Consider approval or denial of various license applications

Lisa Rasmussen indicated there was one denial recommendation for Charrish Winfory for and Operator's License.

Charrish Winfory addressed the committee appealing the denial recommendation. She stated she did not realize that she could have brought evidence of rehabilitation and references. She noted her 2012 drug case was actually from 2008 was when she was just 17 or 18 years old, and she was with the wrong boyfriend and people. She referred to a theft on her record in 2017 stating a person she gave a ride to was stealing, not herself, but she was charged with party to a crime for driving. She stated she now has three kids, and she has stayed out of trouble for several years. She indicated she completed her probation and is engaged. She felt she was on a different path and wanted a chance to get her license.

Rasmussen suggested the committee delay action on Winfory's license to the next meeting to give her more time to provide any evidence of rehabilitation. Nathan Miller noted the second page of the denial letter sent to her listed the evidence of rehabilitation. Rasmussen noted she should provide any evidence to the Police Chief before the next meeting for consideration.

Rasmussen stated there is a special event application for "Hauntingly Chill" on Saturday, October 29, 2022, which is a collaboration between Matt's 101 Pub and Chatterbox. She summarized it is to be a block party with street closure on Elm Street between their two businesses and a request for privileges of alcohol on the street.

Miller explained the issue is that although they can grant temporary extensions of premises for various bars, Wisconsin law does not permit the carrying inside of alcohol from one premise to another. There are two separate premises involved here and we can't ensure beverages aren't going back and forth.

Dan Maas, Chatterbox, explained it wasn't actually a block party, but it was more of a pub crawl between the four bars in the neighborhood, and we were just trying to provide a safer crossing on Elm Street between 101 Pub and Chatterbox. The intention was to allow them to cross the street between 101 Pub and Chatterbox with their cup, so people aren't slamming their drinks first. It is a timed event with one hour at each establishment. They did not intend to serve outside in the street. (The other two bars are (Callon Street Pub and LT Club.) He noted it is a charitable event which asks you to bring a non-perishable food item to contribute.

Miller reiterated that drinks purchased inside the premise would have to be consumed there and could not be carried over and into another premise. Discussion was that the event could be approved to close the street but that it was too late to find a way to work this out regarding alcohol outside the premise. *Discussion continued.*

Motion by Diny, second by Larson to approve the event contingent upon receipt of application to temporarily extend premise outdoors. Motion carried 5-0. (**NOTE: Special Event was subsequently cancelled.**)

Motion by Henke, second by Diny to approve licenses, with the exception of Charrish Winfory to be delayed to the next meeting. Motion carried 5-0.

Total Licenses

5.64.160 - Abandonment of premises.

Any license to sell alcohol beverages authorized by this Chapter may be subject to revocation, suspension or non-renewal pursuant to the procedures in Wis. Stats. § 125.12 under the following circumstances:

- (a) It has not been issued following granting by the governing body contingent upon compliance with City requirements.
- (b) The subject premises is not open for business with stock and equipment within 90 days of the granting of such license; the Public Health and Safety Committee, for good cause, may extend said 90 day period of time for an additional 90 days if all of the following conditions have been met:
 - (1) At the time of application, the real property sought to be licensed does not have a permanent structure on it; and
 - (2) At the time of application, the real property sought to be licensed is either owned by the applicant, or is under lease to the applicant for a period greater than one year from the date of application, or is subject to an accepted offer to purchase, not conditioned on a future event. The deed, lease or offer to purchase must be presented to the Public Health and Safety Committee for review; and
 - (3) At the time of application, the applicant submits a floor plan for the structure intended to be constructed on the real property, said floor plan specifying that portion of the structure which is to be licensed; and
 - (4) The applicant agrees in writing, as part of the application, to submit to the Public Health and Safety Committee within 90 days of granting of the license or licenses a copy of the building permit and, if the applicant is not the owner or lessee of the property at the time of the application, a copy of the deed showing present ownership of the real property by the applicant; and
 - (5) The applicant agrees in writing, as part of the application to be diligent in all efforts to get the structure built and stocked within 180 days of the granting of the license.
- (c) The subject premises is not open for business at least 50 percent of the days within any 12-month period, either within a licensing year, or overlapping two licensing years.
- (d) The licensee does not own or lease a premises from which business may be conducted.
- (e) **The licensee suspends or ceases doing business for a period of at least 30 consecutive days; the Public Health and Safety Committee, for good cause, may extend said period of time for 90 additional days.** An establishment is deemed to have ceased regular operations when any of the following occurs:
 - (1) The alcohol beverage license is surrendered to the City Clerk absent the issuance of a

newly-granted license; or

- (2) The establishment is no longer open to the public; or
- (3) The establishment is open to the public only intermittently in an attempt to circumvent the provisions of this subsection; or
- (4) The establishment fails to maintain open and active accounts with its food and/or alcohol distributors; or
- (5) The alcohol beverage license holder fails to submit a renewal application to the City Clerk before the last possible submittal date.

Topic: Unhoused Population in Wausau and
Update on Homeless Outreach Specialist

The Wausau Police Department recently hired Tracy Rieger for our Homeless Outreach Specialist position. Ms. Rieger has produced the first of what will become a monthly report of her work and the current state of the unhoused population in Wausau. Ms. Rieger will deliver her report and be available for questions. Our goal is to provide the Public Health and Safety Committee with the information it needs to make decisions. Please advise us if there is additional information you would like to see in her monthly report.

Deputy Chief Barnes will discuss current challenges regarding the homeless population specific to citizen complaints about homeless encampments. Many encampments are in City of Wausau Parks. To identify a few, we are aware of encampments or people sleeping, in multiple areas of the River Walk, Barker Stewart Island, Bridges, and Gilbert Park. We have received citizen complaints regarding these campsites, in most cases have not taken corrective action.

The Wausau Police Department and the Parks Department have received guidance from the City Attorney's Office regarding process and requirements should we remove property and the campsites. We will need to develop a policy for removing of property to include proper notice and storage of the property.

In addition to policy, notice, and storage, a significant challenge includes the amount of staff time and resources are required to clean and remove items from these areas. Parks Director Polley can speak to this challenge.

When we have removed campsites and property from our parks, the unhoused individuals living there have asked "where can I go?". Although a year-round shelter will address some of the answer, up until now, we have not had an answer for them. We are aware of some unhoused individuals who choose not to stay in a shelter, regardless of the temperature outside.

Strong feelings regarding the homeless population exist on every side of the issue. We are not sure there is a right or wrong answer/solution. We are asking for direction from our elected leaders regarding how they would like us to police and manage our parks and public spaces.

Homeless Outreach Status Report

City of Wausau

September 2022

Current Estimate of individuals living outdoors: 30 – 50 individuals

This is an estimate, based on the observations of staff. When census data from Catholic Charities becomes available it will be included in this monthly update.

Current Outreach:

From September 1st through 10/20/22, contact with 20 individuals who have identified as being “homeless” and in need of services has occurred.

Services provided include:

- Facilitating the acquisition of replacement identification
- Locating housing options
- Assisting with application for benefits
- Assisting with rental applications
- Transportation to resources
- Emotional support
- Follow-up (Case Management)

Challenges Identified:

- 1) Communication and location of individuals after the initial contact is a challenge.
- 2) Replacement of identifying information such as State ID's, Social Security cards, birth certificates.
- 3) Food security is a challenge. When items such as Food Share cards are lost or stolen. To replace these items takes a tremendous amount of time. For example, without a State ID, a Social Security card cannot be replaced.
- 4) Case Management of these individuals once stabilized (stabilized defined in this role is supporting an individual in their mental health, physical health, and housing) is a significant challenge. In most cases getting an unhoused

individual “housed” is the easiest part. Keeping them “housed” is the challenge.

Collaboration and Problem Solving:

- 1) Engaging in collaborative partnerships with existing agencies. Current partnering agencies include but are not limited to: Catholic Charities, North Central Community Action Program, The Open Door, ADRC, APS, Marathon County Outreach Task Force, Marathon Public Library, Probation and Parole/Marathon County Jail, and Judicare.
- 2) In the coming weeks, “office hours” at the Library, the Open Door and at the Community Partners Campus are scheduled to foster consistent contact with individuals needing assistance. This environment will provide stability and safety for the clients being served.
- 3) Important documents and identification are consistently being lost or stolen. Confidential storage was developed at the Wausau PD for individual’s who wish to have their important identifying information stored/protected to eliminate the risk of losing or having those items stolen.
- 4) Engaging individuals in outside case management when possible. In most cases, individuals must want to engage in case management voluntarily which could lead to additional barriers, so in working with them, developing trusting relationships, encouraging to them to engage in other beneficial resources.

