outside the bar. The suspect left the scene before the victim called. The fight occurred between two groups of people, but was seemingly instigated by the caller who had been punched. The caller was described by the bouncer as having taken two bottles of beer outside the bar. The bouncer was having difficulty keeping the male from taking the bottles of beer out of the bar and also referring to the bouncer in disrespectful terms. This disrespectful mannerism was also directed towards the other group, from which a male punched the caller. When questioned by officers, the caller was argumentative and not cooperative. The bouncer denied witnessing the actual altercation, and the bartender did not come outside until noticing that



there was a commotion and the altercation had already taken place. Since the caller was uncooperative, and the suspect had left the scene, the complaint was not further investigated.

Malarkey's, 412 N. 3rd Street

- (1) *Event #21081021, 06/17/2021 at 12:06 AM: CRIMINAL MISCELLANEOUS:* An **employee** called after a patron was making comments about wanting to “get revenge,” and kill the employee’s friend. The patron also made comments about blowing up and robbing the business. There was a thirty minute time lapse between the incident and the time at which the call was placed. The suspect was no longer at the scene. An officer still responded, however, the employee that was being bothered by the patron had already left. Another employee explained that the suspect was trying to “get to know” the bartender, moving within her personal space and otherwise making the bartender uncomfortable. The remaining employee was able to distract the suspect, long enough for the first employee to leave the bar. The suspect had been cut off earlier in the evening due to intoxication. He was last seen eastbound on Jefferson Street on foot. The officer was unable to make contact with the suspect or the original caller. No further action was taken.

Den Mar, 601 W. Thomas Street

- (1) *Case #21005611, 06/21/2021 at 2:00 AM: HIT AND RUN CRASH:* A bar **employee** called to report that a patron had backed into their car and left. The employee stated the suspect had been there for hours and was Spanish-speaking. An officer responded and took a crash report. The officer described the reporting person as being very intoxicated and difficult to obtain information from. The employee was to email the Officer images of the suspect from the surveillance footage the following day. Based on footage provided, the registered owner of the suspect vehicle was cited for Owner’s Liability for a Hit and Run.
- (2) *Case #21005822, 06/28/2021 at 12:06 AM: CRIMINAL MISCELLANEOUS:* An **employee** called to report an intoxicated patron in the business that was refusing to leave. On arrival, the officer observed the male walking away from the bar. He appeared very intoxicated and was argumentative with the officer. He was told to leave the area, and the officer remained nearby to make sure that happened. The male was referred for bail jumping as he had a bond condition that prohibited going to bars/taverns.

Eagle’s Club, 1703 S. 3rd Avenue

- (1) *Case #21005394, 06/13/2021 at 8:09 PM: CRIMINAL MISCELLANEOUS:* Officers responded to the bar after an anonymous report was made that the bartender (described as a woman wearing a floral dress) was very intoxicated and dropping things. Officers responded and observed a woman matching the given description tending bar. They noticed broken glass beer bottles behind the bar, and a strong odor of intoxicants emitting from her person. She admitted to consuming alcoholic beverages. She submitted to a Preliminary Breath Test (PBT), resulting in a reading of .12% BrAC. The bartender was issued a citation for sober server violation. A Board of Trustees member was contacted by the bartender, however he was not licensed for tending bar, and since the acting bartender was intoxicated, she could not oversee an unlicensed bartender. The board member decided to close the bar for the night. I recommend an assessment of **twenty-five (25) Demerit Points** for Server Under the Influence.

M & R Station, 818 S. 3rd Avenue

- (1) *Event #21081458, 06/17/2021 at 9:15 PM: SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY:* A caller who refused to be identified reported that there were two cars just sitting in the parking lot for the bar. The caller requested an officer to drive through the lot to make sure everything was all right. An officer responded about 10 to 15 minutes later, and found nothing suspicious. No further action was taken.



- (2) *Event #21084954, 06/24/2021 at 11:29 PM:* CRIMINAL MISCELLANEOUS: A caller who refused to be identified reported that there were people that showed up at the bar who were not wanted due to having a “bad history.” The caller wanted an officer to walk through the bar to “scare away the people that are bad news.” Prior to officers’ arrival, they called back and stated males and females were jumping on the bar, being very disruptive and causing chaos. On officers’ arrival at the bar, the bar was clearing out. The bartender was kicking everybody out. The bartender stated patrons got upset when they were told to get off the bar due to the liability, and yelling at the bartender. The bartender stated they did not need any further officer assistance.
- (3) *Event #21086422, 06/27/2021 at 10:52 PM:* SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY: An **employee** called to report observing a male in the parking lot who was walking around “screaming.” They described the male as not making threats to anyone but acting “kind of weird.” An officer responded and located the male on the property. The male was loitering at the bar but not patronizing it. He had headphones on and was rapping to himself. The bartender requested that the male leave the premises. While trying to communicate with the male he appeared to be ignoring the officer and continued rapping. After being told many times to leave, he eventually left on foot. The bar was advised to call back if he returned.

