Minutes of previous meetings. (8/16/21 & 9/08/21)

Motion by Peckham, second by Herbst to approve the minutes of the previous meetings on 8/16/21 and 9/08/21.

Motion carried 4-0.

Consider approval or denial of various license applications.

Lisa Rasmussen noted there were not any applications recommended for denial this month.

Discussion and possible action regarding an Ordinance Amending Section 17.10.030 Third party inspections and reporting systems

Rasmussen explained this comes from the Fire Department regarding their ability to network with third party providers and ensure compliance. It will allow for a penalty to be imposed in order to get compliance, whereas before they didn't have any teeth in the ordinance to work with.

Assistant City Attorney Nathan Miller explained the penalty is modeled after the building inspection forfeitures, which are \$100 plus court costs, which amounts to \$124 per day for a violation. This would go up for different incident to about \$155 for a second and third.

Motion by Peckham, second by Herbst to approve the amendment to Section 17.10.030. Motion carried 4-0.

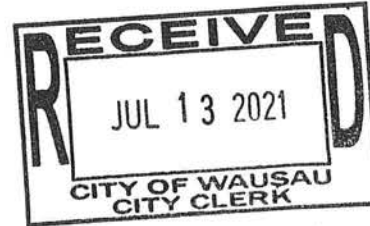

Re: Appeal of labelling 1407 Emter Street, Wausau, WI as a chronic nuisance premises

This law office represents Kiley Berg. She owns a rental property at 1407 Emter Street. She was issued a citation asserting the property is a chronic nuisance premises (see copy of citation number 4T8150Q6Z; Exhibit 1).

This letter is an appeal of that determination.

Kiley Berg rented this property to Kira L. Parker in early 2020. Kira was arrested and left the property about August of 2020.

After many months, Kiley received a call from Kira where she explained that she had gone through a rehab process and really needed a place to stay. With this information, Kiley allowed Kira to re-rent the property.

It now appears that Kira had not completely kicked her drug habit. On June 17, 2021, Kira was again arrested on drug charges at the property.

Kylie received a notice from the police (response letter dated 6/18/2021). As that letter describes, tenant, Kira L. Parker was arrested and the officers located Methamphetamine, Marijuana, and several items of drug paraphernalia (copy of letter; Exhibit 2).

The letter goes on to say:

The Wausau Police Department has provided this information to keep property owners/managers informed of illegal activities or continued

complaints at their properties. This letter is for informational purposes and is not intended for official legal proceedings.

After such arrest, Kira was again out of the property and has not returned (and will never be allowed to return).

Given this letter, my client was surprised to also receive a citation for a required court appearance on September 21, 2021 (copy attached as Exhibit 1) and a second letter from Officer Vang stating that the 1407 Emter Street property is a "public nuisance" under Wis. Stat. 823.113 (copy attached as Exhibit 3) and identifying that any appeal of this determination must be submitted within 30 days and that Kiley could face the loss of her property through Circuit Court action.

This letter initiates this appeal.

Kiley Berg is 40 years old and has worked since she was a teenager in the restaurant, bar and hospitality industry.

Most recently Kylie operated a tavern in Merrill, WI at N1496 Tannery Road (known as Mar-lee's Social House). She did this on a lease with an oral option to purchase. When it came time to exercise the option, the owner reneged. As a result, Kiley is now out of a job or business and relies on the income from her rental properties.

This is an unusual case. We do not see the facts of this case as within the "spirit" of public nuisance laws.

Public nuisance is generally defined as a condition or activity which substantially or unduly interferes with the use of a public place or with the activities of an entire community. *Schiro v. Oriental Realty Co.*, 272 Wis. 537, 546, 76 N.W.2d 355 (1956). Wis. Stat. 823.113 provides that any building that is used to facilitate the delivery, distribution, or manufacture of drugs is a public nuisance.

Obviously, Kiley was not personally using the property or causing any nuisance. According to the police records, Kira Parker met someone at the house to sell marijuana. Thus, the issue is whether Kylie Berg "maintained" a chronic nuisance premises and what she knew. The law and facts support the conclusion that she did not know about or maintain a nuisance.

Wisconsin courts distinguish liability for maintaining a public nuisance from liability for creating a public nuisance by requiring actual or constructive notice in maintenance of public nuisance cases. *Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage Dist. v. City of Milwaukee*, 267 Wis.2d 688 (Wis. App. 2003). As such, liability for maintaining a public nuisance is based on the defendant's failure to abate a public nuisance that he or she has knowledge of. *Id.*

Kylie had no such notice.

The police response letter dated 6/18/2021 states that Kiley Berg "maintained" a chronic nuisance premises. However, there is no indication that Kiley Berg had any notice of any nuisance prior to her receipt of the June 18th letter. When Kira Parker was arrested, Kiley Berg promptly removed Kira Parker.

This really does not constitute the type of situation that creates a public nuisance.

When Kylie Berg talked to Kira Parker about re-renting the property, Kylie believed Kira's situation had improved and that she had turned her life around. Kylie had no reason to believe that Kira was still involved in drugs. In the midst of Covid lockdowns, Kira desperately needed a place to live after she said she left rehab and begged Kylie for the opportunity to rent the property. Believing that Kira changed, Kylie generously rented the property to her.

For the duration of Kira's second, tenancy, Kylie was unaware of any drug issues.

Wisconsin's public nuisance law is designed to mitigate public harms that defendants knowingly condone. Landlords who knowingly permit or promote drug-related activities on their properties pose serious public health risks. But that is not the case here.

Kira is out of the property and will never return.

We respectfully ask for your consideration and request that the property not be declared a "chronic public nuisance."

Landlord/Owner Notification Letter – Nuisance Premises (Drugs)

6/18/2021

RE: 1407 Emter Street

Dear Kiley Berg:

We are writing in reference to the property you own/manage at 1407 Emter Street, City of Wausau. We have confirmed that drug or criminal gang activity has taken place at that address. Consequently, the property has been declared a Chronic Nuisance Premises based upon the following case number(s): 21-005524, Maintaining a Drug Trafficking Place, Delivery of Methamphetamine, Possession of Methamphetamine, Possession of THC and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia.

As a result of this drug or criminal gang activity, your property fits the definition of a public nuisance under Section 823.113, Wisconsin Statutes. As the owner of this property, the law places the burden upon you to ensure that the public nuisance be stopped. You are being notified to give you an opportunity to do so.

Additionally, the City of Wausau has adopted a "chronic nuisance premises" ordinance under 9.24.070. Additional nuisance activity, as defined by the ordinance, requiring enforcement action may result in the cost of future enforcement being assessed as a special charge against the premises. You have the right to appeal a determination by the chief of police that your premises constitutes a "chronic nuisance premises," or that additional nuisance activity has occurred for which the cost of such police response and enforcement has been calculated. Your appeal must be submitted to the Public Health and Safety Committee within 30 days of the date of notice by providing written notice to the city clerk.

Included with this letter is a citation for maintaining a "Chronic Nuisance Premises." You could also face the loss of your property through circuit court action to declare your property a public nuisance.

Section 704.17, Wis. Statutes, allows you to begin a five-day, no cure eviction of the tenants based upon drug activity. Our records indicate that on 08/13/2020, 1407 Emter Street Wausau WI which you owned/managed at the time was declared a Chronic Nuisance as the tenant Kira L. Parker was arrested for several drug charges. You reported that Kira was evicted shortly after our notification. On 06/17/2021 Kira was residing at that same address and arrested on several drug offenses. The residence has been declared a Chronic Nuisance and the citation is included. If you have further questions please feel free to contact me.

9.24.070 - Chronic nuisance premises.

No property owner shall maintain a chronic nuisance premises. Chronic nuisance premises means a premises that meets any of the following criteria:

(1)

Is a premises which has nuisance activity occurring on the premises three times on separate days during a six-month period and resulting in enforcement action;

(2)

Is a premises that has generated complaints to the City Inspection and Zoning Department that result in a City enforcement action three or more times within a six-month period; or

(3)

Is a premises which has had one enforcement action resulting from the manufacture or delivery of controlled substance or related offenses, as defined in Wis. Stats. ch. 961.

(c)

Definitions. The following terms shall be defined as follows in this section.

(1)

Chief means the Chief of Police or his or her designee.

(2)

Chief Inspector means the Chief Inspector or Zoning Administrator of the City Inspection and Zoning Department or his or her designee.

(3)

Chronic nuisance landlord means any owner of a residential unit(s) available for lease or rent within the City that has had three premises or ten percent of their available premises for lease or rent, whichever is less, designated as a chronic nuisance premises within a 12-month period, shall be deemed a chronic nuisance landlord and shall be subject to the additional provisions of subsection (e) and the abatement provisions of subsection (f).

(4)

Enforcement action means arrest, the issuance of a citation, the issuance of a summons and complaint, the issuance of a written warning, or notice of violation from the City Inspection and Zoning Department.

(5)

Nuisance activity means any of the following activities, behaviors, or conduct occurring on a premises:

(A)

An act of harassment, as defined in Wis. Stats. § 947.013.

(B)

Disorderly conduct, as defined in Wis. Stats. § 947.01.

(C)

Battery, substantial battery, or aggravated battery, as defined in Wis. Stats. § 940.19.

(D)

Lewd and lascivious behavior, as defined in Wis. Stats. § 944.20.

(E)

Prostitution, as defined in Wis. Stats. § 944.30.

(F)

Theft, as defined in Wis. Stats. § 943.20.

(G)

Receiving stolen property, as defined in Wis. Stats. § 943.34.

(H)

Arson, as defined in Wis. Stats. § 943.02.

(I)

Possession, manufacture, or delivery of controlled substance or related offenses, as defined in Wis. Stats. ch. 961.

(J)

Gambling, as defined in Wis. Stats. § 945.02.

(K)

Animal violations, as defined in chapter 8 of the Wausau Municipal Code.

(L)

Trespassing, as defined in Wis. Stats. §§ 943.13 and 943.14.

(M)

Weapons violations, as defined in chapter 9.08 of the Wausau Municipal Code.

(N)

Noise violations, as defined in section 9.04.030 of the Wausau Municipal Code.

