Noting the presence of a quorum, the Chairperson called the meeting to order at 05:15 PM.

1 Public comment on agenda items and reading of the City of Wausau Public Comment Statement.

2 Consideration of the minutes of the preceding meeting(s).

Motion by Watson, seconded by Slonski, to approve. Motion Passed 5-0.

June 15, 2026 Regular Public Health & Safety Committee Minutes

3 Discussion and possible action.

a. Approval or denial of various license applications.

Larson stated Zion Merriam and Brent Ruffin, applicants for New Bartender/Operator License, did not appear to appeal the denial recommendation.

Larson stated Darrius Williams, applicant for New Bartender/Operator License, appeared to appeal the denial recommendation.

Larson stated the applicant that appeared to appeal the denial recommendations could communicate with the City Clerk or the Police Department to submit evidence of rehabilitation to distribute to the Chief of Police and the committee to have the recommendation overturned. It was stated that a recommendation based on that communication would come at the next committee meeting.

Larson stated the Liquor License Review Subcommittee met immediacy before the meeting with The Rec Room, Scott and Molly Bergamn of The Rec Room. It was stated the subcommittee voted to recommend approval of The Rec Room.

Motion by Watson, seconded by Trueblood, to approve or deny the various license applications as listed excluding the application of Darrius Williams. Motion Passed 5-0.

b. Consider request granting a 90 day extension to open for business for good cause for The Copper Kettle Steakhouse located at 5512 Stewart Avenue, The Copper Kettle Steakhouse, LLC., agent Robert A. Lamovec.

Motion by Watson, seconded by Slonski, to grant a 60 day extension The Copper Kettle Steakhouse. Motion Passed 5-0.

c. Amending Section.10.40.040 Rules of the Road and Areas of Operations.

Trueblood questioned what this ordinance change is accomplishing as the infrastructure for a multi-use path is not currently in place. It was stated that the goal was to have as much path connectivity as possible eventually for those who lack the comfort of biking on the road and to

allow those bike users to bike on the sidewalk. It was further stated that this is a narrow sidewalk that could move pedestrians off the sidewalk.

Slonski stated that there was strong sentiment from area cyclists that this was an unsafe area for people to bike on the road because of the grade of the hill and amount of traffic on Thomas Street. Slonski stated support as this was not ideal but the best option until a multi-use path can be constructed in the meantime.

Lukens stated support for the ordinance change for the time being because the intersection is challenging for people on bikes and as a matter of safety.

Motion by Lukens, seconded by Watson, to approve. Motion Passed 4-1, with Trueblood opposed.

- d. Review of large-item drop off event and consideration of changes to future events.

Without objection, this item was postponed until the next meeting.

- e. Interval of the Community Outreach report and other communications from organizations supporting the unhoused population.

Watson stated a preference for quarterly reports that featured highlights for the Police Department and the partner organizations. It was further stated that those reports should come in advance of budgetary discussions.

Larson stated support for quarterly reports as well.

Trueblood questioned if the specific months should be outlined, and suggested starting those reports in September and every three months after.

Slonski requested that the reports address obstacles and barriers that are noticed within the reports to allow the committee to comprehend how to help overcome those obstacles.

Motion by Trueblood, seconded by Watson, to get quarterly reports from the Community Outreach Specialist and Bridge Street Mission starting in September and every three months after. Motion Passed 5-0.

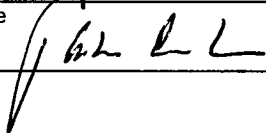

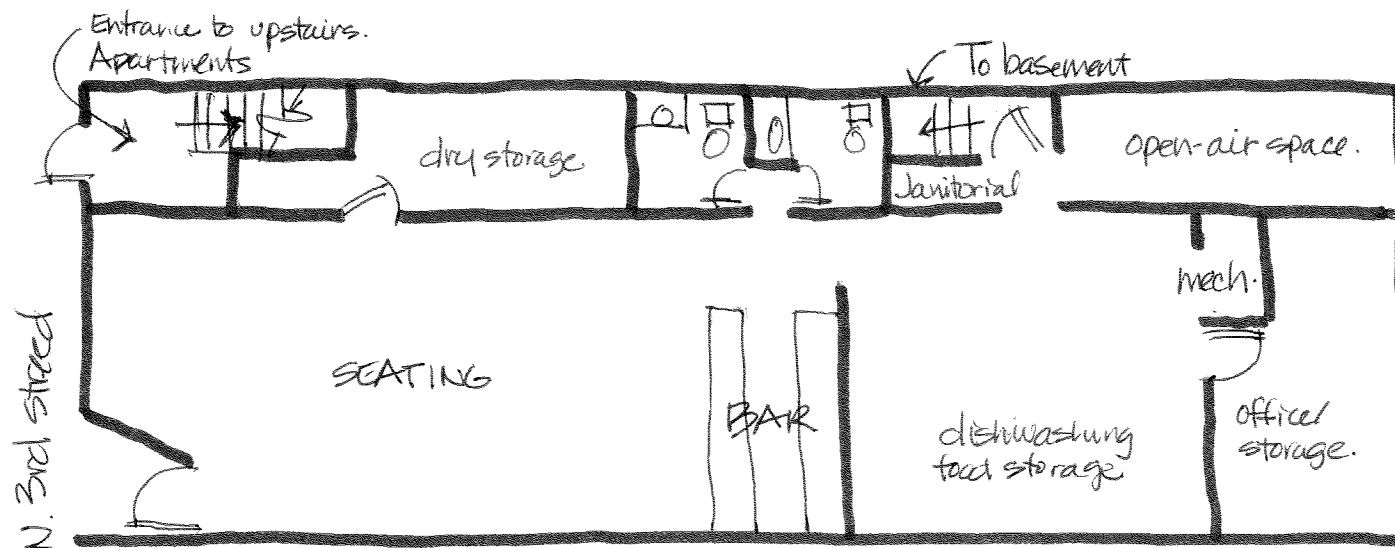

RE: An Ordinance Repealing and Recreating City of Wausau
Municipal Code Ch. 9.28, Abatement of Nuisances

Purpose:

Update City of Wausau, Municipal Code Ch. 9.28 to modernize and streamline the City's nuisance abatement process.

Background:

Under the City's current ordinance, a copy of which is enclosed hereto, the City has three options to abate public nuisances:

- **Summary abatement.** If the public nuisance poses a great and immediate danger to the "public health, safety, peace, morals or decency" the inspecting official can issue the property owner a 24 hours' notice to abate the nuisance otherwise the City can abate it.
- **Nonsummary abatement.** The nonsummary abatement procedure applies when there is a public nuisance that poses a danger to the public "public health, safety, peace, morals or decency" but the danger is not immediate. The nonsummary procedure allows the inspecting official to specify an amount of time the property owner must abate the nuisance and upon the property owner failing to do so, the city may enter onto the property to abate.
- **Council review and court action.** If the public nuisance is deemed to not pose a danger to the public, the inspecting official is required to bring the matter before the mayor for his

review and then it requires council approval to institute a lawsuit in circuit court to get a court order to abate the nuisance.

Recommendation:

The proposed ordinance works to streamline the abatement procedure as follows:

- Expand Nonsummary abatement authority so it is available as a tool for any nuisance, eliminating the need for mayor and council review when the nuisance does not meet the current “danger to the public health, safety, peace, morals or decency” threshold. Allowing all nuisance to be abated via nonsummary procedure, avoiding delays caused by necessitating mayor and council review and the filing of a circuit court action.
- The inspecting official must issue an order to abate, a standardized form that includes clearly defined, required elements. The code now establishes a minimum compliance period, specifies the owner’s right to contest the order in circuit court, and affirms the City’s authority to enter the property and abate the nuisance if the owner does not comply with the prescribed time.
- The ordinance also now includes procedures for handling personal property of value that is removed during abatement and creates a clear process for owners to redeem property removed by the City.

The proposed ordinance revisions improve clarity in the abatement process, ensure more uniform implementation, reduce procedural delays, and modernize the abatement framework. For the forgoing reasons, the ordinance is recommended for approval.

The Common Council of the City of Wausau do ordain as follows:

Section 1. That Chapter 9.28 Abatement of Nuisances, is hereby repealed and recreated to read as follows:

9.28.010 Enforcement.

It shall be the responsibility of the Chief of Police, Director of Inspections and Electrical Systems, and Health Officer to enforce those provisions of this Chapter that come within the jurisdiction of their offices, and they shall make periodic inspections and inspections upon complaint to insure that such provisions are not violated. No action shall be taken under this Chapter to abate a public nuisance unless the officer shall have inspected or caused to be inspected the premises where the nuisance is alleged to exist and have satisfied himself that a nuisance does in fact exist.