Barriers:

- 1) Acknowledging the duplication of services amongst agencies working with the unhoused population.
 - a. The need for “Case Conferencing” amongst agencies will be critical in ensuring that duplication is reduced or omitted completely

In Summary...

From September 1-October 20, 20 individuals were outreached to. Of those 20, 4 unhoused individuals have been successfully “housed”. 2 additional clients have

applied for housing and are awaiting a response from the Landlord. 14 clients have been provided the resources necessary to take “next steps”.

Wausau Fire Department Monthly Report

September 2022

Fire Chief Report by Chief Robert Barteck

September was filled with good news about grant success! We are notified of two grant awards that will help the department and community enormously. The timing of the news couldn't be better as we are working at completing our 2023 budget with only cost-to-continue increases. Our spending restraints were already tight and with inflation, at an all-time high, we are struggling to budget for essential needs in the department.

Wisconsin EMS Flex Grant:

The Wausau Fire Department EMS Division received \$146,000 from the Wisconsin EMS Flex Grant.

The EMS Flex Grant has been awarded to 442 Wisconsin licensed emergency medical services (EMS) throughout the state to help deliver prehospital emergency services. Originally, Governor Tony Evers directed the Department of Health Services to use \$12 million in American Rescue Plan Act – State and Local Funds, to give Wisconsin EMS providers funding to relieve the financial effects of COVID-19 on services. Due to the overwhelming responses from over 400 applicants submitting requests totaling \$63 million, the Governor has added an additional \$20 million to allow more funding assistance to be provided to service agencies bringing the total amount awarded to licensed Wisconsin EMS services to \$32 million.

We will present a proposal to accept the \$146,000 grant to the Finance Committee in October. We plan on dividing the grant to fill key resource needs: \$100,000 – New Ambulance, \$30,000- Power Load Cot, \$10,000- EMS Equipment, and \$6,000- EMS Training.

Staffing for Effective Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) Grant:

On September 21, 2022, we received notice from FEMA that we were awarded our \$3,164,763 SAFER Grant Request. This grant will fully fund nine new firefighter positions in the Wausau Fire Department for three years (2023, 2024, & 2025). This was a highly competitive grant. FEMA received 1576 applications and made 118 awards totaling \$360 million. With a success rate of only 7.5%, we were extremely fortunate to receive the grant award.

The nine firefighters funded through the SAFER Grant bring the total council Approved and funded new firefighter positions to 12. In December 2021, the Public Health and Safety Committee and the Human Resources Committee recommended the creation of 12 new positions to meet increasing call demand and increasing responsibilities for emergency response.

This staffing increase will be transformational for the Wausau Fire Department. This is the first staffing increase since 1970. The 12 additional firefighter/paramedic positions will allow the department to increase the daily minimum staffing to the NFPA 1710 National Standard for fire apparatus staffing. Once all positions are filled and deployed Engine One, Three, and Ladder Two will have three-firefighter minimum staffing. It will also allow a rotation for firefighter/paramedics between the department's three ALS-Level ambulances and the three-fire suppression apparatus.

We have begun recruiting for these open positions and anticipate hiring in two phases. Phase One will be current candidates that are already firefighter/paramedic trained and will likely be hired before the end of the year. Phase two will consist of EMT-Basic firefighters that will be hired in February and immediately begin training as paramedics in a Wausau Fire in-house paramedic class.

It is an exciting time in Wausau Fire Department as we set upon a historic staffing increase of epic proportions. We greatly appreciate the support of the Police and Fire Commission and the Common Council to help us make this staffing increase a reality.

EMS Division by EMS Division Chief Jared Thompson

September was another exciting month for the EMS Division. We currently are designing two new ambulances that the fire department and the department of public works have budgeted for 2023. Designing and spec'ing out ambulances is not like it used to be. The ambulance committee and the ambulance manufacturers are facing some interesting supply chain challenges. Many chassis and other integral components are very hard to find and have extended lead times of two to three years. This has made the ambulance committee look at different ambulance manufacturers that we have never considered. One ambulance manufacturer is Wheeled Coach. They are one of the largest ambulance manufacturers in the US. They face fewer challenges with the supply chain issues than other smaller manufacturers do because they have been able to buy and stock many chassis and internal components that are needed to complete an ambulance build. They are the sole ambulance manufacturer for the Fire Department of New York (FDNY) EMS. They produce 150 ambulances for FDNY EMS every year. The ambulance committee next meets on October 19th, to finalize our design.

During September, a vast majority of EMTs and Paramedics participated in the American Heart Association CPR refresher course. Every two years all EMS personnel are required to take a refresher course in CPR. This is a four-hour course that focuses on high-quality chest compressions which is the most important aspect when caring for a person who suffers a cardiac arrest. Pictured below is A-crew performing chest compressions. The TV screen is displaying real-time feedback on how well they are compressing the mannequin's chest and then it displays their overall score after two minutes. This encourages a healthy dose of competition between crew members during their CPR training.



In September, we had the privilege of welcoming Jerod Blomberg to Wausau Fire. He brings a very unique view to our EMS division. Coming from a very large EMS system in California, he has made it clear that Wausau Fire EMS is very aggressive and progressive in our EMS protocols and procedures. There were a handful of medications and procedures that Wausau EMS carries and performs that Firefighter/Paramedic Blomberg needed to be refreshed on. Pictured below is Firefighter/Paramedic Blomberg learning a new procedure, Suction Assisted Laryngoscopy with Airway Decontamination (SALAD), that Wausau Fire EMS uses when performing endotracheal intubation.

- High Rise Fire Operations

As in every monthly report, the amount of training is significant. September was interesting in the fact that the scheduled training was completed but we were so busy that no photos were taken of the scheduled concepts. However, we made sure to document many of the impromptu and un-scheduled training events that took place.

A brief breakdown of our scheduled activities follows:

Fire Behavior 3rd Edition

This training involved video-based learning on understanding scientifically tested fire behavior from the time of fire ignition through the fire's growth and decay. Fire has been the same consuming creature for centuries. However, the fuel types and building construction dramatically affect how we can fight fires and the survivability for the occupants.

High Rise and Standpipe Operations

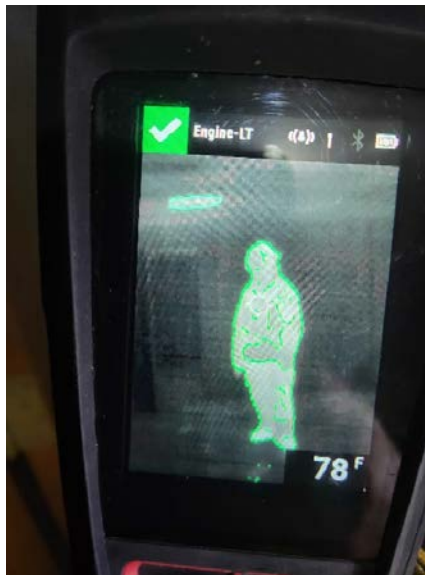
These two drills were combined by most crews to perform fire attack skills in elevated locations such as office buildings, apartment complexes, and even some commercial structures. Often, we must carry our hoses and hook them to a pipe that is pre-plumbed in these types of buildings, then supply water to the building with a fire engine and suppress the fire without our hose coming straight from our pump panel. This type of drill is extremely labor intense as it requires us to carry our hoses up staircases to the floor below the fire, make the connection, and then proceed to advance and fight the fire.

Vertical Confined Space

Only one crew was able to perform Confined Space Training as we simply ran out of time with the other two (for now). Confined Space Rescues are rare in the City of Wausau. However, the risk is certainly there with near-daily entries made by city employees and others in the workplace. We cannot take this type of specialized rescue for granted.

The Colors of Fire Service Leadership

This presentation spoke on key concepts of leadership and followership that can aid firefighters regardless of their rank and seniority. Each helmet color represented a different rank or positional responsibility in the fire service. Each position was presented with pearls of wisdom to aid each member of the organization in recognizing their leadership potential and responsibilities. With each helmet color (rank), a book was referenced to also provide an opportunity to dive deeper into the content after the lecture. We ended with a strong correlation to improving leadership qualities and the benefits both on-duty, and off.