(O)

Any conspiracy to commit, as defined in Wis. Stats. § 939.31, or attempt to commit, as defined in Wis. Stats. § 939.32 , any of the activities, behaviors, or conduct enumerated in subsections (3)(A) through (N) above.

(P)

Violations of the City Housing Code, chapter 16 of the Wausau Municipal Code.

(Q)

Social host as provided in section 9.04.028 of the Wausau Municipal Code.

(R)

Possession or consumption of alcohol by underage person as defined in Wis. Stats. § 125.07(4)(b).

(6)

Nuisance activity does not include activities, behaviors or conduct that result in a call for assistance made by the owner or occupant requesting law enforcement services related to any of the following:

(A)

Domestic abuse as defined in Wis. Stats. § 813.12(1)(am).

(B)

Sexual assault as described in Wis. Stats. §§ 940.225, 948.02 and 948.025.

(C)

Stalking as defined in Wis. Stats. § 940.32.

(7)

Owner means the owner of the premises and his or her agent.

(8)

Premises means an individual dwelling unit or an individual business premises and associated common areas.

(d)

Notice and designation of chronic nuisance premises. Whenever the Chief or Chief Inspector finds a premises meets the definition of a chronic nuisance premises, such official shall notify the premises owner in writing that the premises are declared a chronic nuisance premises. In reaching this determination, the police shall not count nuisance activities that were reported by the owner of the premises. The notice shall contain the street address or legal description sufficient to identify the premises, a description of the nuisance activities that have occurred at the premises, a statement indicating that the cost of future enforcement may be assessed as a special charge against the premises, and a notice as to the appeal rights of the owner. The notice shall be delivered pursuant to section 9.28.040 of the Wausau Municipal Code.

(e)

Notice and designation of chronic nuisance landlord. Whenever the Chief or Chief Inspector finds an owner meets the definition of a Chronic Nuisance Landlord, such official shall notify the owner in writing that the owner is declared a Chronic Nuisance Landlord. The notice shall contain the street addresses or legal descriptions sufficient to identify the premises forming the basis for the designation, and the other notice requirements set forth in subsection (d). The notice shall further provide a statement that the owner shall, within ten days of receipt of the notice, provide the Chief or Chief Inspector in writing, a course of action that will be taken to abate the nuisance activities. The owner shall also be notified that failure to abate the activities shall result in the owner's designation of chronic nuisance landlord being posted on the City's website; and in the City newsletter.

(f)

Chronic nuisance landlord abatement. If the owner of residential units available for lease or rent responds to the notice in subsection (3) within ten days of the receipt of notice or posting and mailing of the notice with a nuisance abatement proposal for all units designated as chronic nuisance premises, the Chief or Chief Inspector or his or her designee may accept, reject, or work with the owner to modify the proposal in his or her discretion and upon approval of the plan, remove the designation of Chronic Nuisance Premises. The designated Chronic Nuisance Landlord nuisance abatement proposal shall include steps that shall be undertaken to mitigate chronic nuisances, which may include, but are not limited to, landlord tenant screening, tenant education, tenant eviction procedures, and other preventative practices to improve the residential unit(s). The Chief or Chief Inspector shall provide written notice to the Chronic Nuisance Landlord of the acceptance or rejection of the nuisance abatement proposal. If the owner causes the number of chronic nuisance premises to be reduced below the Chronic Nuisance Landlord threshold of three units or more than ten percent of the units available for lease or rent, whichever, is less, the City shall remove the designation of Chronic Nuisance Landlord,.

(g)

Additional nuisance activity. Whenever the Chief or Chief Inspector determines that additional nuisance activity has occurred at a premises for which notice has been issued pursuant to subsections (d) or (e) of this section, that this nuisance activity has occurred not less than 15 days

after notice has been issued nor more than 180 days after the last enforcement action, and that reasonable efforts have not been made to abate the nuisance activity, the Chief or Chief Inspector may calculate the cost of police or other staff response and enforcement for this and any subsequent nuisance activities and cause such charges and administrative costs to be assessed and collected as a special charge.

(h)

Appeal. The owner of any premises determined to be a chronic nuisance premises or designated to be a Chronic Nuisance Landlord under this section by the Chief or Chief Inspector pursuant to subsections (d) or (e) may appeal the determination, or the rejection of the owner's abatement plan submitted under subsection (f), to the Public Health and Safety Committee within 30 days of the date of notice issued pursuant to subsections (d), (e) or (f) by providing written notice to the City Clerk. The Public Health and Safety Committee shall set a hearing on such appeal and provide written notice of the hearing to the owner. The Public Health and Safety Committee shall hear any and all evidence it deems relevant and shall affirm or reverse the determination of the Chief or Chief Inspector. Wis. Stats. ch. 68 shall not apply to such an appeal or hearing.

- **9.24.080 - Continuing ordinance violation.**

Any violation of the Wausau Municipal Code that is not corrected within a reasonable time after notice from the City to a responsible party is a public nuisance.

(Ord. 61-5273 (1(part), 2005, File No. 05-1113.)

- **9.24.090 - Penalties.**

(a)

First offense. Any person who shall violate any provision of this chapter or any regulation, rule or order made hereunder shall forfeit not less than \$1,000.00 nor more than \$2,500.00.

(b)

Subsequent offenses. Any person who shall violate any provision of this chapter or any regulation, rule or order made hereunder within 24 months after committing a previous violation of this chapter shall forfeit not less than \$2,500.00 nor more than \$5,000.00.

property, and also allow a collateral challenge of the underlying prostitution convictions. The statutes also do not violate the freedom of association, the protection against government establishment of religion, and the right to equal protection. *State v. Schultz*, 218 Wis. 2d 798, 582 N.W.2d 113 (Ct. App. 1998), 97-3414.

823.11 Evidence; dismissal of action; costs. In actions begun under s. 823.10 the existence of any nuisance defined by s. 823.09 shall constitute prima facie evidence that the owner of the premises affected has permitted the same to be used as a nuisance; and evidence of the general reputation of the place shall be admissible to prove the existence of such nuisance. If the complaint is filed by a citizen, it shall not be dismissed, except upon a sworn statement made by the complainant and the complainant's attorney, setting forth the reasons why the action should be dismissed, and the dismissal shall be approved by the district attorney of the county in writing or in open court. If the court is of the opinion that the action ought not to be dismissed it may direct the district attorney of the county to prosecute said action to judgment. If the action is brought by a citizen, and the court finds that there was no reasonable ground or cause for said action the costs shall be taxed to such citizen.

Read in conjunction with s. 823.11, ss. 823.09 and 823.10 do not violate due process because they provide the opportunity to challenge prima facie evidence that a defendant knowingly permitted prostitution to occur on his property, and also allow the collateral challenge of the underlying prostitution convictions. The statutes also do not violate constitutional rights to freedom of association, the protection against government establishment of religion, and equal protection. *State v. Schultz*, 218 Wis. 2d 798, 582 N.W.2d 113 (Ct. App. 1998), 97-3414.

823.113 Drug or criminal gang house a public nuisance.

(1) Any building or structure that is used to facilitate the delivery, distribution or manufacture, as defined in s. 961.01 (6), (9) and (13) respectively, of a controlled substance, as defined in s. 961.01 (4), or a controlled substance analog, as defined in s. 961.01 (4m), and any building or structure where those acts take place, is a public nuisance and may be proceeded against under this section.

(1m)

(a) In this subsection, "criminal gang" has the meaning given in s. 939.22 (9).

(b) Any building or structure that is used as a meeting place of a criminal gang or that is used to facilitate the activities of a criminal gang, is a public nuisance and may be proceeded against under this section.

(2) If a nuisance exists, the city, town or village where the property is located may maintain an action in the circuit court to abate the nuisance and to perpetually enjoin every person guilty of creating or maintaining the nuisance, the owner, lessee or tenant of the building or structure where the nuisance exists and the owner of the land upon which the building or structure is located, from continuing, maintaining or permitting the nuisance.

(3) If the existence of the nuisance is shown in the action to the satisfaction of the court, either by verified complaint or affidavit, the court shall issue a temporary injunction to abate and prevent the continuance or recurrence of the nuisance, including the issuance of an order requiring the closure of the property. Any temporary injunction issued in an action begun under this subsection shall be issued without requiring the undertaking specified in s. 813.06.

(4) In ruling upon a request for closure, whether for a defined or undefined duration, the court shall consider all of the following factors:

(a) The extent and duration of the nuisance at the time of the request.

(b) Prior efforts by the defendant to comply with previous court orders to abate the nuisance.

(c) The nature and extent of any effect that the nuisance has upon other persons, such as residents or businesses.

(d) The effect of granting the request upon any resident or occupant of the premises who is not named in the action, including the availability of alternative housing or relocation assistance, the pendency of any action to evict a resident or occupant and any evidence of participation by a resident or occupant in the nuisance activity.

An order under this section for closure and sale of an apartment house did not violate the constitutional protection against excessive fines. *City of Milwaukee v. Arrieh*, 211 Wis. 2d 764, 565 N.W.2d 291 (Ct. App. 1997), 96-0482.

823.114 Judgment and order of sale of property.

(1) If the existence of the nuisance is established in an action under s. 823.113, a judgment may be entered as part of the judgment in the case. In that order, the court shall do

Purpose:

Inform the Public Health and Safety committee about the proposed Flood Evacuation Plan for the Hollow Neighborhood.

Background:

The city recently adopted the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR) standard for floodplain zoning ordinance. As part of that ordinance any development where existing street or sewer lines are below the regional flood elevation the city should have one of the following:

1. Written assurance from police, fire and emergency services that rescue and relief will be provided to the structure by wheeled vehicles during a regional flood event or:
2. A WDNR approved emergency evacuation plan or

Staff decided that a flood evacuation plan was the best route to take since several properties in the hollow neighborhood are affected. We engaged with the city/county emergency management director to develop a flood evacuation plan. The plan includes preventative measures to reduce the impact on flood damage, planning response measures to a flood event, identifies city department and local agencies for flood response, identifies critical facilities, and areas for evacuation.

WDNR staff has requested a specific and direct version of the plan for the Hollow Neighborhood. Staff has narrowed the plan to this neighborhood, and expanded the flood evacuation plan for routing to meet the request of WDNR staff.

Next Steps:

We request approval of the plan from the PHS committee.

