Minutes of previous meetings. (6/29/21)

Motion by Peckham, second by Herbst to approve the minutes of the 6/29/21 meetings. Motion carried 5-0.

Consider approval or denial of various license applications.

Lisa Rasmussen noted there were not any denial recommendations this month. There are some special event applications and a Class B Beer license for the Wausau Cyclones Hockey Team.

Pat Peckham questioned a Public Transport Driver License renewal on the list that did not show a recommendation by the Police Chief. Deputy Clerk Mary Goede explained it was still pending the Chief's review, but the individual did not have a criminal history so it was expected to be approved.

Motion by Peckham, second by Herbst to approve licenses as recommended by staff and any pending applications contingent upon the Police Chief's approval. Motion carried 5-0.

Discussion and possible action regarding request for film shoot downtown - Brenton Wildman

Lisa Rasmussen indicated Brenton Wildman was available on WebEx to answer questions. She explained he has requested permission to do a film shoot downtown on a Sunday night. He has already had some discussion with the Police Department and the City Clerk and PD is leaning toward having 3rd Street closed for a couple hours.

Brenton Wildman explained his organization runs a dance film workshop in Wausau for which dancers from all different studios around the area and the state can register. They go through a whole process of scripting, storytelling, pre-production and get the students involved as much as possible for an educational experience. Four days are spent doing the choreography and rehearsal, which has started and goes until Thursday. He indicated the storyline and plot this year involved having a location on a main street with historic looking buildings, so he felt 3rd Street was perfect. There are 11 – 12 dancers using mainly the sidewalks and crosswalks and possibly some shots in the street. The shoot is a nighttime shoot that would start at dark, about 8:30 – 9:00 pm, and take about two to three hours. He was anticipating using the area/intersection near Back When Café and La Prima Deli (3rd Street & McClellan) and up that block. It was noted it would be on a Sunday evening when the businesses are closed.

Discussion followed on street closure during the event. Rasmussen stated DPW will have to leave the street barricades on the corners since they do not work on Sundays. The organizer will have to put them out to close the streets during the shoot and put them back on the corner afterwards.

Motion by Peckham, second by Wadinski to approve the request for the film shoot with closure of the 500 and 600 blocks of 3rd Street, as well as McClellan from 2nd Street to 4th Street, as needed from 8:00 pm – 11:30 pm on Sunday, July 25, 2021. Motion carried 5-0.

Operations Report from Fire Department for June 2021

Chief Barteck commented they are currently seeing EMS numbers trending up a bit, but had nothing significant to add to the report submitted. *The Operations Report can be accessed in the online committee packet:*

Tavern Activities / Compliance Checks / Law Enforcement Activities

Deputy Matt Barnes presented the Wausau PD Operations Report – May 2021. *Report in committee packet:*

Barnes commented during Covid, in cooperation with the Marathon County Sheriff's Department, less people got taken to jail and instead were issued summons orders to appear where bond conditions are set. Typically the conditions were signature bonds with rules, and those individuals would go back out into the community committing additional crimes. He stated these individuals knew they weren't going to jail so they continued to re-offend with low level crimes, which was very frustrating for our officers. He indicated they are seeing a tremendous amount of

people who are out on bond who commit another crime and are charged with bail jumping, but there aren't really any consequences to face. Now there are a tremendous amount of people awaiting trial.

Peckham noted 6th Street Pub still appears to be closed for business after 16 patrol checks by PD. He questioned if the committee intended to pursue revocation for abandonment. Rasmussen stated the Clerk was following up with the owner regarding opening for business, however, if it continues to be closed they would take action similar to what was done with Wagon Wheel.

Rasmussen noted the report shows The Intermission was assessed 25 demerit points for alcohol outside the premise. Extra patrols have continued outside After Shock bar on Lenard Street due to neighborhood complaints and activity had seemed to calm down, however, last weekend it was back to where it started from. She indicated there are still concerns about overserving the patrons and there was a fight that spilled out into the parking lot.

Deputy Barnes pointed out the concerning number of Heroin overdoses this year, which is on pace to set a new record. He stated another thing really impacting the clerical component of the department is the amount of open records request and the amount of time it takes to process them. Officers wear body cameras and to fulfill open records requests it requires a clerical person to watch every minute of the interaction for every officer there.

Communications

Pat Peckham stated the members of the Policing Task Force were encouraged to do a ride-along with an officer. He commented he participated and it showed him the reality of police work in Wausau and the extensive requirement for patience on the part of the officers.

Adjourn

Motion by Wadinski, second by Herbst to adjourn the meeting. Motion carried unanimously. Meeting adjourned at 5:42 pm.