Bauknecht and TDC Briggs have been working with a community partner to bring Mike and his wife Anne to Wausau to share their perspectives on the fire service and fire service marriage.

During the presentation and breaks, firefighters collaborated and made connections to gain perspective on issues in the fire service including training, morale, work/home balance, and more. In the photos that follow, you can see some of the connections made by Lt. Bauknecht and TDC Briggs.

Mike presented on the following:

"This House Rocks" focuses on firefighters rejuvenating their love for the job and on collaborative efforts in the firehouse that translate to an effective team on the fireground.

"The Art of Go/No-Go" provides firefighters with a simplified approach to fireground size-up and decision

making. The method Captain Gagliano shared, assists firefighters in making recognition-primed decisions in mere seconds to set initial strategy and tactics to mitigate an incident.

We hope to bring Captain Gagliano and his wife Anne to the Wausau area in 2023 to share their knowledge, perspectives, and experience with more firefighters who love this profession.

Fire Officer

The Wisconsin Technical College committee on fire officer training continued to meet. The meeting on September 22nd completed curriculum revision and we finalized the written examination test pool validation. Our next step is to prepare the accompanying content and student guide to prepare for the certification process.

Technical Rescue

A new committee was formed through the WTCS on creating the first Wisconsin recognized and standardized technical rescue curriculum beyond the most basic levels. While the state utilizes Proboard certification for Task-Force 1, it is not a WTCS curriculum. For those in the state requesting certification in technical rescue, there is currently very limited availability of training. This new committee has the goal of creating course content that can meet the needs of organizations throughout the state regarding disciplines such as:

- Rope Rescue
- Tower Rescue
- Confined Space Rescue
- Trench Rescue
- Collapse Rescue
- Water Rescue
- Swift-Water Rescue

Fire Prevention Division by Fire Marshal Brian Stahl

Inspections: Within the City of Wausau for the month of September, we performed 137 total inspections. Of those 10 were re-inspections. We had 27 properties that had Fire Code Violations with 43% being Fire Extinguisher Annual Maintenance. These properties will require follow up inspections to confirm compliance. We conducted 5 consultation inspections for the month of that were either remodel projects or new construction.

Investigations: We had zero Fire Investigations for the month of September. We also responded to zero recreational fire complaints.

Public Outreach: The Youth Fire Setting Intervention and Prevention program was completed on September 28th. This entailed a follow-up questionnaire for the mother along with a general discussion and Q/A. The child (eight-year-old) has successfully retained most of the fire safety education that was provided. We performed three smoke detector installs, each of which provided one CO detector and three Smoke detectors to residents.

Education: We attended the Fall IAAI Conference that was held on Sept 20-22 in Eau Claire. This was a three-day conference that provided education for investigating explosions, large incident responses (riots), and Meth Lab fires. These presentations were provided by the ATF and the Wisconsin DOJ.

Fire Operations Division by Deputy Chief Jeremy Kopp

Significant calls:

Wausau Fire was lucky enough in September to only respond to two vehicle fires. We were still busy running emergency ambulance calls at a record rate, but it is rare to see the fire response calls down to two. This is the time of year when we are reaching out to the public to be even more careful because we are entering the heating season. Hopefully we can keep these numbers low on the fire side throughout the fall with community outreach and education.

Recruitment and Retention:

With the closing of the application process on September 18th we were able to set up two full days of interviews. The 1st round being October 10th and 11th and the 2nd round being November. We had 27 applicants and are hopeful that many of them pass through the process and help us get a step closer to our new minimum requirements for staffing. Firefighter Paramedic Jared Blomberg started his first day of our academy on September 12th and first day on the line working with his new crew on September 26th. We had a very nice swear in ceremony at station 2 with Jared and his family on September 22nd.

Fleet:

Engine 2 was sent over to Zentara for front end repairs suffered last winter. This is scheduled to be completed early October and Engine 4 will then be sent to DPW to be auctioned off. We are still waiting on confirmation of our leased vehicles to be replaced. The replacement of these vehicles will put in place a much-needed command vehicle currently Car 2 that is ten years old. The other replacements will be for the inspector vehicles as well as the Deputy Chief's car.

Buildings and Grounds:

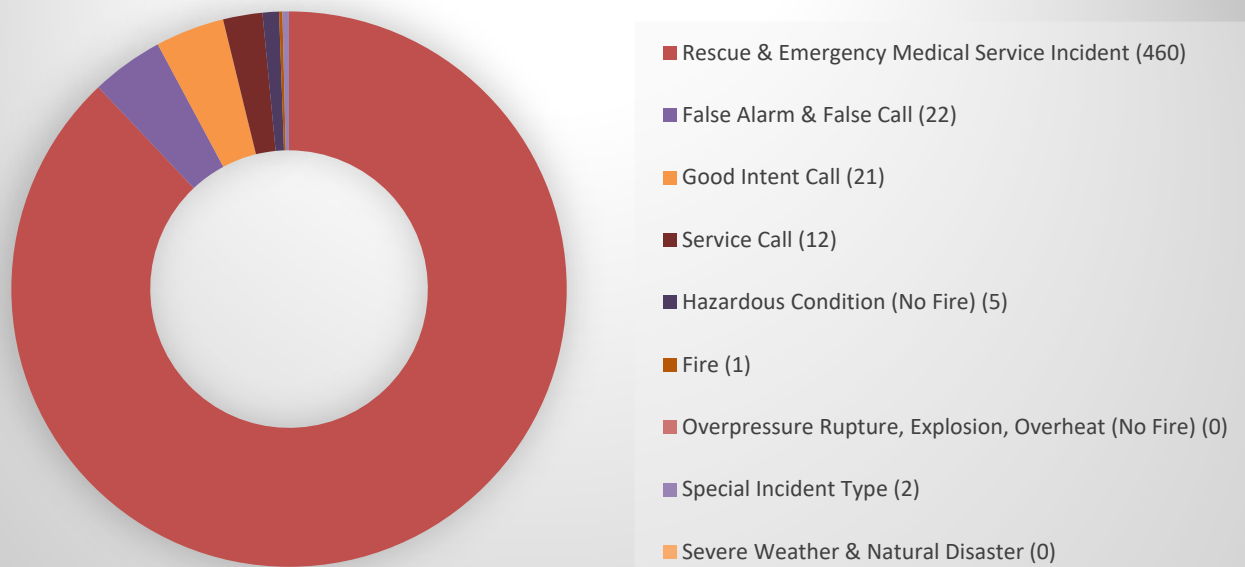

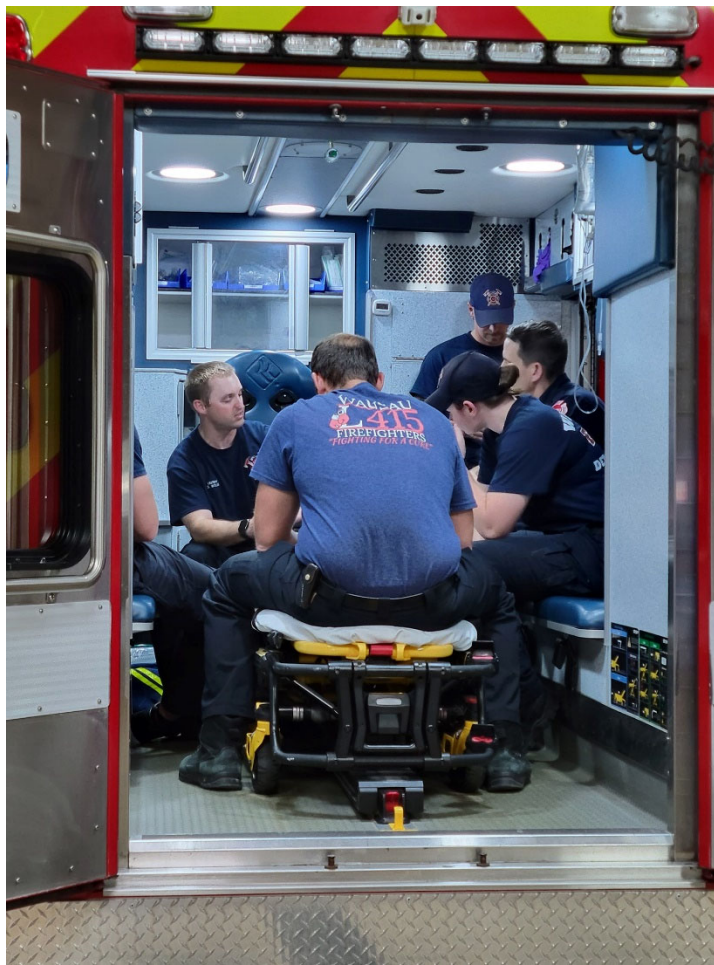

Fire Chief Report by Chief Robert Barteck

The staffing expansion recruitment is well underway! The Human Resources Department has done an excellent job recruiting. In October, we brought five candidates to the Police and Fire Commission for confirmation. In November, we have interviews set for 27 candidates. We remain optimistic that we can fill the remaining open positions from the candidate pool entering into the interview process. Deputy Chief Kopp has a few more details in his portion of this report.