CHAPTER 1

PURPOSE and INTENT

A. Statement of Purpose

The purpose of this plan is to describe the procedures to be used in the event of flooding in the City Wausau along the Wisconsin and Rib Rivers and associated tributaries for the neighborhood known as “The Hollow”. The plan identifies the agencies that will be involved with responding to flooding events, areas expected to flood, available resources such as mutual aid agreements, and other actions taken during an event. This is intended to be a living document, revisited bi-annually to ensure it remains current. This plan is not intended to be followed as a script, but instead used as a guideline. The City of Wausau Emergency Operations Plan should be referred to for additional information.

B. Background

After reviewing their emergency action plans for the City of Wausau, members of primary response departments reviewed and revised a basic flood plan based upon their historical action in dealing with flooding in Wausau. They also followed the National Incident Management System, recognizing that a flood response is the responsibility of the local community with County, State, and Federal resources requested as needed. Once the draft document was prepared, it was presented to the Wausau Public Safety Committee for their review and approval along with providing the public the opportunity to comment.

C. History of Past Floods

Communities that are particularly at risk are those areas within the 100-year floodplain, near water, or downstream from a dam. For example, the upstream waterways that affect the neighborhood known as the Hollow (see page 10) include the Wisconsin River. The downstream waterways that affect the area include Lake Wausau. Dams that may impact the area on the Wisconsin include the Wausau Hydroelectric Dam (WP342), operated by Wisconsin Public Service as well as the downstream dam in Rothschild (FERC Project No. 2212) operated by Domtar. These dams work with Wisconsin Valley Improvement Company on flow.

- i. Past floods. The City of Wausau has experienced numerous flood events over its history, mostly associated with spring events due to high snowfall in the winter and sudden snow melt associated with heavy rain. Spring snow melt floods tend to be most of the annual peak flow events, but summer flash floods of shorter duration occur from heavy rainfall, with interior drainage from storm water adding additional risk.

- ii. Areas of concern: Some of the specific areas of concern include the area known as the “Hollow” whose neighborhood includes Department of Public Works and the wastewater treatment plant. Additional critical facilities are listed on page 11.
- iii. Lessons Learned. This document is intended to capture some of the lessons learned from past events so decisions can be made sooner and resources obtained earlier.

D. Wisconsin River Gauge Information and Elevation Data

The gauge is located on the Wisconsin River near the hydroelectric dam and is monitored by the National Weather Service. Please go to this site for live flood information: <https://water.weather.gov/ahps2/index.php?wfo=GRB>

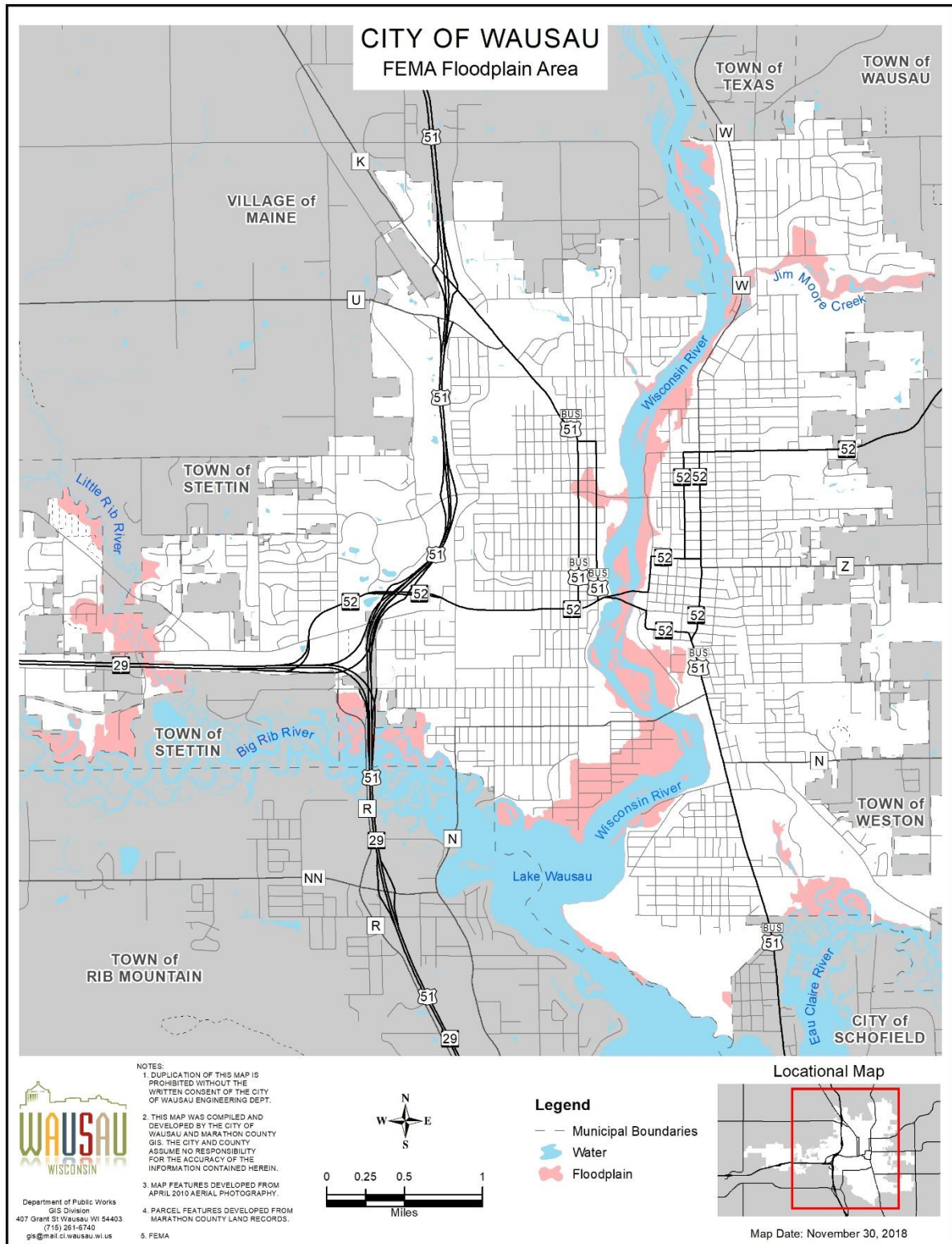
E. Rescue and Relief

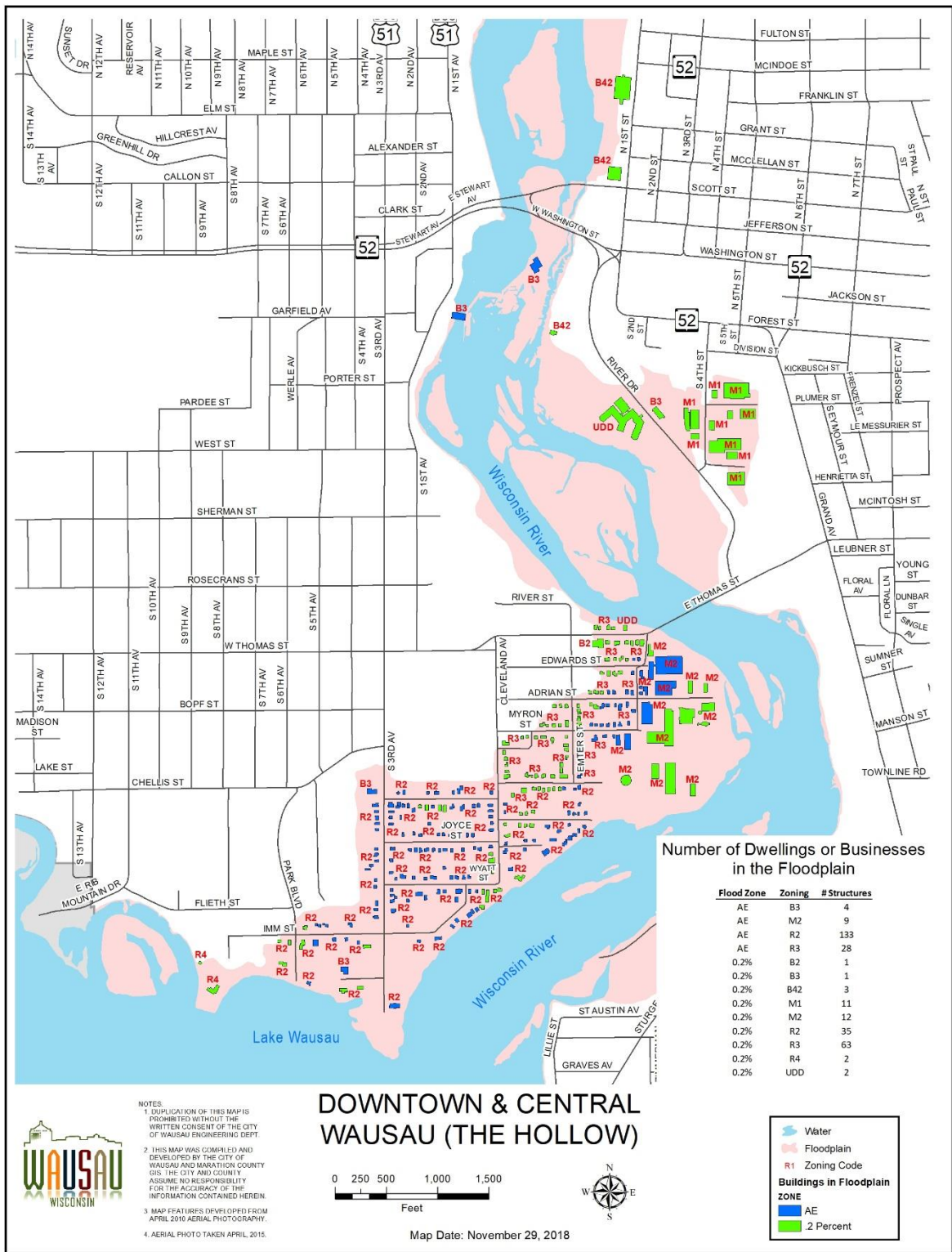
F. General Map

G. Critical Facilities Potentially Affected by Flooding

As part of the effort of creating this document, the following facilities were identified as critical infrastructure within the impacted area. These include:

- City of Wausau Public Works
- City of Wausau Waste Water Plant
- City of Wausau Water Plant
- Wausau Hydro Electric Dam
- Central Bridge Street
- Metro Ride
- Bridge on Stewart Avenue and 48th Avenue

Continuity of Operations plans for these facilities are agency specific.