9.28.020 Summary abatement.

- (a) If the inspecting officer determines that a public nuisance was created, exists, or is being maintained on a property and that there is a great and immediate danger to the public health, safety, peace, morals or decency, the officer may issue an order pursuant to Section 9.28.040 and the property owner shall have 24 hours from the date of service of the order to abate the nuisance identified in the order.
- (b) Abatement by City. If the owner fails or refuses to comply within the time prescribed, the City is authorized to enter onto the property containing the public nuisance and the City may proceed to abate the public nuisance through any available public agency or by contract or arrangement with private persons.
- (c) Restraining Order. Any person affected by an order under this Section may, within 24 hours of service of an order, apply to the Marathon County Circuit Court for an order restraining the City from abating the public nuisance or any such claim shall forever be barred.

9.28.030 Nonsummary abatement.

- (a) If the inspecting officer determines that a public nuisance was created, exists, or is being maintained on a property, the officer may issue an order pursuant to Section 9.28.040 and the property owner shall have fourteen (14) days from the date of service of the order to abate the nuisance identified in the order. The inspecting officer may extend the time to abate the nuisance upon a written request by the owner stating good cause for the extension.
- (b) Abatement by City. If the owner fails or refuses to comply within the time prescribed, the City is authorized to enter onto the property containing the public nuisance and the City may proceed to abate the public nuisance through any available public agency or by contract or arrangement with private persons.
- (c) Restraining Order. Any person affected by an order under this Section may, within fourteen (14) days of service of an order, apply to the Marathon County Circuit Court for an order restraining the City from abating the public nuisance or any such claim shall forever be barred.

9.28.040 Order to Abate Public Nuisance; Service.

- (a) Orders. An order issued pursuant to this Chapter must be in writing and include a statement of the violation with reference to the applicable provision of the Wausau Municipal Code, contain a date by which the nuisance must be abated, and notice of the process to contest the order.
- (b) Service. Orders under this Chapter shall be served on the owner of record for the property that is subject to the order pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 801.11 or by posting a copy of the order to a conspicuous place on the property and mailing the order via certified mail with return receipt requested to the owner's last known address, service shall be deemed complete upon posting and mailing.

9.28.050 Personal Property Removed.

If an inspecting officer removes any personal property of value, as determined in the sole discretion of the inspecting officer, while abating a public nuisance, the inspecting officer shall follow the procedures outlined in this Section.

- (a) Notice. The inspecting officer shall catalog the personal property of value and shall notify the property owner in writing of the property removed within seven (7) days of removal. The notice should inform the property owner that said property may be claimed for a period of thirty (30) days from the date of being removed from the property or it may be disposed of and should inform the property owner of how to claim the property.
- (b) Cost of Storage. The property owner shall be responsible for the actual cost of storage or, if the personal property is stored on City property, shall be charged \$10.00 per day the property is stored on City property, not to exceed thirty (30) days' worth of charges. The property owner must pay any storage costs prior to reclaiming the personal property.

- (c) Disposal. If the personal property is not reclaimed within thirty (30) days, the City may dispose of the personal property in any manner that the City, in its sole discretion, determines is appropriate. If the City disposes of the property by private or public sale, the City must send the proceeds of the sale minus any costs of sale, storage charges, and costs associated with abating the public nuisance, to the property owner.

9.28.060 Nonabatement prohibited.

No person shall fail to comply with a lawful order to abate a public nuisance issued pursuant to this section. Each day of noncompliance with a lawful order to abate issued pursuant to this Chapter is a separate violation.

9.28.070 Other methods not excluded.

Nothing in this Chapter shall be construed as prohibiting the prosecution or abatement of public nuisances by the City or its officials in accordance with any other law, ordinance, or regulation.

9.28.080 Cost of abatement.

In addition to any other penalty imposed by this Chapter, the City may collect the actual costs of abatement or removal of a nuisance under this Chapter from the property owner permitting or maintaining the nuisance and may assess such costs against the real estate as a special charge pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 66.0627.

Section 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect on the day after its publication.

Chapter 9.28 ABATEMENT OF NUISANCES

9.28.010 Enforcement.

It shall be the responsibility of the Chief of Police, Director of Inspections and Electrical Systems and Health Officer to enforce those provisions of this title that come within the jurisdiction of their offices, and they shall make periodic inspections and inspections upon complaint to insure that such provisions are not violated. No action shall be taken under this chapter to abate a public nuisance unless the officer shall have inspected or caused to be inspected the premises where the nuisance is alleged to exist and have satisfied himself that a nuisance does in fact exist.

(Prior code § 12.03(1).)

9.28.020 Summary abatement.

- (a) Notice. If the inspecting officer determines that a public nuisance exists and that there is a great and immediate danger to the public health, safety, peace, morals or decency, he shall cause notice to be served in the manner provided for service of a summons in circuit court upon the person causing, permitting or maintaining the nuisance or upon the owner or occupant of the premises where such nuisance is caused, permitted or maintained, and shall cause a copy of the notice to be posted on the premises. Such notice shall direct the person causing, permitting or maintaining such nuisance or the owner or occupant of the premises to abate or remove such nuisance within 24 hours, and shall state that unless such nuisance is so abated, the City will cause the same to be abated and will charge the cost thereof to the owner, occupant or person causing, permitting or maintaining the nuisance, as the case may be.
- (b) Abatement by City. If the nuisance is not abated within the time provided or if the owner, occupant or person causing the nuisance cannot be found, the officer having the duty of enforcement shall cause the abatement or removal of such public nuisance.

(Prior code § 12.03(2).)

9.28.030 Nonsummary abatement.

- (a) If an officer determines that a public nuisance exists but that the nature of such nuisance is not such as to threaten imminent danger to the public health, safety, peace, morals, or decency, notice to abate the nuisance may be issued and served by the officer pursuant to section 9.28.040 of the Wausau Municipal Code. The notice shall order abatement of the nuisance within the time period specified therein and shall state that unless the nuisance is so abated, the City will cause the same to be abated and will charge the cost thereof to the owner, occupant, or person causing maintaining, or permitting the nuisance; and if notice to abate the nuisance has been given to the owner, such cost shall be assessed against the real estate as a special charge.
- (b) Abatement by City. If the nuisance is not abated within the time provided or if the owner, occupant or person causing the nuisance cannot be found, the officer having the duty of enforcement shall cause the abatement or removal of such public nuisance.

9.28.040 Notice to abate.

The officer may attempt personal service on the owner, agent of the owner, occupant or other person causing, maintaining or permitting the nuisance at such person(s) last-known address. If this attempt is unsuccessful or impractical, the officer shall post a copy of the notice in a conspicuous place in or about the building where the nuisance exists and send notice by first class mail to the last-known address of the owner or agent of the owner.

9.28.050 Remedy from abatement order.

Any person affected by an order under sections 9.28.020 or 9.28.030 of the Wausau Municipal Code, shall, prior to the abatement date, apply to the circuit court for an order restraining the City from entering on the premises and abating or removing the nuisance, or be forever barred.

9.28.060 Nonabatement prohibited.

No person shall fail to comply with a lawful order to abate a public nuisance issued pursuant to this section. Each day of noncompliance with a lawful order to abate issued pursuant to this section is a separate violation.

9.28.070 Abatement by court action.

If the inspecting officer shall determine that a public nuisance exists on private premises but that the nature of such nuisance is not such as to threaten great and immediate danger to the public health, safety, peace, morals or decency, he shall file a written report of his findings with the Mayor, who, upon direction of the Common Council, shall cause an action to abate such nuisance to be commenced in the name of the City in the circuit court of Marathon County in accordance with the provisions of Wis. Stats. ch. 280.

9.28.080 Other methods not excluded.

Nothing in this chapter shall be construed as prohibiting the abatement of public nuisances by the City or its officials in accordance with the laws of the state.

9.28.090 Cost of abatement.

In addition to any other penalty imposed by this title for the erection, contrivance, creation, continuance or maintenance of a public nuisance, the cost of abating a public nuisance by the City shall be collected as a debt from the owner, occupant or person causing, permitting or maintaining the nuisance, and if notice to abate the nuisance has been given to the owner, such cost shall be assessed against the real estate as a special charge.

Patrol Captains Message

The second quarter of 2026 demonstrated, once again, the professionalism, adaptability, and unwavering commitment of the men and women of the Wausau Police Department. While our department continues to face staffing challenges due to retirements, employee departures, training commitments, injuries, and family leave, our officers have remained steadfast in providing exceptional service to the citizens of Wausau.

Throughout the quarter, Patrol officers responded to more than 600 emergency 9-1-1 calls, investigated 271 traffic crashes, handled 259 mental health incidents, attempted service on 145 arrest warrants, and addressed an increasing number of issues involving electric bicycles and e-motos. Officers also managed several significant incidents, including a Silver Alert, a large residential fire requiring the evacuation of residents, serious domestic violence investigations, and an armed subject incident at the Marathon County Public Library. These incidents represent only a portion of the work performed daily by our personnel and reflect the broad range of responsibilities our officers are expected to manage.

Traffic safety continues to be one of our department's highest priorities. During the second quarter, officers conducted more than 1,350 traffic stops, issued over 560 citations, made 52 Operating While Intoxicated arrests, and remained focused on reducing dangerous driving behaviors that place our community at risk. These proactive enforcement efforts are essential to preventing crashes and promoting safer roadways throughout the City of Wausau.