The City budget is heading for finalization in November. In October, the Finance Committee reviewed supplemental requests, and in September, they reviewed and ranked Capital Improvements Projects. One of our supplemental requests is to add annual mental health check-ins with a public safety-specific mental health professional. The Wausau Police Department instituted this program two years ago and has seen excellent results and positive reviews by the staff. Providing our firefighter/paramedics with a robust and comprehensive mental health support program is essential, and this added program will fill a current gap in resources.

We are keeping a close eye on Wisconsin ACT 228's funding progress. In April, Governor Evers signed the bill into law and is now waiting for the funding conduit to become established. ACT 228 Creates an ambulance service provider assessment on private ambulance service providers for supplemental reimbursements under the Medicaid program and a supplemental reimbursement under the Medicaid program to public ambulance service providers through certified public expenditures. Once the funding conduit is implemented, it will allow our EMS Division to increase Medicaid reimbursements. Currently, 17% of our ambulance transports are for Medicaid patients. Medicaid reimbursements for EMS transports do not cover the costs of performing the call when wages, benefits, ambulance, fuel, medical supplies, etc. Supplemental reimbursements under this program could have a significant impact on EMS revenues.

At the last Police and Fire Commission meeting, a commissioner requested that we add a historical monthly call volume so readers can interpret our reported call volumes with more background data. Please look for the new data table that has been added to the operations report. We appreciate this feedback. Please let us know if you want to learn more about anything in this report or see added in the future.

EMS Division by EMS Division Chief Jared Thompson

As the EMS Division Chief, one of the best perks is being able to follow up on the condition of patients that are department cared for.

One EMS run that I have the privilege to speak to is an incident that happened on October 7th on Bridge Street around 1100.

An elderly man who was driving his car suddenly when into cardiac arrest. By-standers on the scene had removed that patient from his car and started CPR. Engine 3 was first on the scene and applied their AED to the patient. The AED delivered one defibrillation. Engine 3's crew noted that the patient started breathing and had a pulse. Med 3 arrived on the scene and took over care of the patient. A 12-lead ECG was performed and sent electronically to the emergency department (ED). The patient had suffered a myocardial infarction that led to his sudden cardiac arrest.

By the time Med 3 arrived at the ED, the patient was able to talk and was stable. The hospital staff rushed him to the cath lab and opened his blocked artery.

Currently, the patient is back home with his wife.

I am in the process of reuniting everyone involved with this patient's positive outcome.

A brief breakdown of our scheduled activities follows:

Fire Prevention:

Fire Prevention training consists of firefighters preparing for public education to prevent fire or minimize the impact of fire on the community. Our member training includes learning how to educate children in fire safe practices, stop drop and roll, exit drills in the home, as well as how to conduct safe and informative station tours.

PPE Inspections:

Personal Protective Equipment inspections are not only important, but they are also required by national standards. Each year, we refresh on the proper procedure and methods of inspecting our PPE to ensure it is safe for us to wear for responding to emergencies. Every member on the department is refreshed on this practice and the deficiencies are written up. If PPE requires repair, it is sent to a certified company for the corrections.

Relay Pumping:

Fire pump operations are an essential aspect of putting water on fire. The methods we use to get water from a source to the pumper, to the fire vary depending on the location and distance. Relay pumping operations are refreshed annually to move high volumes of water over a greater distance. For example, Lazy Acres has only

two hydrants available in the entire complex. Depending on the location of the fire, we need to connect pumpers to each other to boost the pressure in our supply hoses to have an effective amount of water available. This type of training combines communications, pump operations, fire hose operations, and the utilization of attack hoses for suppression activities.

Haz-Mat Scenario:

Lt. Ambrosius created and coordinated a Level “A” hazardous materials scenario for each crew to work through as if they were called to it in the city. After a brief lecture by Lt. Ambrosius, the crews were sent in motion on their “call” to assess, size-up, and mitigate a leaking 150 lb Anhydrous Ammonia tank. This chemical poses inhalation hazards, corrosivity hazards, flammability hazards, and skin contact irritation (burning). Each of the three crews worked through the scenario and mitigated the incident.

Chimney Fires:

Chimney fires are a fact of living in Wisconsin. In the city, we still have a good number of homes that either heat with wood or supplement their heat with wood. As such, we need to ensure our members are prepared to respond to chimney fires. This drill involved a brief video explaining chimney construction, fire behavior in a chimney, and how to safely suppress a chimney fire and not create excess damage. Following the video-based lesson, the crews went to the apparatus and reviewed our tools and equipment available at each station for chimney fire suppression.

Other October Training:

As usual, the crews will train on what they need regardless of what is scheduled. Below, firefighters work with our newest member as a group to ensure everyone is utterly familiar with their PPE and the escape/Rapid Intervention capabilities of our Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA).



Below, four of our members are working on certifying as Pump Operators through NorthCentral Technical College. This 60-hour course trains our members in safe driving operations, pump operations, and the decision-making abilities as it relates to the fireground. The course is attended by five departments around the area: City of Wausau, Town of Wausau, Riverside Fire District, SAFER, and the City of Merrill.



National Farm Medicine Center Agriculture Rescue Train-the-Trainer

Training Division Chief Briggs attended the National Farm Medicine Center's Train-the-Trainer event in Marshfield. While we do not have any farms in the City of Wausau, we do have a fair amount of farm machinery traffic on some of our borders, in our partnering communities, and the city uses some farm machinery in leaf pickup and other specialized uses.

This training provided a perspective that many urban fire departments do not even think of. Concepts from this event will be integrated into our annual training as the schedule allows.

Fire Officer Committee:

The Wisconsin Technical College committee on fire officer training continued to meet. The meeting on October 19th was held in Madison at the WTCS fire training office. In this meeting, the WTCS Education Director of fire training, two fire chiefs, and the Wausau Training Division Chief met to finalize the last components of the Fire Officer curriculum. This material will be put into effect January 1st, 2023 for all new fire officer training.

The beauty of working on this committee is that it will have a direct impact on developing each fire officer we promote as well as those who certify near us and throughout the State of Wisconsin. While committee work is

an extra task, the value it provides is worth every moment.

Technical Rescue Committee:

This committee has not met since the last monthly report. However, while at the Fire Officer Committee meeting, the Training Division Chief was issued eight textbooks to review in an effort to select the best books for each technical rescue discipline. Once selected, the supporting materials from each book will be utilized to form the state curriculums Wisconsin will use to certify technical rescuers. The committee is scheduled to meet on November 2nd to discuss the books and curriculums moving forward.

Fire Prevention Division by Fire Marshal Brian Stahl

Inspections: Within the City of Wausau for the month of August, we performed 424 total inspections. Of those, 32 were re-inspections. We had 34 properties that had Fire Code Violations with 30% being Fire Extinguisher Annual Maintenance. These properties will require follow up inspections to confirm compliance. We conducted 10 consultation inspections for the month of that were either remodel projects or new construction, including- Knox box installation, fire protection and fire alarm systems.

Investigations: The Prevention Division thankfully did not have to perform any Fire Investigations or recreational fire complaints for the month of October. That makes 2 months in a row!

Public Outreach: The Wausau Schools once again carried forward the virtual Fire Prevention Week for all schools in the district. This means the Prevention Division was not doing in-person safety demonstrations in the 1st-5th grades as implemented since Covid in 2020. Teaching materials, videos, a Power-point and web links were provided to the district for dissemination to the teachers of those age groups. We did, however, witness 2 separate fire drills at schools with recommendations made as needed to ensure an effective and efficient exit. The schools practice fire drills once a month and the fire department is required to witness a drill at least once per year.

Education: This was a busy month for inspections and consultations since we did not have in-person school visits for Fire Prevention Week.