H. Flood Watch/Warning Definitions

National Weather Service flash/flood definitions:

Flood Watch – Issued to inform the public and cooperating agencies that current and developing hydro meteorological conditions are such that there is a threat of flooding, but the occurrence is neither certain nor imminent.

Flood Warning – In hydrologic terms, a release by the NWS to inform the public of flooding along larger streams in which there is a serious threat to life or property. A flood warning will usually contain river stage (level) forecasts.

Flash Flood - A rapid and extreme flow of high water into a normally dry area, or a rapid water level rise in a stream or creek above a predetermined flood level, beginning within six hours of the causative event (e.g., intense rainfall, dam failure, ice jam). However, the actual time threshold may vary in different parts of the country. Ongoing flooding can intensify to flash flooding in cases where intense rainfall results in a rapid surge of rising flood waters.

Flash Flood Watch - Issued to indicate current or developing hydrologic conditions that are favorable for flash flooding in and close to the watch area, but the occurrence is neither certain nor imminent.

Flash Flood Warning - Issued to inform the public, emergency management, and other cooperating agencies that flash flooding is in progress, imminent, or highly likely.

Urban Flooding – Flooding of streets, underpasses, low-lying areas, or storm drains. This type of flooding is mainly an inconvenience and is generally not life-threatening.

CHAPTER 2

FLOOD EVACUATION WATCH/WARNING NOTIFICATIONS

A. Monitoring

The Wausau Department of Public Works is responsible for monitoring flood watches, flood warnings, as well as observations of flooding in the City of Wausau.

The Wausau Police Department and Wausau Fire Department should report observations of flooding within the City of Wausau to the Wausau Department of Public Works.

City of Wausau officials will assess the nature and the scope of the situation, and implement the Emergency Response Procedures that are appropriate and within the local jurisdictions ability to perform using policies and procedures that are currently in-place. If the local resources become exhausted, or if special resources are required, the on-scene incident commander will request Emergency County Assistance through Marathon County Emergency Management as outlined in the City of Wausau EOP and Marathon County EOP.

B. Flood Evacuation Watch/Warning Notifications

Upon notification of a Flood Watch or Warning issued for the Wisconsin and Rib Rivers, the Wausau Department of Public Works will:

1. Contact the PIO to coordinate messaging.
2. Communicate with the Marathon County Sheriff's Department, the Wausau Police Department, and the Wausau Fire Department.
3. Consider notifying off-duty personnel.

When the river gauge is at 1165, notification to potentially affected residents should occur and may include mass notification, signs, media releases, social media, etc.

If requested by the Incident Commander, the Marathon County Sheriff's Office will send a mass notification of the watch or warning for the affected area.

For additional assignments, refer to the Task List (page 19) in this document

C. Resident's Responsibility

Those residents in the affected area are responsible for:

- Monitoring river status. Be alert to changing conditions, prepare for and/or evacuate if conditions warrant
- Calling 9-1-1 if immediate assistance is needed in evacuating. All other persons are responsible for evacuating themselves from the area.
- Monitoring media (traditional and social) for watches and warnings.

Flood safety messaging to the public will be conducted annually by the Marathon County Emergency Management Office.

D. Process for Declaring a Disaster

If it is determined that the City's resources are overwhelmed or unable to control the flooding event, a disaster may be declared. The authority and process for declaring an emergency is referenced in the City of Wausau Emergency Operations Plan and may be done by proclamation, ordinance or resolution. An emergency declaration will be coordinated through the Emergency Management Director.

E. Sample Emergency Declaration Resolution

A sample resolution can be found in the appendix or the Emergency Operations Plan.

F. Process for Declaring an Evacuation

There is limited authority to order an evacuation if the situation is deemed unsafe, but a voluntary evacuation may occur with notification to local media, use of social media, use of a mass notification system, and door-to-door notifications (see Quick Reference Guide attachment).

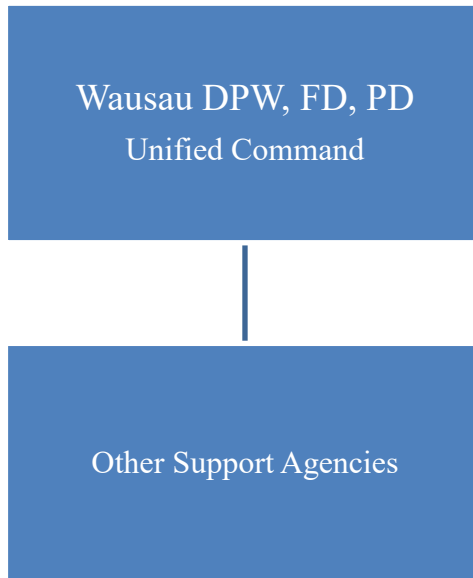

CHAPTER 6

WISCONSIN RIVER FLOOD ELEVATIONS AND EXPECTED IMPACT

- The nearest river gage is near the Wisconsin Hydroelectric Dam.
- Flood Stage is at 1167.
- At 1165, there is mainly lowland flooding in DC Everest and Oak Island Park
- At 1165, there is a buildup of ice and water
- At 1164.4, the potential exist for flooding in certain parts of the Hollow neighborhood
- At 1166.5, the potential exists for flooding on S. 3rd Avenue, Imm Street, Wyatt Street, Nowak Street, Cleveland Avenue, Nowalk Street, and Adolph Street.
- At 1167, waters approach buildings in DC Everest Park and Oak Island Park
- At 1169, up to two feet of water is surrounding an apartment and a business in the DC Everest Park area and the Oak Island Park area. Up to 2 feet of water may be surrounding homes along the Big Rib River west of Wausau along Sherman Road
- 1171, widespread flooding of 2 to 4 feet is occurring in at the DC Everest Park area and the Oak Island Park area. Widespread flooding affects may also be occurring upstream at the Big Rib River along the Sherman Road area

This 74-page report provides detailed information about the primary flood problems throughout the County as well as flood protection measures that have been implemented. A detailed explanation of the engineering methods used to determine the extent of the floodplain boundaries is also included in the report.

The digital flood insurance rate maps that cover the City of Wausau can be accessed by first finding the map of interest on the [Map Index for Wausau](#) and then clicking the corresponding map number listed below. Each of these individual flood insurance rate maps shows the limits of the various flood hazard zones adjacent to the waterways studied.

TASK LIST

A. Wausau Public Works

Upon receipt of a flood warning, the Director will determine the need to activate the flood plan, identify the appropriate level of staffing, and determine which of the following actions should be taken:

1. Activate a command post.
2. Coordinate activities with other City agencies.
3. Coordinate with surrounding communities and Marathon County as needed.
4. Establish a Public Information Officer position.
5. As needed, request procurement of sand and sand bags and other appropriate supplies.
6. As needed, organize sandbaggers to assist with sandbagging operations.
7. Assist Wausau Police Department with barricades.
8. Refer to the Evacuation and Shelter Guide (attachment 1) to initiate evacuation, shelter, financial tracking and other functions as necessary.
9. Ensure that information is disseminated through the Marathon County Sheriff's Dispatch Center to the general public as needed.
10. If appropriate, request a declaration of emergency through the Mayor's office.
11. If needed, stage vehicles and equipment at Marathon County facilities.
12. If damage has occurred to infrastructure such as streets, bridges, and public facilities, activate the Damage Assessment Team to deliver damage assessment information to Emergency Management.
13. Conduct briefings and updates as needed. Monitor gauges and streets.
14. Reroute traffic as needed.

15. Request mutual aid as needed.
16. Perform debris removal as needed (refer to debris plan).
17. When situation has returned to normal, remove signs, barricades, and sandbags.

B. Wausau Police Department

Upon receipt of a flood warning, the Senior Law Enforcement official should consider the following actions:

1. Contact Public Works for the location of the command post.
2. If evacuation is needed, ensure that notification occurs to residents that a flood warning has been declared and that flooding is imminent. Inform residents that conditions may change rapidly and that it is their responsibility to monitor flood status and prepare for evacuation. Use public address system on vehicle and go door to door as necessary. Refer to the Evacuation & Shelter Quick Guide.
3. Establish traffic control, staging area(s) and site security.
4. Assist with transportation needs using resources such as Metro Ride.
5. Assess need for Wausau Emergency Police.
6. Request additional personnel and equipment, including mobile command post, as necessary.
7. Consider establishing a pass I.D. system.
8. Offer to establish a Public Information Officer position.
9. Work with the City/County Emergency Management Director and Public Works Director to determine if an Emergency Operations Center is needed.
10. Provide security for other off-site functions if necessary, such as temporary morgue, emergency management briefing and equipment staging areas as necessary.
11. Participate in damage assessment operations.
12. Ensure documentation of law enforcement activities is kept.
13. Lead re-entry into neighborhoods as needed.

C. Wausau Fire Department

Upon receipt of a flood warning, the Senior Fire Official should:

1. Contact Public Works for the location of the command post.
2. Assist law enforcement and public works if evacuation is needed.
3. Assist law enforcement with the notification of residents and the rescue of injured or trapped persons where appropriate. Refer to the Evacuation and Shelter Quick Guide (attachment 1).
4. Assist Law Enforcement with transportation using resources such as Metro Ride.
5. Assist Public Works with sandbagging and flood control operations when requested.
6. Coordinate utility shut-off.
7. Ensure documentation of fire department activities is kept.
8. Designated personnel will report to the Incident Command Post and Emergency Operations Center, if EOC is activated.
9. Assist Law Enforcement with traffic control and barricades.
10. Assist with the establishment of shelters if needed.

D. Wausau Finance Department

Those departments involved with flood response operations should ensure they are collecting data related to force account costs, including labor, equipment, and material costs, using references such as bid documents, purchase orders, contracts, and invoices.

They are also expected to review damage descriptions and scopes of work specifications in order to determine data, such as bid documents, purchase orders, contracts, and invoices, are in compliance with specifications.