Our Community Resource Unit continued its outstanding work targeting drug trafficking and violent crime. Through proactive investigations, search warrants, and coordinated enforcement efforts, officers removed substantial quantities of methamphetamine, heroin, fentanyl, cocaine, and marijuana from our community while pursuing offenders responsible for distributing dangerous narcotics. The unit also continued investigations involving online child exploitation and connected individuals struggling with addiction to treatment and diversion resources, reinforcing our commitment to both enforcement and prevention.

Mental health and crisis response remain among the most significant demands placed upon law enforcement. Through our partnership with the Crisis Assessment Response Team (CART) and Marathon County, officers continue responding to hundreds of mental health-related calls and welfare checks each quarter. These situations require compassion, patience, sound judgment, and collaboration with our community partners, and I am proud of the professionalism our officers consistently demonstrate during these often difficult calls.

Downtown continues to evolve as services for individuals experiencing homelessness transition to the new Bridge Street Mission facility. Our Downtown Officers have worked closely with shelter staff, city departments, and community partners to address emerging challenges while maintaining a visible presence throughout the downtown area. Their proactive engagement has contributed to improved public perceptions of downtown safety and reflects our department's commitment to collaborative problem-solving.

Perhaps the greatest accomplishment this quarter cannot be measured by statistics alone. It is the resilience, teamwork, and dedication demonstrated by our employees every day. Despite operating below full staffing, our officers have continued to answer every call for service, support one another during critical incidents, mentor our newest officers, and maintain the high standards of professionalism that define the Wausau Police Department.

As we look toward the remainder of 2026, our priorities remain clear: continue investing in our people, strengthen partnerships within our community, proactively address crime and traffic safety concerns, and ensure our officers have the training, technology, and equipment necessary to meet the ever-changing demands of modern policing. I remain confident that, through the dedication of our employees and the support of our community, the Wausau Police Department will continue to build upon its proud tradition of professionalism, service, and public trust.

Counting Rules

Counts on this page are based on the month of the incident or arrest, rather than the month the incident was submitted. If the incident date is unknown, the report date is used. Counts are subject to change as data are updated.

Offense counts are calculated based on the number of offenses for each victim (per incident) for Crimes Against Persons and the number of unique offense types (per incident) for Crimes Against Property and Crimes Against Society. For burglary and motor vehicle theft, offense counts are based on the number of premises entered and the number of vehicles stolen, respectively.

Victim counts are calculated based on the number of victims connected to each unique offense type in an incident. For Crimes Against Persons, the number of victims will be equal to the number of offenses. Victims will be counted more than once if they are connected to multiple offenses.

Arrest counts are calculated based on the number of arrestees listed on a Group A or Group B incident. Each arrestee is counted only once per incident.

Arrests are categorized based on the specific Group A or Group B arrest code submitted by the agency, rather than the incident offense code. Since agencies only submit the most serious arrest charge for each arrestee on an incident, arrest counts are not indicative of the number of charges.

Incidents are cleared in one of two ways: by arrest or by exceptional means. Clearance counts are based on the number of offenses cleared in a given month regardless of when the offense occurred, and can therefore be greater than the number of offenses in a given month. In incident-based reporting, the first arrest on an incident, or an exceptional clearance, will clear all offenses associated with the incident.

Patrol Bureau

Patrol Staffing – Department had a significant change in staffing this quarter.

- Officers Ethan Bares, Cody Friedenfels, Dakota Heidmann and Eric Valadez completed training and are excited to be on their own serving the community of Wausau.
- Officer Reyes returned from Active duty on June 29th, after a short training period he is back to his regular patrol shift.
- Three officers left to pursue other careers and Ofc. Jurasin retired after 25 years of service.
- We currently have 2 officers on light duty from work-related injuries and 1 on light duty because of a significant medical issue.
- We currently have 3 officers on FMLA leave.

Because of the above openings and injuries, patrol shifts are operating at minimums.

9-1-1 calls - Officers responded to 626 emergent calls

Crashes - Officers responded to a total of 271 vehicle crashes, including 64 Hit and Run crashes.

Mental Health - Officers responded to 259 mental health calls.

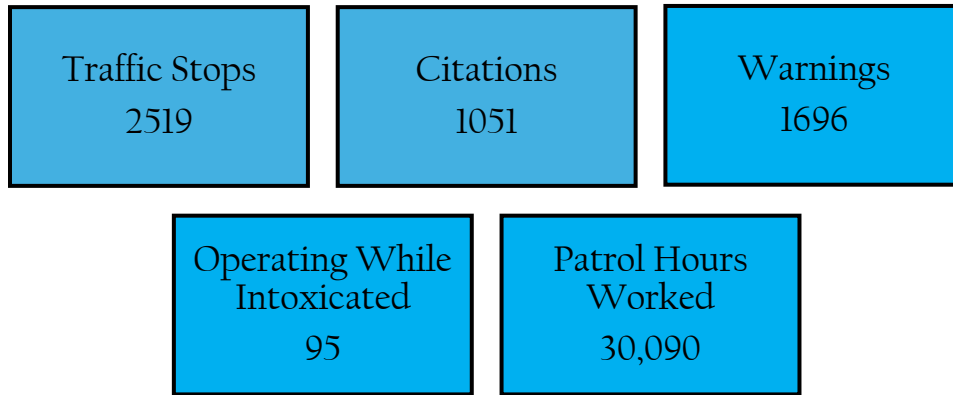
Sexual Assaults - Officers responded to and investigated 11 sexual assaults.

Warrant Service Attempts - Officers responded to 145 Arrest warrant attempts.

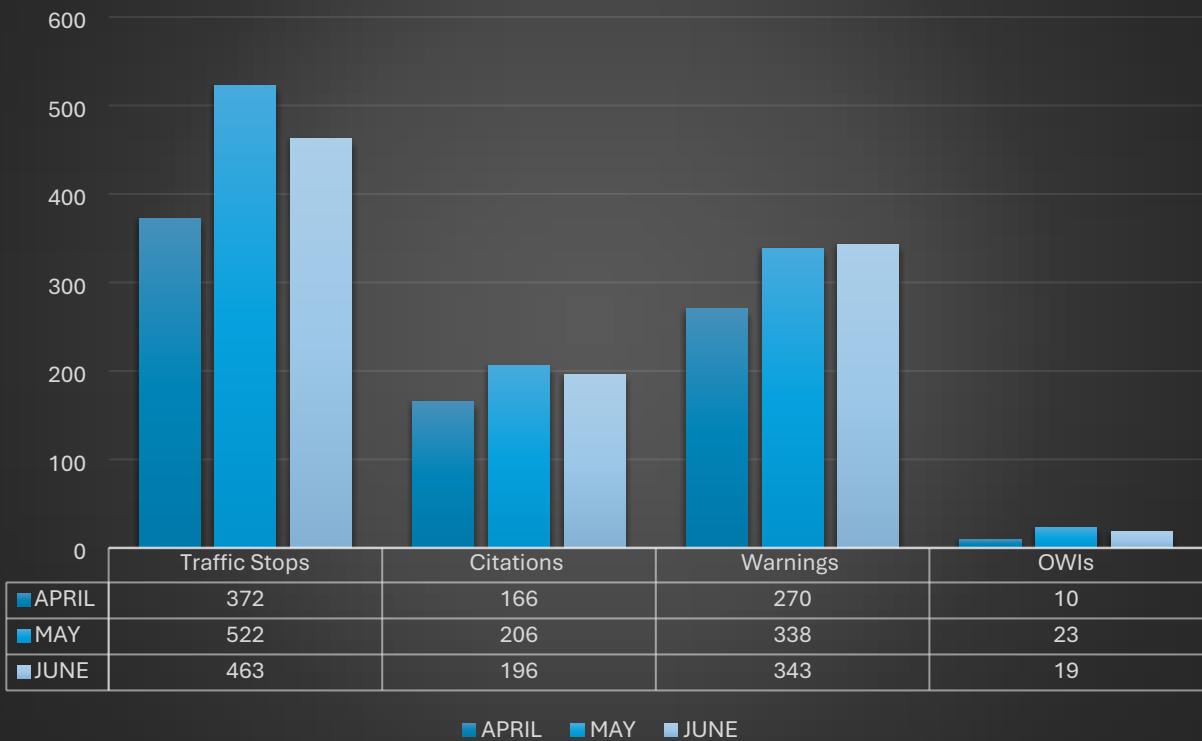
EMOTOS – Officers responded and initiated over 30 contacts with e-bikes/e-motos. Several contacts led to juveniles fleeing and driving recklessly.