Fire Operations Division by Deputy Chief Jeremy Kopp

Significant calls:

Wausau Fire responded to 8 significant calls in October. Two fires in the city limits as well as one mutual aid fire to SAFER District with Truck 1, two cooking fires both contained to small area, one large dumpster fire, one vehicle fire, and a boiler fire contained to the boiler.

Recruitment and Retention:

We were able to move five candidates to the October 24th Police and Fire Commission meeting for their approval and received it. We will be determining a start date for these five when we receive the rest of the minimum requirements. These five additional hires will get us to our old minimum staffing numbers of 62

personnel and hopefully we will get the additional twelve in the November process. The November process is the first round of interviews with EMT Basic applicants.

On October 29th we were invited to the Hmong American Center Halloween Block Party where we were able to setup some recruitment info and talk with interested members of our community about becoming a firefighter/Paramedic. This was a good event for that as well as giving out candy to all the children. In the retention side of things, we have been working hard with making our department a destination department and not a steppingstone department. This includes working with county teams to give our personnel more opportunities to work in specialty fields as well as continuing to provide new equipment and apparatus.

Fleet:

Engine 2 has been fully repaired and back in service supporting our fleet as the backup engine. Engine 4 was taken out of service and is at DPW for auction. The new pickup truck that is to replace Car 2 has arrived in the city and I am working closely with Solomon King to have it outfitted over the next few weeks and hopefully put in service before the end of the year. Ladder 2 went back to Custom Fire on October 31st for the week to have some adjustments done to the outriggers and alarms as well as some other minor repairs, it will be back home on November 4th.

Buildings and Grounds:

We are moving forward on updating the apparatus bay at station 3 and securing pricing.

Overtime and Scheduling:

We still have a few members on FMLA with new additions to their families as well as one member on light duty. With personnel returning from FMLA and the additional five new recruits we should see the OT start to decrease at the end of the year moving into the new year. 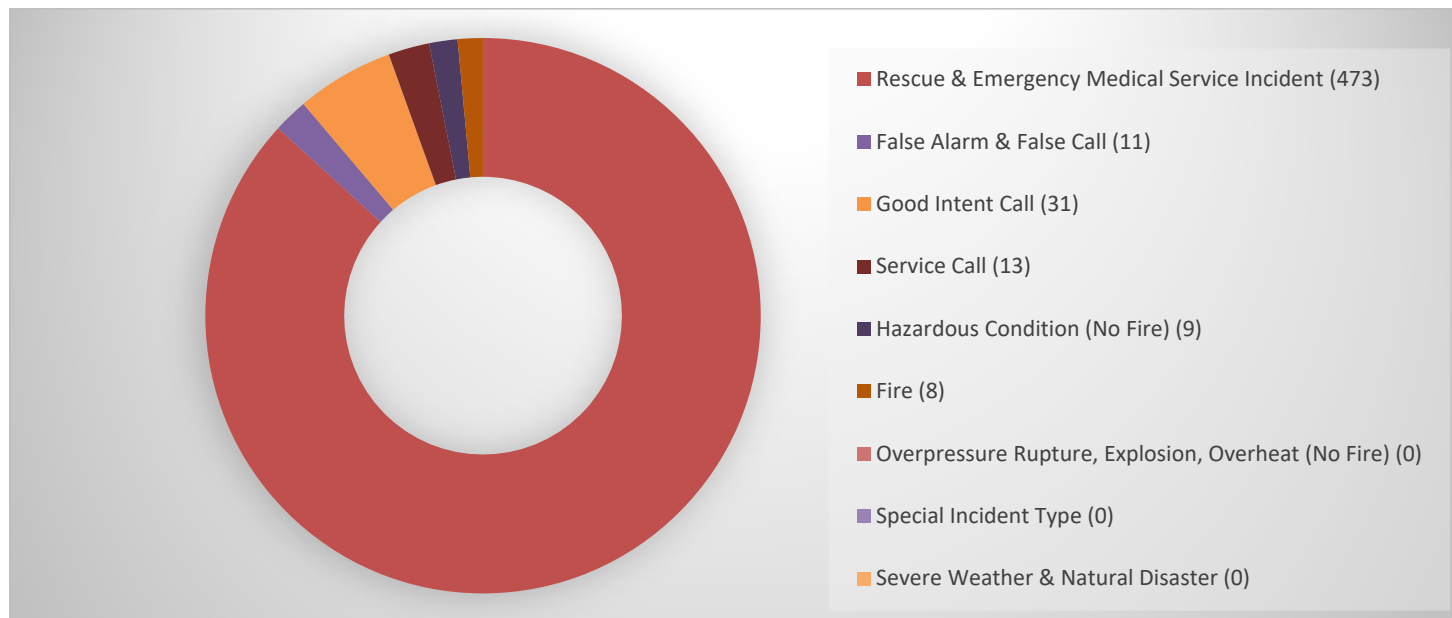

WAUSAU PD OPERATIONS REPORT



3rd Quarter, 2022

Chief's Message

As mentioned in the 2nd quarter report, our staffing levels continue to be a concern. We hired four officers in May, however three are in recruit school and one is still in field training. In addition, we have two vacancies due to resignations, two officers on light duty due to injuries, and we are anticipating 2 resignations and 3 retirements in the next three months. In addition, there are three more officers who have received approval for extended FMLA in the 4th quarter. Our patrol division is working at minimum staffing levels, including more overtime and forced overtime than we have seen in many years.

In September the City began contract negotiations with the police union. Union members and police supervisors are paying closer attention to these contract negotiations than ever before in my time with Wausau PD. It is a daily topic of conversation because of the retention difficulties and staffing shortages as a result of the labor market competition for police officers.

In this report, you will see a new way of presenting the time and costs associated with the law enforcement staffing of special events. Our goal is to provide detailed information to policy makers for decision making regarding municipal costs for special events. Hundreds of hours of volunteer Emergency Police time were not include in my report.

Counting Rules

Counts on this page are based on the month of the incident or arrest, rather than the month the incident was submitted. If the incident date is unknown, the report date is used. Counts are subject to change as data are updated.

Offense counts are calculated based on the number of offenses for each victim (per incident) for Crimes Against Persons and the number of unique offense types (per incident) for Crimes Against Property and Crimes Against Society. For burglary and motor vehicle theft, offense counts are based on the number of premises entered and the number of vehicles stolen, respectively.

Victim counts are calculated based on the number of victims connected to each unique offense type in an incident. For Crimes Against Persons, the number of victims will be equal to the number of offenses. Victims will be counted more than once if they are connected to multiple offenses.

Arrest counts are calculated based on the number of arrestees listed on a Group A or Group B incident. Each arrestee is counted only once per incident.

Arrests are categorized based on the specific Group A or Group B arrest code submitted by the agency, rather than the incident offense code. Since agencies only submit the most serious arrest charge for each arrestee on an incident, arrest counts are not indicative of the number of charges.

Incidents are cleared in one of two ways: by arrest or by exceptional means. Clearance counts are based on the number of offenses cleared in a given month regardless of when the offense occurred, and can therefore be greater than the number of offenses in a given month. In incident-based reporting, the first arrest on an incident, or an exceptional clearance, will clear all offenses associated with the incident.

Community Resource Unit

July – September 2022 in the Community Resource Unit

Community Resource Unit consists of 4 officers and 1 Lieutenant (CROs)

- **There were five reported drug overdoses in the city during the months of July-September 2022 (all of which were in September.)**
 - Zero fatal, five survived.
 - Of those investigations, the following resulted
 - 4 Individuals arrested
 - 4 Felony charges
 - 2 Misdemeanor charges
 - At this time last year, we have had four LESS overdoses this year.
 - CRU made an arrest from a GPS ping written in July on a heroin trafficker resulting in over 90 grams of heroin being seized. The male was also violent non-compliant sex offender and received a \$75,000 cash bond.
 - CRU drafted/executed a SW at 1220 Cedar St. Over 2.5 lbs of marijuana, over \$43,000 cash, and two guns were seized from the residence.
 - Current investigation where a GPS tracker is installed on a vehicle belonging to a known methamphetamine trafficker.
- **32 traffic stops resulting in 24 vehicle searches, by CRO officers.**
 - Several arrests, seized drugs leading to below investigations
- **Conducted drug trafficking investigations to include;**
 - **10 search warrants to include premise, cell phones, GPS pings, and social medica warrants.**
 - **1 controlled buys into drug traffickers.**
 - **Seized 108.9 grams of Methamphetamine**
 - One use is usually around 0.1 gram (point)
 - *1089 doses/uses seized this quarter*
 - **Seized over 90 different prescription pills**
 - **Seized two units of MDMA (Ecstasy)**
 - **Seized nearly 97.8 grams of Heroin**
 - One use is .05 - 0.1 gram (half point or point)
 - *978-1956 uses/doses seized this quarter*
 - **Seized 1270.69 grams of Marijuana**
 - a gram will produce 1 to 2 joints