1. Working with disaster recovery funding streams from declaration to funding approval and grant closeout.
2. Developing the method of pre- and post-declaration funding for the jurisdiction's household pets and service animals preparedness and emergency response program.

3. Developing the method to capture eligible costs for reimbursement by the Public Assistance Program, eligible donations for volunteer labor and resources, and eligible donations for mutual aid resources.

CHAPTER 8

SHELTERS

A. Shelters

Shelters will be identified as needed by either the Wausau Police Department or Wausau Fire Department. Designating shelters should take the following into consideration:

- American with Disabilities Act compliance
- Size (square footage)
- Food preparation
- Meal serving area
- Shower facilities
- Owner of facility
- Pets/Animals

Refer to Emergency Support Function 6: Mass Care, Housing and Human Services and its annexes for additional information and guidance.

B. Volunteers

1. If activated, affiliated volunteers should report to the Volunteer Reception Center.
2. Unaffiliated volunteers should report to the Volunteer Reception Center.
3. Volunteers are discouraged from operating on-scene without processing through the Volunteer Reception Center
4. Documentation is a must. Contact the Emergency Management Department for additional information.

CHAPTER 9

EVACUATION AND REENTRY

The areas potentially affected for a Minor and Significant Stage Flood Event in the Hollow Neighborhood location may require an evacuation. Once an order for an evacuation has been made, the PIO will deliver a message for public release.

Wausau Fire will have the responsibility for evacuating the residents of Wausau in a flood event. They will also be responsible for water rescue operations, fire and medical response. Other roles and responsibilities include those directed by the incident commander and those defined in the City of Wausau EOP and the Marathon County EOP.

Wausau Police Department will have the responsibility of assisting Wausau Fire in evacuation of the residents and traffic control as well as assessing streets for emergency vehicle accessibility. Other roles and responsibilities include those directed by the incident commander and those defined in the City of Wausau EOP and the Marathon County EOP.

An evacuation quick reference guide is attached as Appendix A. The Emergency Management Office has preassembled kits for evacuation teams. The kits include color coded tape to identify the status of homes, instructions, and worksheets to be completed identifying addresses checked, as well as noting anyone refusing to evacuate.

A. Public Information

The Department of Public Works/Incident Commander will assign a Public Information Officer; although not necessarily from public works.

B. Flood Fight

The Department of Public Works will coordinate temporary protective measures such as sandbagging, protection of buildings and other structures. They will also assign a liaison to coordinate with electric and gas utilities.

C. Evacuation Routes

The Department of Public Works will coordinate with the Wausau Police Department regarding evacuation routes.

D. Relocation

If in the case of evacuation of the Wausau Public Works, equipment, supplies, and personnel will be relocated to the Marathon County Highway Department.

E. Reentry and Recover

City of Wausau/Marathon County Emergency Management will monitor the flood level for eventual re-entry into the affected areas. The decision process to allow residents back in will include a safety assessment that includes utilities.

F. Public Information on Re-Entry

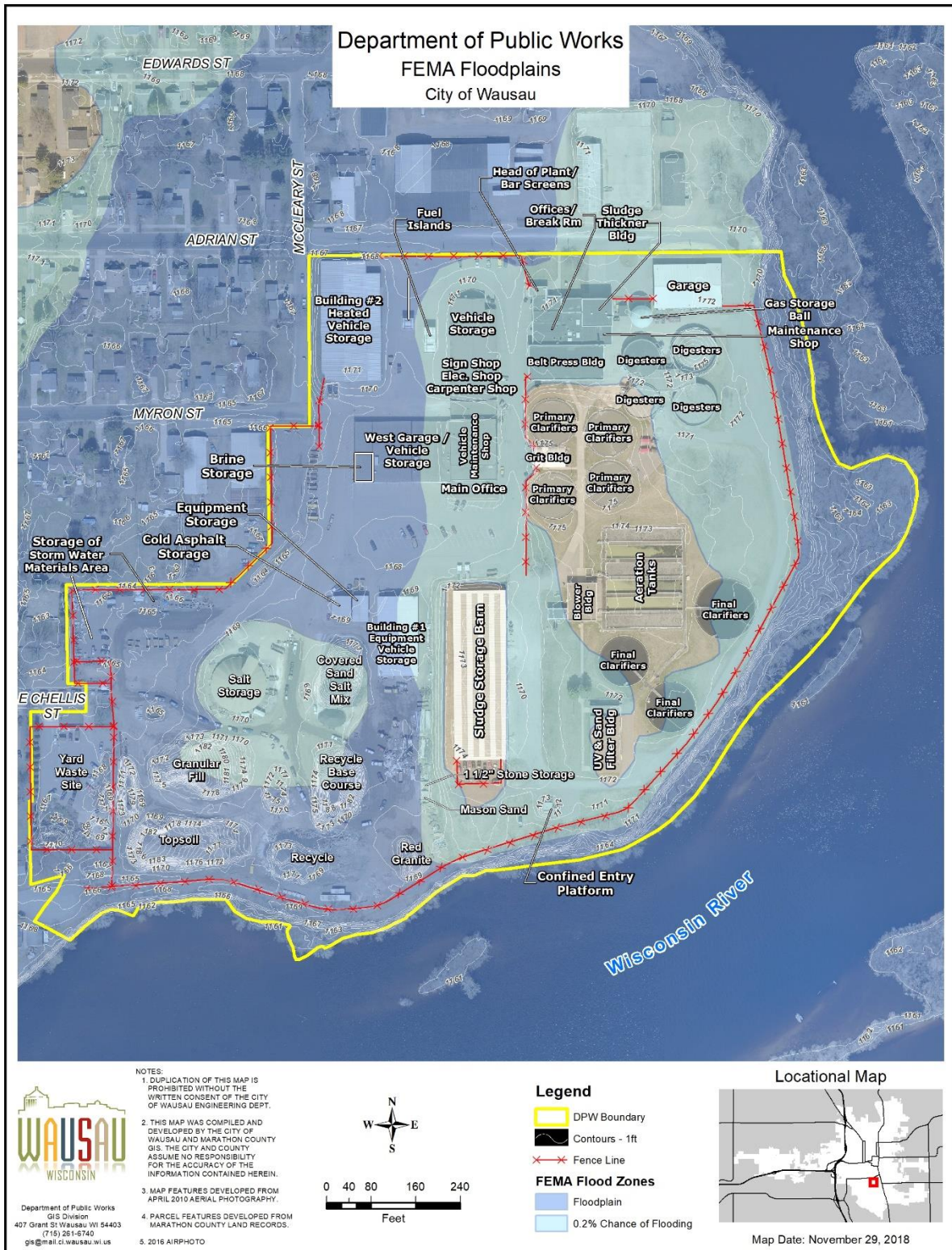
The public will be informed using the Public Information Officer regarding procedure to reenter the area. Transportation routes may be established for this. Any issues with water and/or sanitation will be directed to the Wausau Water Works and the Marathon County Health Department.

G. Damage Assessment

Marathon County Emergency Management must be notified of damage in the area and will coordinate the damage assessment effort with the City's Finance Department.

Damage assessment may include individual assistance and public assistance processes. Insurance coverage information will need to be collected as well.

CHAPTER 11

PUBLIC INFORMATION & COMMUNICATIONS

1. The objective is to provide concise information to the public in a timely manner through multiple media outlets.
2. Although the Mayor will usually be the face in front of the camera or the voice on the radio, the designated spokesperson will be either the Public Works Director, the Police Chief, or the Fire Chief. All public information released must be coordinated through the Public Information Officer.
3. Each primary department has a list of local television and radio stations to contact to release information. If not, they should contact the Mayor's office for their list.
4. Key messages should be sent out on a mass notification system, social media, and placed on the City website. Going door to door may be necessary.
5. Although each department can release information, the message released must be consistent with the other departments and should be coordinated and reviewed through the Public Information Officer.
6. All radio systems within City departments are interoperable and have the ability to communicate with mutual aid departments.
7. For resources beyond the capacity of the City, requests may be submitted through the City/County EOC. Prior to the EOC initiation, a Logistics section may need to be developed.

CHAPTER 12

TRAINING

To assure the readiness of the flood team, training on this plan is recommended for:

- Mayor
- Public Works Department
- Police Department
- Fire Department
- Finance Department
- Other City and/or County Departments

This training should be customized and in-person. The County is also a good source of available training. Additional training is encouraged in the following areas:

- National Incident Management System
- Incident Command Systems
- Flood fighting training

The following classes are available as well:

- National Flood Insurance Program
- Social Media in Emergency Management
- Mitigation Planning for Local and Tribal Communities
- Introduction to Hazard Mitigation
- Emergency Management for Senior Officials

As part of ongoing readiness, the team should consider conducting a one-half day table top exercise in February. This will allow the team to identify any shortcomings in resources or information and take action before flood season.

For additional information, refer to the US Army Corp of Engineers Flood Fight Handbook 2016 Edition, which is available on-line or with Emergency Management.

CHAPTER 13

LESSONS LEARNED

To keep the plan relevant, after each flood fight or event, an after action meeting should be held to capture what worked and what didn't work and update this plan accordingly.

A fire chief has the authority to order all individuals or companies to leave the neighborhood of any fire or first aid scene (§ 213.095). <u>State of Wisconsin</u> During a state declaration of emergency, the Governor can issue such orders as he or she deems necessary for the security of persons or property (§ 323.12(4)). <u>Marathon County Response</u> The County, when requested, will assist local public safety agencies with evacuation and sheltering activities as well as coordinating efforts with volunteer organizations. Law Enforcement

Response

- ☐ Establish a perimeter around the evacuated area and a pass system for emergency response resources for the protection of property.
- ☐ Initiate and monitor evacuation activities (e.g. traffic control, establishment of staging areas, public warning/route alerting.)
- ☐ Assists in the evacuation notification in the risk area as necessary.
- ☐ Coordinate and maintain traffic evacuation routes with consideration to responding emergency vehicles, disabled and abandoned vehicles and traffic volume.
- ☐ Provide security in evacuation areas, reception centers and shelters.
- ☐ Secures, protects, and houses prisoners that must be evacuated.
- ☐ Assists with the relocation of organizational equipment and supplies that will be moved from the evacuation area.