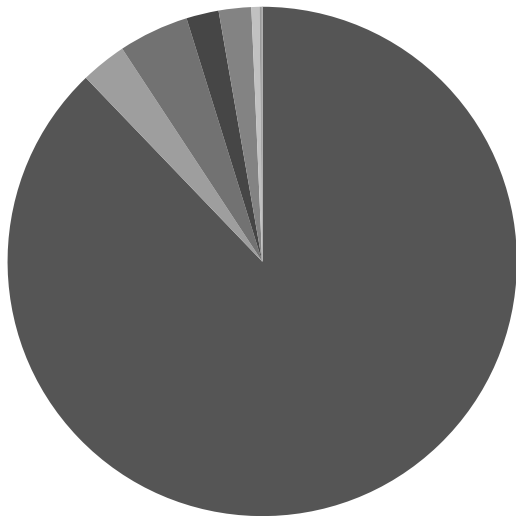

WAUSAU PD OPERATIONS REPORT



August, 2021

Chief's Message

Our community resource unit continues to make significant seizures in methamphetamine, cocaine, and heroin in our community. In July, 2021, our CRO unit seized more cocaine than marijuana. They also made a significant methamphetamine arrest in which 90 grams was seized. A number of heroin arrests were made, but we are grateful there were zero overdoses in July.

Our Housing Task Force arranged with volunteers to conduct a mass cleaning of Big Balls Falls Park and cleaning of gazebos in July. We continue to see an increased volume of calls for service at the gazebo. We have increased our nightly proactive patrols, including enforcement of the 11:00 PM park closing hours.

July events kept our team of officers, CSO's, and emergency police busy. In total, the events cost our department approximately \$6000 in salary and overtime. Of course, the emergency police help significantly with these events volunteering more than 100 hours just in the month of July.

We continue working through the Policing Task Force with about two meetings per month. The community survey should be complete and WIPPS will be reporting the results. The task force has a target of December, 2021, for finalizing recommendations.

Counting Rules

Counts on this page are based on the month of the incident or arrest, rather than the month the incident was submitted. If the incident date is unknown, the report date is used. Counts are subject to change as data are updated.

Offense counts are calculated based on the number of offenses for each victim (per incident) for Crimes Against Persons and the number of unique offense types (per incident) for Crimes Against Property and Crimes Against Society. For burglary and motor vehicle theft, offense counts are based on the number of premises entered and the number of vehicles stolen, respectively.

Victim counts are calculated based on the number of victims connected to each unique offense type in an incident. For Crimes Against Persons, the number of victims will be equal to the number of offenses. Victims will be counted more than once if they are connected to multiple offenses.

Arrest counts are calculated based on the number of arrestees listed on a Group A or Group B incident. Each arrestee is counted only once per incident. Arrests are categorized based on the specific Group A or Group B arrest code submitted by the agency, rather than the incident offense code. Since agencies only submit the most serious arrest charge for each arrestee on an incident, arrest counts are not indicative of the number of charges.

Incidents are cleared in one of two ways: by arrest or by exceptional means. Clearance counts are based on the number of offenses cleared in a given month regardless of when the offense occurred, and can therefore be greater than the number of offenses in a given month. In incident-based reporting, the first arrest on an incident, or an exceptional clearance, will clear all offenses associated with the incident.