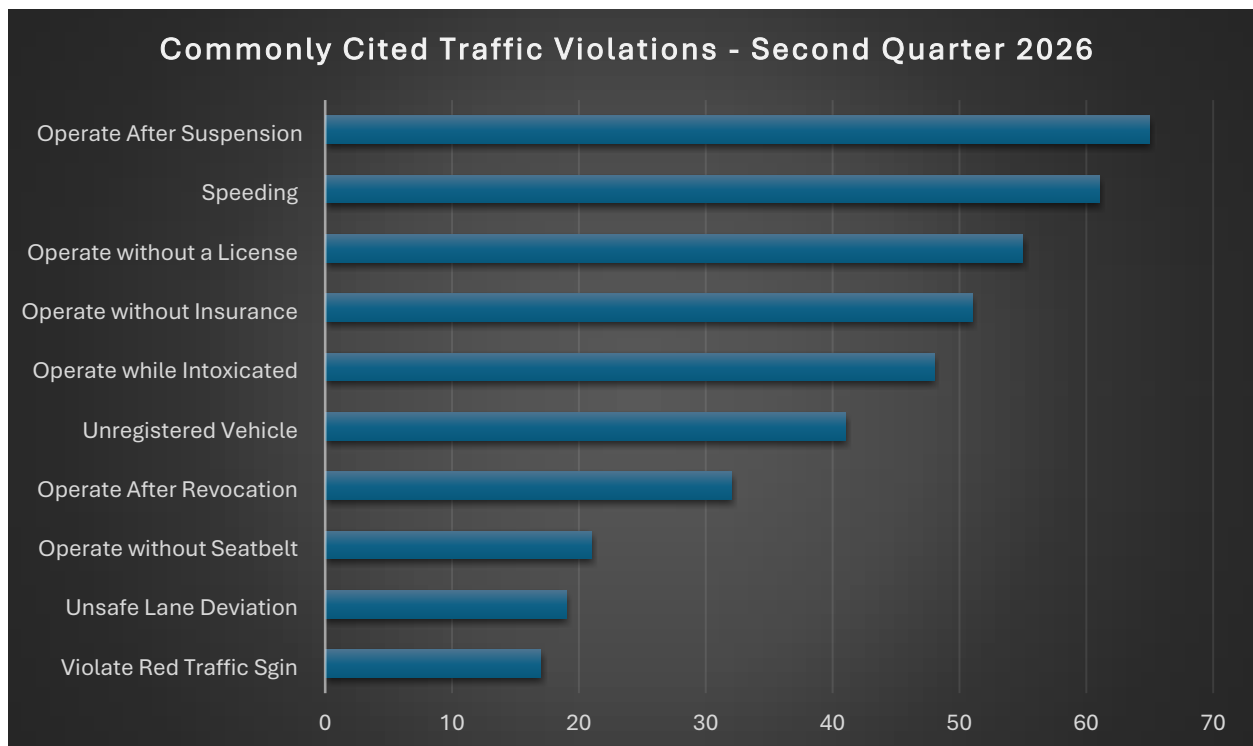
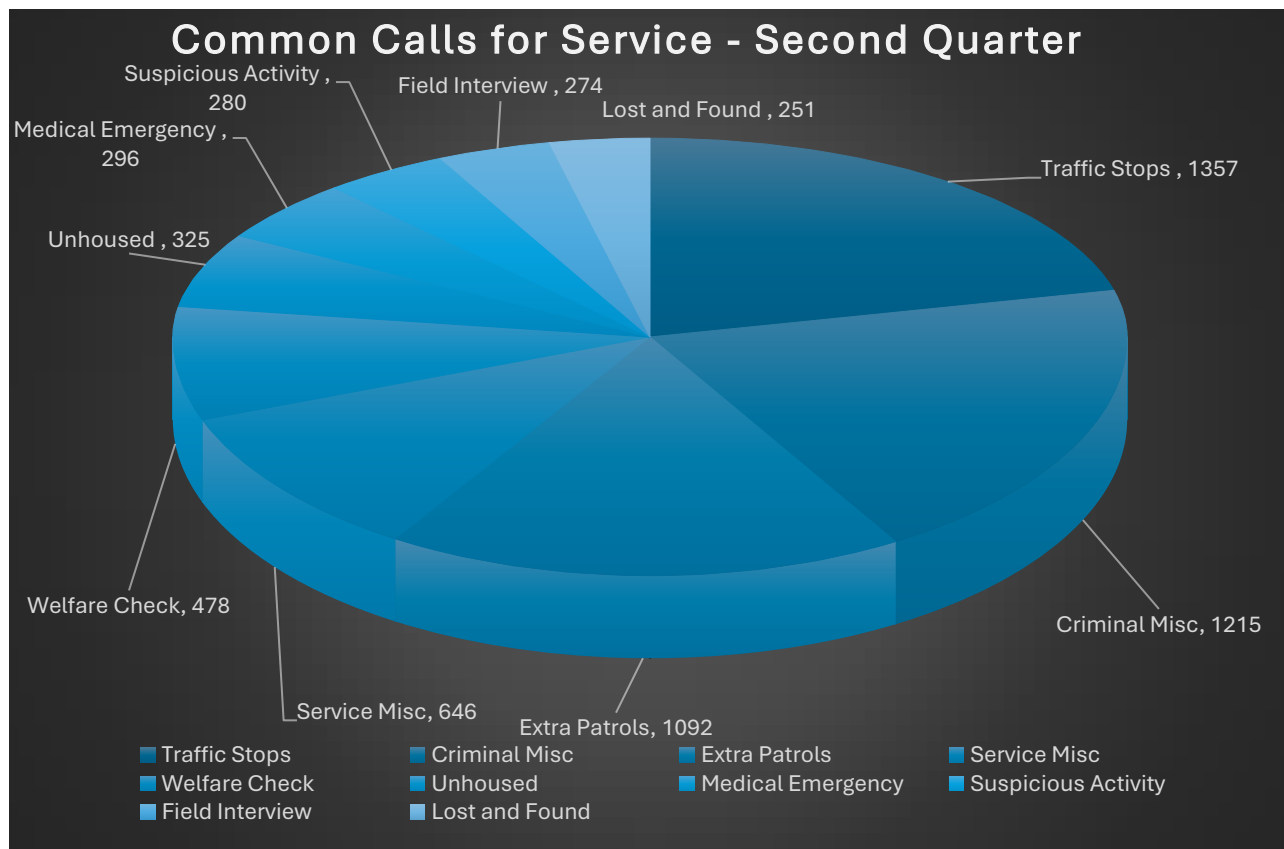
- A Silver Alert was issued on 04/27/26 for an overdue motorist with dementia. The male was found safe a few hours later.

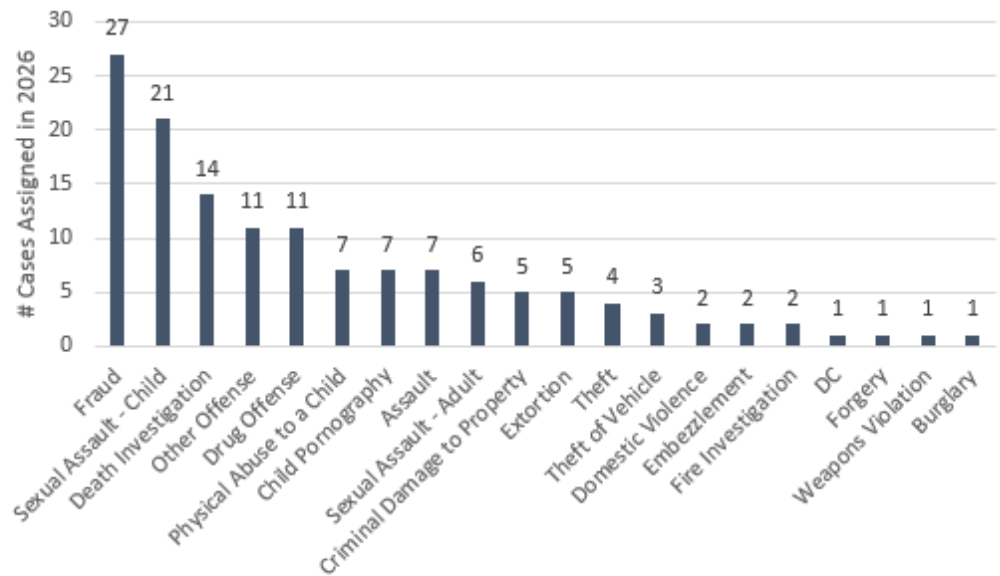

Major Cases/Trends

[Suicide] In April, officers conducted a welfare check after family members were unable to reach an adult living alone. The individual was found deceased inside the residence from a self-inflicted gunshot wound, with no indications of foul play. Evidence and family statements indicated ongoing mental-health challenges and recent personal and work-related stress. The Medical Examiner confirmed the death as a suicide, and the case was closed.

[Drug Overdose] In May, officers responded to a medical emergency at a local residence and discovered an adult deceased from a suspected drug overdose. The investigation revealed quantities of illegal drugs and paraphernalia in the home. Interviews and evidence indicated ongoing substance use and sales activity by residents. The Medical Examiner determined the cause of death was accidental, due to mixed drug toxicity involving fentanyl and methamphetamine. Charges related to drug activity and obstruction were referred to the District Attorney, and the case remains open.

[Suicide] In May, officers responded to a medical emergency at a local residence and found an adult male with a gunshot wound. The investigation determined the injury was self-inflicted, and the individual later died at the hospital. Interviews and evidence indicated ongoing stress related to medical issues, finances, and family circumstances. No signs of foul play were found, and the Medical Examiner's review supported the determination of suicide. The case was closed.