Recovery

- ☐ Assist and monitor re-entry activities including traffic control.

Fire and Rescue Services

Response

- ☐ Depending on incident, take command and establish ICS structure.
- ☐ Follow Concept of Operations checklist.

Recovery

- ☐ Assist and monitor re-entry activities.
- ☐ Assist in public warning and evacuation procedures.

Emergency Medical Services

Response

- ☐ Provide emergency medical services to the incident.
- ☐ Identify and locate people with functional needs and provide advice to the Triage and/or Transportation Officer.

Recovery

- ☐ Assist with the re-entry activities of medical patients and people with functional needs.

Public Works/Highway Department

Response

- ☐ Provide all necessary traffic control devices (e.g., signs, barricades.)
- ☐ Coordinate and maintain traffic evacuation routes with consideration to responding emergency vehicles, disabled and abandoned vehicles and traffic volume.
- ☐ Ensures safety of route to be used.
- ☐ Provides debris removal on evacuation route(s) as needed.

Recovery

- ☐ Lead debris management efforts as needed.
- ☐ Assist clients with relocating with friends, relatives or others or refer to a partner agency.
- ☐ Coordinate and administer food distribution programs as needed. Work with partners.
- ☐ Work with the Incident Public Information Officer.
- ☐ Coordinate activities with Marathon County Social Services.

Utilities

Response

- ☐ The natural gas and electric utilities will monitor their own systems and:
 - Advise the public of outages.
 - Restore service.
 - Inspect systems before re-entry.
- ☐ Be available as a resource to the local incident commander.

VOAD/NGO's

Response

- ☐ Assist with providing family assistance programs for clothing, food and other items to meet the basic needs of victims as directed by Social Services.
- ☐ Assist with the distribution of items needed by victims (e.g., toiletry kits, clean-up kits) as directed by Social Services.
- ☐ ARC provides shelter, food, supplies, counseling, medication replacement, recovery planning and advocacy to people affected by disasters, such as fires, floods or tornadoes. Contact the Wisconsin Region of the American Red Cross at 1-800-236-8680 for response.

Recovery

- ☐ Assist evacuees with relocating with family, friends, or others offering space.
- ☐ Work with other agencies to coordinate and administer food distribution programs as needed.

Transportation Agencies

Municipal or other Bus Services

- ☐ As requested, report to the staging area or the assembly point to pick up residents and transport them to a shelter.
- ☐ As requested, pick up residents and transport them back to the assembly point.
- ☐ Assess functional needs transportation requirements and provide as appropriate.

Chief Elected Official

- ☐ Issues policy statement on evacuation and re-entry compliance.
- ☐ Issues evacuation and re-entry instructions or emergency declaration when appropriate.

Public Information Officer

Response

- ☐ Disseminates instructional materials and information to evacuees to include:
 - o The specific area to be evacuated/re-entered.
 - o Evacuation and re-entry routes with maps.
 - o Lists of items evacuees should take with them
 - o Assembly and pick-up points for people needing public transportation.
 - o Public transportation departure times.
 - o Location of reception and care facilities.
- ☐ Keeps evacuees and general public informed on evacuation/re-entry activities and specific actions they should take.
- ☐ Disseminates information on appropriate actions to protect and care for companion and farm animals that are evacuated or left behind.
- ☐ Considers initiating a Joint Information Center.

- ☐ Makes provision to protect and secure facilities and equipment not taken out of area to be evacuated.

School District/Superintendent

Response

- ☐ Evacuates students from school buildings when the situation warrants.
- ☐ Closes school facilities and releases students from school when directed to do so by appropriate authority.
- ☐ Coordinates with the State Department of Education on the interruption of academic calendar.
- ☐ Coordinates, where appropriate, the use of school buses/drivers to support the overall evacuation/re-entry effort.
- ☐ Makes provision to protect and secure facilities and equipment not taken out of the area to be evacuated.
- ☐ Relocates organizational equipment and supplies that will be moved from the evacuation area.

Administration and Logistics

Response

- ☐ Records and reports along with tracking and status of evacuation and re-entry events.
- ☐ Maps depicting routes designated as primary and alternate evacuation routes.
- ☐ Develops plan for moving essential supplies and equipment from the evacuation area.
- ☐ Initiate mutual aid agreements

Public Warning for Evacuation

Law Enforcement and Fire Departments

- ☐ Initiate Mass Notification System/Emergency Alerting System for impacted area in conjunction with PIO.
- ☐ Use emergency vehicles public address system.
 - o For coverage, use three stops per block.
 - o Ensure Emergency Lights are on
 - o Vehicle/Apparatus should be stationary for the message.
 - o Activate siren, and then shut off.
 - o Read the message over the Public Address system that describes the threat and gives instructions.
 - o Move on to the next area and repeat.

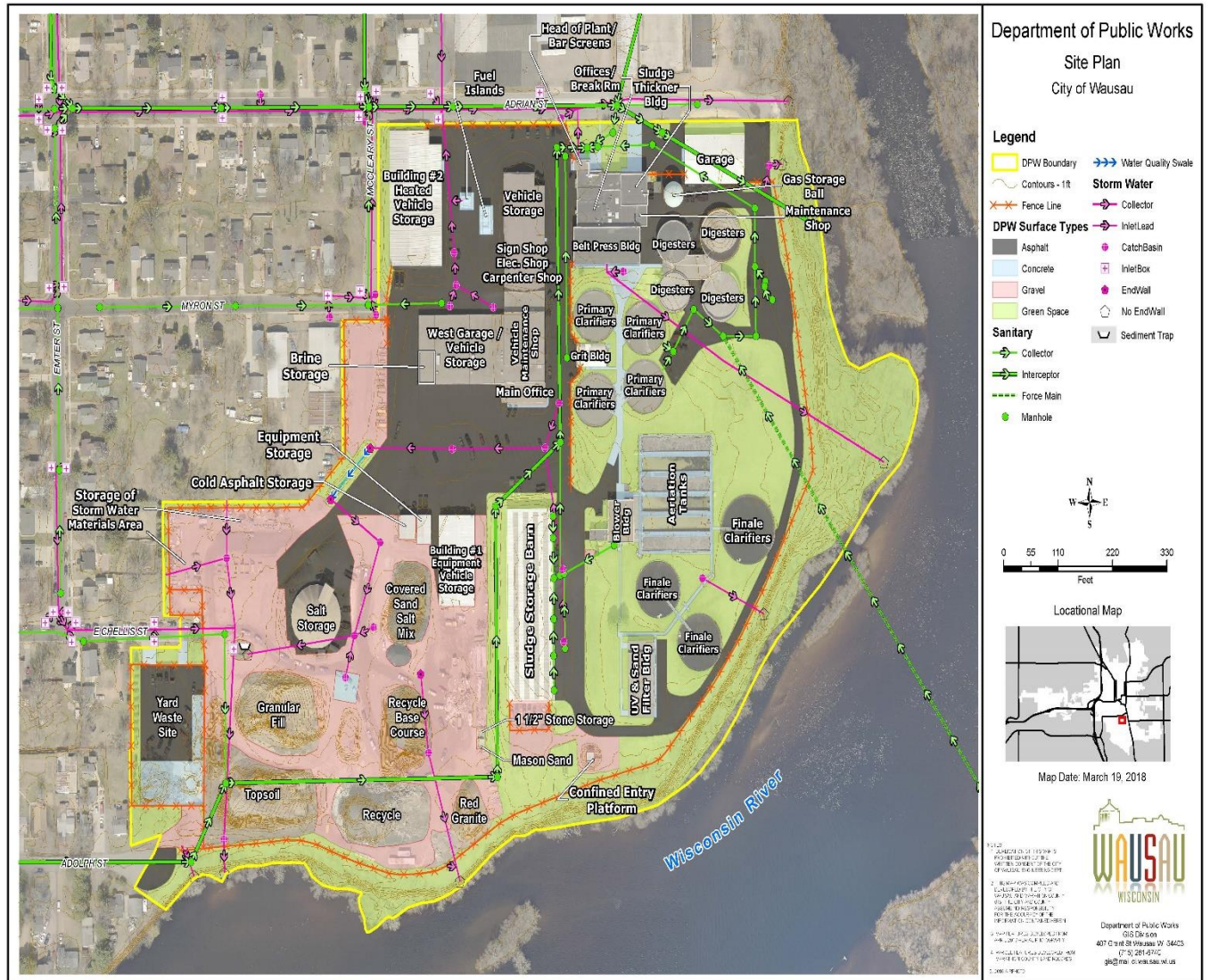

Glossary and Acronyms

1. **Call Tree.** A means by which a large group of people can be contacted in a short time. The plan is designated ahead of time and each person calls a small number of people who in turn each call a small number of people until everyone is contacted.
2. **Critical Facilities.** Locations that provide essential services and functions such as hospitals, nursing homes, fire stations, water and sewer treatment plants.
3. **Elevation Datum.** The basis for surveyed information. Elevations are based on benchmarks that were established at different times over the years and can vary slightly. Comparing river stages in one datum with surveyed ground elevations in another datum can result in critical discrepancies.
4. **Emergency Action Plan.** A step by step plan that addresses how a community or tribe will response to all aspects of an emergency, in this case a flood.
5. **Emergency Declaration.** The action a political body such as a council, state, or nation, takes in the event of an emergency in order to be eligible for assistance from emergency programs.
6. **Evacuation Zones.** Designated divisions of a community based on elevations, risk of flooding, and evacuation routes, so that an evacuation can be more specifically directed.
7. **Flood or River Gages.** Gages that provide data on the water levels in the river. These are usually operated by the National Weather Service or the United States Geological Survey agencies and the information is available online. Some may be located on remote bridges and need to be manually read.
8. **Floodplain Mapping.** A program available through FEMA that identifies areas of flood risk in a community. The mapping is associated with an insurance program and local zoning ordinances.
9. **Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP).** A FEMA program by which funds are made available to the State as a Grantee to reduce future flood risks such as removing homes from the floodplain, and other risk reduction and mitigation measures.