Whiskey River Bar & Grill, 5512 Stewart Avenue

- (1) *Case #21005757, 06/26/2021 at 12:04 AM:* FAMILY DISTURBANCE: A woman called the police to report having been physically attacked by her soon to be ex-husband, while they were inside the bar. At the time of the call, the male suspect was supposed to still be in the bar. Officers responded to the bar, located the male and interviewed possible witnesses. The bar manager stated she hires the male suspect every Friday to DJ. The manager observed the female victim come into the bar and engage in a verbal dispute with the suspect, before they stepped outside together. The male suspect claimed the victim threw a drink at him while in the bar, but denied ever touching her. Other witnesses claim to have seen the male suspect push the victim. As a result of the investigation as a whole, the male was arrested for domestic battery and disorderly conduct.

Aftershock Bar, 1418 Lenard Street

- (1) *** Numerous extra patrols have continued through May (a total of six). Most entries documented how many vehicles were there, and that there were no disturbances noted. The majority of the entries also noted not seeing anyone outside of the bar. ***

Campus Pub, 1110 W Campus Drive

- (1) *Event #21075041, 06/05/2021 at 11:27 PM:* NOISE COMPLAINT: A citizen who refused to be named called to complain that the bar had something going on outside, with music that was “beyond loud.” The complainant stated they could hear the words from their house. They tried calling the bar, but they did not answer. Officers responded and approached on foot. They observed the west side door to be open, and noted that the music was an acceptable level, but someone was yelling into the microphone, which was “pretty loud.” The officer spoke to the bartender and requested they address the microphone issue. The bartender was receptive, and the music was turned down. No further complaints were received.

Labor Temple, 318 S. 3rd Avenue

- (1) *Event #21005776, 06/26/2021 at 9:15 PM:* MEDICAL EMERGENCY: An **employee** called to report that there was a male that was in the bathroom, unresponsive and lying on the floor. Witnesses observed a syringe on the floor next to the male, making them think the male had overdosed. On arrival, officers located the male on the floor with the witnesses trying to rouse him. The male did start coming to when the officer initiated contact with him, although he still nodded off



mid-conversation. He was also found with his pants and underwear down to his ankles. He continuously requested to close the stall door so he could have a bowel movement. Due to the observed medical condition of the male, the officer would not allow the male to close the door, in the event the male lost consciousness again. Officers had to pull the male from the stall, and secure the male in wrist restraints, in order to pull up the male's pants. While doing so, more needles and a drug use kit was observed laying in the crotch of the pants. The male was transported by ambulance to Aspirus Wausau Hospital. He was eventually issued a summons for felony bail jumping, possession of methamphetamine, possession of marijuana, possession of drug paraphernalia and resisting/obstructing officers.

Showtime Gentlemen's Club, 1709 Merrill Avenue

- (1) *Case #21005792, 06/27/2021 at 12:42 AM:* FRAUD COMPLAINT: An **employee** called to report that a male that had been at the bar and ran a tab of \$50.50, which he was unable to pay. The suspect had provided identification and a debit card, however the debit card was declined. Just prior to officers' arrival, the male, who was described as being intoxicated, left. He forgot his identification at the bar, so the officers knew his identity. A short time later, Marathon County Sheriff's Deputies responded to a crash in the area near Rib Mountain and the 51/29 interchange for a vehicle crash. It was discovered that it was the suspect from the fraud complaint. Bar management was willing to forgive the complaint if he was willing to pay the tab, however the suspect was unable or unwilling to do so. He was issued a summons for felony bail jumping (no taverns bail condition) and a misdemeanor of defrauding the tavern. The crash and operating while intoxicated were investigated by the Sheriff's Department.

ALCOHOL BEVERAGE DEMERIT POINTS ASSESSED

- **Intermission** was recommended to be assessed twenty-five (25) Demerit Points for Leaving with Open Container. **Eagles Club** is recommended to be assessed twenty-five (25) Demerit Points for Server Under the Influence.

Records Bureau

Law enforcement would not be able to do its job successfully without access to data. The 76 sworn officers at the Wausau Police Department create a lot of data and paperwork, but it's only useful if it can be found when it's needed, and only if it gets to the correct people. We have 1 Office Manager, 4 Administrative Assistants and 1 Law Enforcement Computer Technician that keep all of our processes moving. They receive information from the officers, be sure it is entered and properly cataloged, forward it to other agencies and departments, and then review and potentially release when requested. This includes paper reports, squad video and body worn camera, photos, and lost and found items.

This department is also the first point of contact for customer service for the public. They are a cheerful, resourceful group who go out of their way to be sure needs get met in as timely a manner as possible.