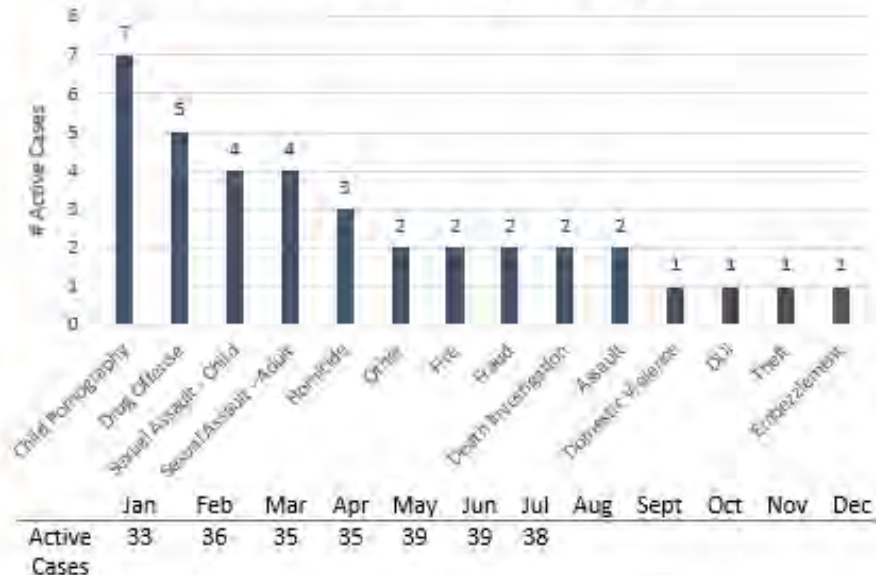

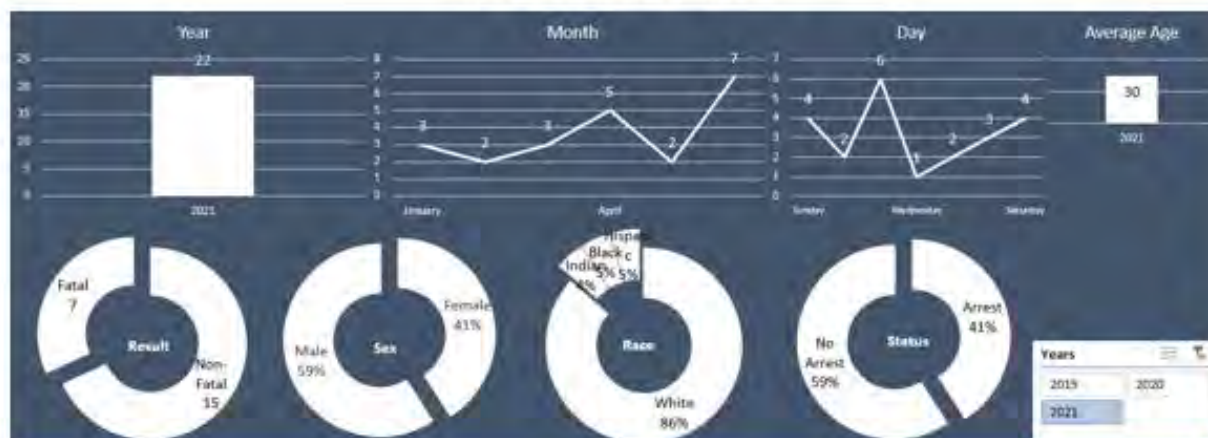

*CART is a shared resource with MNSO; above data represents WPD jurisdiction activities only. WPD has one (1) CART Officer, on M-F day shift schedule. This position is not back-filled during the CART Officer's off-days. MNSO's CART Deputy also responds to relevant CFS in the City when available.

"CFS": Calls For Service (Officer initiated activities and calls received from Dispatch).

"Mental Health" and "Welfare Check" are the two most common types of CFS (coded by Dispatch based on the initial information reported) that involve individuals in crisis.

"Community" origin of 51.15 / 51.45: Law enforcement is called to a location in the community (*residence, business, public location*) in response to an individual in crisis (or incapacitated). De-escalation, safety planning, and/or diversion is not viable or is unsuccessful, resulting in 51.15 or 51.45 detention.

"Facility" origin of 51.15: While under care or custody of the Jail, NCHC, or medical facility; an inmate or patient is suicidal or otherwise assessed on-site by a Crisis Professional, and deemed in need of 51.15. Law Enforcement is then called upon to confirm and complete the 51.15 (as required by WI Stats.) **Lacks opportunity for diversion.**

"51.15": "Emergency Detention" under WI Statute 51.15. Law enforcement may take into custody an individual who is:

- (1) Mentally ill, drug dependent or developmentally disabled, and;
- (2) A substantial probability of physical harm to him/herself or others is evident by recent acts or omissions, attempts or threats.

"51.45": "Alcohol or Drug Detention" under WI Statute 51.45. "A person who appears to be 'incapacitated by alcohol or another drug' shall be placed under protective custody by a law enforcement officer."



Housing Task Force - WPD/NCHC Team update:

5 total residents at McClellan Refuge house:

- 1 resident transitioned out to 18-month mission/treatment program in Eau Claire
(Replaced w/ homeless male wanting to work on alcohol issues / sobriety).
- 2 are maintaining employment, steady income and ready for own apartments
 - searching/applying for apartments, but not yet successful in being selected
- 1 on probation, in AODA counseling (on Soc. Security Disability)
- 1 participating in Community Treatment (psych and therapy) (on Soc. Security Disability)

July CFS to Big Bull Falls Park area:

- 15 WPD responses to Calls for Service (reactive):
 - 10 Criminal/misdemeanor activity complaints
 - 4 Welfare checks / 911 hang-up
 - 1 Medical emergency (incapacitation)
- 44 Extra patrol activities / proactive contacts
- July 12: Arranged with volunteers to conduct a mass cleaning of Big Bulls Falls park and cleaning of gazebos (July 12th), and weekly cleaning thereafter. Night shift increased nightly proactive patrols, including enforcement of the 11:00 PM park closing hours (started with warnings, asking persons to vacate).