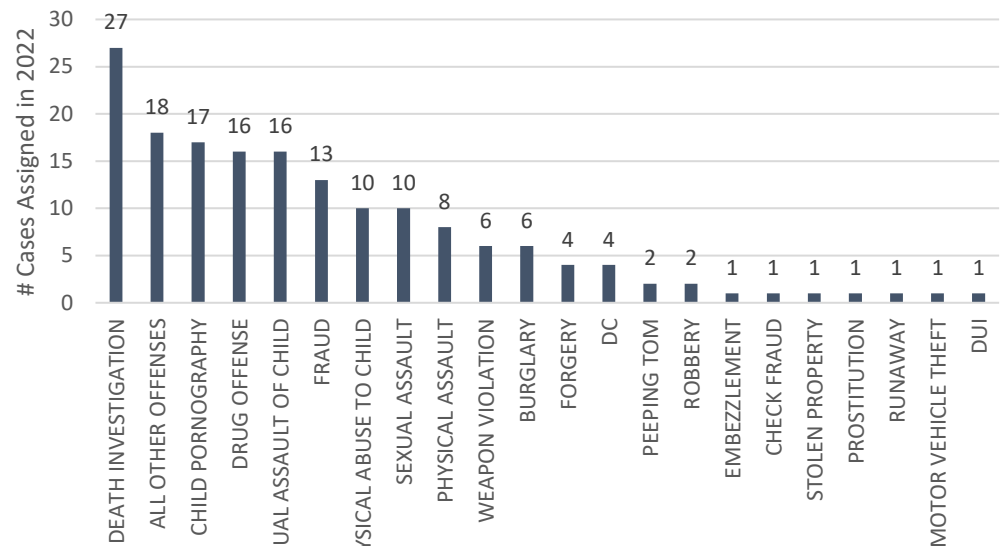

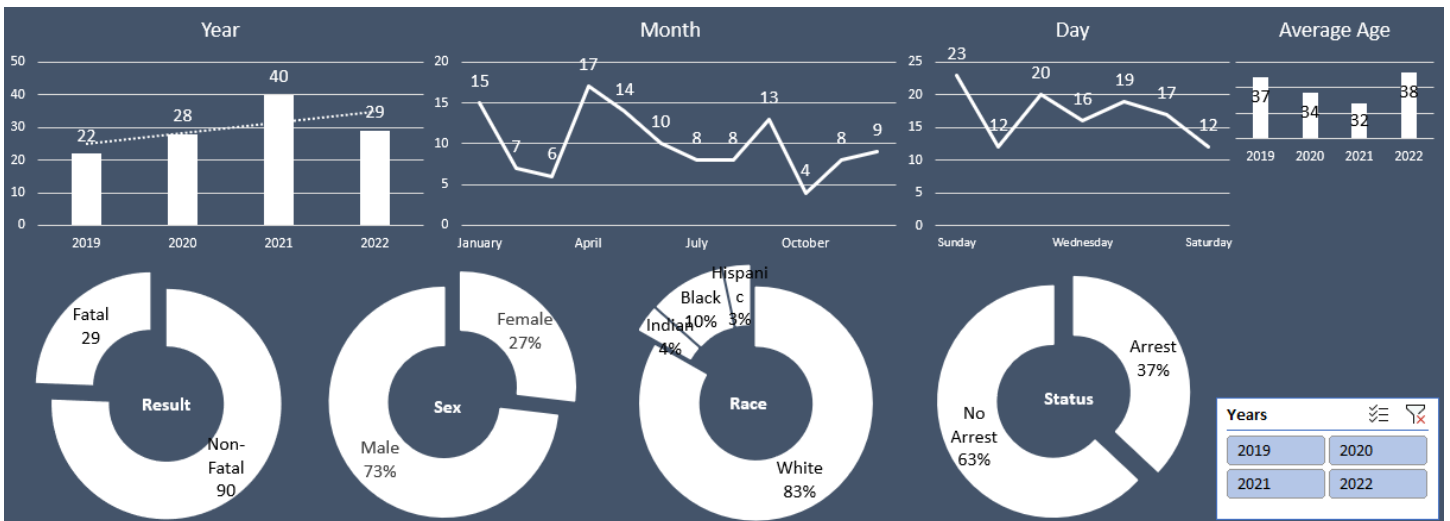

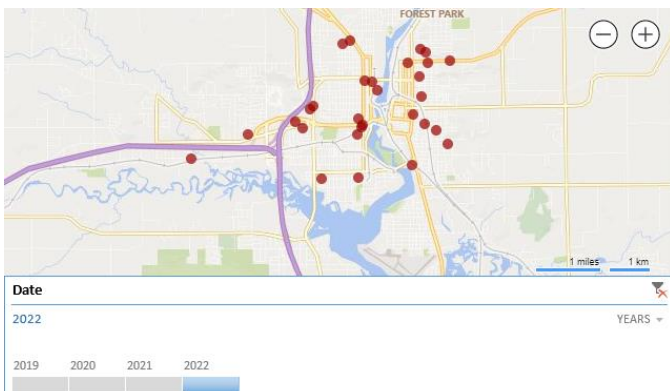
2022 (Jan - September)

Summary

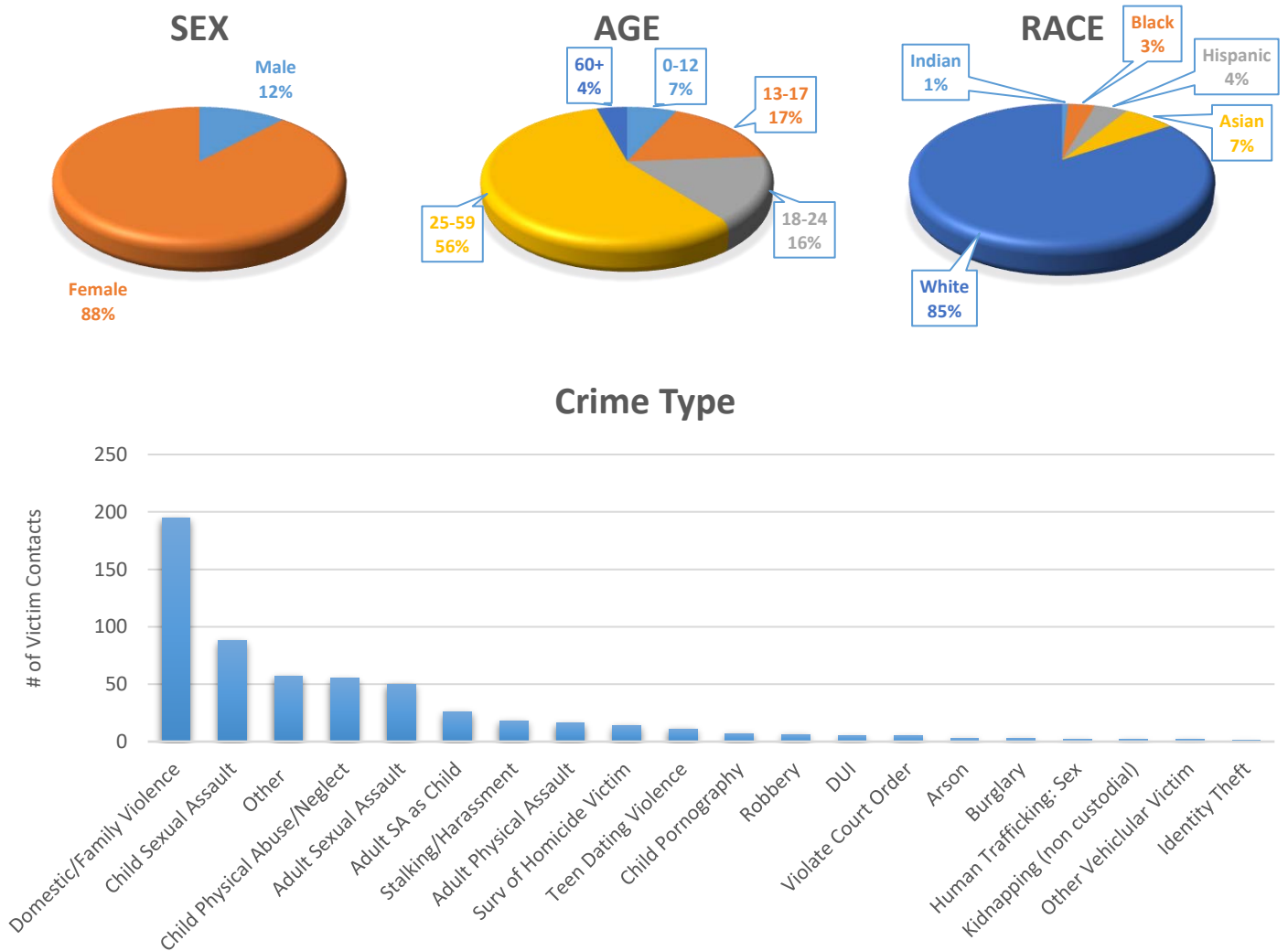
5 new drug overdoses were investigated between July and September. 0 of those overdoses resulted in fatality. Overall, this was a sharp decline from the previous quarter during which we investigated 14 overdoses (fatal and non-fatal combined).