[Suicide] In June, officers responded to a medical emergency at a local residence and found an adult male deceased from a self-inflicted gunshot wound. The investigation revealed the individual had been experiencing a prolonged mental health decline and had recently discussed plans for treatment with family. No signs of foul play were found. The Medical Examiner determined the cause of death was suicide, and the case was closed.

[Domestic] In June, officers responded to a domestic disturbance at a local motel and found an adult female with severe injuries. The investigation revealed ongoing physical abuse, including strangulation, battery, and threats, perpetrated by a partner. Evidence included medical records, witness statements, and video footage documenting repeated assaults. The victim was pregnant at the time of the incident. The suspect was arrested and charged with multiple offenses, including strangulation, battery, false imprisonment, disorderly conduct, and probation violation. The case was referred to the District Attorney and remains open.

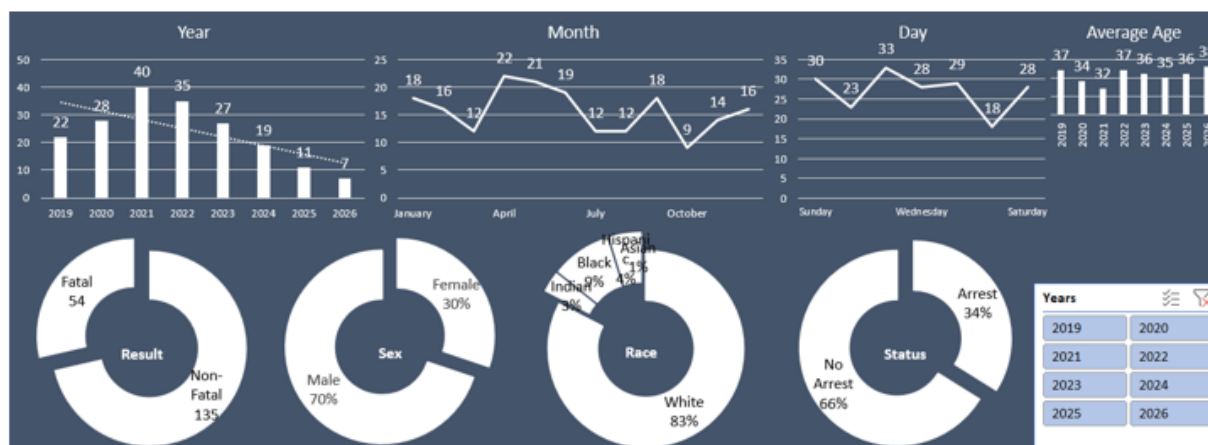
[Sextortion] Three recent investigations reveal a troubling pattern of online sextortion targeting local youth. In each case, minors were contacted by individuals posing as peers—often through popular platforms like TikTok, Snapchat, or messaging apps. The offenders typically initiated conversations, gained trust, and then encouraged the victims to exchange explicit images. Once images were sent, the offenders quickly shifted to threats and demands, including requests for money or further images, leveraging the threat of public exposure or sharing with friends and family. These cases underscore the importance of proactive education, digital safety, and support resources for youth and families facing online exploitation.

Drug Overdoses

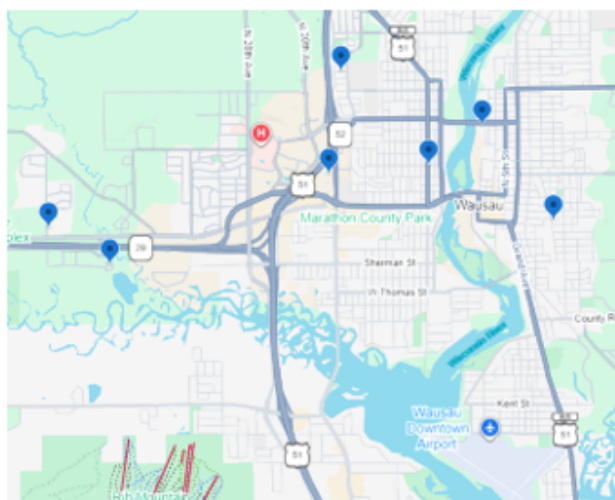

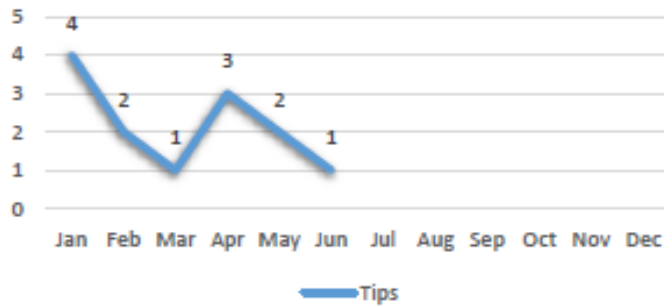
The Wausau Police Department has experienced a sustained decline in overdose responses since peaking in 2021:

- 2021: 40 overdoses (12 fatal) — highest on record.
- 2022: 35 overdoses (9 fatal) — a 12% overall decrease and a 25% reduction in fatalities.
- 2023: 27 overdoses (10 fatal, 17 non-fatal) — a 23% reduction from the prior year.
- 2024: 19 overdoses (6 fatal, 13 non-fatal) — a 30% reduction from the prior year.
- 2025: 11 overdoses (3 fatal, 8 non-fatal) — a further 42% decrease from 2024, with fatalities down 50%.
- 2026: 7 overdoses (3 fatal, 4 non-fatal) — a 27% upward trend overall, with fatalities trending up 100% from 2025

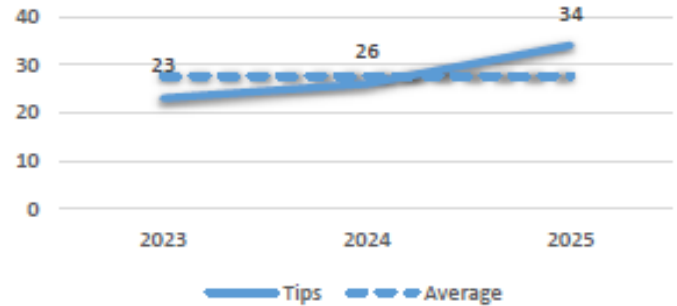
Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Statistics

WPD ICAC Tips by Month

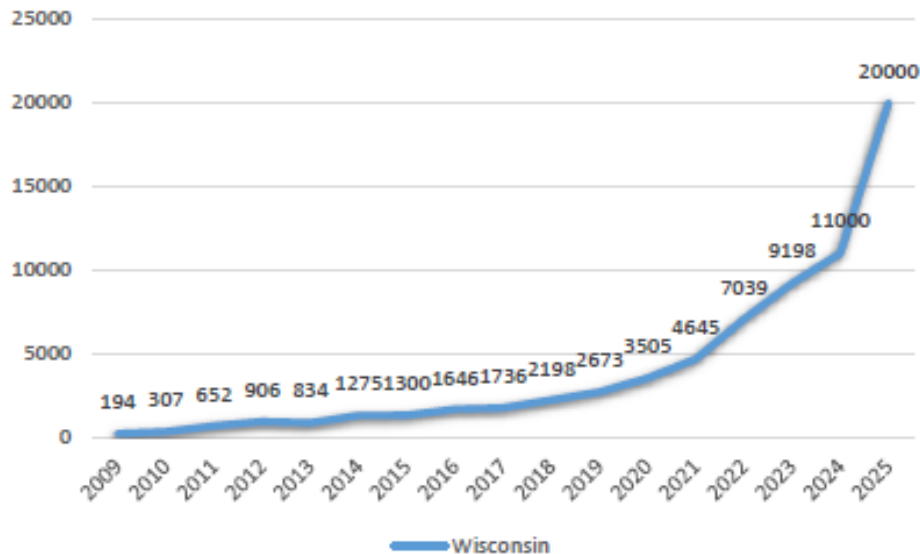


WPD ICAC Tips by Year

Summary

WPD has experienced a steady rise in ICAC tips over the past three years, representing a 52% increase from 2023 to 2025. Locally, online child-exploitation incidents are not leveling off—they are accelerating.

The statewide trend is much more dramatic. Since 2009, Wisconsin has seen an explosive increase—more than a 100-fold rise. The most significant growth occurs after 2020, with tips nearly doubling in just the last two years.

Downtown Officer Program

During this quarter, Bridge Street Mission (BSM) opened both its day center and its overnight unhoused shelter, coinciding with the closure of the Wausau Police Department's temporary shelter.

Downtown officers worked with BSM leadership throughout the transition, holding meetings to support operational coordination and community safety as services shifted to the new facility.

Between April 20 and May 3, BSM generated **57 calls for service**, including requests for extra patrol, medical emergencies, and various criminal complaints.

Since the opening, Downtown Officers have continued to spend a significant amount of time at and around the shelter to maintain safety and support staff as they adjust to the increased service demands.

As the shelter began operating at full capacity, disorderly behavior previously concentrated in the downtown core has migrated to nearby locations such as the gazebo area and the west side of the river. Several encampments have been located throughout the city; however, the overall number of camps has been noticeably lower compared to 2025.