Monthly engagement example:

*July 19-23: Officers were being sent to complaints of a vehicle parked on Alexander St for long period of time, with a woman apparently living out of it. HTF responded, learning of a 52 year old woman was living out of her car (*referred to as "E.A."*), with her 2 dogs. The following is Ofc. Lemirand's description of resulting HTF efforts (and generosity from the community) in the following days:

EA recently lost her job at Walgreens, due to coronavirus, and was battling memory loss issues. Having the dogs was a barrier to be being allowed into shelters. EA's car had mechanical issues and did not run. EA was interested in getting a job but she couldn't because she couldn't leave the dogs in the car alone in the summer. There was no place for them to go. EA had applied and was accepted for a job at Pick N Save, but wasn't sure she could show up for orientation, again, due to the dogs. She had burned bridges with their family.

I worked with the Salvation Army, which was ready to accept her, if we could figure out another option for the dogs. I spoke with owner of the Bark Academy, a business by the new dog park. She agreed she was interested in helping us with periodic care of the dogs, so that EA could attend job orientation and start working, but we had to make sure the dogs were current with their vaccinations.



I then approached CW Auto Clinic owner about the EA's car; he agreed to help and came to assess her car to determine what it needed for repairs (likely needing an alternator).

I called EA's daughter in Illinois, who gave me some insight on her mother's situation. I learned much from the daughter that EA hadn't told me. Daughter was unsure how we could help with the animals, short of her mother surrendering them to the shelter. I went and spoke with management at Pick-N-Save about EA's possible Job offer. I asked if her orientation schedule for the 24th (Saturday), could be put on hold until we could figure out how to make this all work. The manager I spoke to was open to the idea and understood EA's current situation. He assured me the job would be there when we had everything arranged. I also stopped by the post office on my way back to end my day as EA stated she thought she had a new phone in her PO Box, due to her current one not working, but couldn't get there due to the dogs and no car. The situation seemed fairly desperate because I struggled with asking somebody to give up their pets, but I didn't know how else to move forward.

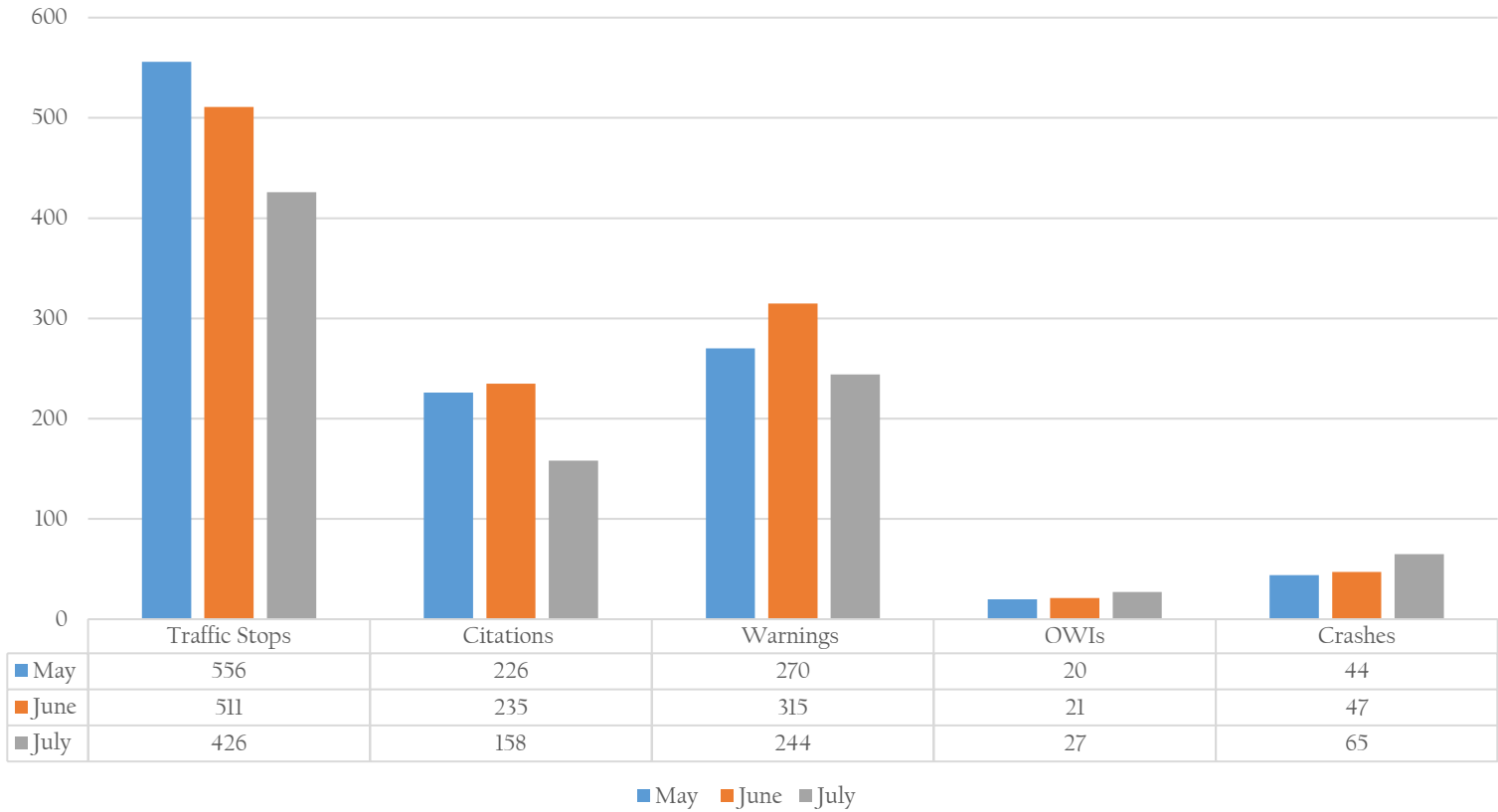
On Friday, I and Victim Resource Officer (Sarah Bedish) met with EA over by Alexander Street. We consulted with the Humane Officer and Lisa from the Humane Society. It was determined the best course of action was going to be for EA to surrender the dogs. We tried to look into foster parents, hold for cause, and any other arrangements. However, all of those would cost money which EA didn't have. In working with CW Auto Clinic, they said the repairs would be approximately \$475, however they offered to do the repair and the alternator at a discount, \$240. We had some funds left over from Lights of Christmas that we would use to cover this. I then contacted a case manager at the Salvation Army, who agreed to take on case management with EA, and offered to hold a bed for her.