10. **Hazardous Materials.** Any materials that corrode other materials, explode or are easily ignited, react strongly with water, are unstable when exposed to heat or shock, or are toxic to humans, animals, or the environment.
11. **Hollow.** The neighborhood roughly south of Thomas Street that is in proximity to the Wisconsin River and Lake Wausau.
12. **Hydraulic Profile.** The slope of the water in the river. The profile can be impacted by the grade of the river channel as it flows downstream but also by water backing up behind bridges.
13. **Incident Command System.** A system created to better manage an emergency response across multiple jurisdictional boundaries. Some features include common terminology, integrated communications, and unified command.
14. **Inundation Maps.** Maps that identify the areas that would be flooded for a particular size flood event. Different maps for different levels of flooding are useful, but the one percent flood is the most common event used in FEMA floodplain mapping.
15. **Mitigation Planning.** Identifies policies and actions that can be implemented over the long term to reduce risk and future losses from hazards. These mitigation policies and actions are identified based on an assessment of hazards, vulnerabilities, and risks. The public and a wide range of stakeholders should be involved in the planning process.
16. **Mutual Aid Agreements.** Agreements between communities, tribes, or agencies to share labor, equipment, and resources during an emergency.
17. **National Flood Insurance Program.** A federal program created by Congress and managed by FEMA. The purpose is to mitigate future flood losses nationwide through sound, community-enforced building and zoning ordinances and to provide access to affordable, federally backed flood insurance protection for property owners.
18. **National Flood Insurance Community Rating System.** A system within the FEMA flood insurance program that recognizes community efforts beyond those minimum standards and reduces flood insurance premiums for the community's property owners.
19. **National Incident Management System.** A system developed to provide uniformity and consistency across all levels of government during a response.
20. **One-Hundred Year Flood.** A term frequently used to describe a flood event that has a one percent chance (1%) of occurring in any given year. The term implies that it is a once in a lifetime event, which is not an accurate representation of the probability.
21. **Mass Notification System.** A communications system that allows for pre-recorded messages to be sent to all phones in a specified geographic area.

22. **Five-Hundred Year Flood.** A term used to describe a flood event that has a 0.2 percent-annual-chance of occurring.
23. **Tabletop Exercise.** A process by which various scenarios are presented for discussion and the group of flood personnel talk through the steps and possible challenges.
24. **Topographical Mapping or Topo.** Mapping that shows elevations and contours of an area.
25. **Web EOC.** An on-line system used by FEMA and a number of states for tracking requests for resources and the status of flood responses in real time.

First Two Hours:

- Establish Incident Command System
- Notify all agencies with a role in your plan
- Determine the size and nature of the area affected by the disaster
- Determine the number of people, businesses and buildings affected by the disaster
- Conduct search and rescue operations as needed
- Inform the hospital(s) of potential casualties
- Open shelters as needed
- Determine if the area needs access control and set-up road blocks
- Begin clearing roads and streets
- Begin to determine the amounts and types of outside assistance you need
- Notify the County Emergency Management Director
- Notify Wisconsin Emergency Management
- Begin public information activities and issue protective actions for the public if necessary
- Activate mutual aid agreements
- Hold one or more command staff briefings
- Consider the need to declare a state of emergency

- Consult your agency's response check list.
- 10 of the 12 issues on the response checklist need to be addressed in the first two hours after the disaster occurs.

2 - 4 Hours after Initial Response:

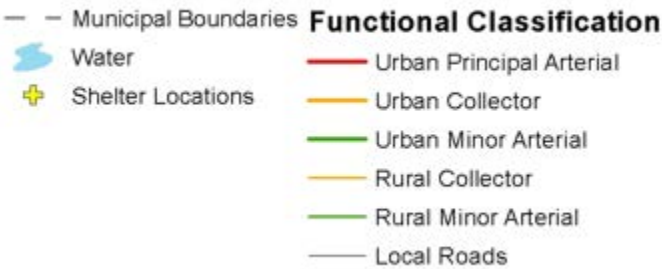
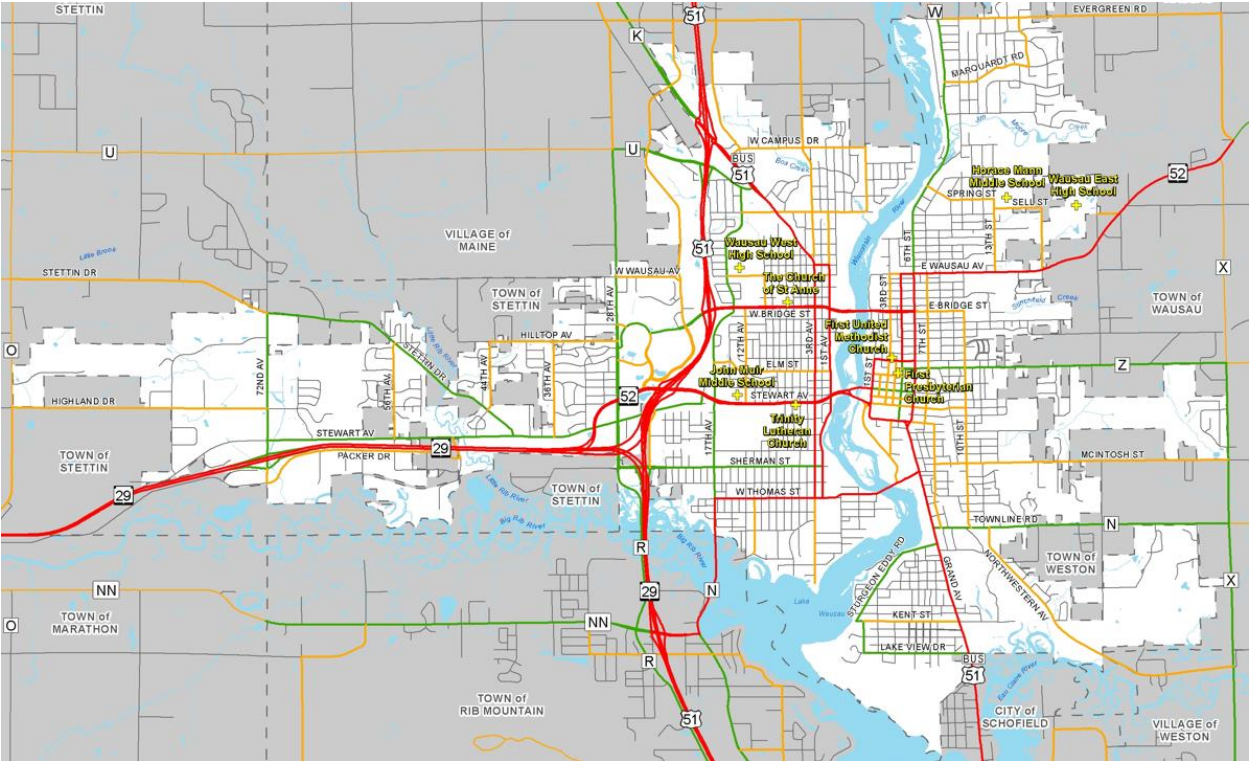

- Continue public information activities
- Consider the need for 24-hour operations and establishing 12-hour shifts
- Continue shelter operations as needed
- Continue to inform the hospital(s) of potential casualties

- Assign people to handle request for assistance and to track the needs of special populations
- Assign people to track requests for information on disaster victims
- Assign people to track offers of assistance and donations
- Continue clearing roads and streets
- Determine how debris will be disposed
- Begin to determine the public health effects of the disaster

- Begin to take care of the needs of the responders

- Hold one or more command staff briefings

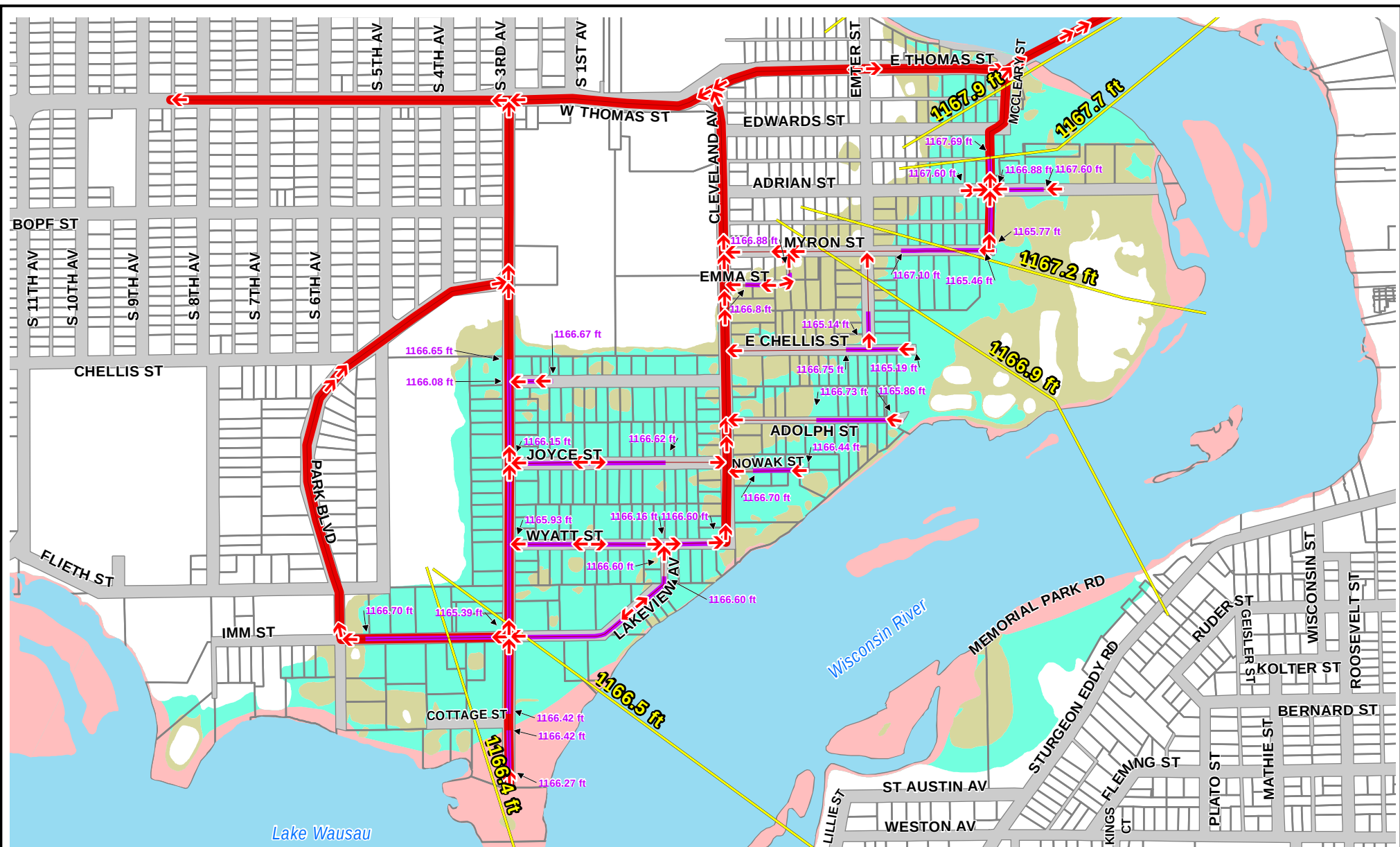

- Continue on with the tracking of requests for assistance and the needs of special populations
- Continue to track request for information on disaster victims