Community feedback has been positive. Downtown officers have been told that the downtown area feels significantly improved and 'very nice'. This reflects both the impact of BSM's expanded services and the sustained engagement of the downtown team.

"CFS": Calls For Service (Officer initiated activities and calls received from Dispatch).

"Mental Health" and **"Welfare Check"** are the two most common types of CFS (coded by Dispatch based on the initial information reported) that involve individuals in crisis.

"Community" origin of 51.15 / 51.45: Law enforcement is called to a location in the community (*residence, business, public location*) in response to an individual in crisis (or incapacitated). De-escalation, safety planning, and/or diversion is not viable or is unsuccessful, resulting in 51.15 or 51.45 detention.

"Facility" origin of 51.15: While under care or custody of the Jail, NCHC, or medical facility; an inmate or patient is suicidal or otherwise assessed on-site by a Crisis Professional, and deemed in need of 51.15. Law Enforcement is then called upon to confirm and complete the 51.15 (as required by WI Stats.) **Lacks opportunity for diversion.**

"51.15": "Emergency Detention" under WI Statute 51.15. Law enforcement may take into custody an individual who is:

- (1) Mentally ill, drug dependent or developmentally disabled, and;
- (2) A substantial probability of physical harm to him/herself or others is evident by recent acts or omissions, attempts or threats.

"51.45": "Alcohol or Drug Detention" under WI Statute 51.45. "A person who appears to be 'incapacitated by alcohol or another drug' shall be placed under protective custody by a law enforcement officer."

Community Resource Unit consists of 5 officers and 1 Lieutenant (CROs)

Law enforcement would not be able to do its job successfully without access to data. The 79 sworn officers at the Wausau Police Department create a lot of data and paperwork, but it's only useful if it can be found when it's needed, and only if it gets to the correct people. We have one Office Manager, four Administrative Assistants that keep all of our processes moving. They receive information from the officers, be sure it is entered and properly cataloged, forward it to other agencies and departments, and then review and potentially release when requested. This includes paper reports, squad video and body worn camera, photos, and lost and found items.

This department is also the first point of contact for customer service for the public. They are a cheerful, resourceful group who go out of their way to be sure needs get met in as timely a manner as possible.

Fire Chief Report by Chief Jeremy Kopp

This report covers the period from April through June 2026. The second quarter provided continued momentum in professional development, operational refinement, and departmental planning for the months ahead.

At the end of June, I attended the Wisconsin State Fire Chiefs Conference in Milwaukee. This conference offered high-quality leadership and operational training sessions, along with invaluable networking opportunities with fire service leaders from across the state. The classes reinforced best practices in strategic planning, resource management, and emerging trends in emergency services. These insights will help inform our future planning efforts as we move into budget development and organizational forecasting.

A significant focus this quarter has been managing overtime usage. We continue to work toward stabilizing staffing levels through ongoing recruitment efforts, while also maximizing our ability to conduct meaningful training in-house whenever possible. This approach allows crews to remain available for emergency response while still advancing their skillsets. However, it is important to note that outside training remains an essential component of firefighter and paramedic development, and we continue to support participation in select external courses that provide specialized expertise.

As we approach the upcoming budget cycle, much of our administrative work has shifted toward planning for long-term needs. One priority is addressing the vacant Division Chief of Training position, which has been unfilled for nearly two years due to budget constraints. Restoring this position is critical to the department's training infrastructure, leadership development, and succession planning. We are hopeful that the next quarter will bring positive updates in this area.

Additionally, we continue to evaluate opportunities for growth within the Community Care Paramedic Division. Our partnership with Aspirus Hospital remains strong, and we are collaboratively exploring ways to expand community-based healthcare support. Enhancing this program will allow us to better meet the needs of residents while reducing strain on emergency medical resources. We anticipate meaningful progress in this initiative over the next quarter.

Training efforts this quarter included seasonal operations refreshers, water rescue training, equipment drills, and severe weather preparedness exercises. Crews remained highly engaged in strengthening readiness for summer emergencies, and call volume continued to reflect a sizable number of fall-related incidents within the community.

Administrative workflow evaluations remain ongoing following the relocation of the Fire Prevention Division to Station 2 earlier this year. Early feedback suggests improved workspace utilization and reduced congestion at Station 1.

Overall, the second quarter of 2026 emphasized strategic planning, thoughtful resource management, and continued professional development. The Wausau Fire Department remains committed to enhancing operational readiness and strengthening community partnerships as we prepare for the remainder of the year.

On behalf of the department, I extend sincere appreciation to the City of Wausau, our community partners, and the residents we proudly serve. Your continued support enables us to meet the evolving needs of our community with professionalism and resilience.

The second quarter of 2026 has been an exceptionally productive period for the Operations Division of the Wausau Fire Department. While our personnel continued to provide outstanding emergency response services to our community, we also made significant progress on several initiatives that strengthen our operational readiness.

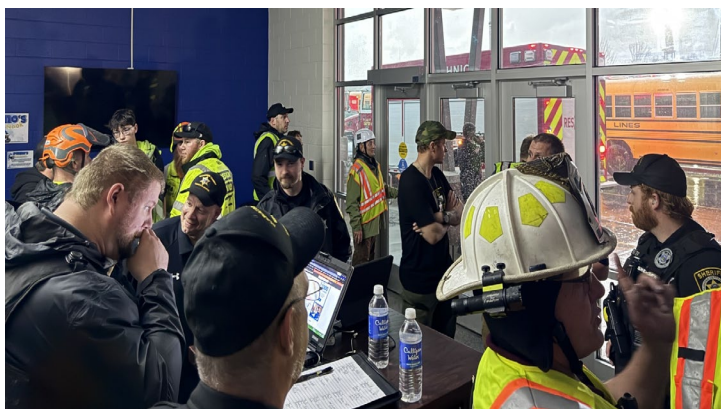
Central Wisconsin Airport Disaster Tabletop Exercise

In April, WFD Command Staff participated in a large-scale disaster tabletop exercise at Central Wisconsin Airport with regional partners including law enforcement, fire departments, hospitals, Emergency Management, and airport staff. The exercise focused on Incident Command, multiple casualty incidents, mutual aid, resource management, patient triage, and coordination between EMS and hospitals. This training was coordinating and made possible with the efforts of the North Central Regional Trauma Advisory Council (NCRTAC) and North Central Wisconsin Healthcare Emergency Readiness Coalition (NCW HERC).

Regional Response – April 17 Ringle Tornado

On Friday April 17, members of the Wausau Fire Department Command Staff responded to assist with the tornado that struck the Town of Ringle. The tornado caused widespread destruction. The incident required a coordinated, multi-agency response to address life safety concerns, conduct damage assessments, manage resources, and support recovery efforts. Through a unified command structure, agencies communicated effectively, shared resources, and worked together to ensure that all operational objectives were completed safely and efficiently.

Additionally, WFD Firefighter Christensen's home was directly in the tornado's path. After ensuring his family was safe, he immediately went door-to-door in his neighborhood to check on residents impacted by the storm, exemplifying dedication.



The professionalism and teamwork demonstrated by every agency involved resulted in a well-coordinated response. We commend the members of the Ringle Fire Department for their leadership throughout the incident and appreciate the dedication of all responders who came together to serve the residents of the Town of Ringle.

New Vehicle Extrication Equipment

New hydraulic extrication equipment was placed into service. Training continues for all personnel. The equipment improves our ability to safely and quickly remove seriously injured patients from heavily damaged vehicles. Funding was made possible through Capital Improvement Project (CIP) funds and grant assistance.



Public Information Officer Training

Battalion Chief Wiesman and Fire Chief Justin Pluess attended the Wisconsin Emergency Management/FEMA Public Information Officer course, strengthening the department's ability to communicate effectively with the public and media during emergencies.

New Scheduling Software

WFD staff worked with the City's IT Department and Wausau Police Department through the RFP process. FirstDue was selected as the City's new scheduling software, improving scheduling, record keeping, and workforce management.

Wings Over Wausau

The Wausau Fire Department played a significant role in supporting the Wings Over Wausau Air Show, held June 26–27, 2026, at the Wausau Downtown Airport. The event attracted thousands of spectators and featured professional daytime aerobatic performances on both days, spectacular nighttime airshows each evening, and one of the area's largest fireworks displays on Saturday night.



Supporting an event like this requires months of planning and coordination between the Wausau Fire Department, airport staff, event organizers, Wausau Police Department, Marathon County Sheriff's Department, the U.S. Coast Guard, Wisconsin DNR, and numerous other local and regional partners. Department personnel participated in multiple planning meetings to develop emergency response plans, establish incident command procedures, coordinate aircraft rescue and firefighting capabilities, and ensure adequate staffing and resources were available throughout the event. The air show required significant commitment from Wausau Fire Department personnel and apparatus.

Significant Incidents

April 7 – Residential Structure Fire

WFD responded to a two-story triplex after reports of smoke coming from the exterior of the building. Upon arrival, crews quickly located a fire concealed within an exterior wall that had begun extending into the interior living space. WFD crews extinguished the visible fire, opened the wall to expose hidden fire extension, and coordinated with additional crews to complete overhaul and ensure the fire was fully extinguished.