I reached out to N-CAP towing to see if we could get EA's car moved, to avoid further complaints and parking tickets. Linda at N-CAP told me she had a customer in mind who previously wanted to donate for people in need, who couldn't afford towing... so Linda / N-CAP happily agreed to tow EA's vehicle to the Auto Clinic, to be covered by the customer's kindness. (Linda added she would've otherwise donated her services anyway for this situation).

By end of day Friday, EA was in shelter, with her car off the street and in the shop, and she was set up for job orientation still on Saturday the 24th.



3 Month Traffic Enforcement Comparison

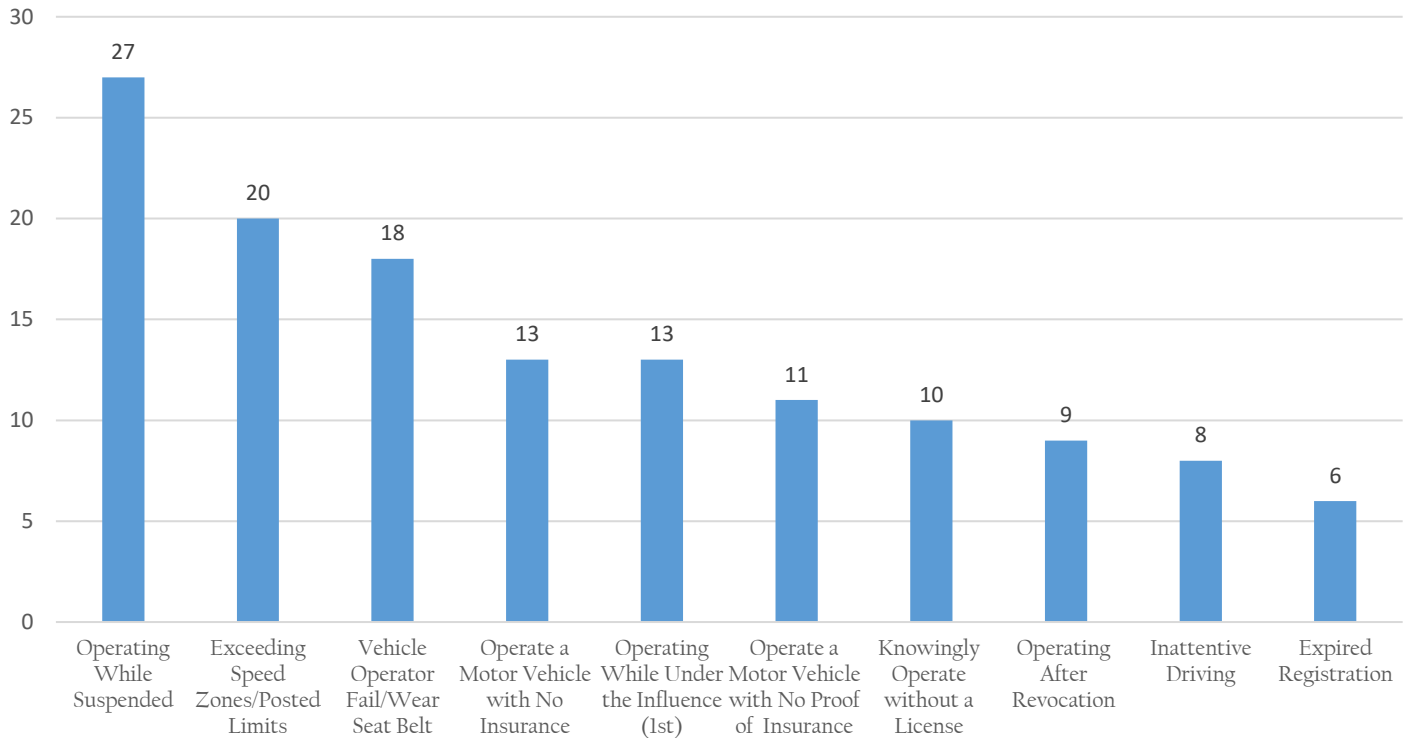


YEAR-TO-DATE TRAFFIC TOTALS (JANUARY- MAY 2021)

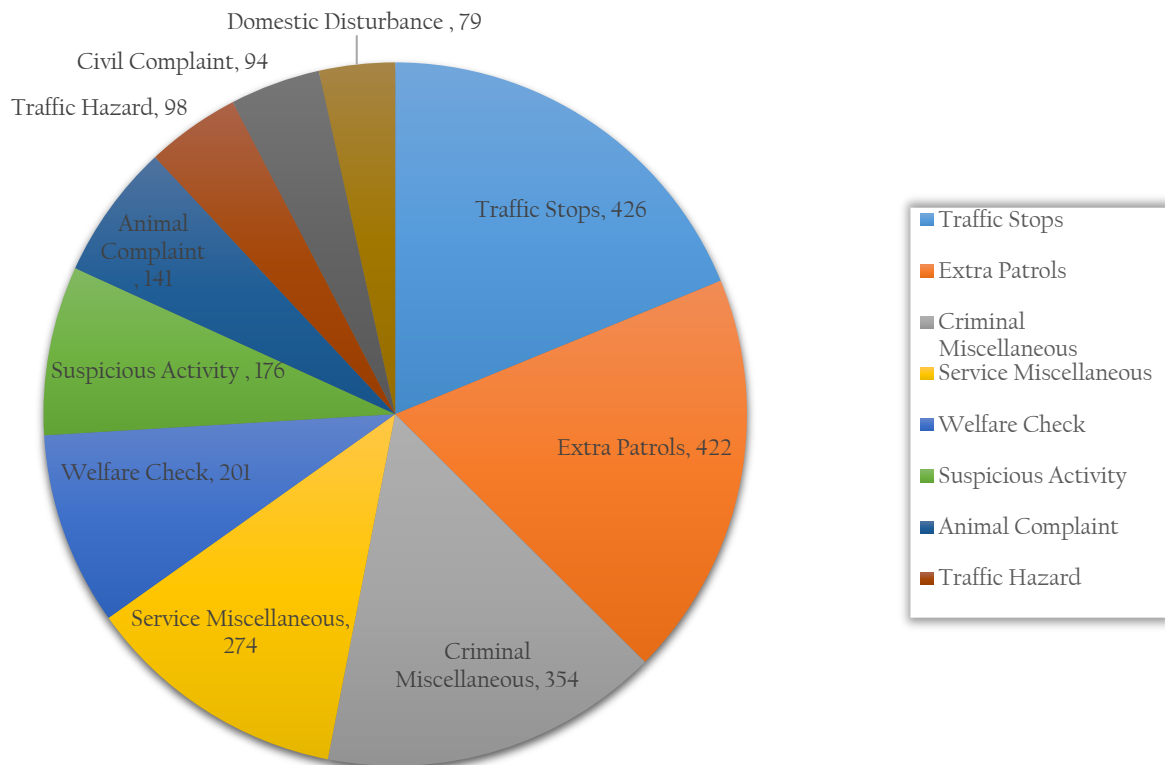

NOTABLE INCIDENTS AT TAVERNS TO WHICH POLICE WERE DISPATCHED.

6th Street Pub, 2002 N. 6th Street

- (1) Extra patrols have been done to determine if the bar has been open. The bar was checked twenty-seven (27) days, and never found to be open for business during the month of July, 2021.