The City is still on pace with 2021 numbers, which was the highest year of overdoses we've had on record. Despite maintaining an average of 3 overdoses per month, fatalities are currently trending downward by 33% (6 so far this year).

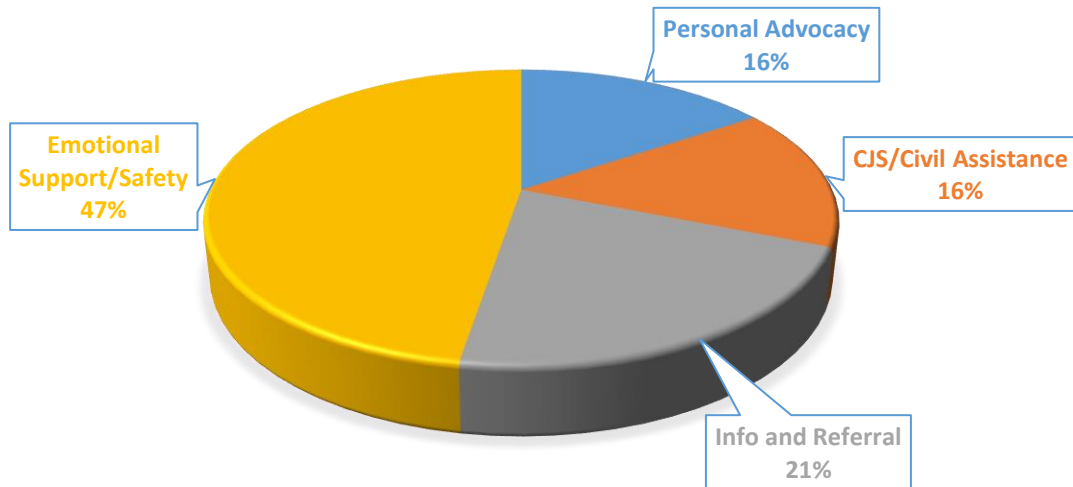
Victim Resource Unit (Fiscal Year 2021-2022)

"CFS": Calls For Service (Officer initiated activities and calls received from Dispatch).

"Mental Health" and "Welfare Check" are the two most common types of CFS (coded by Dispatch based on the initial information reported) that involve individuals in crisis.

"Community" origin of 51.15 / 51.45: Law enforcement is called to a location in the community (*residence, business, public location*) in response to an individual in crisis (or incapacitated). De-escalation, safety planning, and/or diversion is not viable or is unsuccessful, resulting in 51.15 or 51.45 detention.

"Facility" origin of 51.15: While under care or custody of the Jail, NCHC, or medical facility; an inmate or patient is suicidal or otherwise assessed on-site by a Crisis Professional, and deemed in need of 51.15. Law Enforcement is then called upon to confirm and complete the 51.15 (as required by WI Stats.) **Lacks opportunity for diversion.**

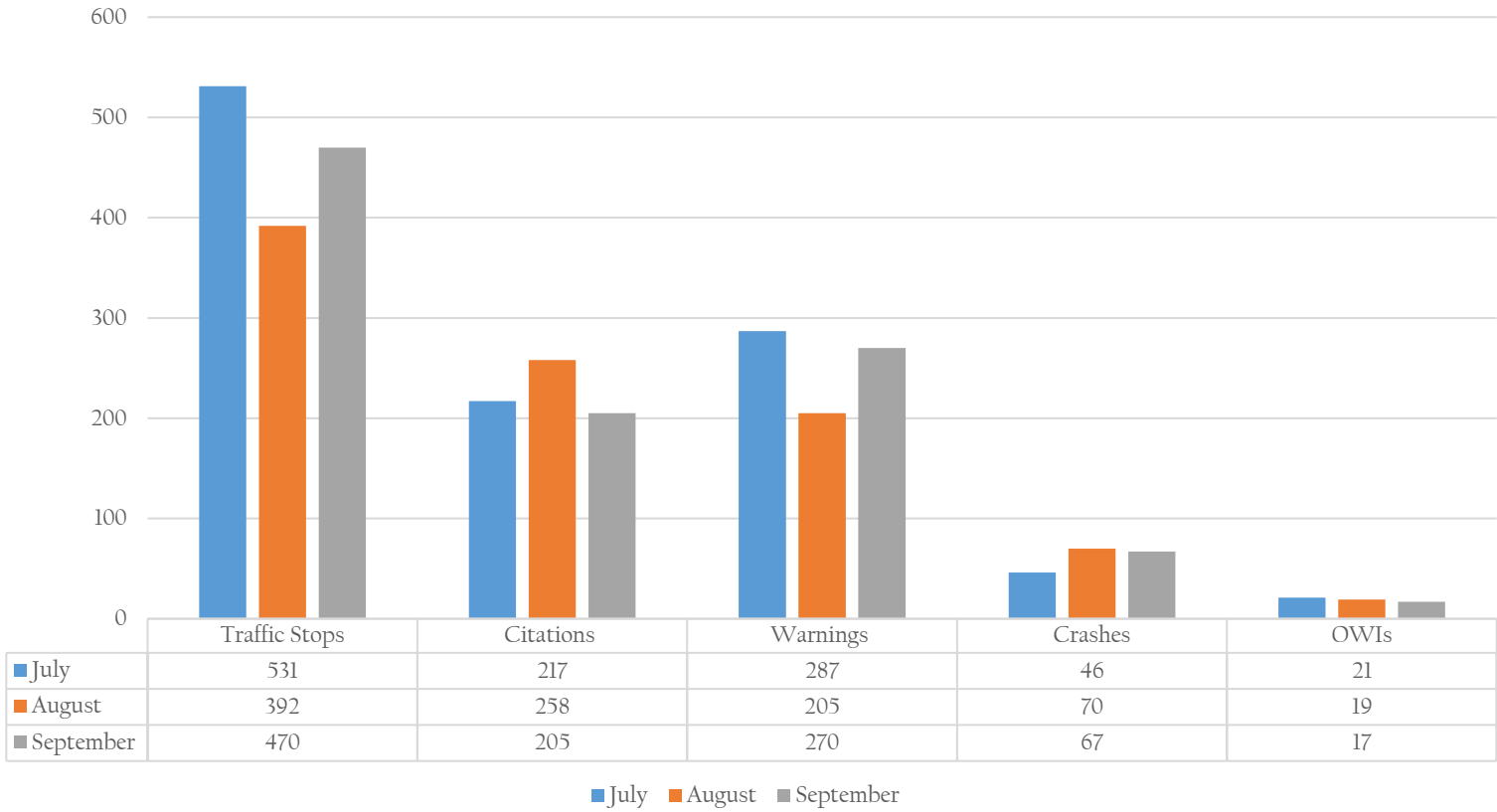
"51.15": "Emergency Detention" under WI Statute 51.15. Law enforcement may take into custody an individual who is:

- (1) Mentally ill, drug dependent or developmentally disabled, and;
- (2) A substantial probability of physical harm to him/herself or others is evident by recent acts or omissions, attempts or threats.

"51.45": "Alcohol or Drug Detention" under WI Statute 51.45. "A person who appears to be 'incapacitated by alcohol or another drug' shall be placed under protective custody by a law enforcement officer."