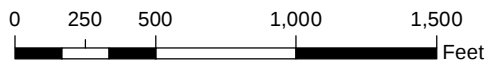

NOW COMES Todd Baeten, Patrol Captain of the City of Wausau Police Department, and alleges as follows that:

1. The Complainant, Todd Baeten, is an adult resident of the City of Wausau with a business address of 515 Grand Avenue, Wausau, Wisconsin, and at all times material to this action, he was and is Patrol Captain, employed by the City of Wausau Police Department.
2. The Complainant, Todd Baeten, as Patrol Captain with the City of Wausau Police Department, is familiar with the efforts of City police officers and local law enforcement agencies and their investigations into violations by taverns and other places where alcohol is sold within the City of Wausau, of alcohol beverage and other laws, and by employees and agents of such taverns and other places.
3. The Respondent herein, Allen Woller and Allen Woller d/b/a 6th Street Pub ("Respondent"), is an alcohol beverage licensee according to documents on file with the City Clerk of the City of Wausau. The licensed premises operated by the Respondent is known as 6th Street Pub and is located at 2002 N. 6th Street, Wausau, Wisconsin ("Licensed Premises").
4. On May 24, 2021, the Public Health & Safety Committee of the City of Wausau recommended the granting of a Class "B" Beer & Liquor License to Respondent for the period July 1, 2021, through June 30, 2022.
5. On June 15, 2021, the Common Council of the City of Wausau granted a Class "B" Beer & Liquor License ("License") to Respondent for the period of July 1, 2021, through June 30, 2022. A copy of the License is attached hereto as **Exhibit A**.

6. The Public Health & Safety Committee should recommend to the Common Council revocation of the Respondent's License on the grounds that the Respondent has violated chapter 125.12(2)(ag)1 of the Wisconsin Statutes, and such statute as adopted by Section 5.64.010 of the Wausau Municipal Code, and municipal regulations adopted pursuant to Section 125.10 of the Wisconsin Statutes, namely Section 5.64.160.

7. Section 5.64.160, Abandonment of Premises provides in relevant part:

Any license to sell alcohol beverages authorized by this Chapter may be subject to revocation, suspension or non-renewal pursuant to the procedures in Wis. Stats. § 125.12 under the following circumstances:

...

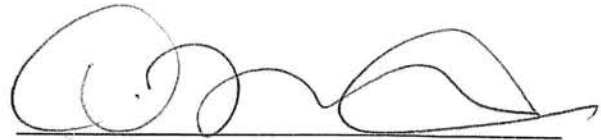
- (e) The licensee suspends or ceases doing business for a period of at least 30 consecutive days; the Public Health and Safety Committee, for good cause, may extend said period of time for 90 additional days. An establishment is deemed to have ceased regular operations when any of the following occurs:
 - (1) The alcohol beverage license is surrendered to the City Clerk absent the issuance of a newly-granted license; or
 - (2) The establishment is no longer open to the public; or
 - (3) The establishment is open to the public only intermittently in an attempt to circumvent the provisions of this subsection; or
 - (4) The establishment fails to maintain open and active accounts with its food and/or alcohol distributors; or
 - (5) The alcohol beverage license holder fails to submit a renewal application to the City Clerk before the last possible submittal date.

Respondent has abandoned its Licensed Premises, such knowledge being based upon Complainant's best information and belief, review of City of Wausau Police Department records made at or near the time of the incidents reported therein in the course of regularly conducted law enforcement activity, based upon the personal knowledge of those law enforcement officers, and review of City of Wausau public records as follows:

- (a) The Licensee has admitted the Licensed Premises have not been open since August, 2020.
- (b) On July 8, 2021, Licensee admitted he had stopped all distributor orders, but has stock on the premises.
- (c) Since May 1, 2021 through October 10, 2021 the Wausau Police Department has performed one hundred and nine (109) "Extra Patrols," "Follow-Up Investigations" or "Service Miscellaneous" at the Licensed Premises and police officers have not observed the establishment to be open at the time of those Extra Patrols. A copy of the CAD Events is attached as **Exhibit B**.

(d) An affidavit of Lt. Michael Felder in support of the Complaint is attached as **Exhibit C.**

THEREFORE, your Complainant respectfully requests the Common Council of the City of Wausau, Marathon County, Wisconsin, to revoke or suspend said License of the Respondent, Allen Woller, and Allen Woller d/b/a 6th Street Pub, for said Licensed Premises.

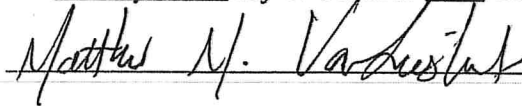

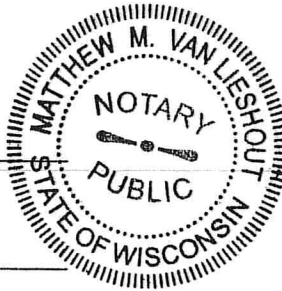

MICHAEL FELDER, being first duly sworn upon oath, deposes and says as follows:

1. I am an adult resident of the State of Wisconsin.
2. I make this Affidavit in support of Complainant's Complaint for revocation or suspension of Class "B" Beer & Liquor License of Allen Woller, Allen Woller d/b/a 6th Street Pub.
3. I am a City of Wausau Police Lieutenant and among other things am responsible for monitoring activities that occur at establishments in the City of Wausau that hold alcohol licenses issued by the City pursuant to Wis. Stat. ch. 125.
4. In May, 2021, I was asked I was asked to make contact with the owner/agent of the 6th Street Pub, 2002 N. 6th Street, Allen Woller to obtain information regarding their recent business history. There was evidence that the bar had not been open for some time.
5. Internal City records listed Allen Woller as the person responsible for the liquor license for the business. In May, 2021, I attempted to call Mr. Woller to ascertain what his plans for the business were, as it appeared the bar had been closed for some time. I called the number listed for Mr. Woller on Evolve (715-370-1968). I received a voicemail on which I left a message, however never received a return call.
6. From that time, officers had been checking the bar to see if it was open for business. Many checks were made although not every consecutive night. Every single check that was completed showed the same result: closed for business.
7. On June 8, 2021, City of Wausau police officers tried making contact with Mr. Woller again. He answered, and we had a conversation lasted approximately thirty minutes. Mr. Woller stated that he did have plans on opening up again, although he had no set date in mind. He said he has been closed since August, 2020. He stated he would have no problems restarting distribution contracts, noting that he had stock on hand and would only need to order fresh

beer. He admits he has been holding off on opening due to health concerns he has had recently, to include kidney dialysis and a broken leg.

8. I asked Mr. Woller if he had plans to sell the business. He admitted he had a person interested in buying the business last month, but they were not able to come up with the cash for the purchase. If he could sell the business, he would retire. He also opined that it was not necessarily the best time to sell right now, so soon after COVID-19.
9. He asked me what the purpose of my inquiry was. I advised him that there was a City ordinance in which a business with a liquor license that was closed for thirty consecutive days could be considered abandoned. He countered with the question of whether or not other businesses had been closed over COVID. I initially agreed that there had been closure due to COVID, however I did retract that, so as not to give the opinion that other businesses lost their licenses for being closed during that time. He also asked if all he needed to do was be open one day a month. I advised him that if he were to do that, it would likely appear that he was trying to "work the system." He expressed his opinion about how the city has been "working the system" with him over inspections while he was trying to rebuild/remodel after the fire in the upper apartment.
10. He admitted receiving two notices regarding correspondence from the city that were never delivered. On one occasion, he was home and they simply left the notice, without giving him the opportunity to sign for the letter. He had not contacted the Postal Service regarding those notices. I confirmed that I had been told the city had sent him a letter, however I was not certain that it was certified or what the exact content of the letter would have been.

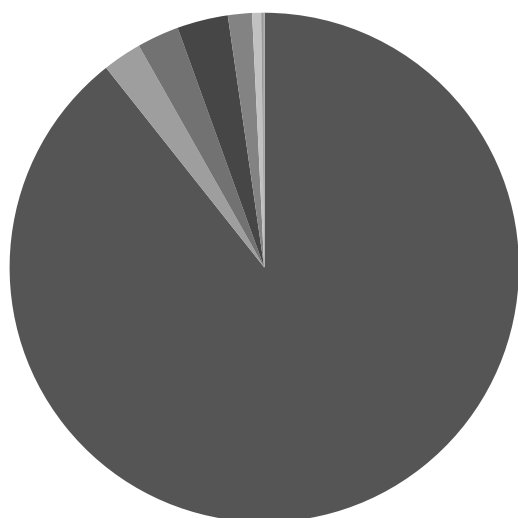

Showtime Gentlemen's Club, 1709 Merrill Avenue

Officers looked all around the bar property did not locate the alleged missing handgun. About one hour later, employees at Briq's were cleaning the outside of their property, and located a pair of rubber boots. Inside the boots was a handgun. Officers collected and secured the handgun for safekeeping. The first handgun collected was turned over the following day to a sober owner. At the time of this writing, I am not certain the other handgun had been claimed. Officers were unable to obtain enough evidence to support any charges of possessing the handguns while they were intoxicated. No charges were filed as a result of this incident.