Cop Shoppe Pub, 701 Washington Street

- (1) *Event #21098368, 07/20/2021 at 02:14 AM: TRAFFIC CRASH-PROPERTY DAMAGE ONLY:* A caller that refused to be identified reported a vehicle that was leaving the bar ran into a pole. The male driver was described as passing out, but then trying to leave. Before officers arrived, the vehicle was able to leave. Responding officers were notified of the vehicle description, however the vehicle was not observed. Inspecting the scene, there was no damage to the pole. Furthermore, there were no pieces from the vehicle on the ground. Officers spoke with a bartender who gave a description of the male, noting that he had been in the bar and had three drinks and two shots. Officers were unable to locate the vehicle and since there was no discernible damage, no crash report was completed. Approximately an hour later, a suspect vehicle was observed. Contact with the operator at that time led to an arrest for operating while intoxicated. Suspected marijuana was also located in the vehicle. The driver did not admit to striking the pole.
- (2) *Case #21006621, 07/22/2021 at 10:17 PM: CRIMINAL DAMAGE TO PROPERTY:* A citizen called to report that the windows of her car had been smashed out while it was parked in the bar parking lot. The car owner and her boyfriend came into the bar and saw the male's ex-girlfriend already in the bar. No contact was made between the parties while they were in the bar. The ex-girlfriend left prior to the others. The male went outside to smoke a cigarette, and observed the ex-girlfriend smashing out the windows of the new girlfriend's vehicle with a baseball bat. The suspect lives across the street from the bar. Officers made contact with her in response to the complaint. She denied having any involvement, even though she was witnessed causing the damage, and a baseball bat with what appeared to be auto safety glass lodged in the wood was located resting up against the exterior of her residence, around the corner from the door. She was issued a summons for felony criminal damage to property.



El Jalapeno's, 300 N. 3rd Street

- (1) *Case #21006054, 07/04/2021 at 1:17 AM: FIGHT:* Several citizen calls were received reporting a fight involving several people. Officers responded and spoke to many people, including those that were injured as a result of the fight. Everyone spoken to was unable to explain exactly what happened. The bouncer was at the door checking IDs when told that a fight had broken out. He observed several people fighting and was struck in the face while trying to break the fight up. The male that struck the bouncer claimed he did not mean to strike the bouncer, and was simply trying to defend his brother from other attackers. Due to conflicting stories and an inability to discern who did what based on interviews alone, officers viewed the video from the bar. However, after doing so they were not able to identify the start of the fight or a predominate person that instigated the incident. As a result no charges were filed.

Loppnow's, 1502 N. 3rd Street

- (1) *Event #21100922, 07/24/2021 at 8:16 PM: CRIMINAL MISCELLANEOUS:* An employee called to report a group of intoxicated males destroying the bathroom. Officers arrived after the destructive males left with their group, celebrating a bachelor party. The bartender stated most of the members of the group were well behaved and many of them were drinking non-alcoholic drinks. Two males from the group went into the bathroom and started destroying property. There was a dent in the door and the towel dispenser was cracked. Officers spoke with the owner of the bar who decided he did not wish to pursue charges, as long as the males had left. No further action was taken.

Oz Nighclub, 320 Washington Street

- (1) *Event # N/A, 07/10/2021 at 10:33 PM: CRIMESTOPPERS TIP:* A Crime Stoppers Tip was submitted on 07/10/2021, at 10:33 PM, that Oz was being operated without a licensed bartender. The tip was not passed on to law enforcement until 07/12/2021. A bar check was conducted on 07/14/2021, and the owner was present tending bar. Often times at this particular bar, the owner is present either tending bar himself or supervising an employee. It is possible that was the case on the night of the tip-an unlicensed bartender was tending bar under the supervision of the owner.

Timekeeper Distillery, 720 Grant Street

- (1) *Case #21006174, 07/07/2021 at 2:25 PM: CRIMINAL MISCELLANEOUS:* An **employee** called to report damage to property. Several juveniles were involved in throwing rocks at the trolley located on their property, just south of their building. Several windows were broken out, and it is an ongoing problem. An officer interviewed several juveniles, one of whom admitted to throwing rocks at the trolley. Another juvenile suspect was named, but had taken off running prior to the arrival of the Police. At the time, that juvenile was known to have a capias for his arrest.

Christine's Bar, 936 S. 3rd Avenue

- (1) *Event #21104335, 07/30/2021 at 1:30 PM: EXTRA PATROL:* The **owner** called requesting extra patrol throughout the night and the following night due to a larger than expected crowd as a result of the festival in town. Officers conducted walk-throughs throughout the night and found everything in order.