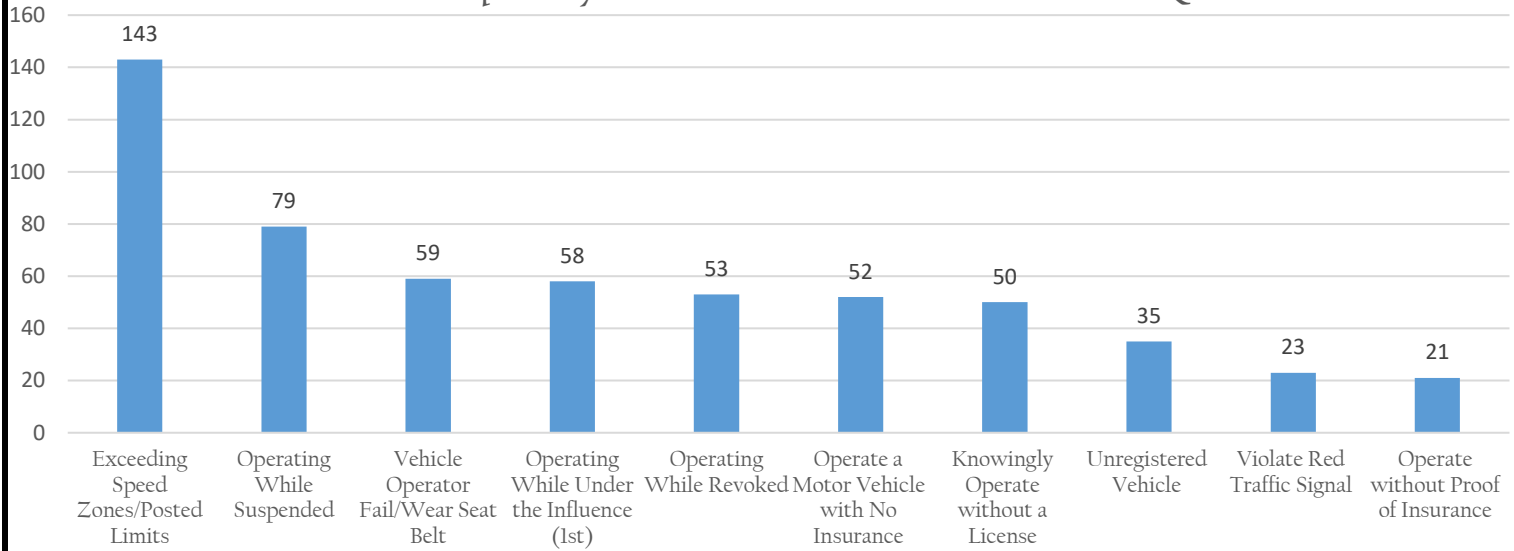

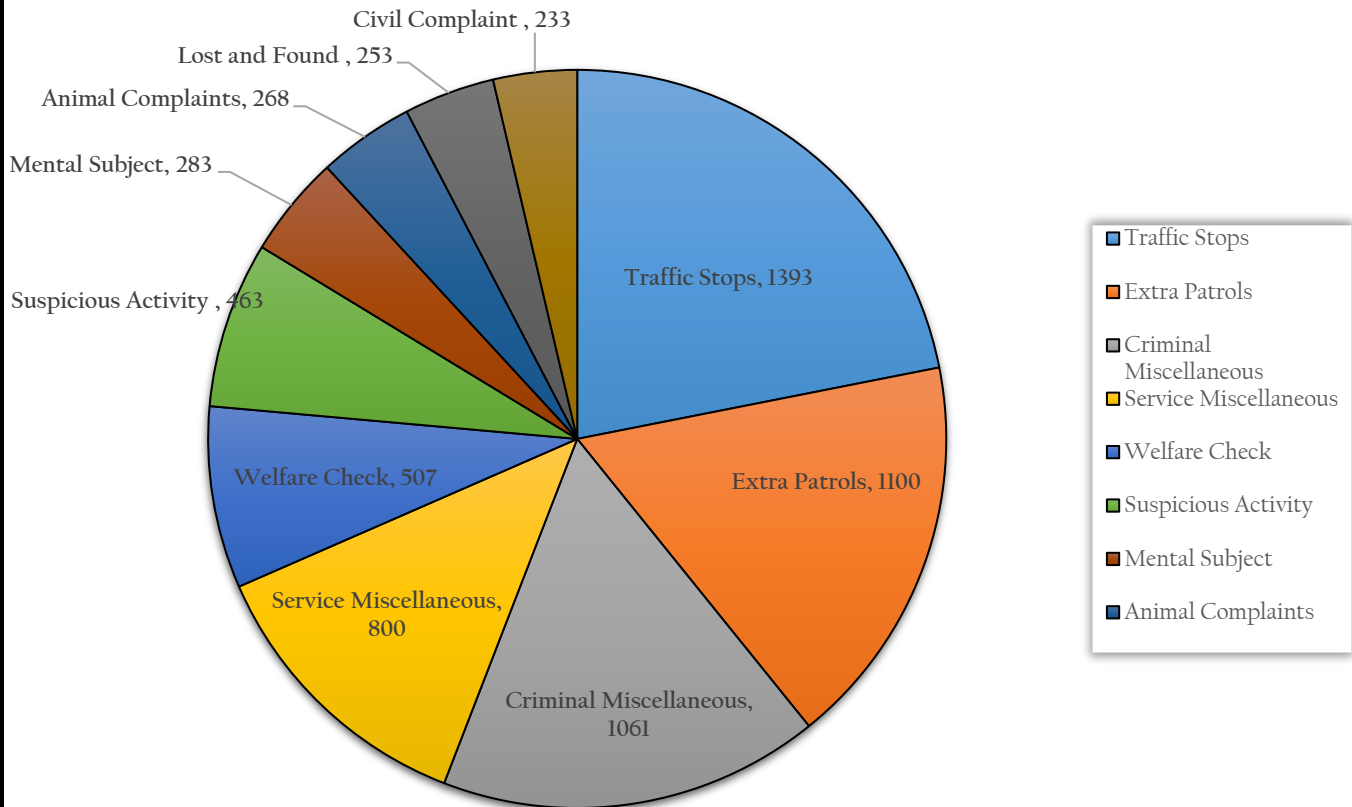

Citizen Complaints & Internal Investigations

1. In July, officers initiated a traffic stop for expired registration which resulted in an arrest of the driver for possession of heroin with intent to deliver. The arrestee later wrote a letter to the police department alleging officers did not have a valid reason for the traffic stop, conducted an illegal search of the vehicle and driver, stole \$200 from the driver's wallet, and racially profiled the driver. A supervisor investigated the complaint by watching body cameras, reviewing reports and speaking to the officers involved. The complaint was determined to be unfounded.

- (2) *Event #22130772, 09/23/2022 at 11:25 PM:* EXTRA PATROL: An officer driving by observed two males sitting outside the bar with two clear plastic cups containing a brown liquid. When questioned, they admitted the drinks were "Jack and Coke." The officer noted the cooperation and honesty of the individuals, and their potential unfamiliarity with the laws in her decision to issue only a verbal warning. Since no citations were issued that could be used as evidence towards the violation, no Demerit Points were assessed for allowing the drinks outside the premises. The bouncer was told he could not allow that to happen. He told the officer he was the only one working. I had been told by the owner that they would not open if not properly staffed.

- (1) *Event #22143222, 10/19/2022 at 10:56 AM:* CRIMINAL MISCELLANEOUS: A complaint from an alderperson came to the City Clerk's Office, and was routed to the Police Department regarding this business. An advertising noted that complimentary beers were provided to customers there for a haircut and other treatments. The Clerk responded that the business was given a Class A beer license, with the caveat that they were to only provide a maximum of two samples of 3oz servings per person. The complaint and advertising made it seem that the business was not following the serving portion guidelines of the license. Capt. Baeten responded to the business and found that there was cooler in the business that contained 7oz bottle and cans of beer. This would violate the provisions of the license and according to Department of Revenue Agents, the business would not be able to "combine" the two servings to a six ounce serving. In addition, the business owner was recently arrested and charged with a crime. The bond condition of that arrest included a prohibition of possession of alcohol. Having alcoholic beverages in the business while he was present would be a violation of that bond. Capt. Baeten had a conversation with the owner regarding these restrictions. He agreed that he would suspend the practice of providing alcoholic beverage samples while he figured out the best way for him to comply with the license limitations. He also understood the effect of his bond conditions with this situation.