April 11 – Commercial Structure Fire (Mutual Aid Response)

WFD responded on a second alarm assignment to assist the Mosinee Fire Department with a commercial structure fire at a large manufacturing facility. Upon arrival, WFD crews were assigned truck operations, including aerial roof operations, interior ventilation, and assisting fire investigators with locating the fire's origin. During operations, firefighters identified a large chemical tank releasing an unknown liquid, prompting additional evaluation and coordination with facility personnel.

Due to the potential for hazardous materials involvement, the Wausau Fire Department Hazardous Materials Team was placed on standby while plant personnel evaluated the integrity of the chemical storage systems. Fortunately, it was determined that the chemicals remained safely contained, and a hazardous materials response was not required.

April 17 – Residential Structure Fire

WFD responded to a reported residential structure fire after occupants reported a stove fire with smoke filling the upper level of the home. Upon arrival, firefighters confirmed all occupants had safely evacuated and quickly entered the residence. Crews extinguished the stove fire, ventilated the structure to remove heavy smoke, secured the gas and electrical utilities to the appliance, and utilized thermal imaging and atmospheric monitoring equipment to confirm there was no fire extension or hazardous carbon monoxide present before returning the home to the occupants.

May 2 – Multi-Family Residential Structure Fire

WFD responded to a working fire in a large multi-family residential building that housed numerous elderly residents and individuals with disabilities. Upon arrival, interior conditions confirmed an active fire, and additional resources were requested through a MABAS box alarm due to the size of the building and the number of occupants requiring assistance and evacuation. Firefighters conducted coordinated fire attack, search and rescue operations and ventilation.

The fire was brought under control, and all occupants were accounted for. Crews systematically checked every room for toxic gases, hidden fire extension, and salvage concerns before the building was deemed safe for re-entry. One resident was displaced by the fire, while several neighboring occupants temporarily relocated due to smoke and water damage.

May 24 – Multi-Family Residential Structure Fire

WFD responded to a fire alarm at a multi-family apartment complex after a neighboring resident reported a smoke detector sounding continuously for approximately one hour. Upon investigation, firefighters gained access to the apartment and encountered heavy smoke conditions. Crews quickly located an unattended pot left on an active stove burner, secured the appliance, removed the overheated cookware, and confirmed no occupants or pets were inside the apartment. Firefighters then ventilated the residence and monitored air quality before safely returning the unit to the occupants.

June 3 – Detached Garage Fire with Extension into Residence

WFD responded to a fully involved detached garage fire that quickly threatened a nearby residence. Upon arrival, firefighters initiated a defensive attack on the garage while simultaneously identifying that the fire had extended through the soffit and into the attic of the home. Crews established a water supply, deployed multiple handlines, performed coordinated interior and exterior fire attack and vertically ventilated the roof. The fire was ultimately confined to the attic space, preventing significant damage to the remainder of the home.

During this incident, WFD was simultaneously dispatched to a second reported structure fire elsewhere in the city, requiring department resources to be carefully managed while maintaining coverage for additional emergencies.

June 6 – Commercial Structure Fire

WFD responded to a reported commercial structure fire after employees discovered smoke coming from behind a wall in the kitchen and cooler area of a single-story business. Upon arrival, firefighters located a concealed fire involving insulation and building materials that had been ignited by sparks from construction work. Crews removed wall coverings and insulation to access hidden hot spots, extinguished the remaining fire, verified there was no extension into the attic space, and ventilated the building before returning it to the owner.

June – 26 Outdoor/Tent Fire

WFD responded to a tent fire involving multiple LP propane tanks. Bystanders had mostly knocked down the fire, but due to propane hazards and reported smoke inhalation, crews were needed. One individual with smoke inhalation was evaluated and did not require transport. The tent was heavily damaged, and four unsecured 20-lb propane cylinders were found under a table with pressure cookers; one was leaking. Crews disconnected propane hoses and moved the leaking cylinder to a safe area. The scene was secured.

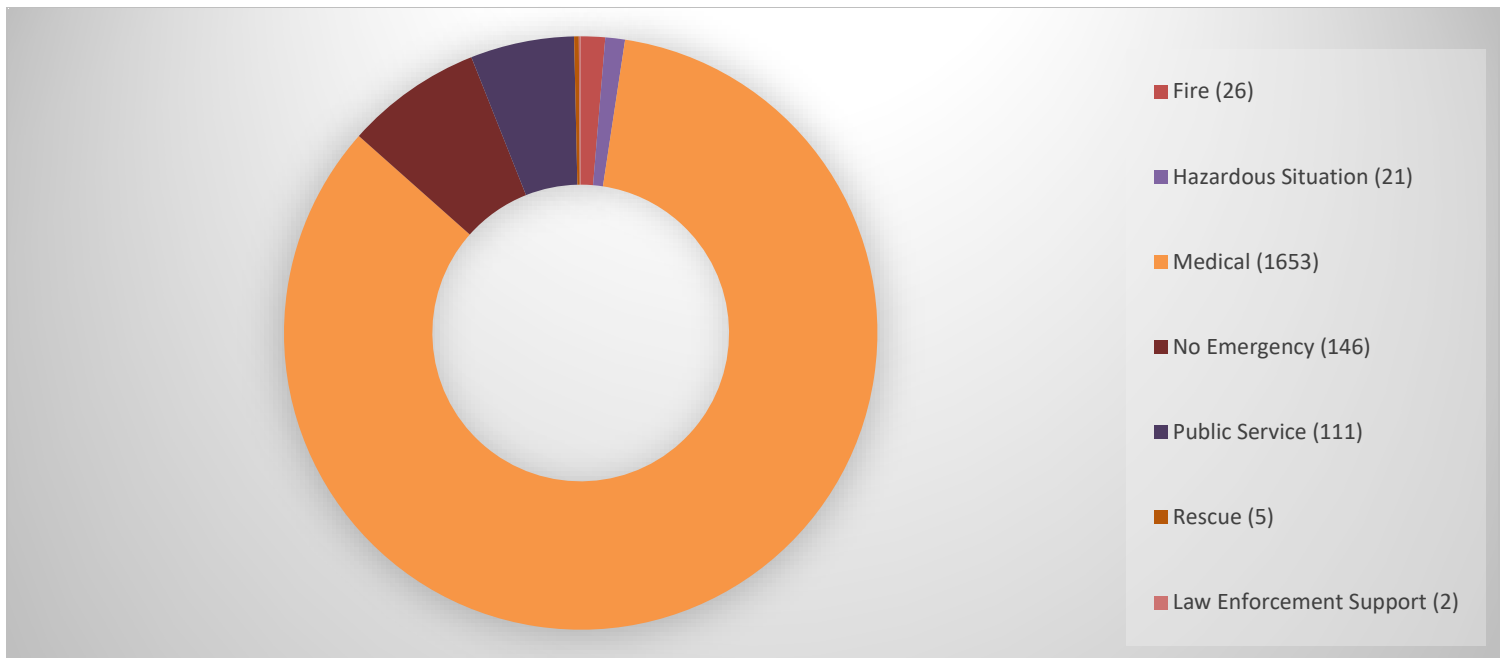

EMS Division by EMS Division Chief Matthew Tormohlen

Second quarter encompasses some of our busiest months. Our EMS run volume continues to increase, with our medics responding to a total of 1,768 runs in Q2 2026, an increase of 11.83% of Q2 2025.

Following a complete revision of our EMS training and tracking program, Wausau Fire successfully recertified all four of our State EMS licenses (Tactical EMS, WFD EMS, WFD Community Care and WFD Training Center), valid through June of 2029. Additionally, all WFD employees renewed their individual licenses, a requirement to maintain the level of service we provide to the city. This represented a total of over 4,000 continuing education hours completed by our Paramedics.

Our monthly Critical Case Review process continues to expand with the help of our newly appointed EMS Crew Leads. Critical Case reviews are instrumental in expanding our paramedics understanding of Emergency Medicine. Our Medical Director is also beginning bi-monthly lectures on different topics in EMS.

Global supply issues have made their way to Wausau Fire. Our newly purchased video laryngoscopes have been placed on backorder, and we are currently working on ways to expediate their delivery. In the meantime, we have implemented a monthly skills evaluation, where each fire company completes all our highest risk skills under the review of the EMS Division Chief or one of the EMS Crew Leads. Our job requires the use of fine motor skills in incredibly stressful situations. Repetition of the mechanics in a controlled environment builds muscle memory and is instrumental in building confidence and skill, when it matters most.

Wausau Fire continues to adapt and overcome challenges associated with our ambulance fleet. We are still down one front-line ambulance due to manufacturer delays and repairs associated with warranty items. Our front-line staff continues to work tirelessly to maintain three front-line ambulances, ready for serving the community, often having to switch between ambulances multiple times within a 24hr period to ensure the maintenance needed can be completed to keep our ambulance fleet running safely.