Eagle's Club, 1703 S. 3rd Avenue

- (1) *Event #21098330, 07/19/2021 at 11:30 PM:* SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY: An **employee** called in reference to receiving alarm at the front door of the business. Remotely checking the cameras, he observed a vehicle parked in front of the business, in addition to another one that pulled in. He did not believe anybody went inside the business, but were requesting officers to check the building. On arrival, officers located one person outside the building, who explained that she had been involved with a raffle and had helped close up with one of the bartenders. She saw a group of kids that pulled up in the parking lot and had talked about going swimming. After several minutes, they simply left. Officers did check the building and found one of the doors unlocked. They cleared the building which set off a motion sensor alarm inside. The original employee that called responded to the scene to reset the alarm and secure the building. No further action was taken.

Day's Bowl-A-Dome, 1715 Stewart Avenue

- (1) *Case #21005967, 07/01/2021 at 9:17 PM:* THEFT FROM MOTOR VEHICLES: A citizen reported that his vehicle had been entered while parked in the parking lot. An old iPhone, a debit card, a driver's license, sunglasses and a work iPad were all stolen from his truck. The debit card was used at two local stores, and the officer was working on getting video to potentially identify a suspect.

Whiskey River Bar & Grill, 5512 Stewart Avenue

- (1) *Event #21099208, 07/21/2021 at 6:01 PM:* MEDICAL EMERGENCY: An employee called to report that a patron had fallen and hit their head, adding that they were bleeding from the back of the head. No officers were dispatched to this call, and the responding ambulance did not request law enforcement assistance.

Aftershock Bar, 1418 Lenard Street

- (1) *** Numerous extra patrols have continued through July (a total of seven). Most entries documented how many vehicles were there, and that there were no disturbances noted. The majority of the entries also noted not seeing anyone outside of the bar. ***
- (2) *Case #21006364, 07/13/2021 at 9:01 PM:* WELFARE CHECK: A named citizen called in to report observing an intoxicated male sitting on the steps at the front door, but almost falling over. Someone was trying to help him up. The citizen was concerned that the bar had over-served the male. The citizen then observed the intoxicated male trying to get into a vehicle, even though another person was trying to stop the intoxicated male. Officers arrived to find the intoxicated male sitting in the driver's seat of the vehicle. The vehicle was not running. The bartender was found to have been holding the keys from the intoxicated male. The intoxicated male was allowed to leave by cab. Officers interviewed the bartender to investigate the possibility that she over-served the male. The bartender recounted serving the male two shots of Jack Daniels Fire, and approximately five bottles of Bush light beer between 6:00 PM and 9:00 PM. He was seated at the bar until approximately 8:55 PM, when he went to the restroom. While the male was seated at the bar, the bartender did not feel that the male was overly intoxicated. However, once the male stood up to go to the bathroom, she could see that he was intoxicated. At that point, she made the decision to stop serving him and attempt to make arrangements to get him a ride from the bar, to include removing his keys from his vehicle while he was in the bathroom. An Officer was later able to review video of the male's time in the bar. What the officer observed corroborated the account given by the bartender. It also included seeing the male stand up, walk over to a video machine and play the machine for some time, in a seemingly normal manner. When the male gets up to use the bathroom close to 9:00 PM, he is markedly more unsteady on his feet. An officer also interviewed the intoxicated male a couple days after the incident. He admitted that he had stopped at Eagle's Club and M & R Station prior to going to Aftershock, but he was unable to recount how much he had



been drinking. After review, it was determined that it was reasonable that the bartender was not aware of the male's condition until he got up to go to the bathroom, at which point she took the proper steps and stopped serving him. As such, no action was taken against the bartender or the bar.

- (3) *Case #21006483, 07/18/2021 at 2:16 AM: FIGHT:* Several neighbors called upon witnessing a physical fight occurring in the parking lot. A bartender became aware of the disturbance, and was going to call, however one officer was already on scene and they could hear others responding. Investigation determined that there was a domestic abuse incident occurring between a male and a female in the parking lot. A second male attempted to intervene and stop the altercation. This caused the first male to attack the second male. It was at this point that officers arrived and separated the people involved. The first male was arrested and taken to jail for the domestic incident.

Law enforcement would not be able to do its job successfully without access to data. The 76 sworn officers at the Wausau Police Department create a lot of data and paperwork, but it's only useful if it can be found when it's needed, and only if it gets to the correct people. We have 1 Office Manager, 4 Administrative Assistants and 1 Law Enforcement Computer Technician that keep all of our processes moving. They receive information from the officers, be sure it is entered and properly cataloged, forward it to other agencies and departments, and then review and potentially release when requested. This includes paper reports, squad video and body worn camera, photos, and lost and found items.

This department is also the first point of contact for customer service for the public. They are a cheerful, resourceful group who go out of their way to be sure needs get met in as timely a manner as possible.