Moving into 3rd quarter, we will be completing additional trauma training, burn training and heat related emergency training. A recent survey completed by our paramedics sent a clear message: “We want more training; we want to do better!” I think this exemplifies the personnel that work here; dedicated and always looking to improve. I am proud to play a small part in helping these self-motivated, incredibly capable paramedics achieve their professional goals.

Fire Prevention Division by Fire Prevention Division Chief Shahn Kariger

Inspections: Throughout the second quarter of 2026, we inspected 1360 public buildings and places of employment. We performed 1162 inspections that passed, and we had 198 properties with fire code violations. 206 of the 1360 were re-inspections from previous violations. The failed inspections were primarily overdue fire extinguisher annual maintenance, followed by overdue sprinkler system service, failed exit/emergency lighting, and fire alarm annual service and deficiency issues. These properties will require continued follow-up inspections to confirm compliance. We completed 42 consultations for the quarter. These include consultations for Fire Alarm and Sprinkler Systems, Knox Boxes, and new construction or remodeling.

We also received and reviewed 398 reports through the Compliance Engine for service and maintenance of Fire Protection Systems at various public buildings and businesses. We are currently at 98% for compliant systems, which is an outstanding accomplishment. This is a direct result of the Division's dedication to follow up, and the effectiveness of code enforcement and education we provide for our businesses throughout the city.

Investigations: The Prevention Division investigated 4 fires during the second quarter of 2026. The first fire originated inside a multi-family residential property, caused by an electrical circuit that was disturbed during remodeling. The second was classified as accidental involving a stove fire caused by inattentive cooking in a multi-family residential building. The third was accidental and involved another multi-family property where a fire table was left on and a cushion blew off a nearby couch onto the fire table due to wind. The last fire occurred at a private residential garage which spread to the residence. The cause was determined to be a heat source placed too close to combustibles and was also accidental. Fortunately, there were no significant injuries because of these fires. The estimated property loss because of the fires was nearly \$300,000 involving property and contents worth over \$80,000,000.

Public Outreach: We continue to install new smoke alarm and CO detectors in single family homes where they are needed. Totals for the quarter are- 4 private residences positively affecting 10 citizens, placing 17 smoke alarms and 4 CO detectors. We also provide a home safety survey, education regarding cooking safety, and encourage fire escape planning or options to shelter in place depending on the resident's abilities or limitations.

Education: Prevention Chief Kariger, Lieutenant Ludwig, and FF/Inspector Lech attended the International Association of Arson Investigators 50th annual seminar in Stevens Point, hosted by the Wisconsin Chapter IAAI. Topics included- *Lithium-Ion Battery Fire Causes and Failure Analysis, Legal Aspects of Fire Investigation, Electric Vehicle Fires, Extremist Groups, and Explosion Case Study and Analysis*. The Division logged 28 hours of Fire Investigation continuing education each. All personnel successfully renewed their Wisconsin Paramedic licenses and completed American Heart Association CPR refreshers. FF/Inspector Lech attended two higher level Incident Command courses. He earned certificates by successfully completing both ICS-300 and ICS-400 during June. These are both multi-day, advanced, classroom-based emergency management courses taught under the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and National Incident Management Systems (NIMS) guidelines. They teach supervisors and personnel how to manage expanding, multi-agency, and complex incidents, and are a pre-requisite for future promotions.

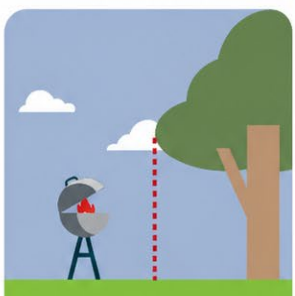

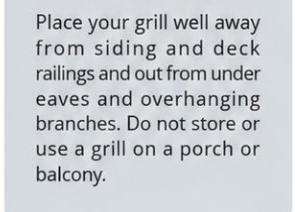

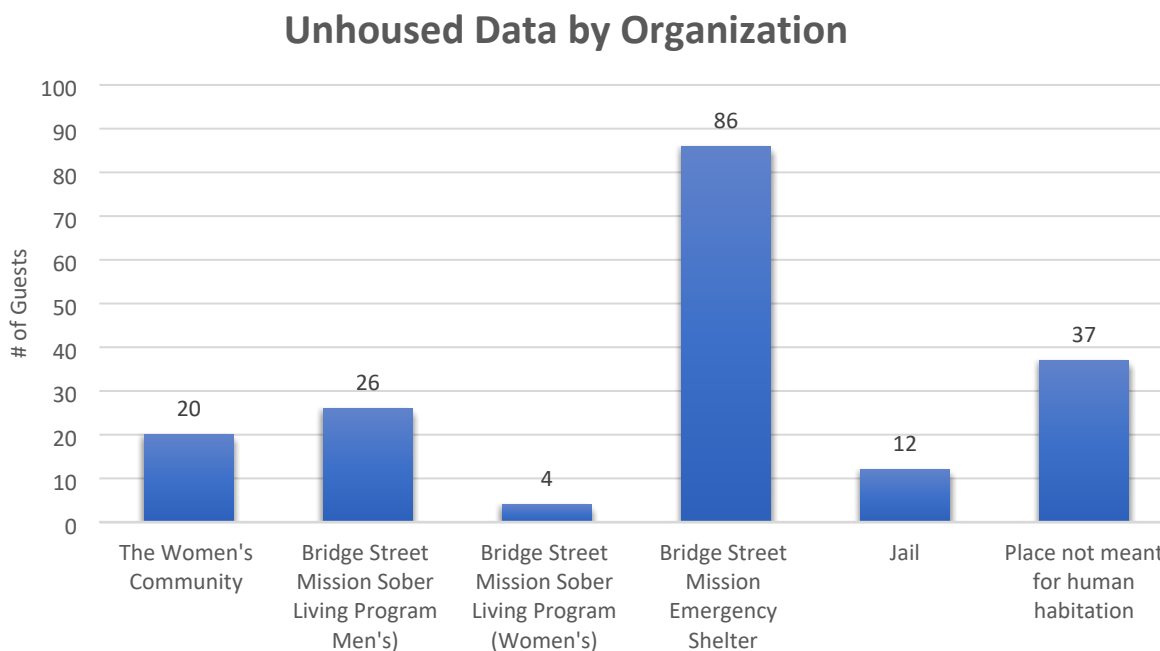

Unhoused Data

The following graph shows the number of unduplicated¹ guests housed by each organization in the previous month.



Unhoused Data Summary

In June, data provided suggests there were approximately 185 unhoused individuals identified in Wausau through various partnering agencies. As indicated in the footnote, 185 is not the true number of unhoused. As of today, organizations do not cross-reference names when coming up with their unduplicated count. This means an unhoused individual may be part of more than one organization's count, thereby inflating the true number of unhoused. An example is provided in the footnote. This number also does not include those individuals who are considered "couch surfing".

¹ The numbers reflected do not eliminate duplicates across organizations. For example, a person who stays at The Bridge Street Mission and Marathon County jail in the same month will count as 1 person for each organization.

In the graph above, 80 percent of the unhoused sought or received shelter in the month of June. Approximately 20 percent of the unhoused were living outside, or in places not meant for human habitation.

The Women's Community data includes crime victims who sought shelter because their home was unsafe. This number reflects both adult residents (11) and their children (9).

Bridge Street Mission includes individuals who have received shelter after release from jail/prison, drug rehab, or homelessness. The numbers reflected include all individuals who are housed at Bridge Street Mission Emergency Shelter, Men's recovery program and the newly opened Women's recovery program.

The Marathon County Jail includes individuals who identify as "homeless" or "unhoused" at the time of booking.

Outreach Update

One male client was moved into permanent supportive housing.

In addition to assisting with housing, we have also provided additional aid like transportation to medical/psychiatric appointments, bus passes, medication management, collaboration with St. Vincent DePaul, Catholic Charities, NCCAP, Social Services, Probation/Parole, and CW Solutions (FSET). Assistance was also provided with obtaining identification, setting individuals up with additional services through the ADRC as well as Community Treatment through NCHC. Case/Care Management is a service provided through both resources.

Collaboration with landlords and other non-profit agencies is on-going. Office hours at agencies throughout the city have proven beneficial in reaching the unhoused population.

Challenges and Opportunities

While we celebrate every time an unhoused individual achieves stable housing, the work does not and cannot end there. Generally, the unhoused population is vulnerable. Without someone providing ongoing support, management, intervention, accountability, and aid, the chances of remaining housed wane dramatically. In other words, our work can and will be undone in short order without systems to sustain the work. Thankfully, there are systems in place, but there are also gaps. Where gaps in case management exist, we are filling that void. We recognize, however, that our time and resources are limited in this regard. As a result, we are working to improve our understanding and relationship with existing systems while also exploring solutions that not only bridge the gap to housing, but to the essential supports that will make housing permanent.

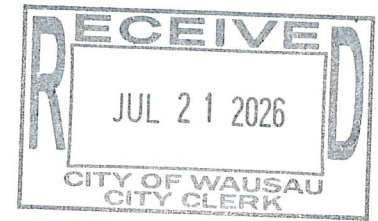
